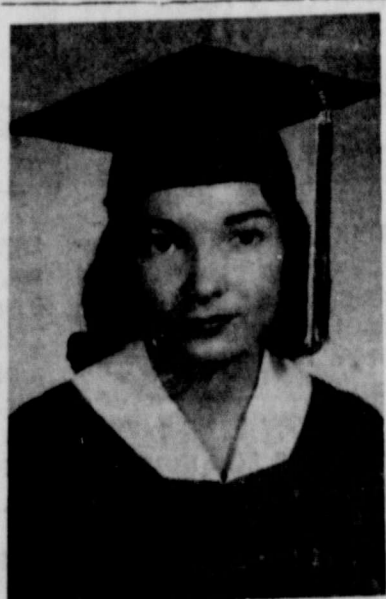

# Local Youths Capture State Class B Debate Championship

## Two Others Place High in Austin Meet

Hico High School owned its second State Literary Championship in history as the result of the meet held in Austin last weekend.

Barbara Randals and Tom Pratt, sophomore students in the local school, won the honors and were named State Conference B Debate champions.

Four students from the local school competed in the state meet, with all four gaining final eliminations in their respective categories. Other than Miss Randals and Pratt, Miss Nelda Whiteside was a fifth place winner in Poetry Reading, and Mark McElroy placed sixth in the low hurdles in track.

Following is a descriptive story outlining the progress of the debate team from district to state, which was contributed to the News Review:

Hico now boasts a State Championship Debate Team. The Interscholastic League debate winner in Conference B are Barbara Randals and Tom Pratt. Conference B schools are those having less than 125 students enrolled in high school.

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# IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

By E. E. DAWSON

Edwin Way Teale is a naturalist and photographer and a writer of note. He has written three books in the last ten years that have had a heavy sale and are most readable volumes. The first was the story of a journey he and his wife, Nellie, made from the Southern tip of Florida to the White Mountains of Maine that took from March 21 to June 21, and the title is "North With the Spring." The second came some years later and told of his and Nellie's trip from Cape Cod across the top of the United States to Vancouver, Washington, and then down the west coast to a point between the Oregon line and San Francisco, and the title of that volume is "Autumn Across America."

Now the third volume is off the press and is being eagerly read all over the country by those charmed by the informing travels of this hardy pair of naturalists. The title of the new volume is "Journey Into Summer." Teale and Nellie left from the point in Maine where their story "North With the Spring" ended on the border between Maine and New Hampshire. Across the top of New Hampshire and Vermont to the St. Lawrence River, thence to Lake Ontario and all the five big lakes of the United States to Minnesota and westward to Plentywood, Montana, thence south through half a dozen states to Texas, and on the final lap through the corner of New Mexico to Colorado, which state they crossed and crisscrossed sev-

eral times to witness all the sights to be found in that colorful state in summer. Starting on June 21 they finished on a high point in Colorado at midnight of September 21.

Folks who think they know America when they acquaint themselves with its geography and even memorize its farm and factory products and population figures certainly do not know the country, as Teale's travels reveal. He does not deal much with geography and history, but with vegetation and bird and animal life, especially of the wildlife of the country. One is amazed at what he relates in this recent volume. With keen discerning eyes he and Nellie, with aid of field glasses and camera, record plant and animal life in the wild, and bird life in all the areas they crossed.

At the west end of Lake Erie, where the town of Sandusky, Ohio is located, is an island in the lake called Kelley's Island. It is world-famed for the Mayflies there to be found in May each year. They are something in appearance like the ragon fly, and start their two-

year life period at the bottom of the lake in the mud. In the second year of their life they come up into the air and during their mating and breeding period swarm over Kelley's Island and the city of Sandusky in such numbers that they pile up around the shores of the island as high as three feet, and on the streets of Sandusky in like numbers until many streets are impassable for all vehicles and even pedestrians find it difficult to walk because the oil from the dead flies' bodies that make the streets so slick. Workers load the dead flies into trucks with scoop shovels and haul them away.

Then farther west in Indiana where the Illinois River has its beginning in a swamp are the Fireflies in numbers almost as great as the Mayflies at Sandusky.

Up the west side of Lake Michigan Teale and Nellie made some marvellous finds among animals and birds and plants. The story of their visit to the most northern point in the United States at the tip of Lake of the Woods in Minnesota is a most interesting chapter. And so were their travels across North Dakota into Montana and thence south, weaving back and forth into Wyoming, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas. In southwestern Kansas they visited Greensburg and saw the deepest hand-dug well and the largest in America. It is 109 feet deep and a dozen feet in diameter and walled with rocks of the area. Later near that point in Kansas they watched a whole night as the annual shower of meteors fell. In that community where they watched more meteorites have been found than anywhere in the world, and may be found in all the museums of the world.
