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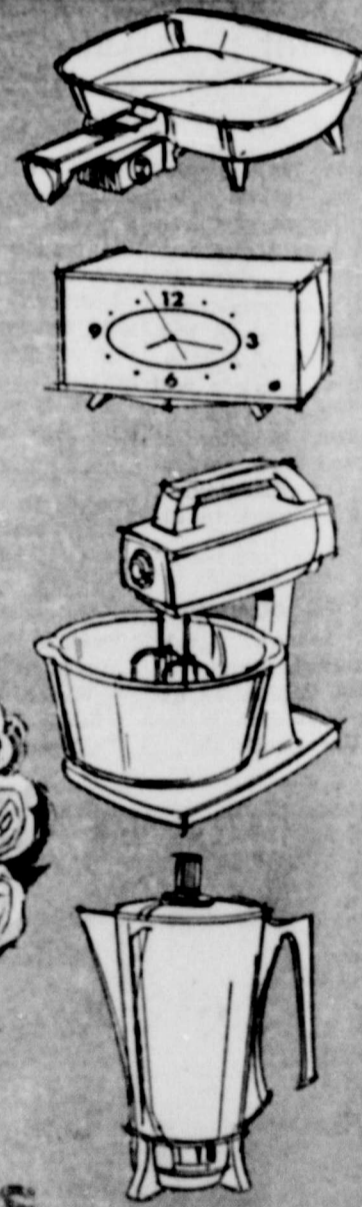

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Legislature to Re-convene July 10 to Make Fresh Stab at Writing Tax Bill

Austin, June 7.—From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy works in Texas.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years. Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the legislators and him their views on how the matter should be handled.

Gov. Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue. He used his influence in the regular session to block a move in this direction.

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selective excise tax," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and more acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on items costing 25 cents and more with food, medicine and farm necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Turman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree. Governor Daniel grants the need for some sales (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be stringently limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth tax" such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the summer, the legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money and authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins September 1.

And a two-thirds majority is also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

Oil On Troubled Waters.
A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked

out by a major catastrophe as enemy attack.

6. Raise the present \$100,000 a year ceiling on public works payments to \$52,000,000.

7. Allow the Legislature to up hospital districts without a special constitutional amendment each one.

8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation public beaches.

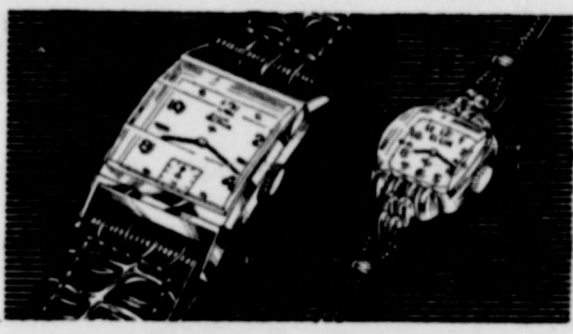
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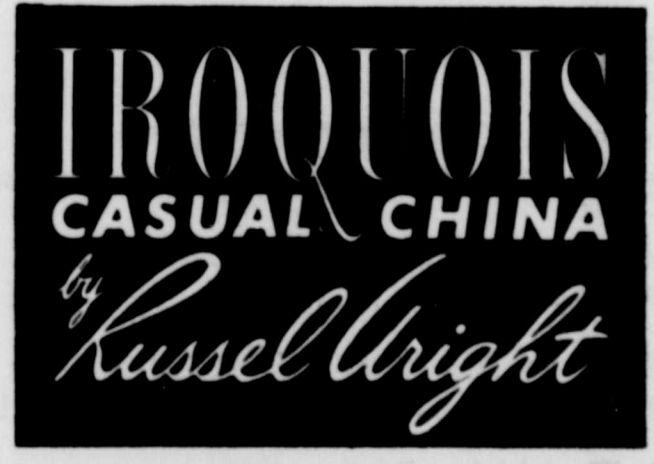

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D. C.—Mental illness is one of the greatest health problems in America. Many feel it to be the number one problem, but it ranks far down the line in interest and in dollars and cents spent for patients' care and research study.

In recent years there has been an increased interest in trying to do something about this very serious problem. In 1935 there was established a Joint Commission on Mental Illness and Health under grants administered by the National Institute of Mental Health. The purpose was to analyze and evaluate the needs and resources of the mentally ill people of America and make recommendations. The Commission released its report last week, March 24. The study carried on by the Commission reveals amazing information. The crux of the report is that attempts must be made to provide more human care for mentally ill and to transform "insane asylums" into hospitals and clinics true to the healing purpose of medicine.

One of the most revealing findings of the study is that comparatively few of 277 State hospitals administer treatment to their patients calculated to bring about recovery. In other words, we continue to treat our mentally ill as people who "must be put away." We have never come to look upon the insane or mentally ill as we look upon people who have other illnesses. We too often assume that the "insane" person is one who must be removed from society for the rest of his life. For ages people have looked upon people who have "lost their minds" as "totally crazy" and that the only place for them is behind bars.

