Intensive Search Yields Suspects

A 36-hour man hunt in the Hico area ended about Wednesday morning when two youths, one 15 and the other 16, were apprehended about three and a half miles south of Dublin.

The pair had been sought since Monday night after they were reported to have robbed J. C. Robison at a Conoco service station in Hico of \$84.

Texas Ranger J. P. Lynch of Mineral Wells, who was accompanied by H. G. Shaffer of Alexander, arrested the pair. Law enforcement units from Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Parker, and Comanche counties had participated in the all-day and night search.

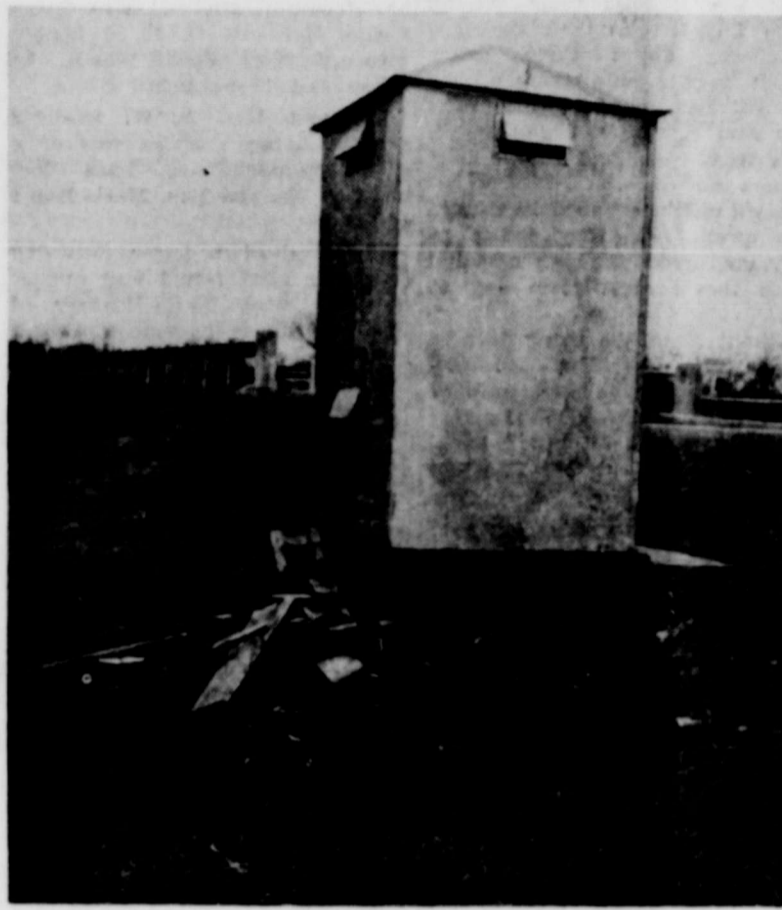
Texas Ranger George Roach of Stephenville named the two youths as William H. Stephenson, 16, and Tommy Gene James, 15, both of Houston.

The hunt began in this area after the pair had robbed Robison and fled to Dublin where they

abandoned a car stolen in Bryan earlier in the day, and stole another vehicle at Dublin. They started back toward Hico and wrecked their automobile near Greens Creek, west of Alexander. The first in the string of car thefts began at Houston.

Robison and his 11-year-old daughter, Robbye, were in the office at his station about 7:30 Monday night when the pair drove into the driveway. One of the boys entered the station and demanded the cash register contents at gun point. Robison said the other youth got out of the car, but did not accompany his companion inside the station. Neither he nor his daughter were harmed.

Roach stated Wednesday afternoon that charges of car theft had been filed against the pair in Erath County. Other robberies were being investigated in the Houston area in an attempt to link them with the pair.



WHAT IS IT?—A question commonly asked the past few days concerned the structure shown above at the north end of the Highway 281 bridge. Local Weather Observer W. R. Hampton explained this week that the structure, containing electronic instruments, was erected to measure the flow of the Bosque River and was erected by the U.S. Geological Survey. The instruments record the river flow and height, and Hampton also takes daily water samples to determine sedimentation content.

Vandals Hit Hico Tuesday

Vandals struck at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Lackey late Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning, stealing and destroying an undetermined amount of property.

Several Hico Future Farmers exhibited projects at the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce Junior Livestock Show in Hamilton Tuesday.

Those winning honors included Harry Brown, Champion Dairy Heifer and Showmanship winner in the dairy division, and Edwin Black placed third in the competition.

