Citizen of the Week . . .

Across the country this week, school bells will ring for countless children, as well as teachers. These same bells will also ring for the 32nd time for a man who has done a tremendous job for the Hico School during the past 11 years, school superintendent O. C. Cook. Mr. Cook came to the Hico Schools in 1950 as principal and the next year succeeded Mr. Lincoln as superintendent. Mr. Cook came to Hico from Taylor where he was principal of that school. Previous to this he worked for the state as Deputy State Superintendent. He has also taught school in Union Grove, Browns Ranch, Moselle, and Evant. He attended Tarleton two years before going to North Texas where he received his Bachelors Degree in 1933. He also received his Masters Degree there in 1938. When I asked him if he had any particularly fond memories in

all of these years as a teacher he answered that they were all fond memories to him. One thing Mr. Cook is especially proud of is the Distinguished Service Award presented him by the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas this summer. He has received many letters congratulating him on this achievement. Mr. Cook represents this county at the State Teachers Association meeting in Austin, and was formerly President of the Lions Club. He and his wife attend the Methodist Church here. In his leisure moments he likes to go fishing as it offers him an opportunity to relax and to be doing something different. He doesn't have any plans for retirement but went on to say that he will think about that when the time comes. However, he said that he will retire when his health will not permit him to continue in his work.

Tigers Take Training School 20-0 For First Grid Win

Hico lifted the lid on the 1961 football campaign last Friday night with a 20-0 victory over a stampeding herd of Gatesville State Training School Buffaloes before a partisan crowd of several hundred at the local stadium. The tough running of fullback Mark McElroy, the pin-point passing of Don Jernigan, the excellent receiving of Larry Erick, and the fine defensive play of Robert Reed was the difference in the game. Though the record only shows 7 of 20 completions and one interception, Jernigan was able to hit on the passes needed. All three of the Tigers' touchdowns were the result of his accurate pegging and the fine snagging of Erick, who accounted for 18 of the 20 points scored. McElroy blasted out 118 of the Tiger's 126 yards on the ground. Jerry Casey handled the ball twice for a net of 4 yards, and Jernigan rolled out four times for the only other ground efforts by the Tigers. Erick was on the receiving end of all the Tiger's pass completions except one, which Danny Reeves gathered in for 15 yards. At the start it looked like the locals were in for a hard night, with the visitors taking the opening kickoff and marching to the Tiger 44 before running out of downs.

On the local's initial offensive play from that point, Gatesville intercepted Jernigan's first pass and ran to the locals 30 yard line before being hauled down. However a clipping penalty set the ball back to the 45, and after two plays Jerry Casey returned the favor by swiping a Gatesville aerial and returning to his own 34. The interception was the first of two during the game for the sophomore halfback. Hico was unable to gain a first down, and McElroy got off a beautiful 49 yard punt that set the visitors in a hole at the 8 yard line, and which eventually led to the locals first TD. Gatesville chose to gamble on fourth down at their own 35, and the gamble didn't pay off with the locals taking over at that point. In the series of downs from the 35, Jernigan passed to Erick for 8 yards to the 27, McElroy got 7 to the 20, the big fullback picked up 16 more to the four before losing one yard back to the five where the first quarter of play ended. On the first play of the second quarter Jernigan found Erick in the left flat running a step ahead of the nearest defender and layed in a perfect strike to the little end with the sure hands for the first touchdown. The 35-yard march took five plays. McElroy skirted wide to the left sideline for the two-point conversion. Neither team could muster a

scoring threat in the remaining minutes of the second quarter. The Tigers came out throwing in the second half. They took the kickoff and marched 68 yards in nine plays for their second touch-down. Starting things rolling, Jernigan hit Erick for 11 yards to the 43, backed it up with another strike to Erick for 22 yards to Gatesville 35, hit Danny Reeves for 15 yards to the 20 and a first down. After a ten-yard loss back to the 30, McElroy ran hard for 18 yards

