Farmers, Ranchers Urged To Attend Water Meet

Fourth of a series of educational meetings for farmers and ranchers residing in the Upper Bosque Watershed District will be held tonight, Friday, at 7 o'clock in the Hico School Auditorium.

The three previous meetings were held at Huckabay on Monday, Lingleville Tuesday night, and Stephenville on Thursday evening.

Purpose of the meetings is to discuss the development of the work plan on the Bosque project, review local people's responsibilities, and to obtain permission for members of the Planning Party to enter onto farms and ranches for the purpose of surveying.

Mr. L. J. Lann of the Soil Conservation Service has been assigned to the area as Party Chief, and he will be present at the Hico

meeting to answer questions, and explain any details of the program that might need explaining. Lann stated that work would begin on the project on December 4, with actual surveying to start on December 18.

Prior to the actual surveying permission must be granted by all landowners in the area for the party crew to enter their property.

The Bosque project, largest ever approved in the United States, is composed of 235,000 acres extending from the Huckabay-Lingleville area above Stephenville to a point approximately five miles below Hico. Preliminary planning calls for 40 or more structures to be built.

Odus Petsick, director of the district for the Hico area, has urged that all landowners and other interested persons be present at the Friday meeting. He also urged that landowners unable to attend the meeting and grant permission for the survey party to enter upon their land, to please sign one of the letters which have been sent to most landowners, or come by First National Bank and give this permission.

Time is short, and cooperation on the part of every landowner will be appreciated by the Watershed Association.

Carl King Selected as Top Supervisor in SCS District

Carl King of Hico, Chairman of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors, was selected as the outstanding supervisor for this district for 1961, according to Bill Manning, chairman of the banker group that made the selection.

Each year the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas, headed by Jack Garrett, presents various awards to district supervisors that have contributed most to their district during the year.

Mr. Manning stated that King was selected on the basis of seven points that include length of time as a district supervisor, promptness in attending board meetings, evidence of time and thought devoted to local district activities, extent to which he is recognized as a leader within his district, extent to which he has applied conservation on his land, and attendance at state and national conventions.

King will receive a Gold Certificate of Merit and will compete

on an area basis for a service tray of silver. The winner of the State Award will receive \$500 to be used on a trip for him and his wife to observe various methods of soil conservation farming and ranching in some part of the United States.

'Stormy' Westover Injects New Life Into Fur Business Here

One of the oldest industries in the world has come to new life in this area. The fur business is a good source of revenue and is expected to bring to this area several thousand dollars during the season which begins Friday, December 1.

Mrs. C. H. Westover, known by her friends as "Stormy", is associated with C. H. Holland, a fur buyer since 1919 who operates in the Burnet area.

They have set up headquarters on Highway 281 North near Edwards' Garage.

This section produces many fur-bearing animals, including racoon, opossum, civit, mink, fox and skunk. The most abundant varmints are the coon and opossum. Most of these are hunted with dogs and headlights which provides a popular local sport. Trapping is still a most reliable method of getting these varmints.

Besides the extra money obtained by getting these varmints you rid the community of the havoc they inflict on crops, as well as poultry.

