### Let's Examine Our Movie Fare

"Perversion, violence, nakedness-this is common fare for 55 million to 65 million Americans who weekly sit in semi-darkness before brightly illuminated movie screens." It's high time the American public woke up to the consequences of this perversion of the largest industry in America.

A common evening's entertainment at one of America's largest movie houses in Hollywood include these titles:

"Not Tonight, Henry," "Eve and the Hundyman," and "Nudist on the High Seas," and others equally as startling.

The thing that causes the problem, though, is not the amount of bare flesh shown as it is the fact that immorality is justified; drinking is glamorized; religion and ministers are satirized; prostitutes are idolized. This last fact can be seen most vividly by the fact that of the four Academy Award-winning actors for this past year two portrayed prostitutes.

This kind of thing can not possiby have any other than adverse effect on common Christian morals. For years only a handful of ministers and a few parents were interested in the things seen by American movie-goers, the majority of which are under 25 years of age. But, new, even magazines and newspapers are crying out in alarm.

The big problem is that the wave of sex movies is not being checked by these efforts. This moral corruption has swept the country and hangs like a leech even in our own local theaters. The theaters that allow this exploitation of sex are not crum-bum theaters on skid row either. The big majority of them are large family theaters in respectable neighborhoods.

Pollers say that sex crime and the divorce-rate have increased in proportion to the wave of movies. This shows the effect on young people (and adults) of this trend.

The big trouble is that many parents and leaders are not informed about the screen productions seen by their young people. I urge you to make a study of the fare for our local theaters and judge

But, the question still remains-what must be done?

It stands to reason that movies are made to make money. If a particular kind of movie draws customers, it starts a trend. Therefore, we see the American public apparently wants this smut. But-Do we?

The fault lies in the fact that respectable people continue to patronize the places that show this corrupted view of life. If the money stops, the theaters change themes. The quickest way to a movie man's choice of entertainment is the box office. Not only this but community and church groups should provide activities to keep our youth busy. It's up to you!

"In the final analysis the correction of the problem rests-with individual acting in a responsible fashion, with individual theater owners who refuse to exhibit such movies, with individual moviegoers who refuse to patronize smutty productions and with individual citizens who are concerned enough-to rally an effective force of public opinion."

If this doesn't happen a handful of men interested only in money will continue to warp the lives of our families until America will be nothing but a decadent nation on the down-grade.
