ROOF COLLAPSES WHEN WALL SAGS

Damage was estimated at several thousand dollars to the building owned by J. B. Woodard which partially collapsed Sunday. The building, located on the lower end of main street, housed an automatic laundry in the front portion, and the rear was used for storage by Woodard. Only the roof covering the rear portion collapsed, and the laundry equipment was not damaged. The laundry has been closed until repairs can be made to the building. The roof collapsed when the outside wall of the rock building swayed outward, letting the roof joists give way.

\$106,115.40 School Budget Adopted By Trustees

Hico school's 1961-62 budget, as adopted by the board of trustees last Thursday night, calls for the expenditure of \$106,114.40 for the coming school term. The figure is estimated. Big item in the budget is salaries and instruction, which also includes tax collection expense, clerical, office supplies, etc. An estimated total of \$89,180.05 will be spent for this work. Maintenance of plant, operation of plant, health service, and other miscellaneous items account for most of the remaining money.

Revenue for the school year is estimated to be \$108,536.00. Sources of revenue are listed as follows: Local source (maintenance and debt service tax) \$26,520.00. Revenue from county sources \$80.00. Revenue from state sources, \$81,936.00. Total estimated revenue from all sources, \$108,536.00.

The contest with the Training School had been originally set for October 6 but was changed to the September 1 date when Toiar withdrew from the schedule. 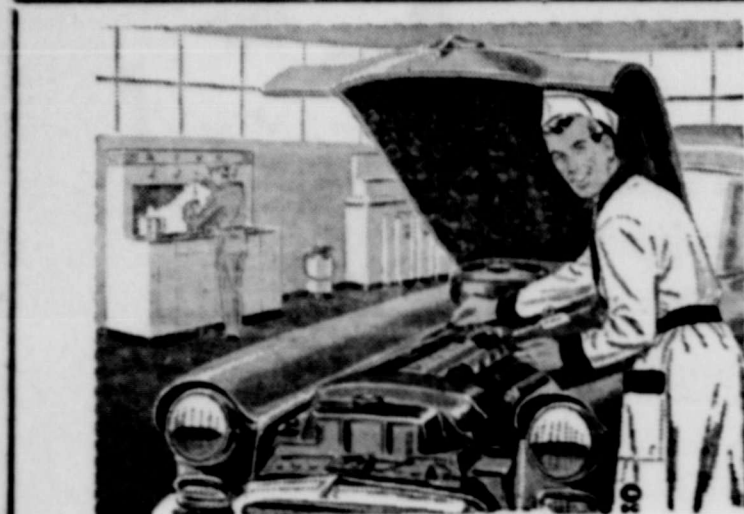

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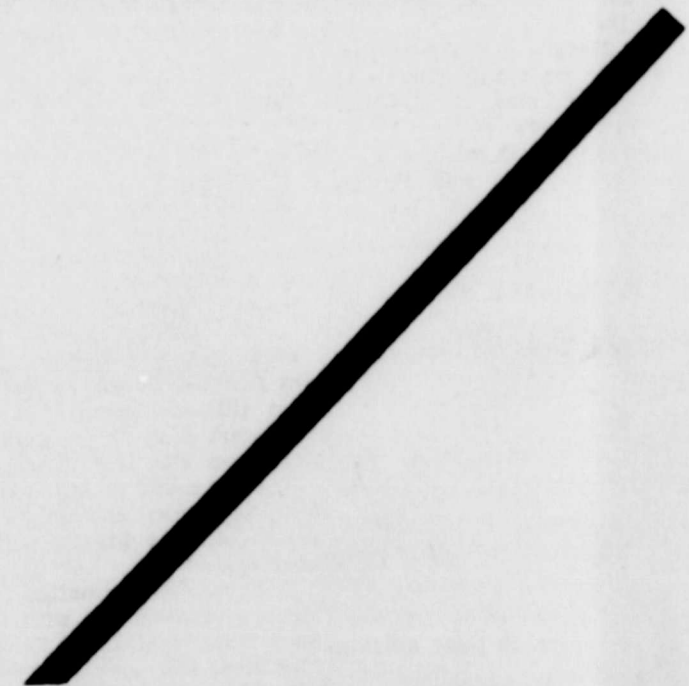

The District 23-B football roulette wheel spins again in a couple of weeks and this season the odds favor the bouncing ball to land in the vicinity of Meridian, or possibly again at Valley Mills.

Meridian's Yellowjackets, under first-year coach Reginald Reynolds, has the guns returning but the always-tough Eagles of Coach A. E. Drew, also in his first year at Valley Mills, have the tradition.

If either of the favorites should slip, Coach Dick Varichak's Evant Elks or Jack Barnett's Hico Tigers could take the cake. Only Cranfills Gap, winless in its last 27 starts, appears out of the running.

Meridian Yellowjackets

Reynolds inherits a 34-man squad, bolstered by 16 lettermen and seven returning starters to start the yearly grind toward the showdown against Valley Mills. Reynolds has detected a wealth of speed, good passing and fine blocking in the crew he has taken to command.

The Jacket backfield is due to be strong, fast, have plenty of depth and can produce the knockout punch at any time. Fullback "Cent Pass, a 176-pound senior, and veteran halfbacks Gary McDowell, 179, and Boots Harris, 150 will produce the fireworks with Gary Hennessee calling the signals at quarterback.
