



Should you have happened to harvested your cotton last fall when it contained excess moisture, and if you are planning to plant your own seed, it might be advisable to run a germination test on it before planting. Research has shown that seed should not be saved from cotton which is harvested when moisture content is above 8-10 per cent. When moisture is above this level and the seed cotton is held for even a comparatively short time on the trailer, the cotton goes through a heating process which not only lowers the grade but also the quality of the seed.


