drinks, ice, candy.

Fruit juices, drugs and medicines bought without a doctor's prescription, hearing aids, shaving supplies, grooming and beauty supplies, soaps, writing paper, pencils, artists' supplies, musical instruments, window coolers, fans and air conditioners, heaters, sewing machines, vacuum cleaners, brooms, bicycles, sports equipment, boats and boat motors, cameras, photographic supplies, commercial pictures, camping supplies, clocks and watches, jewelry, pets, flowers, luggage and caskets.

Roughly 180,000 Texas retailers must obtain permits to do business from the Comptroller and file quarterly returns on the sales taxes they collect. The Comptroller, Robert Calvert, has locked in his staff to write the necessary forms and regulations.

Calvert confirms that the new "limited sales, excise, and use tax" does not fall on services or real estate, but solely on tangible

which may be seen, weighed, measured, felt, or touched, or which is in any other manner

perceptible to the senses." The basic rate of tax is one penny per 50 cents of the reta.l sales price, that is, two percent. "The tax hereby imposed shall be collected by the retailer from the consumer." states the law.

The use of tokens or stamps in collecting the tax is prohibited and retailers are forbidden to tell their customers in any way that the tax will not be added to the retail price or will be absorbed or refunded by the re-

This is the sales tax on "each retail sale":

One to 24 cents, no tax; 25 to 74 cents, one cent: 75 cents to \$1.24. two cents: \$1.25 to \$1.74. three cents; \$1.75 to \$2.24, four cents: and another penny tax "for each additional fifty cents of purchase, or fraction thereof." Utilities are given special per-

defines as "personal property customers "in one lump sum corering the utility sales price plus the tax." Every other retailer is required by the law to give every customer a receipt for sales

or use taxes paid. Citizens may include the amount of sales tax they pay in itemized deductions on their federal income tax forms, just as they may now include, in their itemized deductions, state gasoline sales taxes. This is the only way they can reduce their federal income tax on account of

He said "everyone that sells anything" retail must have a permit from his office to do so. including wholesalers if they sell to the public. His office is now preparing a mail-out, including

Exemptions are specified for some kinds of consumer goods, some kinds of business and .2 ricultural purchases, some elements in sale prices, and some kinds of buyers.

Consumer exemptions: "Food products for human co 1sumption" are exempt. However,

this does not mean all food. Specified as exempt are cereal. milk, olemargarine, meat, poul- cines when prescribed by a li-

spice, sugar, coffee, tea and cocoa products.

Specified as not exempt are water, including mineral bottled water, carbonated water, and carbonated and noncarbonated packaged soft drinks and diluted juices where sold in liquid, frozen, or dry-mix forms; and ice and candy. In other words, soft drinks, fruit juices, ice, and candy will be taxed.

Restaurant meals are also taxed. So also are school meals "served by public or private schools, school districts, student organizations, or Parent-Teacher Associations pursuant to an agreement with the proper school authorities, to the students or teachers of an elementary or secondary school during the regular school day." It appears from this language that meals served to college students will be taxed.

Medical preparations are excluded from the food exemption entirely. Then "drugs and mediThis means that things like aspirin, first-aid kits, and preparations against colds will be taxed if one buys them without a doctor's prescription. Exempted by name are "braces, spectacles, hearing aids, and orthopedic and dental prosthetic appliances."

A number of products are exempt on grounds they lead to the production of food. These include "any form of animal life" feed, seeds, plants, and fertilizer. Farm machinery and equipment is exempt if it is used to produce food, feed, or other agricultural products.

All leasing and renting is exempt from the tax.

An exemption entitled "work clothes" applies to "outer wearing apparel" which sells for \$10 or less retail. A point is made that this exemption does not apply to clothing accessories.





## Sales Tax 'Poop' Continued

ducts, motor fuels, alcoholic bev. erages, water, and telephone and telegraph service.

Freight charges are exempted from the sales tax if the common carrier buys the property and ships it under a bill of lading to a point outside the state.

"Gas and electricity" are exempt, but only for business and farming purposes. The language exempts them "when used in industrial manufacturing, mining, agricultural, dairy, or poultry operations or pumping water for irrigation of for electrical purposes."

The tax will not apply to cash discounts, labor installation costs any federal retail sales tax. finance, carrying or service charges or interest, charges for transportation after sale, storage and use for the purpose of transporting the property outside the

Here is how the sales tax is set up:

The basic idea is a tax of two Groveside Services percent of the retail sales price of tangible personal property sold in Texas for consumption, use, or storage. Goods sold for resale or for incorporation into are not taxed; neither are services or real estate.

It presumes "that all gross receipts are subject to the tax until the contrary is established. The burden of proving that a sale of tangible personal property is not a sale at retail is upon the person who makes the sale" unless he takes from his buyer a certificate that the property was bought to resell, lease,

Evidently to make sure nobody gets through the law's closewoven net of definitions and requirements, another tax is also imposed-a "use tax"-on the use, or other consumption of purchased tangible personal property at the rate of two percent. This tax falls on the buyer, not the seller, and the buyer's liability "is not extin-

paid to this state."

The retailer keeps back one per cent of the taxes otherwise due from him as his fee for collecting them. If he pre-pays his tax based on an estimate for the quarter, he gets another two per cent of the total; most retailers will try to do this considering the size of the incentive. If the retailer is late getting his tax money in, he forfeits all payment for collecting.
