Following article, entitled "All Town Siloquy," was written by the editor of the El Dorado Times, and the description fits Hico, and many other small towns, that we are seeing it herewith:

I am a compact cluster of homes and their modest homes, down along the banks of the placid stream, or in some shaded vale—or perhaps in sheltering shadows of high mountains.

I make no pretense at earthliness. No roaring factories of mankind intrude upon my premises; no glittering skyscrapers or minarets or towers to mar my lovely sky line.

I represent a happiness that is as rare as the smile of a child. I am in repose such as is rare—no noisy turmoil and striving. I accord them calm and equality, inviting them to play at moderate pace to mingle harmoniously the kindred spirits, to ponder and reflect and to find sufficient time and room for their thoughts to grow.

My people will not behold the name emblazoned in dazzling lights—yet there are those who dwell in far places who remember me tenderly—some with tear or sigh. The makers mark me with a little dot upon their charts—like some who wander in the relation of human jungles, near the magic and mystic label of Home.

I number my children only in the score, and those who return in the crowded camps of massed centers hold in slight esteem. I bear no grudge, for I am favored with the bounties as the good life, the radiant sky, the free and vagrant winds, and a sympathetic kinship with all Nature—which comfort me. Each as it passes brings new joy—a new appreciation for the wonders of plain, wholesome life.

I occupy only a tiny spot in the firmament, yet my being is marked for usefulness by the Master Plan, else there would be so many of me.

I am a haven and a habitation, and my environment has invested me with a personality through which I strive to reach the concord of brotherhood. From me flows a force which, I am convinced, exerts a powerful influence upon the driving lustiness of our times, and that contributes to the tolerance and restraint of the distilled essence of its character.

Temple Crash Kills Hico Resident

Charles Edward Burns, 65, of Hico was killed and seven others injured in a two-car collision on Highway 36 west of Temple at 4:16 p.m. Wednesday.

According to Patrolman Bill Harrison of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the accident occurred when a car driven by Mrs. Gladys Litch of Hico was leaving the Highway. Other passengers in the car were Maron Litch, 60, and Mrs. Lillie Burns, both of Hico. They were under observation at Scott and White Hospital in Temple early Thursday morning.

Driver of the other car was listed as Mrs. Louise Laub of San Marino, Calif., according to officials.

Mr. Burns was pronounced dead at the scene by a Peace Justice. The four passengers in the Laub vehicle were treated and released from Scott and White.

Investigating officers said the Litch car was damaged mostly in the right front and at the right front door. The impact sent the Litch vehicle off the highway about 93 feet to a service station. Other details of the accident were not available to the News Review at press time early Thursday morning.

