His funeral home home arrangements were conveyed to the Hico Home late Wednesday where arrangements were made.

## HERE IN HICO

September 1, Texans will be paying a sales tax on practically everything they purchase for the first time in history.

At present time, nothing is being done to prevent confusion among merchants and customers alike.

Only two short weeks in Hico to put the plan into operation. Merchants are going to have their hands full trying to figure out the taxable and what is not taxable and what is not taxable. Many people ask us the mechanics of the plan, but so far we haven't received official information from the state.

Never in a nutshell, here are some of the proposals on collecting the tax.

For instance, if you and four other local cronies go to the store to buy a pair of pants, better split the bill. If one of you try to pay for the two-pairs for the coffee, you will also have to pay a sales tax. Best way to beat the tax is to go dutch.

The law says that "outer wear" up to \$10.00 is not taxable. However, if you buy a pair of pants then the tax is collected on the entire bill. A lot of discussion has gone on about this, including whether or not socks are taxable. Some legislators concede that socks are taxable, but contend that part of a pair of socks is hidden.

Shoes—suppose you want to buy a pair costing \$14.00. The law says you can get a shagginess on the way, specifically said the merchant couldn't sell you for another \$7 and the right shoe for \$7 and evade the tax. In other words they don't care there are many calls for one shoe so they said that they would sell in units of two's.

Women can go right on to the grocery store and buy all the things they want and not pay tax regardless of amount. But if they separate all items not classed as food and you must pay tax on items such as brooms, soap, other household supplies are taxable.

On the other hand if you go to the store and order a hamburger for 25¢, then you pay a sales tax on the burger even though it is food.

Automobiles are exempt from sales tax but you will still have to pay the old tax which was very high.

Appliances come under the tax. If you purchase a new washer or refrigerator should do so before the first of September. (It'll not be much to you appliance dealer that plug).

Perhaps the state will be paying with merchants, and not deducting a penitentiary sentence for who don't fully understand the program at the start. The plan will probably work without many hardships on anyone. After it is once set up, but now it appears that a collection of books will have to be written in order to make a collection of a business to handle the state's money. We have always been opposed to a sales tax, but apparently it was the only way to the state's money woes.

## Managing Rangelands for Maximum Returns is Problem

Managing rangelands to obtain maximum returns from grazing is a problem that requires close study and at best is a problem. If ranges are either overgrazed or undergrazed the best returns will not be obtained.

The USDA's Southern Plains Experimental Range near Woodward, Oklahoma, in making an eight year study of stocking rates on ranges brought out the fact that evidence of results of overgrazing or over stocking does not necessarily show up in the condition of b-reeder cows. But it does show up, according to an article in the July 1961 issue of USDA's "Agricultural Research." The title of the article is "Calf Weights Stocking, Guide for Cattleman."

It was found that where only 12 acres were allowed per cow the calf crop produced was only 81 per cent and the calves averaged 404 pounds at weaning time. Compared with this, cows that were allowed 17 acres of grazing produced a 92 per cent calf crop and the calves averaged 481 pounds.

The article also stated there was no noticeable difference in the condition of cows allowed only 12 acres of grazing and those with 17 acres. In fact, it was necessary to check the brands to determine if a cow came out of the overgrazed pasture or from the properly stocked range.

With these factual figures in hand it is a simple matter to arrive at the extra profits to be earned by proper use of rangeland. For example, assume a rancher wants to establish a 100 cow breeding herd and buys 100 cows at a cost of \$200 each and

leases 1700 acres of grassland at \$3.00 per acre. From this he can expect the following:

81 calves weighing 404 pounds each or a total of 32,724 pounds of beef. At 23 cents per pound this would be a gross income of \$7,526.52.

Less 6 per cent on \$20,000.00 (investment in cows) \$1200.  
Cost of lease, 1200 acres at \$3.00 would be \$3600, or a total of \$4,800 interest and lease.

Net return above interest and lease expense, \$2,726.52.

Assume this same operator leases 1700 acres instead of 1200 and still runs only 100 breeding cows. In this case, based on figures developed at Woodward, the rancher could expect these results:

92 calves weighing 481 pounds each or a total of 44,252 pounds of beef.

At 23 cents per pound this would be a gross income of \$10,177.96.  
Less \$1200 for interest, and cost of 1700 acre lease at 3.00, \$5100 for a total of \$6300.

Return above interest and lease expense, \$3877.96.

It is obvious that even though unfavorable results from overgrazing may not show up in the condition of breeding cows, it shows up in percentage of calf crops produced and in weaning weights of calves, and ultimately in money in the bank.

Analyze these figures and if in doubt about proper stocking rates for your range, consult SCS technicians at Hamilton or Gatesville who are working with the Soil Conservation District. These technicians will make range surveys and forage inventories of pastures and suggest methods of improving them.