Butch Knudson showed the first place breeding beef cow and the second place feeder calf. Bill Rutledge showed the second place breeding beef heifer, and Charles Erick showed the second and third place pen of laying hens.

James Randalls showed the third place Junior Rambouillet Ram. James and Jerry Johnson showed the Champion Rambouillet Ewe and the first place Junior Ram.

James Crews showed the third place Junior Rambouillet ewe and also won Showmanship on Sheep. The Johnson brothers won numerous other awards with their lambs and with their Suffolk winning its class. They also showed the first and second place Junior Billie and third place Junior Nannie.

Scott Patterson showed the second and fifth place Junior Nannies.

Others exhibiting at the Hamilton Show were Ronnie Partain, Reecie Giesecke and Tommy Douley with swine entries.

The boys brought home about \$100 in prize money from the show, according to advisor Harold Walker, who supervised them at the show.

Judging Will Begin At 9:30 Friday Morning

Kite-Flying Season Brings Warning From Local CPS Manager

Many a young heart was right there in the capsule with Astronaut John Glenn when he circled the earth recently, but for a while yet, the aerial exploits of most youngsters will be confined to kite flying, and even that pastime is a lot more complicated than it used to be. Time was when a young kite-pilot did not have much to worry about except tree wind and the proper amount of tail for ballast.

Nowadays, however, this traditional sport is beset by many hazards such as electric power lines, television antennas and busy highways; and many youngsters do not realize the dangers in this innocent pastime if safety rules are not observed. This reminder comes from O. L. Davis, local manager for Community Public Service Co. in an appeal for caution directed to children and parents alike.

"The most important rule," Mr. Davis declared, "is to never fly kites where there is a possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other "don'ts" include: don't use metallic cord or wire for kite string, don't use metal in frame of kite, don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a kite snagged in electric wires and don't fly a kite over television antennas.

To help impress children that safety is all-important in kite-flying, CPS has provided safety rule posters for school bulletin boards.

Beef Cattle Field Day Set March 29 At McGregor

Beef Cattle Field Day at the McGregor Experiment Station will be March 29, according to H. O. Hill, Superintendent.

The program will begin at 10 a.m. with a bus tour to inspect cattle and research facilities. These tours will take about 30 minutes and can be made any time until noon.

Dutch treat barbecue will be at noon.

Ed McKay, McLennan County Agent, will be in charge of the afternoon program. Dr. A. M. Sorenson, Texas A&M, will explain how cattle reproduce and give tips to improve calf crops. Walter Kruse, of the Experiment Station, will give ideas on ways of improving weaning weights and their importance. Dr. O. D. Butler or Douglas Wythe, Texas A&M, will demonstrate with live animal how to select and judge meat type steers.

Hereford, Angus, Brahman and Charbray bulls bred by the Experiment Station will be for sale at private treaty. These animals are all gain performance and fertility tested. No bull will be offered for sale that did not gain 26 pounds per day on test or be above average of their breed.

Bulls can be seen at any time, but no animal will be sold until March 29 on a first come—first serve basis.

Accident Report for Stephenville Area Given by Sgt. Eggen

Stephenville, March 22.—Sgt. A. A. Eggen Jr., Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville Area, released accident summary for Comanche, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties for the month of February.

The Highway Patrol in this area investigated 31 rural traffic crashes during the month of February. One of these crashes was fatal, killing 1 person; 11 resulted in personal injury, injuring 13 people; the remaining 19 caused property damage only. The estimated combined property damage amounted to \$10,472.00.

During the first two months of 1962 the Stephenville area reported 92 rural traffic crashes, one of these fatal killing 1 person; 30 resulted in personal injury, injuring 37 people; the remaining 61 caused property damage only. Estimated combined property damage amounted to \$45,459.00.

