is a special friend to members of her troop and all Girl Scouts.

5. A Girl Scout is courteous.

6. A Girl Scout is a friend to animals.

7. A Girl Scout obeys orders. She respects the laws of her community and the requests of those people who are responsible for her.

8. A Girl Scout is cheerful. She does her daily jobs pleasantly and is not discouraged when things seem hard.

9. A Girl Scout is thrifty. She uses materials, time, money, and energy wisely.

10. A Girl Scout is clean in thought, words and deed. She directs her thought toward worth-while things so that she will not stoop to words or deeds that would bring shame upon her or upon others.

"A girl who lives by the standards set forth in these laws must certainly grow up to be an asset to her family, community, and country," Mrs. Martin said.

"The girls and adult leaders have shown a great deal of enthusiasm for this new program and it is hoped that many parents will show their interest and support for this worthwhile organization," Mrs. Martin concluded.

Civil Defense Meeting Set Here Next Thursday Night

Mrs. Martin retired from her position as assistant district agent with the Texas Extension Service in 1958. She now devotes even more time to Civil Defense, serving as state consultant to the Texas Division of Defense and Dis-

aster Relief. She is a member of the National Women's Civil Defense Council, and has visited many states and has observed their related programs.

In her recent visit to Puerto Rico, much of her time was spent with Civil Defense people observing their work. Mrs. Martin met and talked with staff heads of government agencies, attended a radiological training school and awarded 16 certificates for those completing the course.

While in Europe last year, Mrs. Martin visited underground shelters in Norway, Civil Defense Centers in Denmark and spent an entire day in the Women's Volunteer Service headquarters in London.

Importance of the program will be explained at the Thursday meeting, and means of survival in a rural area will be discussed.

Mrs. Patsick has stressed that the program is not for women only, but for men and children as well, and expressed her hopes that a large group would be present for the meeting.

HOLLADAY COW HAS OUTSTANDING RECORD

The Holstein-Friesian Association of America has announced the completion of an outstanding official production record by a registered Holstein cow in this area.

Bosque Dandy Phyllis 3665041, owned by G. E. Holladay of Hico, produced 14,033 pounds of milk and 505 pounds butterfat in 267 days on twice daily milking as a 7-year-old.

Texas A & M College supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the official herd testing programs of the national Holstein organization.

These programs provide continuing lactation and lifetime production records on every cow in more than 2,800 participating registered Holstein herds.

Kiril Chteren, First Secretary, Legation of the People's Republic of Bulgaria, and Tosko Vantchev, Second Secretary were in Hamilton County this week observing the daily life of the average American farmer and businessman.

Both visitors are with the Bulgarian Embassy in Washington, D. C.

The two visitors spent Wednesday at the ranch of Derel Fillingim where they were interested observers of the huge poultry operation there.

They are primarily interested in farming and ranching operations, and the poultry industry of the county.

Friday, April 21, through Friday, May 5, has been proclaimed as Annual Clean-Up time in Hico by Mayor D. E. Bulloch.

Trash placed in containers and set at the curb will be hauled off free of charge by the city, on two separate days following the clean-up period.

Haul off days are Wednesday, May 3, and Friday, May 5.

The mayor has called upon every citizen to render all the aid and cooperation possible, pledging the cooperation of city officials in perpetuating Hico's record for sightliness and healthful conditions.

Mayor Bulloch pointed out that there was always an accumulation of trash about the premises of residences throughout town, and it takes constant effort to maintain sanitary conditions and control the hordes of mosquitoes which will soon be making their appearance.

City officials are urging everyone to cut weeds in ditches, gather up old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this special period of cleaning.

Officials are especially stressing the need to gather up all old tin cans, and any type container which might be holding stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation around premises are growing rapidly this spring, and should be cleaned away.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to the haulers.

Trash barrels, garbage cans, and other metal containers should have holes punched in the bottom to allow excess water to drain.

IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

By E. E. DAWSON

A fairly recent book by Edna Ferber is entitled "Letter From Peking." Like all Edna Ferber books, it is an interesting story of an American woman who married a man from China, whose father was an American and the mother Chinese. The husband had just finished his work at one of America's outstanding universities with a doctor's degree. The pair then went to China where he eventually was made the head of one of China's great universities. The pair had a daughter in due time, but she did not live long. Later they were the parents of a son. That made the boy one-fourth Chinese and three-fourths American.

Edna Ferber served for a good many years as a missionary in China and her articles and books have been among us here in America for generations. She is fond of Chinese people and her stories and articles always speak in high terms of the people of that ancient land. Edna Ferber says (I have read the statement repeatedly in her works) that Chinese women are the most beautiful of all women. And her admiration of Chinese men is equally high. I am inclined always to believe whatever the eminent writer says about anything.

Finally, the Communist invasion of China began and the husband began to urge his wife to return to America with the son, stressing that she was American and the son was more American than Chinese, and he foresaw difficult times for China. But he felt he must remain in that country as a duty he could not run from. The university must be continued whatever came to pass. The wife did not want to leave her husband for she and he were deeply in love with each other and she could not willingly leave him alone amid the changing conditions there. But for the sake of the son she finally came back to America and went to the family estate in Vermont. Now many thousand miles separated husband and wife, and son and father. It was a tremendous strain on all concerned. But seemed to be the only reasonable course.

