

Another manufacturer was able to deduct the cost of maintaining a beautiful resort facility on a tropical island, including an airplane and its upkeep for going back and forth. Many more cases of a similar nais unfortunate that these abuses reflect not only on the business integrity of the small per cent who has taken an undue and on the vast majority who are conscientious in their claims. Of course, such practices are not condoned and practiced by responsible business and industrial leaders.

As the price-fixing scandal involving a few electric companies gives those who oppose them reason to advocate radical action against them, so do the repercussions go against legitimate business activities.

It is now proposed that a traveling businessman not be allowed more than \$30 a day for all expenses, whether his own or entertaining others.

Business organizations such as the National Association of Manufacturers and the United States Chamber of Commerce contend that this move is the Government telling the citizen to change his! way of running his business. They contend that it denies business the freedom of action to conduct its own affairs, prohibits their right to speak and to be heard on matters affecting their welfare.

Legislation has been introduced which attempts to clarify the situation, but it is certainly no easy matter. It is an extremely complicated problem and one which seemingly defies solution to the satisfaction of everyone.

The attempt, however, should be made to permit reasonable and fair expenses as deductible items for income tax purposes when such expenses are necessarily incurred for business promotion and betterment. The fact remains that the many who are conscientious and reasonable seemingly, must be protected from the few who take unfair advantage. This is true in most all things in our society and is the reason for laws, both prohibitive and mandatory.
