


The dinner will be held at the IOOF and Rebekah Lodge Hall, 701 Columbia Street, from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m.

## Voters Poised For Amendment Election

Next Tuesday's Constitutional Election, which features the vote on the proposed state lottery, will find Parmer County voters going to their "old regular" polling places, according to County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

We're trying to stress that the precinct changes which were recently advertised do not go into effect until January 1, 1991," Mrs. Warren said.

The County Clerk said on Thursday that approximately 70 absentee ballots had been cast in the early voting stage, and thought that might indicate a larger turnout than usual for a constitutional amendment election.

Of the 70 total absentees, that included 20 absentee votes which were cast on Tuesday at the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union, the one-day absentee booth. Absentee voting ended Friday.

The election will mark the final time for the Black and Lakeview polling places to be operated, as both have been consolidated with the Friona polling places beginning in 1992.

60 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 16, 1931 Friona now has two attorneys since the locating of Attorney A.D. Smith, formerly of Fort Sumner, New Mexico. Mr. Smith arrived in Friona on Thursday of last week and has established his office in the room of the J.W. Parr building adjoining the Friona Garage building on the east side of Main Street.

55 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 9, 1936 The first bale of cotton for this season to be ginned at the local gin was brought in Monday afternoon, by R.E. Barnette of the Black community. This bale weighed 470 pounds, which was ginned out of 1710 pounds of seed cotton. The bale was purchased by the Friona Gin at a price of 12 cents per pound, a bounty or premium of one cent per pound, or a total of \$5.00.

50 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 10, 1941 Dr. R.J. McReynolds, local physician and surgeon, now has under construction, a building which when completed, will give Friona and vicinity a clinic or sanatorium equal in quality of equipment to anything of that kind in the plains country. Construction is under the direction of George E. Taylor, local contractor, who is assisted by J.H. Lea, C.L. Rury and Harding will do the stucco work. The building, which is located next door north of Dr. McReynolds' residence, will contain eight rooms and a corridor through the middle, leading back to the doctor's present office rooms.

45 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 11, 1946 The Friona Women's Club met in the basement of the Congregational Church Wednesday afternoon to celebrate its 75th birthday. Mrs. Pearl Kinsley and Mrs. J.P. Slack were hostesses to twenty-three members. Mrs. F.N. Welch took the members by picture, to the "Beauty Spots" of America. Mrs. Carl C. Maurer took the members on an imaginary trip to several interesting places in America.

40 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 4, 1951 Friona's new public school addition should be ready for occupancy by November 15, according to contractor G. Williams, who attributed the delay in completing construction to the difficulty in obtaining many necessary materials.

Elevator men, amazed at the influx of harvested grain so early in the season, pointed out this week that more grain had been brought into Friona elevators by October 1, of this year, than at this early date on any other year they could remember.

35 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 27, 1956 Friona celebrated her 50th birthday last weekend, and had plenty of help doing it. From every standpoint, the anniversary event was a success, reports Wright Williams, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the promotion. The only thing which didn't go exactly to suit the celebration boosters was the weather.

30 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 5, 1961 The Friona City Council read five applications for the city manager position Monday and interviewed two applicants Tuesday in successive meetings. No final decision was made as to who will be selected for the office soon to be vacated by Albert Field. Council members chose to delay final action for a few days pending a possible reply from an advertisement in a professional publication.

25 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 29, 1966 Ben J. Ladnicky, landscape architect with the Texas Highway Department, will be the principal speaker at the regular meeting of Modern Study Club next Tuesday. 

La Constitucion de Texas requiere que la Legislatura de Texas prohiba loterias en Texas. Por lo tanto, el estado no puede iniciar una loteria a menos que la constitucion este enmendada para permitirlo. La constitucion fue enmendada en 1980 para permitir a la legislatura a autorizar juegos de bingo manejado por grupos religiosos y caritativos y otra enmnienda en 1989 para la autorizacion de rifas para grupos no negociantes.

Si la propuesta para la enmienda pasa la legistura crearia una division de la oficina del fiscal para operar la loteria. Argumentos a favor:

1.-La loteria provee un recurso de ganancias al estado que se levanta por participacion voluntaria. Provée una manera de aumentar el tesoro del estado sin aumentar los impuestos.

2.-La loteria en Texas recobraria "Lo prometido es deuda" dice el el dinero de Texas que se gasta en la loteria en otros estados. Beneficiaria las tiendas porque atraeria clientes a comprar los boletos.

