## D. E. Bulloch Seeks Third Term As Hico Mayor

D. E. Bulloch, who has served as mayor of Hico for the past four years, this week announced his candidacy for a third term to the office.

With the announcement by Bulloch, only one city office remained without a candidate as mid-week. G. M. Bullard, who has served two terms as councilman, has not filed for re-election. Two aldermen whose terms expire this year, W. C. Howard and Jim Jameson, had previously announced for another term on the council.

Bulloch, who suffered a heart attack two months ago, was a doubtful candidate for re-election until this week when his physician gave him the go-ahead to seek the office for another term.

He was first elected to the City Council in April 1955, and served one and a half terms before resigning to become a candidate for mayor in 1958. He is a seven-year veteran of city politics.

Saturday, March 3 is the final filing date for city political aspirants.

## McNeil Issues Formal Statement on Behalf of Representative Race

Dan McNeil, 33 year old Mayor of Gatesville, this week formally announced his candidacy for the office of State Representative from the 53rd District, comprised of Coryell, Hamilton and Erath Counties.

McNeil has lived in Gatesville for the past 11 years. Along with his duties as Mayor, he also owns and operates Dairy Queen stores in Gatesville and Belton. He is a graduate of Waco State Home High School and Baylor University, where he was a member of Alpha Chi honorary scholastic society. He received a Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Baylor in 1960 majoring in economics and finance, and minor in education. He served in the Army in 1946-48; one year of which was spent in Japan as a paratrooper with the 11th Airborne Division. He is married and has three children.

McNeil is presently serving as President of the Kiwanis Club, and is also a member of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce and the First Presbyterian Church in Gatesville.

In announcing his candidacy this week McNeil released the following statement:

"I believe that every citizen should devote some time and attention to public and political affairs, and to aid to the extent he can in the operation of his government Texas, in the dynamic decade of the sixties, will move forward in direct relationship to the strength of its leaders and the spirit of public service and cooperation."

## Valley Mills Claw Tigers for Bi-District Play-Off Berth

Hico and Valley Mills, perennial powers of District 27B basketball squared off last week in a best two of three games to decide the district championship, and when the firing was over the Eagles emerged with the play-off berth by virtue of winning the first two games.

Both teams had advanced to the play-off by waltzing through regular district play with identical 7-1 records, each having defeated the other.

The Eagles defeated the locals three games out of four during district and post-season play. In a delayed affair Hico defeated Valley Mills 41-30 to cop the first half title, only to see the Eagles take the second half championship with a two-point 42-40 win at the Hico gym last Tuesday night.

In the first game of the play-offs the Eagles again popped the locals by two points, this time winning 55-53 on Thursday night at the Hico gym. What proved to be the last game of the year for the Tigers was played Friday night at Valley Mills, with the Eagles taking a 52-44 victory.

The Eagles found the only weak spot in the Tiger team when they threw up a stiff full-court press. Hico was never able to solve the defense which brought to an end a successful season.

For the year, Hico posted a 21-4 record, losing three of the games to Valley Mills. Their only other loss was to Carlton in the first game of the season.

Included among their victims were Dublin, SAA champions, Jonesboro, winners of their district, Hamilton, member of 8AA, and several other teams who have since copped district championships.

Three seniors bowed out for the locals, Mark McElroy, Harold Hathcock, and Robert Reed are the departing team members.

## Free Movies Set Saturday Afternoon, Feb. 24-March 3

Hico merchants, cooperating with the local theatre, have lined up two free movies, to be shown Saturday, February 24, and Saturday, March 3.

Special features have been purchased by the theatre management to be shown on those two dates, during the afternoon only.

Sponsored by Hico Civic Club, merchants who participated in the last trades day program are footing the bill for the free movies. Committee members stated this

week that the program is being carried out on a trial basis, with an eye toward making the free movie an every Saturday feature.

## Bosque County Judge, J. P. Word, Enters Race for Senate Post

## Operation Screwworm Control Underway With Fly Release

College Station, Feb. 21—Texas' multimillion dollar screwworm control program is underway. It was launched Wednesday morning, February 14 when sterile male screwworm flies were air-dropped over Hays County.

The release—first of its kind in the Southwest—was timed to coincide with a meeting of the Southwest Annual Health Research Foundation in Austin. More than 20 livestock producers and sportsmen from Texas and adjoining states attended the kick-off meeting.

