★ 1208 HAMILTON COUNTY PEOPLE RECEIVING SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS

According to information just released by the Social Security Administration, there are 1208 people in Hamilton County receiving social security benefits, totalling \$59,540.00 per month. Payments of \$38,453.00 per month are going to 654 Hamilton Countians receiving old-age insurance benefits, while 27 persons are receiving disability insurance benefits of \$2,083.00 per month. The remaining \$19,104.00 in monthly benefits goes to 527 survivors of deceased workers and dependent wives and children of aged and disabled workers.

These social security payments are intended to replace in part earnings lost due to

retirement, death, or disability of the breadwinner of the family, according to Henry Madeley, assistant manager of the Temple district office. By helping maintain the purchasing power of families whose income has been greatly reduced or perhaps cut off entirely, the social security program contributes materially to the economy of the community, Mr. Madeley said.

A representative of the Temple district office will be in Hico at the City Hall at 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 8 and September 12. He will assist those who wish to obtain further information or file a claim for social security benefits.

Cranfills Gap Couple Found Dead in Tank

Cranfills Gap (Spl.)—The bodies of an elderly couple were found floating in a stock tank on their farm near Cranfills Gap about 7 p.m. last Friday.

Boque County Constable James McDowell identified the couple as Oscar Monroe Jones, 63, and his wife, Margaret Ruth Jones, 57.

McDowell said a neighbor, Levi Bryn, found the bodies of the couple floating in the shallow water at the edge of the tank. He said they apparently had been fishing from a boat and fell into the tank.

Justice of the Peace Will Freedman said they had been dead more than 18 hours. He said his verdict probably would be death due to accidental drowning.

Sheriff A. O. Carr and Highway Patrolman James Wright conducted the investigation, assisted by Freedman and McDowell.