3.-El estado de Texas ha aprendido de la experiencia de treinta estados que ya tiene loterias. La legislatura encargada incluye cosas para prevenir problemas que otros confrontan como un fondo estabilizado para la loteria por si el dinero del estado bajara, programas para ayudar a aquellos que tienen el vicio compulsivo de apostar y medidas para reducir la posibilidad de fraude. El estado usaria el proceso de la loteria para recobrar de los ganadores quienes deven al estado impuestos atrasados, pagos o prestamos no pagados para la educacion.

Argumentos en contra: 1.-La loteria no producira suficiente dinero para resolver los problemas monetarios del estado ni prevenira para el aumento de impuestos en el futuro. RElativamente es una manera costosa para recabar fondos, la cual le costaria al estado tanto como 37 centavos por cada dolar para el fondo, comparado con el costo de dos o tres centavos si hubiera un impuesto estatal

como en otros estados. 2.-La loteria no es una funcion apropiada para el estado, ni como fuente de ingresos o como forma de entretenimiento. Promover la loteria especialmente a la gente pobre para aumentar los fondos estatales es moral y eticamente sin defensa.

3.-La funcion de la loteria como impuesto regresivo dana mas a aquellos de escasos recursos. Las loterias han demostrado ser dos veces mas regresivo que el impuesto estatal. La loteria apela mas a las personal pobres, quienes gastan un porcentaje mas alto de su dinero comprando boletos para la loteria y la loteria as particularmente danina para la gente que es impulsiva en apostar.

## Hospital Happenings

Prairie Acres Nursing Home will be the site for monthly support group meetings on Alzheimer's Discase.

These meetings are designed for people touched by the disease to come together in a non-judgmental, safe environment to vent their frustrations, to share coping techniques, to learn more about Alzheimer's and discover what resources are available to them.

Alzheimer's is a progressive, degenerative neurological disorder that results in severe mental deterioration and eventual physical decline. There is no cure.

The disease has a gradual onset. Symptoms include difficulty with memory and loss of intellectual abilities severe enough to interfere with routine work or social activities. The Alzheimer's patient also may experience confusion, language problems, poor or decreased judgment, disorientation in place and time, and changes in behavior or personality.

Alzheimer's can strike people in their 40s or 50s but most victims are older. Four million Americans have the disease and it is the most common form of irreversible dementia--a group of symptoms that characterize certain diseases and conditions.

Alzheimer's also affects the family of the patient. The emotional, social and financial costs of caring for an Alzheimer's patient are high. Family members also often risk their own health in order to care for the patient at home.

Deborah Sweatt, activity director and Deb Hendley, R.N. D.O.N. at Prairie Acres, have researched the group strategy and will be starting the meetings beginning Thursday, November 7.





Nothing went right for the Friona Chieftains last Friday at Chieftain Field, as the team lost its eighth game of the season, 32-0 to the Tulia Homets.

The team received a blow with seconds left in the first half when FHS quarterback Blair Burney was injured when he was hit from behind, and had to be removed from the field by paramedics in the ambu-

Burney was replaced for the rest of the game by Britt Conklin.

Before the second half was over. junior wide receiver Brian Herring was injured, and the loss of the team's top passer and receiver definitely put a crimp on Friona's passing attack.

And, while the Chieftain offense sputtered, Tulia's high-geared attack was moving pretty well.

Friona played a good defensive game for the first half, allowing only one score, on a one-yard plunge that capped a 51-yard Hornet drive. Blue Field blocked the PAT kick, so Tulia's halftime lead was 6-0.

Friona's main chance to score came in the second quarter, when the team drove 65 yards from their own 34 to the Tulia one but failed to score.

Curtis Brady had a nine-yard run, and Burney hit Kelly Jack for another first down as the Chiefs moved to a first and goal from the Tulia eight.

#### Prenuptial Agreements Can Be Your First Step In Estate Planning

A prenuptial agreement may sound like a quick way to end a romance, but in today's financial environment it is becoming more

Prenuptial agreements are legal contracts between a future husband and wife. Such agreements generally detail how the couple's financial affairs are to be handled during the marriage and in the event of divorce. Once funds are commingled without prior agreement, the property is usually considered jointly owned. The important thing to remember about prenuptial agreements is that they are legal contracts dealing with property issues. It is therefore suggested that the contract contain only financial issues. Avoid other issues that serve only to complicate the agreement. Some states require each partner to retain a separate lawyer to avoid conflicts of interest. Even if this is not required, it may be advisable.

Prenuptial agreements are not for everyone, but they make a lot of sense for some people. They offer one way to sensibly discuss and agree on property matters before you are forced to make those decisions at a time of extreme duress. Prenuptial agreements are not irrevocable. They should be written to meet current and anticipated needs. If circumstances change, and your spouse agrees, they can be changed

Before signing any prenuptial agreement, understand all the provions. The best way to protect yourself is to select a knowledgeable attorney who is responsible to you and has your best interests in
