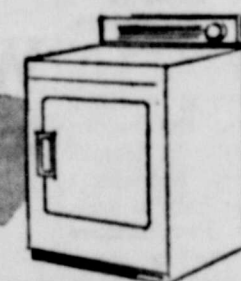

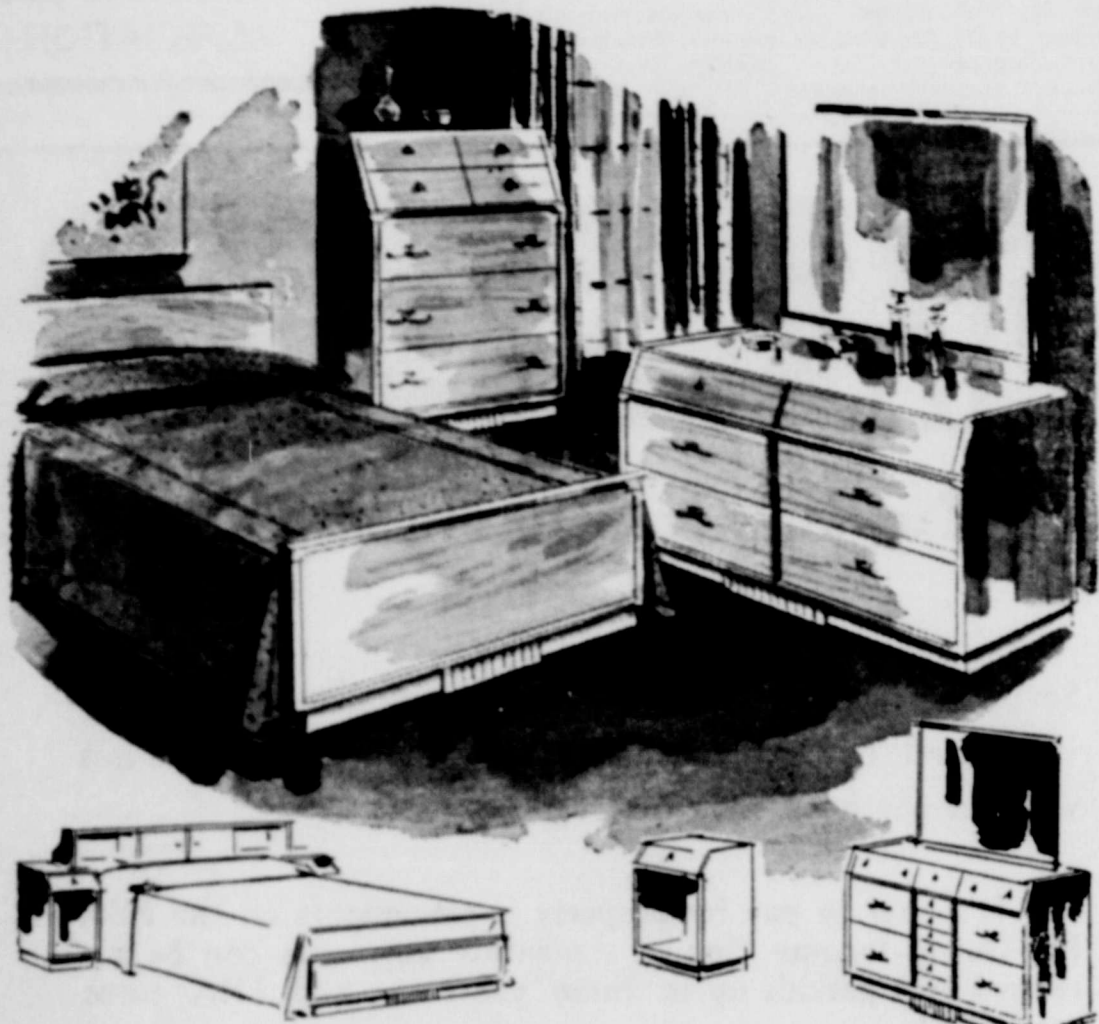

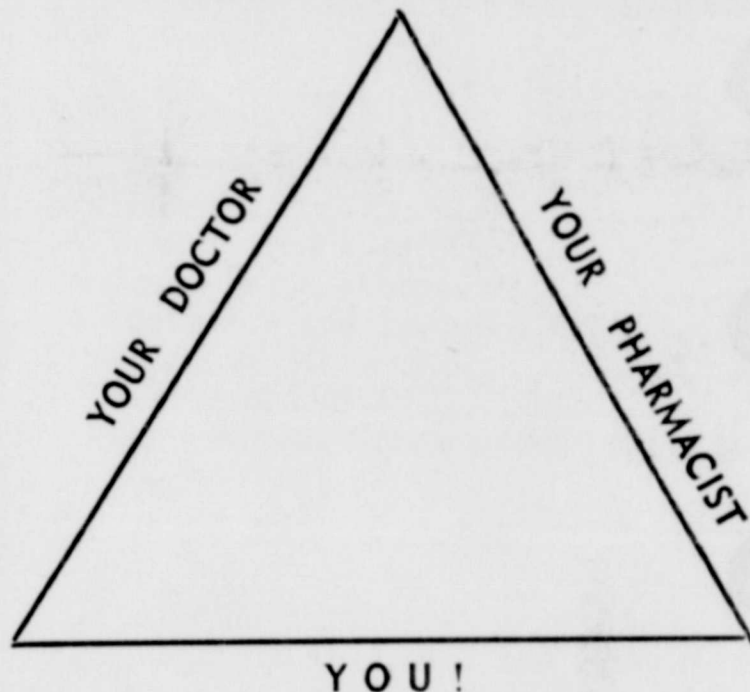

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Harold Jr. on the farm to market road between Perry and Crossville, Ga. are building a new home at their ranch. It is just about complete however they do not have all of the heating unit in just yet. Some heat openings are still not closed in the floor and some of the ventilators in the foundation are not closed or screened.

Well, this condition caused a little excitement the other day. Some that during the night one night last week a hot cat got into the house through these openings. Harold went into the house the next day and when the wind cut saw him things started happening. The cat got from room to room and finally saw a big picture window, jumped through it, breaking the pane to make its escape. Harold the Wolf Club would appreciate your membership. \$2.50 per month, and the club trapper will be glad to try to catch cats on your place.

Last week a few of the worms that caused so much tree defoliation last spring hatched out. One might be on the lookout for them from now on. Their first appearance will be small white in the forks of small branches of trees and shrubs. If practical one can break off these and destroy them. Or they can be killed by spraying with the 2:1 spray mixture used for cotton insects. Mix about two tablespoons to a gallon of water.

Now is a good time to apply fertilizer to the lawn. Fertilize with 14-20-8 getting two pounds of nitrogen to each 1000 square feet. Then through the summer fertilize with straight nitrate fertilizer at the rate of one pound of nitrate per each 1000 square feet and repeat every 20 to 40 days. When mowing try not to take more than an inch off each mowing, but less. Water only when grass needs it and that soak to a depth of 4 inches or more.

Around February 14, the first sterile flies were released along the Rio Grande at the screwworm control program. This means the program is a year or two ahead of original plans.

Too, that very few, if any, screwworm cases should show up this summer. There are certain measures each producer should take for individual assistance in the screwworm program. These are:

1. Inspect all livestock frequently. Pay particular attention to the heads of age-born animals, a few weeks after the screwworm.
2. Collect 25 maggots from every infested wound after treatment. Place in a container of alcohol or water and bring to my office. Leave your name and address if I'm not in.
3. Do not move animals from area unless all wounds are treated with recommended insecticide.
4. Do not move animals out of the county where screwworms have been reported until animals have been sprayed and all wounds treated.
5. Do not accept or move animals from other States where screwworms may exist, unless the cattle dealer, buyer, or hauler inspects and treats all animals at origin.
6. Remain alert to all informa-