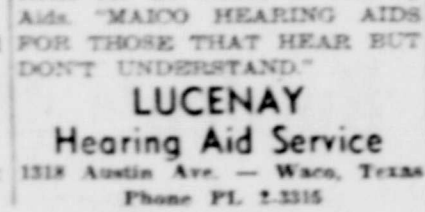

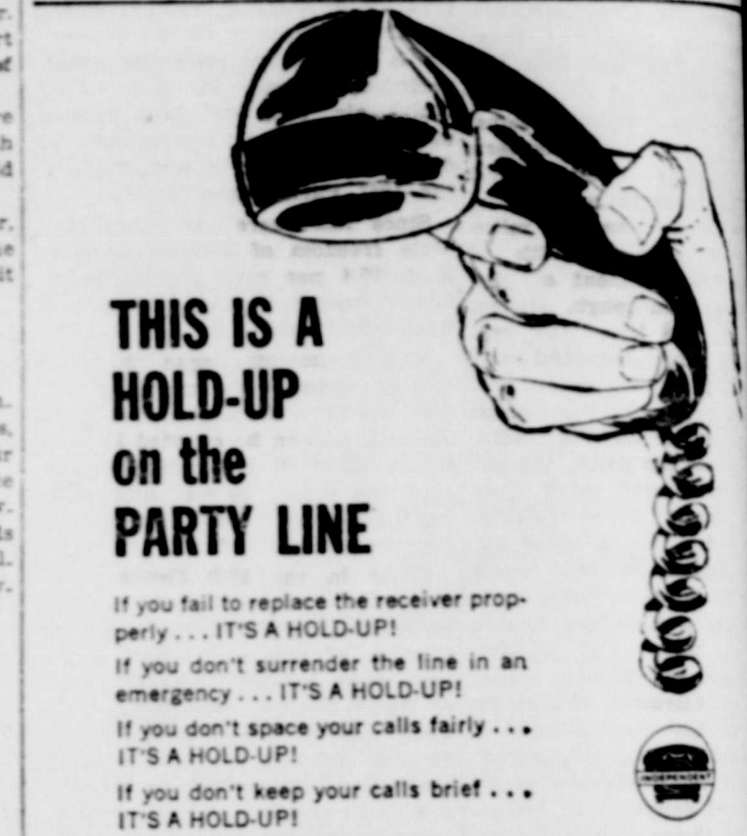

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Individual premises on which screwworms are found will not be quarantined, advises Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission in Austin.

State and Federal animal health authorities must have reports on all suspected screwworm infestations to conduct the eradication program properly. Livestock owners who make such reports will get the earliest and most thorough relief, Dr. Garrett said.

A screwworm transport patrol line has been established by the Commission across Texas from Del Rio generally east to Columbus and south through El Campo and Bay City to the Gulf of Mexico. This action was taken to contain known infestations in the southern

part of the State, where their presence has been confirmed, and to prevent their transportation by truck or rail to the free area north and east of the patrol line.

Dr. Garrett requests that all animal handlers be especially watchful for animal wounds. He suggests that where possible, such wounds be treated immediately with remedies and fly repellents so they will not become infested. If screwworms are found, will you please report it to me as soon as you can so I can take a sample for you and send them in for identification. I have a special mailing tube for this and I'll appreciate it if you will advise me of any cases of worms you might have.

Topics for discussion in this year's clinic have been selected on the basis of interest and concern to commercial egg producers. Several speakers, including three from out of state will discuss a wide range of subjects.

Thursday March 29 is the date of the annual Beef Cattle Field Day at the Experiment Station in McGregor.

A first for the annual Swine Short Course to be held at A&M April 2-3 is expected to be a highlight of the meeting. The event will be an all-breeds production tested sale. It is scheduled for 4 p.m. on April 2. The offerings will consist of litter mates or pigs sired both gilts and boars, by the boars siring the pigs tested at A&M under the Carcass Contest of self-fed hogs.

Preliminary results from the contest indicate wide variation among the pigs from which breeders will have an opportunity to select from. The daily rate of gain has varied from a high of 2.57 pounds per day to a low of 1.3 pounds; that dressing percentage on the animals slaughtered has ranged from 75 per cent down to 67 per cent; that amount of backfat has varied from a low of .98 inch to a high of 2.18 inches; that carcass length has ranged from 27.9 inches to 31.6 inches; that loin-eye area has varied from 2.51 square inches to 4.66; that the percent of lean cuts to carcass weight has ranged from 43 to 57 percent and percent of lean cuts to live weight from 35 to 41 percent.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Capital newspapermen quizzed candidates for lieutenant governor at a Sigma Delta Chi dinner and found wide variety in the answers.
At a prior meeting the professional journalism society had quizzed the gubernatorial candidates.
Big news of the session was the unanimous opposition to legalizing pari-mutuel betting on horse races. Texas voters will have an opportunity to express their own views on this subject at the May 5th primaries.
Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio got this issue listed on

both the Democratic and Republican primary ballots by presenting both political party headquarters with petitions signed by more than 200,000 persons. Petition asked the legislature to give the people an opportunity to vote on pari-mutuel betting.
Further questions to the candidates at the newsmen's dinner revealed diverse opinions on repeal of the poll tax as a pre-requisite for voting. Four favored repeal; two opposed it. Senator Preston Smith and Bill Hayes were the opponents.
Candidates present at the meeting were Senators Preston Smith,

