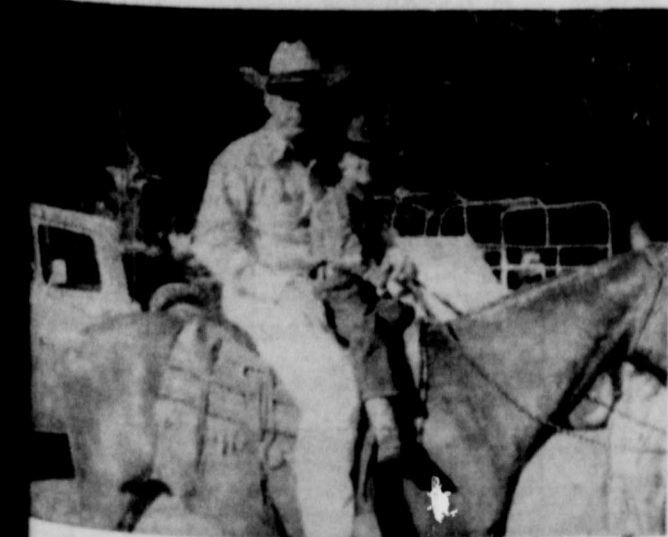

## Trades Day Program Set Wednesday

Hico schools will begin Tuesday, September 5 for the 1961-62 year, according to officials who made the announcement this week.

First day of classes will be devoted mostly to a general assembly at 9 a.m. and the issuing of books.

Pre-registration for high school students will be held Thursday and Friday, August 31 and Sept. 1 from 1 to 3 p.m. both days. All high school students are urged to take advantage of the pre-registration period.

Classes will take up at 9 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3:45 with the exception of the first day when school will be dismissed one hour early. Lunch will be served on opening day.

Four new faces will be among faculty members when classes are resumed for the fall term.

New members are Mrs. W. B. Hill, Jimmie Ramage, Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, and David Anderson.

Mrs. Hill will be seventh grade teacher, Mr. Ramage will teach the fifth grade, Mrs. Johanson is homemaking teacher, and Mr. Anderson is assistant coach.

Eddie Henry and Mrs. Robert McCutcheon resigned their positions as assistant coach and homemaking teacher several weeks ago.

This will be the first year of teaching for Mrs. Johanson, Mr. Ramage and Mr. Anderson, but Mrs. Hill has been teaching in the Fairy system for several years.

### Birth Certificates Necessary

A child is required by state law to be six years old before Sept. 1 to attend classes. A birth certificate is necessary for enrollment, and must be presented the first day of classes.

# COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

I have a new booklet that I believe many of you who deal in livestock will find interesting. Especially those of you who buy and sell a few cattle.

The booklet has information in it on intrasit shrinkage of cattle; do's and don'ts to minimize shrinkage; shrinkage tables, showing prices per cwt, shrinkage deducted and many other valuable tips on shrinkage, buying and selling and figuring the shrinkage etc.

These booklets are on the table at the left as you come through the door to the office. If you would like one, just pick it up and take it. Or if you would like for me to mail you one, just drop me a card and let me have your name and address.

Generally through August some time we have several days of real hot weather, and this hot weather causes the poultryman trouble. From what it was Monday afternoon, we might be in for some real hot stuff.

Hens perform best when the temperature is between 55 and 75 degrees, but it is next to impossible for anyone around here to keep the laying house at such cool temperatures.

Here are some things though that most anyone can do to help the layers make it through some of the hot days:

1. Give the layer plenty of cool water at all times.
2. All sides of the house should be open to permit cross ventilation.
3. Exhaust or circulating fans will aid in air movement.
4. All vegetation within 50 feet of the house should be kept down by mowing as this will cut down on heat reflection.
5. A fine mist or spray of water sprayed on the house roof will reduce temperature through evaporation.
6. Actually spraying the birds on extremely hot days with the garden hose will pay.
7. If the roof of the house is a

dark color a good coat of white-wash is a good investment.

Wheat producers will determine whether or not wheat marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1961 crop on August 24. "The decision farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the Nation not only for 1962 but also for many years to come," said Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman when he announced the referendum date.

"The program available with quotas in effect would be far different from that which could be operated without quotas," he added. If two-thirds of the referen-

dum voters favor quotas, wheat price support. Although level of support has not definitely been determined, it will be higher than the present level of \$1.00 per bushel if proposed legislation now before Congress becomes law. If farmers decide in the referendum against quotas, there will be no limit on marketing support would be at 50 per cent parity (wheat parity now is 60 per cent) and would be available to all farmers who plant within acreage allotments.