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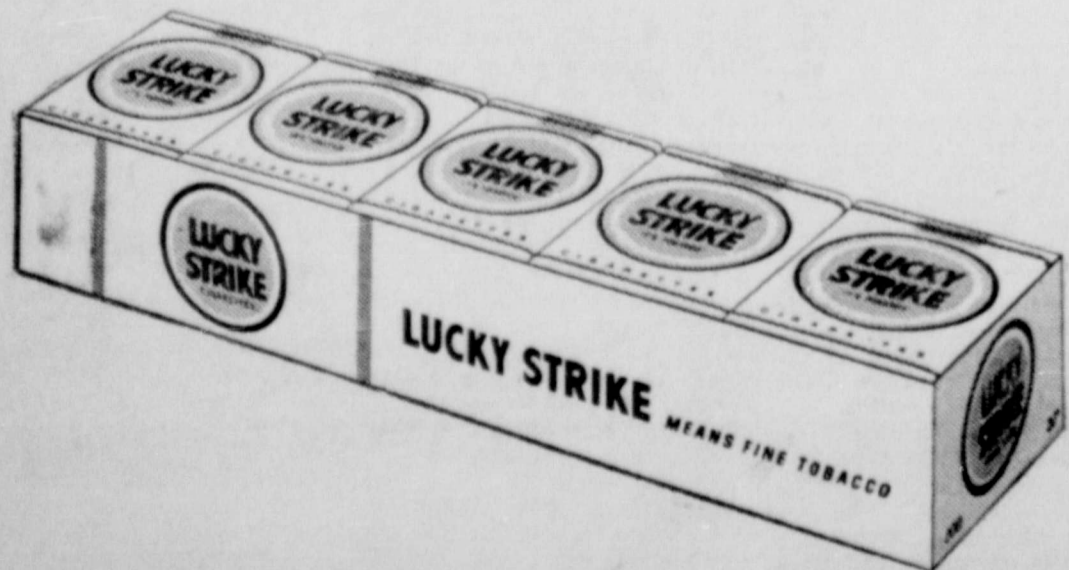

## Long-Dreaded Sales Tax Starts September 1 in Texas

Austin, Aug. 15.—Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation.

To the central collection point for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer the cost is unknown, but educated guesses are already being made.

James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions, the general sales tax will be two per cent on purchases of 25c or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man—and woman—on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances.

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They in-

creased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They make a book-keeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

In addition, the Legislature previously had passed a tax on private clubs, calculated to raise some \$4,000,000.

Roughly, it is figured that all these things will cover the state's needs for the next two-year period, and provide for a school teachers' pay raise of \$810 per year.

**Escheat Bill Omits Banks**

Gov. Price Daniel won a partial victory in his long fight to tighten the state's escheat law. It's the law under which abandoned cash and property held by private business and industry is supposed to revert to the state.

After several attempts the Legislature passed a bill requiring institutions holding such property to report it to the state. Banks, however, were exempt from the provisions of the bill, much to the dismay of Governor Daniel.

"With everyone else covered," he said, "The banks cannot hold out much longer. The enforcement procedures should include banks and I shall continue to fight for this, both as a principle and as a means for the state to obtain property it already owns under the present escheat law."

**Problem at Gatesville.**

Recent breaks at the Gatesville School for Boys, and the death of an attendant with a baseball bat, have focused attention on that institution which is without walls or barricades of any kind.

A delegation of attendants came to Austin, talked with Governor Daniel and complained that measures which they are allowed to take are too indefinite. They said no attendant is allowed to "discipline" inmates of the school. Sometimes the boys will mind and sometimes they will not.

Dr. James A. (Jack) Turman, Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council, told the men that changes were being made which would help. A maximum security unit is being built, a trade school is under contract, and a double maximum security fence is in the works for the worst offenders.

**Legislative Council Swamped.**

The Texas Legislative Council has been requested by the Legislature to look into a host of things which may require new laws.

One request asks a study of the adequacy of the present cattle brand inspection laws. It was pointed out that Texas, unlike many other western states, has no statewide brand registration system, relying on county by county registration which permits duplication of brands.

TLC also has been asked to look into the problem of job discrimination because of age; problems of urban mass transportation; and the feasibility of using state parks as evacuation centers in the event of enemy attack.

**House Streamlines**

The House of Representatives has voted to do away with more than a third of its committees in order to streamline its operations. House's 43 committees will be reduced in the 1963 session to 25 by combining several groups. Seniority would determine the membership of one fourth of each committee.

**Texas Business Good.**

Business activity in Texas dropped three per cent in June, from an all-time high in May, reports

the UT Bureau of Business Research. But it still was seven per cent above the level of one year ago.

June activity also was the second highest for any month since the bureau began computing it in 1935.

Prospects are fine for good business conditions to extend well into 1962. This partially as a result of the expanded arms program, resulting from the Berlin situation.

However, the agency said there is a possibility of inflation plaguing the economy again.

**State Guard Strength Reported.**

With the possibility of calling up the National Guard for active duty, Adjutant General James W. Taylor has been furnished a report on the active strength of the Texas State Guard—1,504 officers and enlisted men in active reserve units, and 218 officers in the ready reserve unassigned.

Corps has a total authorized strength of 10,000, when mobilized to full table of organization. All officers and men in this service serve without compensation and provide their own uniforms.

The State Guard is subject to being called by the Governor for internal security service

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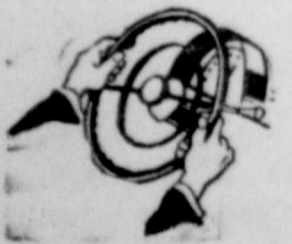
