## THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

### Highlights and Sidelights

Aware of the fact that more money soon may be available for trunk-highway construction, 15 delegations of civic leaders descended on Austin.

They asked the Texas Highway Commission for a record number of dollars for highway work. Specifically \$171,056,000.

Houston and Harris County, presenting a plan of freeway development designed to carry Houston's traffic in 1980, asked for \$189,400,000 program. This is the big one. But all of the other projects were equally important to the homefolks, even though less money was involved.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer feels that 22,000 of the 25,000 miles in the trunk-highway system are inadequate. He says that less attention has been paid to these town to city roads during the years in which urban freeways and farm to market roads have taken top priority.

Gov. Price Daniel brought the issue of highway financing to a head when he vetoed the \$15,000,000 Colson-Briscoe farm to market road appropriation. Legislators had appropriated it for the year starting next September 1. Governor Daniel will ask the legislature, at its special session this winter, to cut down on farm to market road construction and step up the money available for trunk highway work.

Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association has endorsed the change.

Gov. Daniel will go in person to the Texas Farm Bureau convention in Galveston Nov. 12-15 to try to get that powerful rural group to accept the plan.

**Business Coming Back.**

A steady growth in Texas retail trade in 1961 is reported by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas.

Despite a Gulf Coast slowdown in September, due to Hurricane Carla, retail sales for the first nine months of 1961 pulled to within one per cent of the sales for the same period of 1960. First six months of 1961 were three per cent behind 1960.

September sales were off largely because people bought heavily in August to avoid the sales tax. But

presentation of a 12-month file of National Geographic magazines was accompanied this year by the society's atlas of large and unusually beautiful maps.

In a letter to Governor Daniel he proposed that the State ad valorem tax be abolished, and the sales tax revenue be used to make up the gap.

So far, sales tax revenues have only begun to trickle in to the State Treasury. So the state's main checking account is still \$86,850,569 in the red. If good business conditions continue and income is up, it will still be more than a year before the deficit is erased.

## Cattle Rules.

New rules invoked by the Texas Animal Health Commission are designed to protect areas where brucellosis control programs are underway.

Under the new brucellosis control law, 78 counties, mainly in West and South Texas, have set up programs for testing herds. Purpose is to see if they have brucellosis, and to dispose of cows having the disease.

So the commission has notified truckers, livestock auctions and commission merchants that movements of cows into the certified control areas is restricted. They

must have been tested and found free of brucellosis before they can be moved from an uncontrolled county into a certified control area.

Then the new owners must have them quarantined. He must have them retested in 30 to 60 days before he can put them with his herd.

Restrictions do not apply to steers, sprayed heifers, calves under eight months of age, and calves under 30 months of age. They have been officially vaccinated against brucellosis.

## Loan Study

A committee of the Texas Legislative Council went to work with its staff to bring a study on loans and lenders up to date.

Acting Lieut. Gov. Bruce B. Babbitt, who is in charge of the committee, said the study is being conducted by the Legislative Council. He was author of the constitutional amendment which gave the Legislature power to allow interest rates to exceed 10 per cent.

Other members of the committee are Sen. Neville L. Smith of Navasota, Sen. Frank Smith of Lubbock, Rep. Joe G. Brown of Mexia and Rep. Watson of Mart.





For a number of years, Lee Cannaway of Hico has been training horses. There are others over the county who are doing the same thing.

Each trainer does most of the work outside in an open arena. And there are some fine training arenas in the county too.

The trainers are handicapped when weather turns bad and prevents them from doing their outside work. Lee has just about completed a large iron covered training barn which has an arena inside that is about 40 by 60 feet. Off to one side there are stalls for horses he is working on training. He also has other barns and stalls on his place. Lee still has a lot of work to do around his barn to make it ship shape but this is being done as rapidly as time will permit.

This summer Punch Oglesby, Lanham, made some additions to his place so he will be better equipped for horse training. James used a good layer of sand and constructed a new fence and chutes.

A. E. James, Olin, is doing some construction work around his place so he will be better equipped for horse training. James uses his facilities for working and training horses produced on the farm and doesn't take in outside horses for training as does Oglesby and Gannaway.

Army worms are at work in places over the county but not in numbers like they were last year. Cool wet weather is good for the worm and we could have some trouble. The army worm can be easily recognized by the inverted Y on its head. The stem of the Y points to the rear of the worm and the two prongs point toward the mouth parts. The Y is not readily seen on young worms either, but as they get older it becomes easier to see.

Army worms can be controlled by applying 1 quart of toxaphene per acre, to pasture land with

**BROKEN BOTTLES: "TRIPLE THREAT" ON OUR HIGHWAYS**  
A triple threat on the football field is fine, but a triple threat on the highway spells trouble. Broken bottles are the "triple threat" of our highways. They are accident hazards to traffic; they injure people who step on them; they start costly and dangerous roadside grass fires. The dangers of the triple threat increase during the football season. The Texas Highway Department asks Texas travelers to dispose of bottles in proper containers. Help keep the "triple threat" on the gridiron—not on the highway.

### Highway Dept. Continues Anti-Litter Campaign

Stop the "triple threat" this fall—not on the football field, but on the highway.

The broken bottle on Texas highways and roadsides is the dangerous "triple threat" of the highways, according to State Highway engineer D. C. Greer. This triple hazard grows worse during the football season, due to thoughtless acts by high-spirited travelers.

These are the triple threats of broken bottles:

They slash automobile tires, may cause a blowout and an accident. They injure people who step on them.

They start grass fires by means of the sun's concentrated rays.

Thrown carelessly from open car windows, bottles smash on the

pavement or on the roadside shoulders, posing a lethal hazard to highway traffic—especially on busy football weekends.

The safety rest areas along Texas highways (Roadside Parks) also come under the danger of triple threat. A traveler stopping in a rest area may learn of this threat the hard way when he, his wife, or their child steps on the broken glass.

Bottles are the cause of destructive grass fires. The sun's hot rays are concentrated by the glass to an intense heat that sparks fires along the roadsides, threatening property and jeopardizing the safe passage of highway traffic.

The cost of the triple threat in human lives and property damage is compounded by the cost of tax dollars needed to keep bottles cleaned from highways and roadsides, where they present not only a safety hazard but also an unsightly litter problem. To Texas Highway Department maintenance

crews, bottles are the worst offenders among highway litter. They must be picked up by hand since no machine can do the job and they pose an injury danger

to the men who pick them up. The Highway Department urges motorists to take advantage of the disposal facilities offered for public use at the more than 1,000

Roadside Parks in the state. Those bottles, don't throw them. This fall, please help keep the "triple threat" on the gridiron—not on the highway.



Community Public Service Company has again won first place in its group in the Public Utilities Division of the National Safety Council's annual fleet safety contest, it was announced at the National Safety Congress in Chicago on October 19.

This the seventh time Community has won such a first place award since the National Safety Council began its fleet award program 15 years ago, said O. L. Davis, CPS manager here. In addition, the power company has won two second place awards and one third-place award during the 15 year period.

Community's fleet, which is comprised of 277 vehicles, operated 4,013,000 miles during the 12-month contest period with only eight chargeable accidents. This is a rate of .19 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles. Average rate for the 37 utilities reporting in the group is 1.30.

Community Public Service carries on an intensive year-round safety educational program for employees, not only for vehicle operation but also in personal and line safety techniques. Responsible for this continuous safety program is the CPS safety department headed by Personnel and Safety Director W. J. Millican of Fort Worth. Safety director for this area is Jake Perry of Clifton.