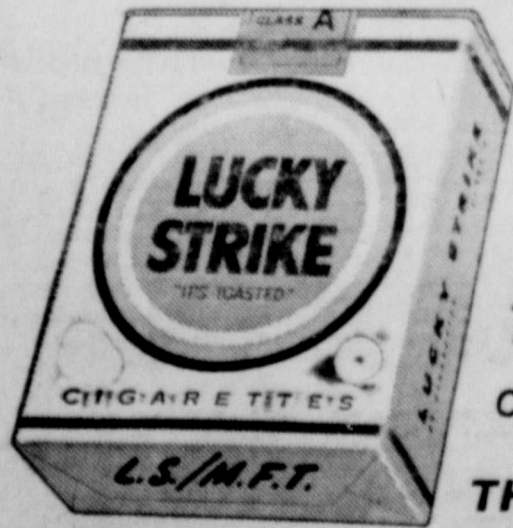

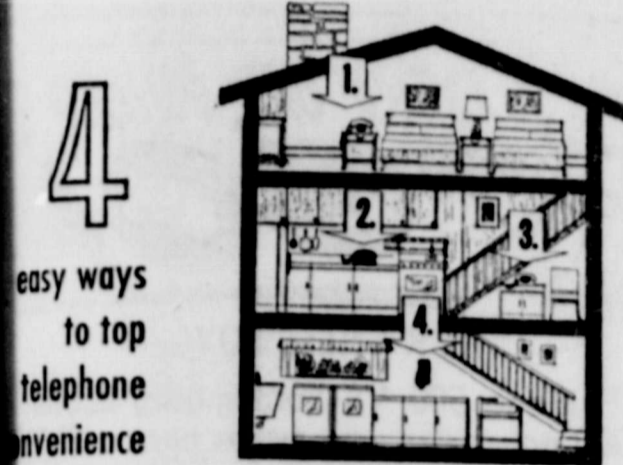

Grimes Co. ASC Manager**

W. I. Chenualt, Grimes County ASC office manager for the past three and one-half years, has resigned his position effective July 31.

Mr. Chenualt, a former Hico resident, is a brother of Mrs. S. W. Everett, Mrs. Ethel Lackey, and Miss Florence Chenualt, all of Hico.

He has been connected with the ASC and its predecessor agencies, PMA and AAA for the past 27 years. He served as a community committeeman in Hamilton County during the cotton plow-up in 1933.

He accepted a position as Office Manager in Bosque County July 1, 1934, and moved to Waco in a similar position in 1935 where he served until 1938 when he accepted a position with the State Office as Farmer Fieldman supervising the work in connection with the farm programs in 18 Central Texas Counties.

In January 1942 Mr. Chenualt was called into the State Office where he worked with the Agricultural Conservation Program Section and handled information work.

He returned to the field as

Farmer Fieldman for 18 East Texas Counties in 1953 with Grimes County as one of the areas he served. He resigned his position with the State Office at the end of 1957 and came to Grimes County as Office Manager January 1, 1958.

Many changes have been made in the National Farm Program during the time Mr. Chenualt has been connected with it. 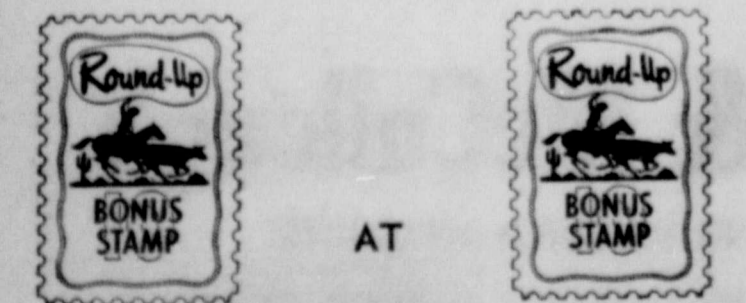

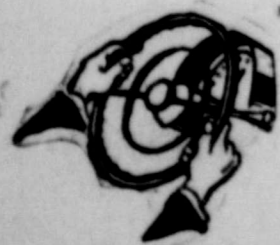

## Highway Department Asks For Help in Litterbug Program

Austin, August 9.—"You can't take it with you," many of our litterbugs are local citizens," he said. "They simply do not think of the consequences of throwing out an empty pack of cigarettes, a napkin, or a bottle and how these items, multiplied by the thousands of motorists who use our highways each day, can destroy the scenic qualities of our highway network."

He pinpointed bottles as the "triple threat" of highway litter. "First, they are the hardest items to pick up among the litter; second, they often break when thrown from a car window and can cause slashed automobile tires or injuries to people who step on them; third, they can be the origin of grass fires caused by the summer sun rays."

He said the litter problem is especially acute in Texas' 1,000 Roadside Parks during the summer months when they are heavily used. "We provide disposal units at these parks and ask that they be used."