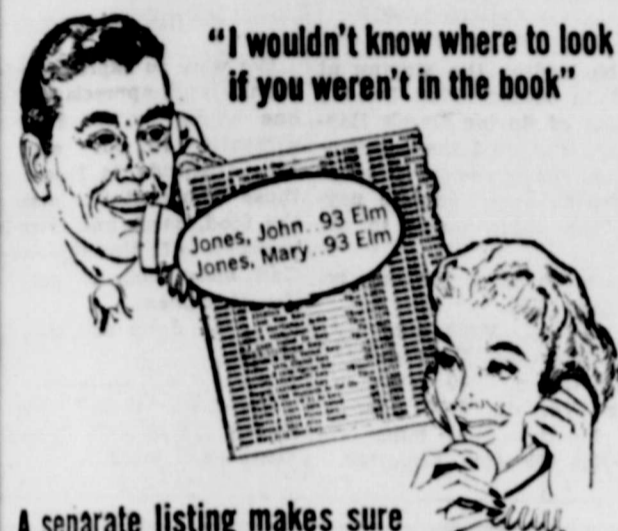

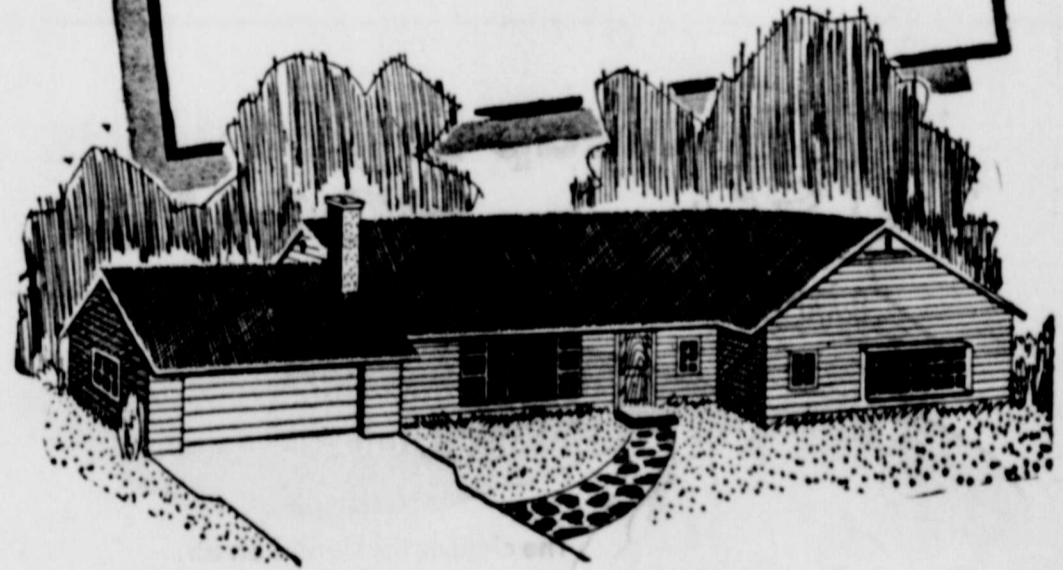

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Earl Smith, cotton ginmer, has a very good cotton crop on his farm out near Pottsville. He planted thimble treated seed and got a good stand. He has been following an insect control program, about half of the field and it is well fruited and looks good. As a whole the crop over the county is looking much better, however cotton root rot is showing in some fields. Insects are not causing very much trouble at this time, however, one should not neglect making weekly field checks for insects. It is about time for the second generation of boll weevils to be around and they could do damage.

July 21, August 1 and 2 are dates that cattlemen should be interested in. These are dates of the Annual Beef Cattle Short Course at College Station.

The course will be held in the Memorial Student Center which is well air-conditioned and centrally located on the campus. The theme of the short course will be practical application of animal husbandry practices. Discussions will be presented from the standpoint of putting technical information into practice.

Registration will start at 8 a.m. and the first part of the program will begin at 9:15.

Rains have sure been heavy over the county the last few weeks and many home garden crops have suffered. However, Mrs. Winfred Strager of Aleman says that her cucumbers have really done well. Some of them are nearly as large as small watermelons. Most damage has been done to tomatoes and many plants have died.

A new leaflet is out on Coastal Bermuda grass that some of you might like to have. It is on the bottom row on the bulletin rack and you are welcome to pick up a copy. If I'm not in the office, please feel free to take one.

Cotton growers who are likely to use insecticides are urged to handle all of them with care and caution. Treat them all with respect but be especially careful in applying such insecticides as parathion, methyl parathion and Guthion. Care should be used in handling and applying mixtures containing phosphorous insecticides.

Know your insecticide by its content rather than by its trade name so that you may know what insecticide you are handling or applying and may take necessary precautions. Read the label on the container and follow directions and cautions as given, use the insecticides on those crops or plants only that the material is recommended for.

If present weather continues, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council reports that plans for the observance of Farm Safety Week, July 23-29, literally should make a big splash. But seriously, they warn, wet fields are delaying farm work and causing work to pile up.

Don't, they advise, take chances when operations are again resumed. Muddy fields, turn rows and ditches could be the cause of crippling tractor accidents. Don't try to catch up in a day.

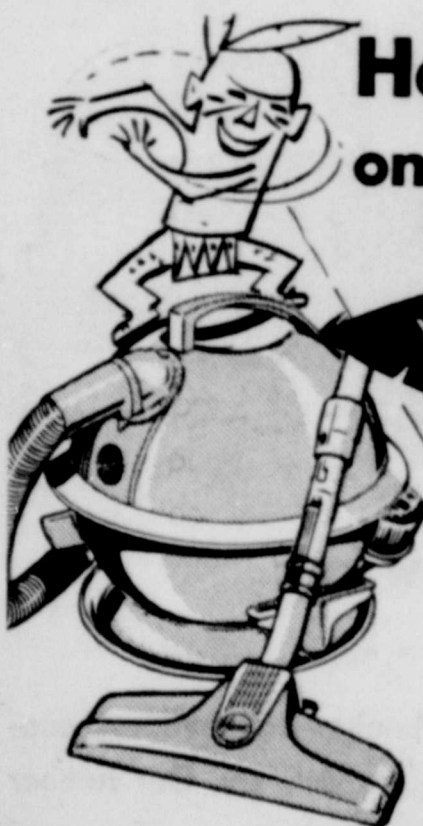