All this has been said in order to repeat what Edna Ferber says about the wife and the husband. As the Communists took over, communications between husband and wife became increasingly difficult and finally ceased altogether, that is by letters. The censorship of the Communists was too rigid and involved too many dangers. But in spite of the vast distance from Vermont Hills where the wife and son resided and Peking where the husband was, Miss Ferber says the wife and husband did have communion with each other. It was a matter of spiritual communication of two deeply loving individuals. The wife was able to protect her mind across the continents and a vast ocean and meet and hold communication with another projected mind from a far-away west.

Now the question is, how is such a thing possible? But that it did occur I am ready to believe, for Edna Ferber is a wise, discerning soul, and entirely truthful and not given to treating fancies as facts. Beyond any question the two souls did meet and become conscious of

each other and convey a very personal message to each other. It is just one of the marvels of the human mind and spirit.

Such communication is possible only between souls in tune with each other; they must have love of a deep and abiding character; and this world does know that sort of love that binds hearts together. It is not unusual for souls to have such communication. I always remember my mother who would on a morning at breakfast sometimes say that something was the matter with a loved one. How did she know? Her love had caught the message. I never knew such statements from mother to be in error. She knew because she had the news through spiritual channels. Many other such occurrences could be related. This seems enough.

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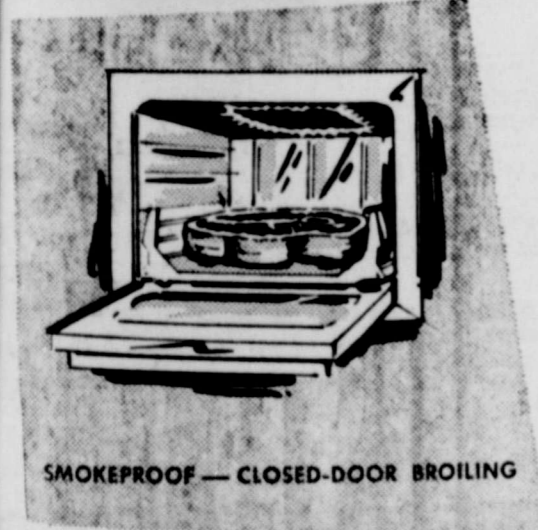
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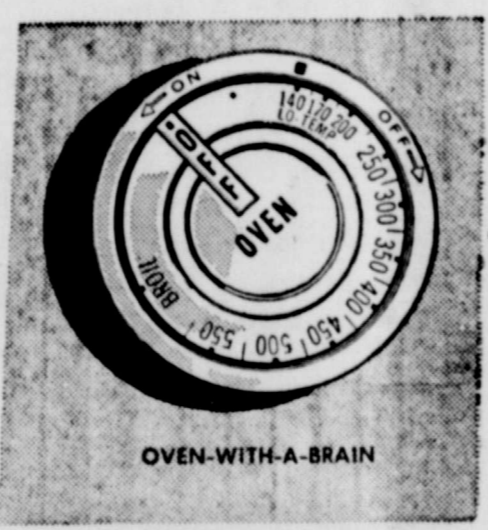
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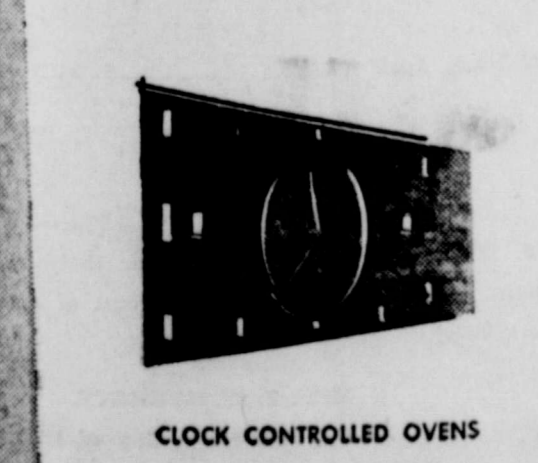

woody plants, are perennials. Everyone knows what happens to woody plants when they are cut down and resprouts kept clipped off. They die. The same thing happens to perennial grasses overgrazed and kept grazed to the ground. The first thing noticeable is a lack of vigor in the plants. Growth is slow and if the overgrazing is continued long enough and heavy enough, bare spots on the range begin to appear. The turf is dead. In other words, grass roots stop growing and begin to decay where the grass is not permitted to grow. When this happens all manner of undesirable weeds and brush begin to take over and the rancher is out of business.

There are ways of preventing this condition of range poverty from occurring. The ideal way is to have your rangeland divided into the number of pastures most desirable for the size of your operation. Alternate grazing by shifting your livestock from one pasture to another at regular intervals. Also, plan your operations to completely defer grazing for a period of five to six months on at least one third of your range each year. The desirable features of a deferred grazing program are too numerous to mention all of them. Two of the most outstanding benefits are the renewed vigor of plants and development of seed for increasing the number of plants per acre.

To encourage improvement of ranges the Agricultural Conservation Program offers cost-sharing for deferred grazing. One period is from June 1st to October 31st. The other is from May 1st to October 31st. Of course, the higher rate per acre is for the longer period.

A deferred grazing program consisting of one-third of your rangeland will, under average conditions, insure you ample winter grazing, so essential for economical production. Consult your SCS technicians and the ASC offices in Hamilton and Gatesville for more detailed information.
