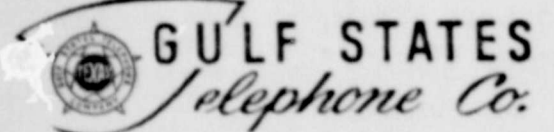

6 servings
Baking dish, 9x13 inch.

Preheated 350° oven
6 large, firm tomatoes
salt, pepper, dash of lemon juice
1 1/2 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons chopped green pepper
3 tablespoons chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/4 cup sharp Cheddar cheese
1 1/2 cups Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 cups flaked crabmeat
1 cup sharp Cheddar cheese

Thoroughly hollow out center portion of each tomato and turn upside down to drain on absorbent paper. In saucepan, melt butter, saute green pepper, celery and onion. Blend in flour. Add Evaporated Milk and cook, stirring constantly until sauce is smooth and thick. Add seasonings, crabmeat and cheese. Cook until cheese melts. Put tomato cases in baking dish, add salt, pepper, and lemon juice; fill tomatoes with crab mixture. Add enough water to cover bottom of dish. Bake 15-20 minutes or until tomatoes are cooked.

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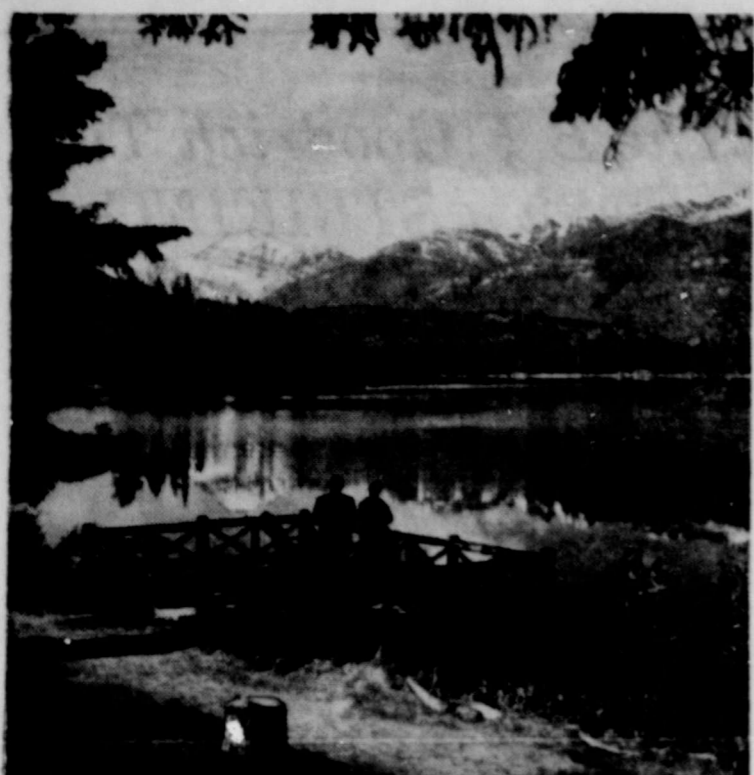

IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

By E. E. DAWSON

In the distant past of my mundane existence, a book showed up in our home entitled "Encyclopaedia." It was about as big as an old-time family Bible, and had an accumulation of articles that encompassed many matters from all realms of human activity. As a kid I read a lot from it with more or less interest.

One division of the volume had an assortment of literature, one item of which was a poem captioned, "The Raven," by Edgar Allen Poe. The poem was highly mystifying, and a brother and I discussed it a good deal as we thinned corn and chopped cotton and dragged a cotton sack. Our

discussion was mainly of the word "Nevermore" croaked by the raven that flew into Poe's quarters at midnight one night, and sat atop the door and several times uttered the word "Nevermore." It gave a boy the creeps to read the gloomy poem, even though there was a compelling something about it that brought it often to mind.

Recently I have been reading the biography of Poe and reviewing some of his poems and several of his weird stories. Perhaps one can measureably grasp the meaning of "The Raven" when he becomes acquainted with the life and works of the poet and story writer. What a man is at heart manifests itself in his ways of life and his productions.

In the first place, Poe had a bad upbringing, and his spirit responded hostilely to that upbringing. He seems to have never been able to get along with other people. It was pitiful the way friendships were wrecked by his suspiciousness and turbulence. The results of this may be seen in many of his poems and stories. Tragedy is so often the overall effect of his relations and productions. His gloominess continually manifests itself.