to the 12, picked up six more to the six, and after a no-gain effort and an incomplete pass, Jernigan again found Erick in the end zone and pitched home for the touchdown. The final score of the night came after Erick intercepted a Gatesville pass to set up the counter. From the interception point—the 44 yard line—McElroy picked up 16 yards to the 28, an incomplete pass netted zero, McElroy scooted for another four yards to the 24, and then Jernigan called

on old faithful, a scoring peg to Erick good for the 24 yards and the TD. Gatesville managed their only serious scoring threat of the night in the final period by marching to the Hico 29. One other Hico TD was wiped out by a rules infraction after Jernigan had swiped a Gatesville pass and ambled 30 yards to the end zone only to find that a teammate had been offside nullifying the counter. Most fans agreed that the Gatesville team was the best organized group ever to play here, and as a team put out all the way to the end. It wasn't an easy victory for the locals and a few key plays were the difference. Several bright spots were uncovered by the coaches, one of these being the tremendous defensive game turned in by Robert Reed. The big No. 85 was in on a greater majority of tackles during the night, and generally turned in one of the best performances seen in several years. Another fine defensive effort was put forth by Mike Lowe. The passing of Jernigan and the receiving of Erick were other bright spots, as was the running of McElroy, who fared well on the sweeper plays but had little luck with the dives at guard and tackle slots. Protection for the passer was one of the weaker points, with

Jernigan being rushed most of the night. Otherwise the game could be considered well-played by all hands for a first-nighter. Elsewhere in the district Meridian proved to be a solid pick along with Valley Mills in the favorite's roll. The Yellowjackets clobbered a good Joshua team 22-0. Valley Mills also came through, gaining an 8.7 verdict over Midway of Waco in a squeaker. Dublin, Hico's opponent this week, blasted Early High of Brownwood, a future Tiger opponent 22-0. Gorman, another Tiger opponent, almost caused a riot in Comanche County by upsetting old rivals DeLeon 6-0 to make opponents sit up and take notice. Hico plays Dublin here tonight, and then takes on Blanket and Early High in home games before hitting the road.