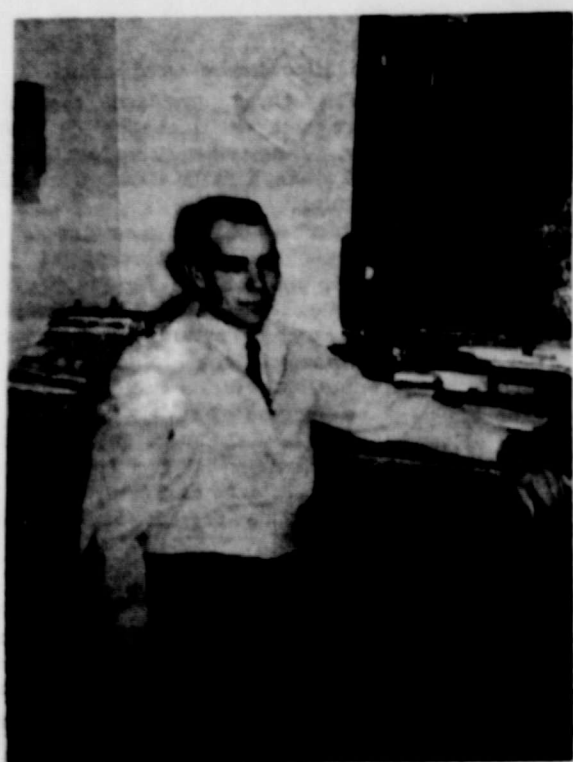

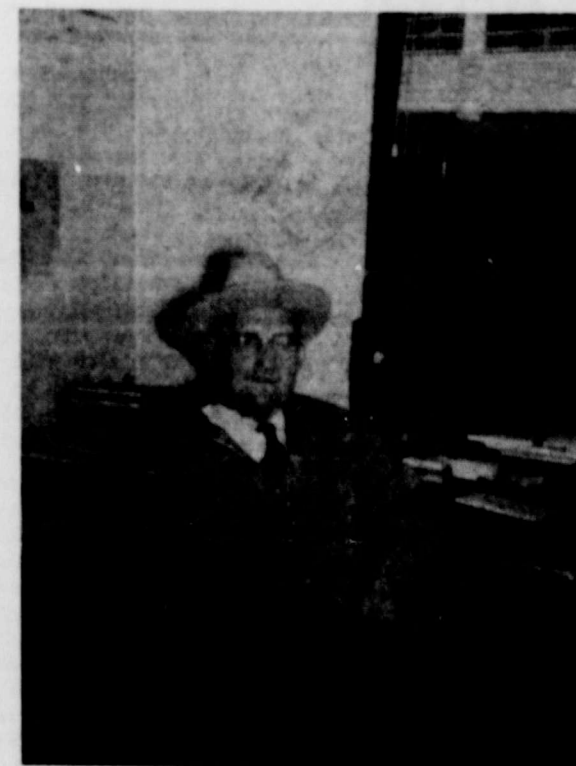

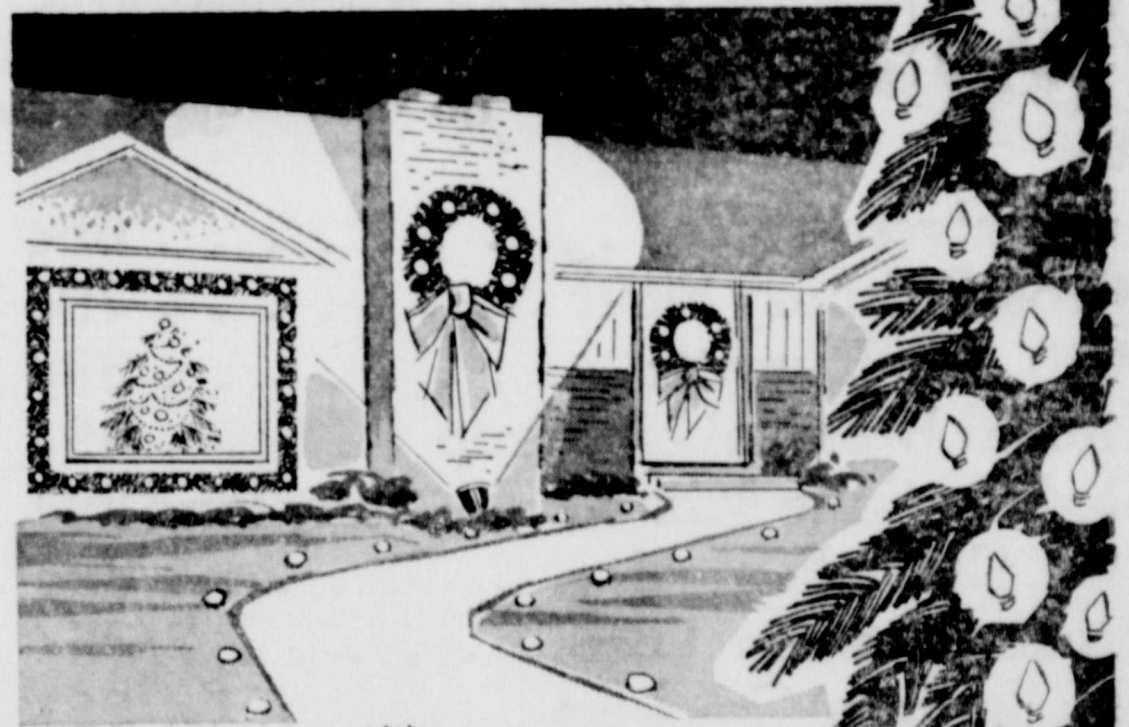