Another determining matter was the fact that he was an alcoholic. He drank to cure his gloom, and thereby increased it. Many of his human relationships were wrecked by his devotion to the bottle. One is impressed as he reads Poe's works with the native gifts of his mind, for he had a wonderful power to use language. But dissipation so often destroyed his opportunities of success, and wrecked his relations with his fellow mortal.

"The Raven" must show the hopelessness of the man. The black color of the raven portrayed Poe's outlook on life, and the croaking of the bird uttering "Nevermore" seems to express the hopelessness of his future. Disposition and Drink brought gloom that shut off all prospects ahead. "Nevermore" seems to be his expectations as he looked ahead into perpetual night. Even now I feel a chill climbing my backbone as I read again the mysterious masterpiece of the gifted poet.

Poe's biographer, Hervey Allen, in the final paragraph of Poe's life says: Finally on Sunday morning, October 7, 1849, he became quiet and seemed to rest for a short time. Then, gently moving his head, he said "Lord, help my poor soul. As he had lived so long in great misery and tragedy. Poe was born in Boston on January 19, 1809. Hence he was his 41st year when he died.

the very beginning of civilization, as far as recorded history. There is evidence that the ancestors of modern man followed the ancestors of modern cows from pasture to pasture thousands of years ago. In the earliest writings known to man, the Vedic hymns written in Sanskrit on tablets of stone, the earliest known form of King was a Gopatis or Lord of the Cows. Gopatis owned the cows but milking was a sacred rite. One priest stood at the cow's head while another held her tail. The third was of the highest ranking and did the milking. Gopatis referred to the moon as the "milk goddess of the night". The stars were defined at 5-horned cattle.

As Gopatis watched the cow-studded Heavens, another visible proof of the holiness of the cow appeared. Across the sky there flowed a great river of soft whiteness which to this day is called the "Milky Way." The great Greek

physician Hippocrates prescribed milk as a medicine 500 years before Christ was born.

Without the dairy cow, more than half the colonists who first came to America's shores from England in the years 1607-1610 did not survive. They imported food but their supplies of butter and cheese were entirely inadequate. The first shipment of dairy cattle arrived at Jamestown, Virginia, in 1611.

From that time forward, the health and wealth of America was on the upswing. As man moved westward across the continent, the cow was tied to the tailboard of the covered wagon and her brothers, the oxen, furnished the pulling power. Today, the dairy industry provides America's consumers with about 28 per cent of their foodstuffs and contributes mightily to their well being.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

This, That and The Other Reported From Austin

By VERN SANFORD
Texas Press Association

Austin, June 14.—See Texas first this summer. Texas Highway Department will help you plan a good time.

"Many Texans have never seen their own state through a tourist's eyes," says State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. They're unaware of the pleasures immediately available to them via Texas' excellent highway system.

For example, Greer noted, Texas has:

1. One National Park (Big Bend).
2. Four National Forests.
3. More than 600 miles of coastline.
4. More than 50 mountains over 6,000 feet high.
5. Numerous scenic caverns, inland lakes, old cattle trails, restored forts, monuments and museums.
6. More than 50 state parks for outdoor recreation including water sports and camping.
7. Some 1,000 roadside parks where travelers may rest or picnic.

Highway Department will send maps and descriptive literature on points of interest and special events upon request without charge. Those writing should indicate the part of the state they want to visit and the sort of things they would like to see and do.

Address the Texas Highway Department, P.O. Box 5064, Austin 31.

Task Force for Taxes.

Gov. Price Daniel has named a 19-member committee to study Texas tax problems and recommend a plan for raising some \$350,000,000 for the next two years.

All the 19 appointees are in positions causing them to have a strong interest in seeing sufficient money raised for coming state appropriations. They include the chairmen of the governing boards of the state's educational, welfare, and hospital systems and officials of a number of school-connected associations.

Their report is to be ready prior to July 10, opening date of the special legislative session.

What's In A Name.

Pro-sales tax legislators declare that Governor Daniel is merely calling "a rose by another name" in his labeling of what is and what is not a sales tax.

Sen. Wardlow Lane and four House members presented "their side of the story" in a formal answer to the governor's report to the people on the regular session failure to pass a tax bill.

Any \$350,000,000 tax program, including the governor's, will have to run heavily to sales taxes, whatever they're called, said the law-

makers. They recommended "telling the truth about it."