The fly release climaxed the efforts of thousands of stockmen and sportsmen who have worked on the program for many weeks. C. G. Scruggs, president of the AHRF, said the program involves the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas A&M College and the research foundation. He reported that contributions by stockmen and sportsmen now totaled approximately \$1,400,000. An intensive drive will be continued, AHRF officials said, until the \$2 million goal is reached. Scientists, capitalizing on freeze out of overwintering screwworms in January, believe there is an opportunity for lowering—if not totally eradicating—screwworms from Texas this year.

The program will follow the pattern of the successful eradication effort in Florida and the southeast. Millions of artificially

raised male screwworm flies, made sterile by exposure to radioactive material, will be released in the overwintering area in South Texas and in a buffer zone along the southern border of the state. A giant screwworm producing plant will be constructed in South Texas with an expected capacity of 50.75 million flies per week. Facilities at Kerrville lab will eventually produce 20 million flies each week. Dr. S. Gartman, who has charge of the Kerrville fly facilities, will head operations at the new plant.

Release of sterile flies is only half the job. The remainder is up to the stockmen. If maggot infestation is found, stockmen are asked to remove 10 from the bottom of the wound and report to their county agent for a positive identification.

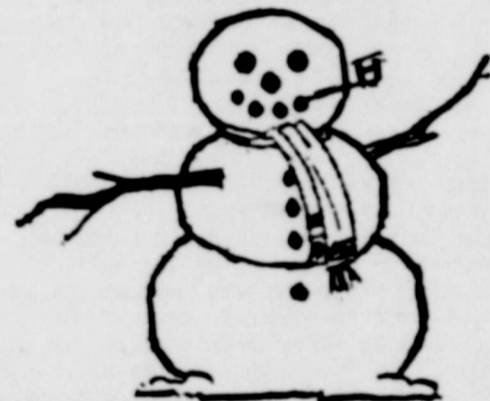

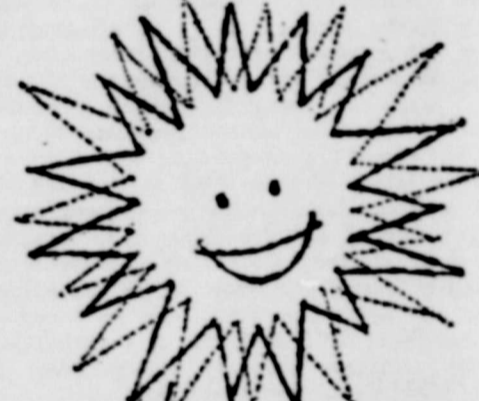

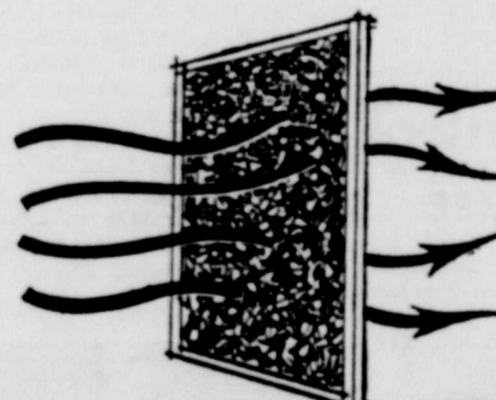

## IT'S THE LAW—

### No Will? Who Inherits Your Worldly Goods?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dis- pose of your property in accord- ance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detail- ed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law con- cerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather compli- cated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal prop- erty, for community property and for separate property, for home- stead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to de- termine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community prop- erty which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviv- ing children or descendants of de- ceased children, they would divide

one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is de- ceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the por- tion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where

there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

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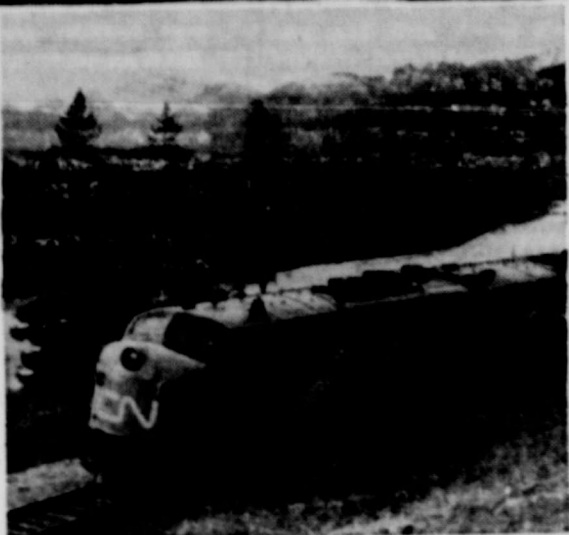