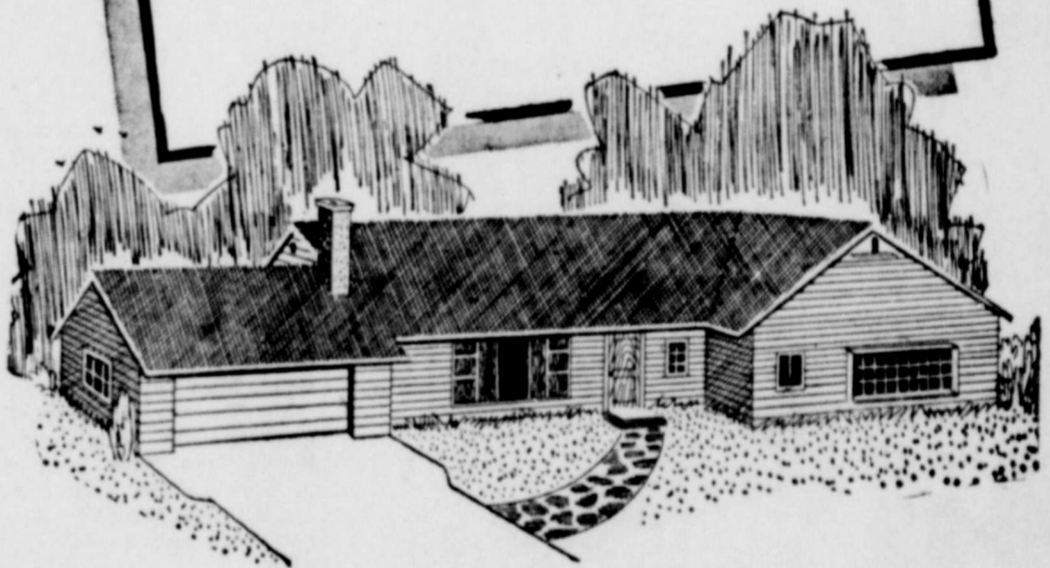

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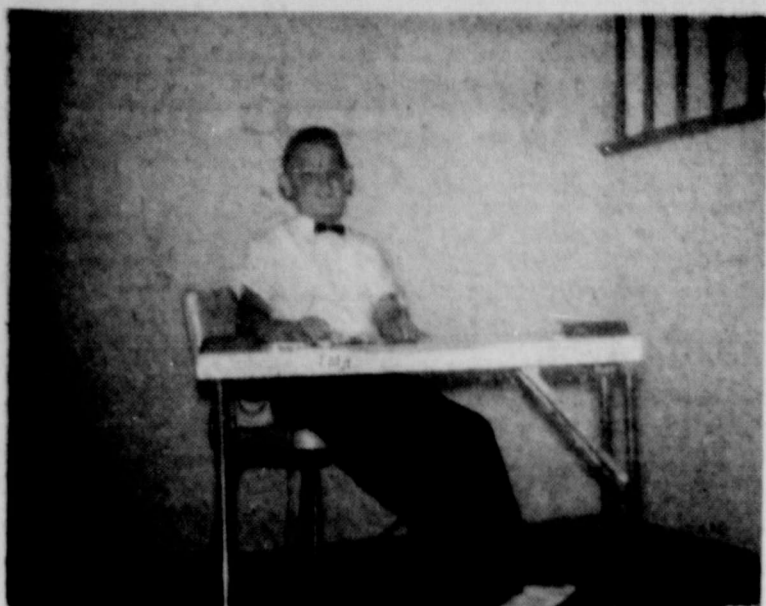

They have had all of their cases well prepared and the work they have done in preparation beforehand, has enabled us to go about our business with a greater dispatch than would have been possible had not this work been done. 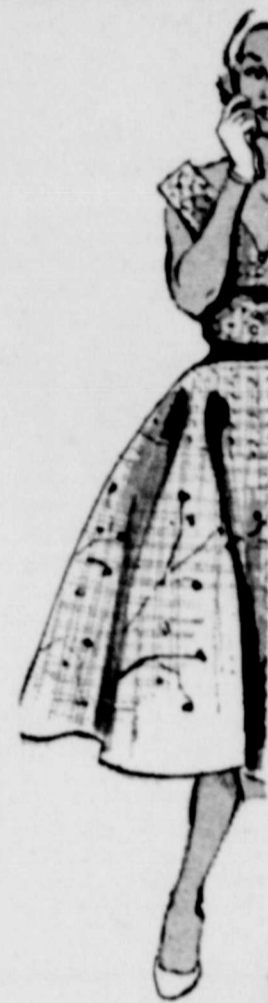
Well, the Boyds' have company in the form of Joyce's sister, Cathy

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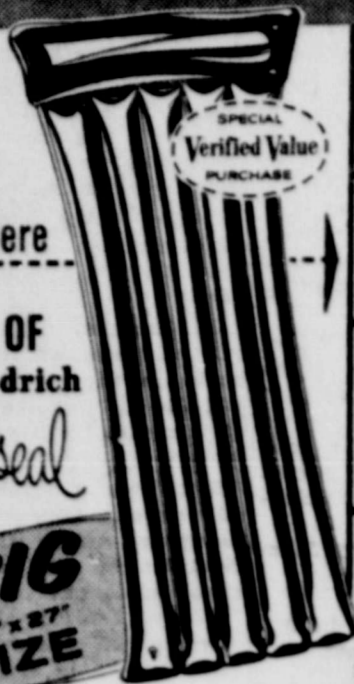

This will be followed by Dr. Loe Merrill of the Ranch Experiment station at Sonora who will talk on pastures. The Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will furnish a barbecue lunch to those present.