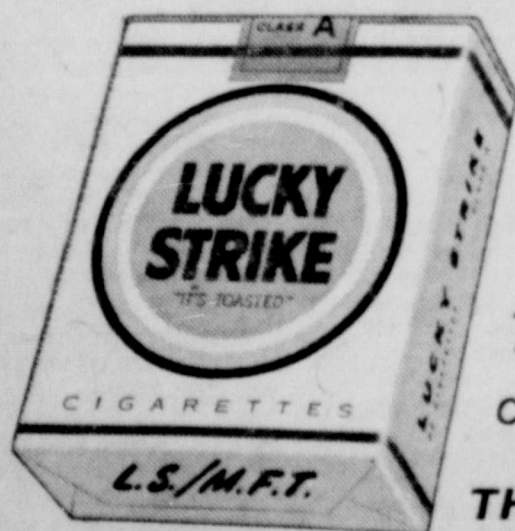

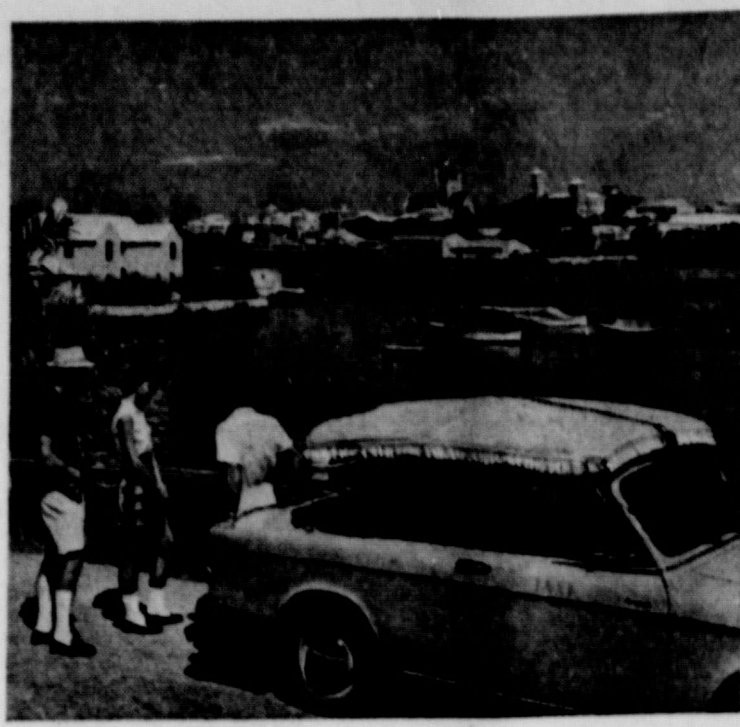

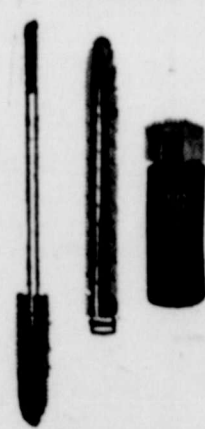

Confusion Reigns as New Sales Tax Put Into Effect

Austin, Sept. 6.—Storm clouds of protest boiled up quickly among consumers, clerks and merchants during the first week of application of Texas' almost-general sales tax.

Reaction was not so much against the cost of the new tax, but more to the principle, inconvenience and confusion. Natural resistance to any new levy always is evident. And there's certainly nothing "hidden" about a sales tax. Noticeable were strange new surprises of pennies in pocket and purse. They were bothersome. Arguments also ensued over what is subject to tax and what isn't.

Although State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert issued bulletin after bulletin explaining what is covered by the tax, it was evident that much time will have to pass before everyone concerned clearly understands the new law.

No one would venture a guess as to how many telephone calls were received by the Comptroller's office during the first week. The multitude of businessmen converging on the Capitol to seek information or lodge complaint gave Comptroller Calvert not a moment's peace.

Meanwhile at the other end of the line—the direct contact point for collection of the extra pennies—clerks, especially those in supermarkets, were equally harried. There had been so little time for them to bone up on the many exemptions and intricacies of the new way of taxing Texans.

Probably the most universal scheme to beat the tax emerged in coffee shops across the state. If the coffee tab for the group

came to 25 cents or more, there was no sense in one person picking it up and having to pay an extra penny.

Chicken Prices Fixed?

Texas chicken eaters who have been enjoying their favorite fare at phenomenally low market prices this summer have been given something to think about by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

"I want to determine if there is an effort to price the Texas poultry producer out of business," he said as he launched an investigation into the matter. "If our Texas broiler raisers are squeezed out of the market with below-cost prices, the ultimate result will be scarcity and sky-rocketing retail chicken prices."

Wilson said that since August, 1960, there has been a decline of some six cents per pound in the price paid broiler producers in Texas, to a low of 12 cents or less. He pointed out that 14 to 16 cents per pound is the usual cost of raising broilers.

The Attorney General is investigating a court-of-inquiry to look into the possibility of anti-trust violations.

Lt. Governor's Race Shaping

Many eyes of Texans are beginning to look in the direction of the Lieutenant Governor's office, vacated by Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner.

One candidate, Republican O. W. Hayes of Temple, has announced he definitely will be in the race. Other definite possibilities include House Speaker James A. Turman of Gober, Sen. Crawford Martn of Hillsboro, Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris, Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock, Sen. Bob Baker of Houston and Don Yar-

brough of Houston. Yarbrough ran against Ramsey last time.

Institutional Work Week Cut

More than 9,000 state hospital and special school employees, forced to work longer hours than other state workers for several years, got the break they had been waiting for when the Hospital Board invoked the 40-hour week throughout the system.

Legislature had given the board the option of hiring additional employees and reducing the 44-hour week to 40, or of retaining the longer work week and giving present employees pay raises. The money was provided to do it either way.

"This new work schedule will make it possible to retain and attract more qualified personnel," board chairman French Robertson of Abilene said.

Tougher Security for Gatesville. Recent serious trouble at the Gatesville State School for Boys has led to tighter security measures.