Governor Daniel announced he had received a heavy volume of mail since his talk, with the sentiment running 6 to 1 in favor of his program.

Several legislators said this was contrary to the way their mail was running.

Troubles All Over.

To make matters worse, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported that some of Texas' prime sources of tax revenue seems to be dwindling.

Oil production taxes for the nine months ending May 31 were \$92,110,769, down by \$3,000,000 from the same period of a year ago and down \$12,000,000 from the year before that.

Gasoline taxes, which have splurged up at about 5 per cent a year, have hit a slowdown. They are expected to be about \$129,000,000. This is identical to the same nine months period of a year ago.

Corporation franchise taxes were also down to \$51,542,964 for this year, a drop of about \$7,000,000 from last year.

One bright spot was in "sin taxes." Cigarette taxes brought in \$7,821,931 during May compared with \$6,310,562 for April. Taxes on alcoholic beverages (beer, wine and liquor) were up from \$2,672,947 in April to \$2,835,650 in May.

But poll taxes were down from \$2,818,527 in 1960, the presidential election year to only \$1,827,574 for 1961.

Despite everything, the deficit in the state general revenue fund dropped in May to \$78,848,137 from a high of \$102,000,000 in April. Hopes are that it will go even lower not to exceed \$63,000,000 by August 31, the end of the fiscal year.

Some Changes Made.

Despite the bog-down on tax bills, the Legislature did add quite a bit to the law of the land in its recent session. Among noteworthy changes:

1. Old age pensioners, beginning January 1, can receive help with their hospital, doctor and nursing home expenses. Any state-licensed hospital or nursing home will be eligible for participation in the program.
2. Filing fee for candidates for statewide office will be \$1,000. Previous fee for candidates in special statewide elections was \$50. This brought out 71 candidates in the recent special senatorial race.
3. Persons who refuse to hang up when a party telephone line is needed for an emergency call will be subject to fine. Notices will be printed in this year's new telephone directories.

Not all these bills have been signed, but the governor has indicated no opposition.

Small Loan Law Urged.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has urged Governor Daniel to add loan company regulation to the list of subjects which may be considered in the upcoming special session.

At present the governor has limited the session to revenue and appropriations bills. Only subjects included in the governor's "call" may be considered in a special session.

Wilson said that, by beginning where the last session left off, lawmakers should be able to pass a loan bill quickly. A regulatory bill was passed by the House last session, but opposing forces came to a deadlock in the Senate.

Governor Daniel has evidenced coolness toward considering anything else until a revenue and appropriation agreement is reached—not even his pet escheat bill.

Also being asked for special session consideration is a bill to increase unemployment benefits which failed in the regular session. It passed on second reading in the House, but never got any further.

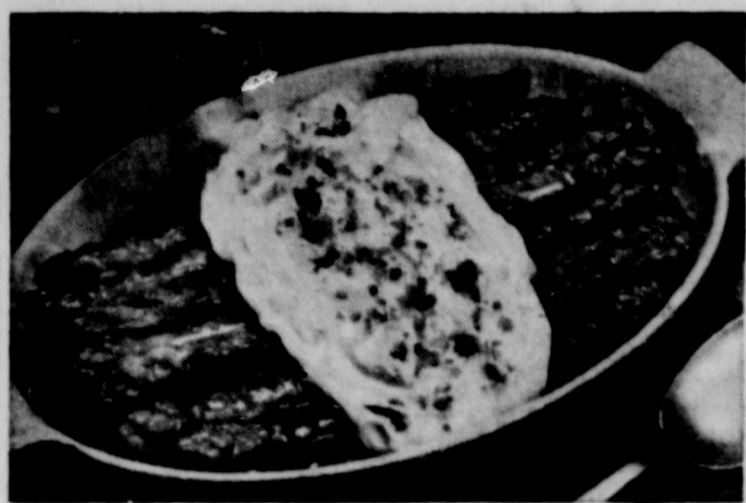

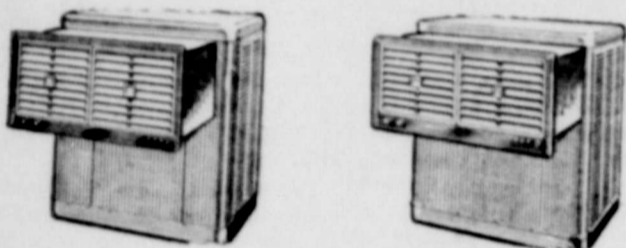