After lunch Dr. W. T. Hardy, also of the Sonora Ranch Experiment Station, will discuss diseases and internal parasites of goats. Jim Gray will give a demonstration on selecting goats for flock improvement. Gary is with the Texas A & M College Extension Service.

I hope a large group of you goat raisers will be able to attend the field day as I believe it will be worth your time and effort. The day is being sponsored by the Hamilton and Bosque County Program Building Sheep and Goat Subcommittees and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Another spraying of pecan trees might be a good thing on some places to control scab and also mold. With weather conditions like they are these two are likely to cause some trouble. Two pounds of Zineb to 100 gallons of water is good for this. Too, add 2 pounds of zinc sulphate to the spray solution.

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Leaverton Thinks Limited Sales Tax Will Be Adopted

It seems agreed that the Legislature must raise about \$350 million in new money. Heretofore, Texas has relied on natural resources and selective taxes. These have been hit hard where highly productive. Many think the end has been reached. Few deny that a sales tax is disproportionate on the lower income brackets. Industry favors a sales tax and the lower bracket individual opposes it. Both segments have a right to fair tax treatment.

I don't think Texas is on the rocks. Texas has increased faster than the U.S. in population, income created by manufacturing, retail sales and personal income. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says the trend in business activity in Texas since 1940 shows a very satisfactory growth, and that another highly favorable factor in our growth is shown in the index of

bank debts. Selective taxes have not placed Texas in a bad financial situation. Most states have higher tax burdens, greater public debts and far more costly government than Texas. The average family state tax in the U.S. is twice that in Texas.

We do have a deficit of some \$60 million but selective taxes did not cause that. Last session, the Legislature voted taxes that the Comptroller certified would pay all bills including the deficit; but the production of oil declined and resulted in a reduction of income of about \$50 million. A few other items made up the balance. This was not the fault of selective taxes. Many states which have selective taxes have large deficits because of miscalculations on the income. In 1959, Pennsylvania, which has a 4 per cent sales tax had a deficit of \$141 million. Michigan, which raised its sales tax from 3 to 4 per cent on Jan. 1, 1961, still expects a deficit of \$55.8

million at the end of the fiscal year of 1961. Many other sales tax states have deficits.

It is unlikely that an agreement could be reached on sufficient selective taxes without oppressing some. Self preservation is expected but most people have a sense of fairness. A limited sales tax with exemptions to soften the impact where needed may be the solution.

I think the Legislature and the Governor will reach a common ground—a limited sales tax. Too many exemptions will defeat its purpose. The House and the Senate passed such a tax. The House supplemented its sales tax with a permanent tax on business by taxing interstate corporations now lightly taxed; the Senate supplemented its sales tax with temporary taxes on Texas corporations now heavily taxed.

I voted against the Senate bill because:

1. A vote for the bill served no purpose as the Governor said he would veto it.

2. I did not wish to approve a bill taxing Texas corporations now paying heavy taxes and let the interstate corporations who are now lightly taxed go free.

3. The bill was inadequate. I think Texas would be displeased with a sales tax, heavy business taxes, and yet the deficit remain.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Legislators Back on Job Following Month Recess

Austin, July 12.—Texas legislators, like students who failed to complete their work in the long term and have to come back to summer school, return to Austin this week to "get it over with."

Goal is the passage of a two-year appropriations bill expected to run around \$2,600,000,000. To pay for it, they will need to find some \$350,000,000 more in tax money than now provided on the law books.

But if money is short, advice is not.

At least three committees have a word or two for the lawmakers. Two are unofficial. They are the Citizens for a Sales Tax, whose name explains its purpose, and the Citizens for Fair Taxation, which is pushing Gov. Price Daniel's plan for additional selective sales taxes, plus more business taxes, higher taxes on alcoholic beverages and others.

A third committee, appointed by

the Governor, avoided a single, specific recommendation but pinpointed some sort of retail sales tax as the most likely source for the amount of money needed. This committee is composed mainly of the chairman of governing boards of state welfare and educational agencies.

Committee suggested that either the retail sales tax passed by the Senate last session (a "general" sales tax with exemptions for food, farm supplies, medicine) or a "Pennsylvania-type" tax which affects only the items listed in the bill or a combination of the two might be the answer.

All of which leaves the Legislature just about where it was—with at least some support, and some opposition, for any course it might take.