Dr. James Turman, Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council, reports that horses and jeeps will soon be placed in service for patrol purposes, and men will be equipped with walkie-talkies.

"We want to give evidence of authority," he said.

Although guards will not be armed, he pointed out that "every man knows he can use physical force to control his company." He also noted that many problems will be eliminated with completion next year of a maximum security unit to be known as Mountain View School, one and a half miles from the Gatesville School. A double fence with barbed wire on top will surround this unit.

"We are not dealing with Boy Scouts or Sunday School classes" said council member Robert W. Kneebone.

Automatic Tax Check Due

Internal Revenue Commissioner Mortimer M. Caplin, on a recent visit to Austin, dropped the hint that automation in the processing of income tax returns may ultimately eliminate spot-checks and permit scrutiny of every return in detail.

He said an automatic processing system soon will be put into service that will quickly spot individuals and business firms failing to file returns, check mathematical accuracy and other data. Center of the tax accounting system will be in Martinsburg, West Virginia.

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D. C.—It was my responsibility to handle a Resolution against the diplomatic recognition and against the admission of Red China to the United Nations.

The action was taken by the Congress on Thursday of last week, August 31. My preliminary remarks to the debate were as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, on numerous occasions the House of Representatives has expressed itself by an overwhelming vote on Resolutions against diplomatic recognition by the United States Government of the regime of Communist China and against its admission to the United States.

"We come again to this issue. I am aware that some of you feel that the sentiments expressed in this Resolution should also be applicable to Outer Mongolia. I share your sentiment and have introduced separate legislation on the subject. Since this Resolution has been passed by the other Body, should it be amended, there is doubt that time will permit a possible conference or that the other Body will consider it, if amended.

"I think, however, I can give you reasonable assurance that the separate Resolution on the admission of Outer Mongolia to the United Nations will be considered by the Foreign Affairs Committee, and I join those of you who share this view that action of this nature is desirable. In the hope that it may be brought to the floor before adjournment.

"Mr. Speaker, there is no doubt in my mind that this House will overwhelmingly, and I hope, unambiguously, approve Senate Concurrent Resolution 24. In doing so, we address ourselves to all the people of the United States of America, and yes, to all peoples of the world. The action here will give strength and assurance to those of our own people who harbor some fear that we may weaken and be less diligent in our opposition to the Chinese Communist regime becoming a member of the United Nations. It should strengthen other peoples of the world who see some increased opposition to our stand on this issue.

"In my judgment, Mr. Speaker, we should absolutely leave no doubt in the minds of people anywhere that pressures from what ever source applied will continue to be resisted with the strongest possible determination. It would be unconscionable and unthinkable for us to do otherwise.

"In the face of the aggressive intents of the Chinese Communists, according to their own admissions; the fact that the Communist regime does not represent the will of the people it ruthlessly rules; because of the constant belligerence towards free people of other countries; because of their avowed and recorded efforts to sabotage and subvert other na-

tions, including the illicit, wholesale export of narcotics; and because of this outlaw regime's action in Korea, it is crystal clear that not the slightest consideration should be entertained that Red China qualifies for admission to the United Nations or is entitled to diplomatic recognition by our own Government.

"The 16th session of the United Nations opens on September 19. The representatives of the United States Government in the United Nations will be fortified with an important tool of opposition to the admission of Red China by the action of the Congress. The Congress speaks for the American people. There is no doubt that this Resolution reflects the views of the vast majority, and that vast majority, through this Congress and through our Representatives in the United Nations, says to the world that we stand on the principle that so long as any regime practices the outlawry plainly evidenced by the Red leaders of Communist China, that we will stand unequivocally firm and determined that she shall not take her place among other nations of the world at the Council table."

A highlight of each year's show is the crowning of the Fall Fair Queen, who will reign throughout the show and the coming year. Judging of entrants for the queen's contest will be held Wednesday night, Sept. 13, and the coronation ceremonies are scheduled for Thursday, September 14.

The livestock show includes a Junior Show, beef cattle exhibit and dairy cattle. The Junior Show consists of dairy, beef cattle, swine, and sheep and goat division.