**Highlights and Sidelights**

**W. VERN SANFORD**

Sanford's long fight to get the state for escheat has ended at last.

So has argument over rural roads policy.

But the scrap over the question of what to do about regulating loans, interest rates and lenders is not yet settled. And it may not be for a long, long time.

The Legislature has settled the escheat and road policy questions. Also it has partially solved the advertising program for tourists, juvenile parole and repair of the San Jacinto Monument.

Money problems were eased when Comptroller Bob Calvert estimated that the escheat reporting law passed last year will yield at least \$300,000 during the next 20 months. He put no estimate on the bank reporting law just laid on Governor Daniel's desk for certain signature into law.

When the Legislature meets, growing Texas brings a pack of problems to Austin for it to solve.

High Plains irrigation farmers are quarreling with their gas company. They want its rates regulated. Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress and Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla tussled a bill through both houses to let the farmers appeal to the Railroad Commission, just as cities do, if the gas company increases its rates.

San Angelo and Edinburg got favorable reports from the Commission on Higher Education on making San Angelo College and Pan American College, now locally supported, part of the state system of colleges in 1963.

They came to Austin to get the Legislature to pass the necessary laws, and make the state take over support of the colleges. House of Representatives went along with both proposals.

But Sen. W. T. Moore of Bryan, down in A&M country, thinks Texas has enough state colleges already. So, he used the filibuster to fight the two new college bills to a standstill.

**Way to Roads Paved**  
State Highway Commissioner Herb Petry Jr. complimented the Legislature on passage of the farm to market road bill. He announced new projects as soon as Governor Daniel's signature was

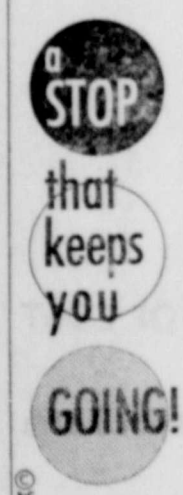

operation of its citizens. "Today Texas is standing on the threshold of unlimited and unparalleled growth in every phase of its economy. All over the state civic minded groups are promoting Texas to desirable industrial prospects. Also in many areas of our state, and particularly in our three-county district, our farm and ranch leaders are forming voluntary groups for the purpose of evaluating and improving our agricultural economy. Two examples of this are the Operation HIC—Blackland Improvement Growth Program—and the screwworm eradication program being carried out by the Southwest Animal Health Foundation. Both of these cooperative programs are being financed by private funds and not public funds.

"But the attitude and actions of the State Legislature will play a large part in the extent which Texas progresses and prospers, both agriculturally and industrially, in this decade. It is the responsibility of the Legislature to provide a desirable and attractive base from which both agriculture and industry can grow.

"In the field of education—the most important single service the state provides—Texas must face up to its responsibilities soon if it is to avert the encroachment of the federal government in this field. In our elementary and secondary school system positive action is imperative on the part of State Legislature. The only defense against federal control is strong, affirmative state and local government. Our State Legislature must provide the financial basis and the incentives necessary to our local school districts whereby they can continue to carry out their responsibilities to the people.

"And last but not least, the State Legislature must begin to economize and streamline the operation of the varied state agencies, because our industrial, agricultural and educational progress will be stymied and retarded if the ever-increasing tax burden is not halted and reversed. This can be done only if the State Legislature institutes drastic measures whereby expensive duplications of services provided by state, county and local governments are eliminated; and the archaic and outmoded phases of our governmental system on all levels are either discarded or streamlined for maximum efficiency and service to the people.

5. The Automobile Insurance Law badly needs revision. I will support any measures to correct the defects of the present law.

Our children have an opportunity to grow up in a different atmosphere from those of the city. In the country people may live far apart but feel close together.