Human beings regard loss of liberty, forcible detention, removal from the community and imprisonment as punishment for wrongdoing. The mentally ill are no exception. As the pioneer reformer Clifford Beers once said, "Madmen are too often man-made."

Before enough can be done for the mentally ill, an appeal such as is made for polio, cancer, heart disease, and cerebral palsy must be made. A mentally ill person is not disgraced by his illness, nor should the family of such an unfortunate one feel that a stigma is placed on them. The fact that society tends to reject these unfortunates is, of course, well known. What is tragic is that, while we

promote crusades for many other types of physical illness, so little has been done in the past to reach these whose illness is less understood. There was a day not too long past when tuberculosis at times stigmatized its victims. But the stigma of the disease, recognized to be physical, tends to disappear as it becomes better understood and publicly attacked.

The reason this is true is rather simple. The physically sick person fits society's deep-seated conception of a sick person. Feeling helpless, he turns to others for help and, receiving help, is responsive to it. He evokes sympathy. Commonly, the acutely ill psychotic does not appear to want help or expect help but, quite the reverse, thinks he is not sick and may interpret "help" as "harm." He repels sympathy. Oftentimes society then uses its huge institutions as dumping grounds for social rejects rather than as true hospitals.

Even violence by the mentally ill is an exception rather than the rule—a popular misconception. It is a characteristic of the mentally ill that they behave in an irresponsible manner; it is a characteristic of society that we behave toward them in the same manner.

Under the numerous social programs of the Federal Government, it would seem justified to place

mental health research high on the list of activities. Evidently there are large gaps in our scientific research about the fundamentals of mental illness. Certainly state and local gov-

IT HAPPENED . . .
HERE OR NEAR

John Tillyard was reared in Suffolk, which is northeast of London and lying along the English Channel and the North Sea. He went from his childhood's school in his local community to one of the Colleges of Cambridge University where he prepared himself for ministry in the Wesleyan Church. While at the University he met Hilda Oldroyd from Yorkshir in the north of England. They fell in love and were married, and in due time they were located at Sainsbury in Cambridgeshire, which is just west of Suffolk where Tillyard was reared.

At Sainsbury the family was begun and in due time there were three children: Mary the eldest, then Annie the boy, and lastly the girl whose name is not given who tells the story in the first person. Pastor Tillyard's flock numbered around half a hundred souls and he was very devoted to them, as was his family. Not all was rosy, however. For in England there is an Established Church, a part of the government, controlled and supported by the government, and having in its traditions the past which was for so long the Roman

Catholic Church and controlled by the Pope of Rome. Now those of the Established Church do not have much regard for the religious folk who are not of the Church of England, and never honor such folks by calling their congregations churches, but always refer to them as "Chapel." That is true whether the religious group is Wesleyan, Presbyterian, Baptist or whatever. You understand that the Wesleyans are Methodists in all other countries.

Once upon a time in the first decade of this century an American Bishop of the Methodist Church was in England and met Pastor Tillyard and told him of things in America, and invited him to move to America and assured him that he, the Bishop, would assign him to a good church if he should make up his mind to make the move. This offer appealed to Mr. Tillyard, and to his family, and the outcome of it was that when the Bishop named him to a church at Pepperell, Maine, he accepted and as soon as he could set out for America with the family. The children were in high glee over the move, but Mrs. Tilly-

ard was not so keen about it, for her father, an Archdeacon in the Established Church, had always greatly resented the fact that his daughter had married a man outside the church. Naturally, the daughter disliked to leave her parents, but she went along peacefully.

The voyage from Southampton to New York on the Empress of Austria was a wonderful experience, even though it was made in the steerage with a thousand other souls, all poor and uneducated and some of them about as silly as souls could be. But the Tillyard family had the least love for the Rev. Abraham Plimsoul, who had his family of fourteen children and another soon due to arrive, who made life miserable for all of them by his insistence on having daily services and putting on a great display of emotion and making sensational appeals. Mr. Tillyard could not endure the Primitive Methodist preacher, who was on his way to North Dakota to carry on a work.

After seven days of delightful weather on the ocean they arrived in a dense fog at New York, and then began seeing the unbelievable, because it was so unlike England. As they headed toward Maine on the train they looked at the passing landscape with the greatest interest.

The first thing on that journey was stunning to Mrs. Tillyard especially was American trains. They were such tremendously large things as compared with the English trains. Why, a hundred folks got into a coach, all sitting right together, whereas in England each coach of the train was divided into compartments in which never more than a half dozen were thrown together. It seemed indecent to Mrs. Tillyard! The vegetation along the railroad was so different from English plants. A tall weed along the railroad with yellow flowers attracted their attention particularly. They asked the conductor what it was. He replied "Golden Rod." They noticed that the houses along the way were built of lumber and had shingle roofs; not a thatch roof was to be seen. It seemed impossible. They saw huge barns at all the rural homes, and they were connected with the houses Streets and highways wholly different. Folks were
