



Chill until set sufficiently to add second layer. On top of cottage cheese layer arrange halved gelatin mixture that has partially strawberries around the edge set. Another important hint: pour with the outer side of the berry against the mold. Mash avocado and beat in other portion of parter is completely set. This way, the layers will be less apt to separate when the salad is unmolded. Refrigerate. Unmold on serving plate and garnish with remaining

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

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