Jarrard Secrest, Crawford Martin, and Robert Baker, all democrats, and Bill Hayes and Kellis Dibrell, republicans. Speaker James A. Turman, the seventh candidate was absent.
Former Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey moderated the discussion. He closed the session with a comment that most people underestimate the importance of the job of Lieutenant Governor. Because all state policy is made by the Legislature, the lieutenant governor is of prime importance. He presides over the Senate, names the Senate committees, and decides which committees will handle bills. Thus he has almost absolute control over the course of legislation—which is state policymaking.
Poll Lists High
It seems like there's a record number of candidates running for state and national office this year. There also appears to be a record number of potential voters.
A recent count showed 2,373,857 Texans paid poll taxes or filed for exemptions this year. That's 218,212 more eligible voters than last year.
With 15 county totals still due at the State Comptroller's office, including some big cities, the list may exceed the record-setting 2,594,254 who paid to go to the polls in the 1960 presidential election.
All poll-tax payers who show up at the May 5 primaries will answer the big question: Do they want to keep the poll tax as a voting requirement?
Their answers on primary tickets of both parties should be a representative decision on the long-battled subject.
Water Work Divided.
After 10 years Vice President Lyndon Johnson finally got an answer as to who will do what toward implementing the \$4,000,000,000 plan to provide for Texas water and soil conservation, flood control, navigation, water supply and irrigation projects.
Federal agencies now have agreed that the Army Corps of Engineers and the US Bureau of Reclamation each will take on about \$1,000,000,000 worth of dam and conveyance construction; local and state agencies will assume one billion dollars worth of work; and the US Soil Conservation Service will handle \$200 million worth of small dam and soil conservation work.
Balance of the project is navigation, irrigation, recreation, and local flood protection.
Agreement still needs approval at the Washington level, but for the first time in its history, Texas has a water plan and water agencies and engineers have come to an understanding on Texas' future water needs.
The Texas Water Commission endorsed the work division agreement.
Rehabilitation Center Holds On.
Gov. Price Daniel reports that directors of the Texas Rehabilitation Center at Gonzales have rescinded their order to close the center. They will keep it open at least until May 5, to wait the outcome of a campaign to raise \$100,000 through private donations.
Governor Daniel called for public support of the drive, and said he will recommend action by the Legislature to continue the services the center offers to victims of crippling accidents and diseases.
Fifty-four patients now are under treatment at Gonzales Warm Springs. If operating funds were available the foundation could care for 120 patients.

IT'S THE LAW—

Income Tax Exemptions And Deductions Explained

You are entitled to a \$600 deduction on your income tax return for each exemption. If you are in an income bracket where you will have to pay a tax, this will result in a minimum reduction of your tax of \$120.

The basic exemptions are those for the taxpayer and his spouse. You are entitled to one exemption each, plus an additional exemption of \$600 for each of you who reaches the age of 65 during the taxable year or who is blind.

In addition to exemptions for you and your spouse, you may claim a \$600 exemption for relatives who receive less than \$600 gross income during a taxable year and who receive more than one-half of their support from you. Non-relatives also can constitute dependents which will entitle you to a dependency deduction where they satisfy the same rules, and when they live in your home.

Your child, if under 19 or a student, can be a dependent for which you will be entitled to an exemption, whether or not he or she earns in excess of \$600 gross income, where you provide more than one-half of the actual cost of supporting the child. Amounts received by the student child as a scholarship are not counted.

The standard or optional deduction is available to you if you do not desire to itemize your personal deductions authorized by law such as real estate taxes, charitable contributions and medical expenses.

These personal deductions are deductions from a figure called Adjusted Gross Income. Adjusted gross income is gross income less exclusion, such as the sick pay exclusion, and deductions for business expenses and related items such as expenses incurred in connection with property which you hold for the production of rents or royalties.

The standard deduction is 10 percent of this adjusted gross income figure up to a maximum deduction of \$1000. It is a substitute method allowed as a measure of presumed personal deductions and is given to you whether or not you keep records of deductible expenses or actually have these expenses.

The determination of whether or not you should use the standard deduction should be made by comparing the net tax which you will pay under both methods of filing your return. The final method

amount of personal deductions you have incurred and your ability to sustain the burden of proving the accuracy of your itemized deductions.

A general rule of thumb would indicate that you will pay less tax by itemizing your deductions where you own your own home and pay substantial real estate taxes and mortgage interest. However there can definitely be other situations where the itemization method will benefit you taxwise.

7. Checked the spread of disease in cattle by requiring Veterinarians to report diseases, and by regulating the sale and delivery of diseased cattle.