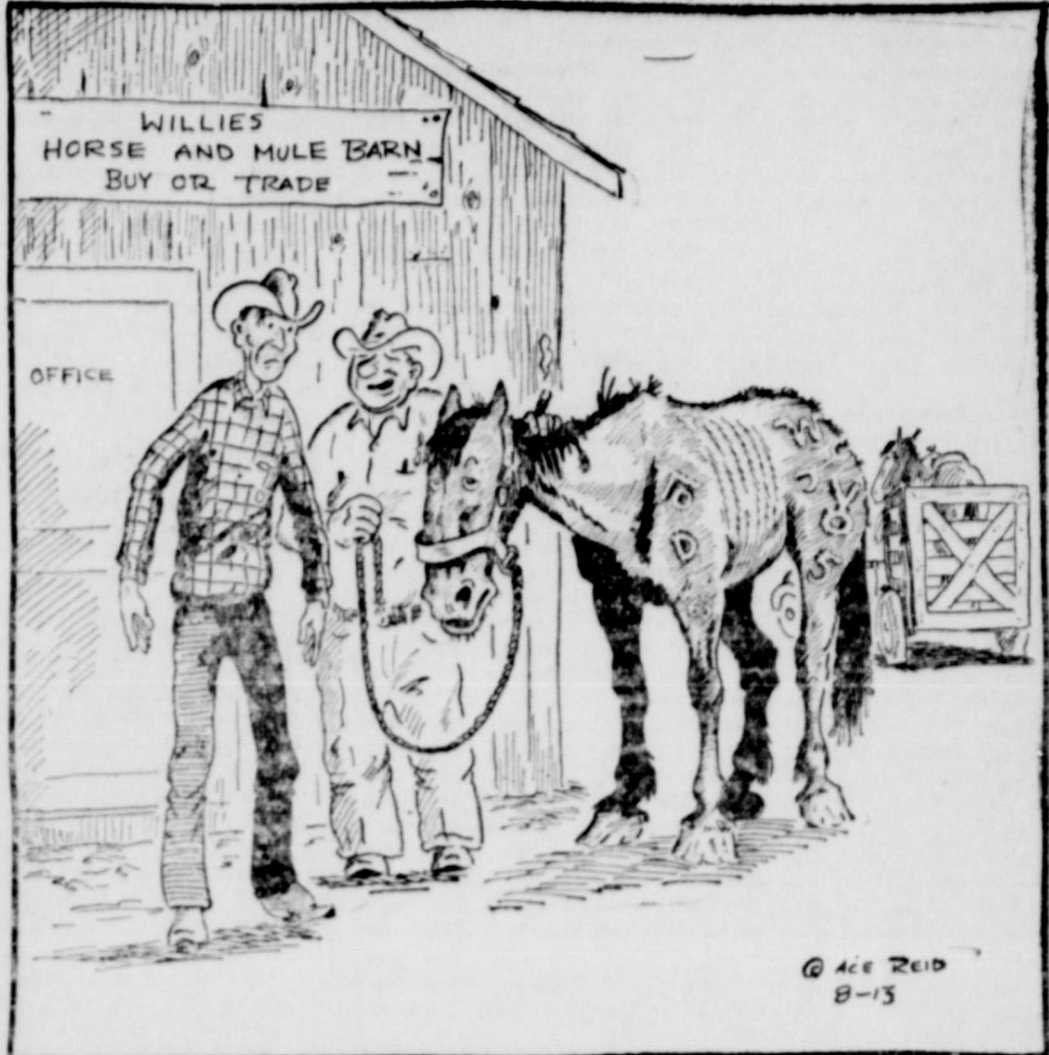
Greer urged motorists to follow these simple rules to stamp out litter:

- Set a good example for your children and neighbors by always disposing of trash in a proper receptacle and carrying a litterbag in your car.
- Aid your local civic organizations in making people aware of the need to keep Texas highways beautiful by "stowing" trash, not throwing it.
- Enjoy the picnicking facilities of Roadside Parks but leave them clean for the next visitor.

## Crop Cost Study Meeting Held By County Farmers

Soil Conservation Service

A group of farmers and ranchers from Hamilton County met in Hamilton recently to determine the cost and return figures from crops commonly produced in the Hamilton-Coryell SCD. The figures obtained were based upon what the group felt was the low, average, and high production rates for this area.

The two crops that were considered were continuous oats, and cotton. The farmers and ranchers present felt these two crops were usually found in most farming operations in the district.

On the oats following oats operation, it was estimated that under low production, 15 bushels per acre, the average farmer was losing about \$2.75 per acre. Under high production of 70 bushels per acre, the return figures were estimated to be \$29.15 per acre. The average production was estimated at 35 bushels per acre. The return for average production was estimated to be \$5.35 per acre.

All figures on expenses and income were what the farmers felt were average for this area. The results obtained by the group indicates the increased need for farmers to consider the conservation practices that will aid them in reaching the higher production rates.

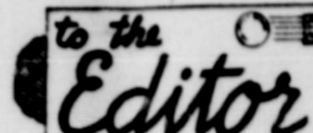
# Citizen of the Week . . .

This week I have chosen a man who has written several interesting articles for this paper. He has also served many communities, as well as our own, in his lifetime of service. That service being the ministry, he is none other than Rev. E. E. Dawson.

Rev. Dawson became a minister at the age of 21. He has since then served as a minister for 43 years and for five years was an editor for pastoral papers. Four of those years were in Abilene and one was in Kingsville. His work for pastoral papers gave him valuable experience for his future writings.

There was one question that I wanted to ask him. "What caused you to decide on the ministry?"
