Leaverton's Corner

"THE ALTERED BUDGET"

We discuss further our opponent's budget. At the outset, let me say that technical matters like budgets, transfers, etc. are primarily the business of the County Judge. He is the lawyer for the County. The Commissioners are not usually informed on such matters and necessarily go along with the County Judge, their lawyer, just as you would follow the advice of your lawyer or doctor. It would be wrong and unfair to censure the Commissioners for miscues in this field. For practical purposes the Commissioners assume chief responsibility for the Road and Bridge Fund and have outside duties while the County Judge assumes responsibility for the General Fund and the office duties. We are not complaining of the Commissioners and their Road and Bridge Fund. In it they have something to show. The saving we have in the bank is almost wholly from the road money, although roads have not received all the money to which they are legally entitled. Our trouble is with the General Fund and the office management. This is not a personal matter. I repeat that I believe my opponent to be an upright Christian gentleman. I also think that the people should know the official record. If we throw a blanket over the Courthouse how are we to know what is good or bad, efficient or inefficient? Democracy is based on an informed citizenry. The 1962 budget, prepared in 1961 by the County Judge, shows a tax levy for General Fund (which is used for general county purposes) of 25 cents, the maximum allowed by law; shows the amount of taxes from the levy for the Jury Fund will be \$3,161.53; shows the cash balance in the Jury Fund January 1, 1962 will be \$2,801.13; and shows the total to be spent from the Jury Fund in 1962 will be \$1,671.00. The budget shows an intention to transfer in 1962, \$1,500 from the Jury Fund to the General Fund! Although there is in the Jury Fund more money than will be used in 1962 from that Jury Fund, yet you are taxed \$3,161.53 for the Jury Fund with the avowed intention to transfer \$1,500 from the Jury Fund to

the General Fund that already carries the maximum levy permitted by law for that fund. The Constitution and the Statutes both prohibit ANY transfer from the Jury Fund, and the law also prohibits the collection of any tax for a specific fund when the money is not needed for that fund. I assure you, if you honor me by election, I will recommend the collection from you ONLY THE MONEY NEEDED, and, further, I will use the taxes you pay for the very purpose for which they are collected—and no other purpose. Our Court of Civil Appeals said in Earnest v. Standefor, 54 SW (2nd), 228: "The rule is that where the Constitutional limit of 25 cents has been levied for general county purposes, the Court cannot in addition thereto levy more than is actually needed for jury purposes, especially when the intention is to transfer the surplus from the jury fund to the general fund of the county." During the time my opponent has served you as County Judge, he has transferred out of the Jury Fund approximately \$30,000.00, much of it to his favored General Fund, yet he continues to collect taxes for the Jury Fund. We quote from our Supreme Court in the case of Carrol v. Williams, 202 SW, 504: "Section 9 of article 8 of our state Constitution, supra, prohibits any and all transfers of tax money from one to another of the several classes of funds therein authorized and, as a sequence, the expenditure for one purpose therein defined, of tax money raised ostensibly for another such purpose." By necessary implication said provisions of section 9 of article 8 were designed not merely to limit the tax rate for certain therein designated purposes but to require that any and all money raised by taxation for such purpose shall be applied, faithfully, to that particular purpose, as needed therefor, and not to any other purpose or use whatsoever." That's the way the Supreme Court sees it. Shall we have a government of law or of man? How do you see it?
