

Dear Friend(s),
My opposition has put out a last-minute unsigned letter. "They say" they do no mud-slinging, yet they want to know why Leaverton leaves a job that pays more than the office of County Judge. I have had two terms; that is enough. The legislative race is every two years and over three counties making the expense six times that of County Judge, plus caretaker's expense on the farm. My wife is not well and should be at home, not at Austin.
I have said a lot about records I give signed facts verified by the record. Here are some more:
Representatives' salaries were voted by the people of Texas and placed in the Constitution. About the first act of my opponent when he took office in 1947 was to raise his salary 25 percent. (See Volume 12, Page 189, Commissioners' Court Minutes.) About his first act in 1962 was to fix the maximum of County fee officers at \$6,750. (See Volume 12, Page 698, Commissioners' Court Minutes and Art. 5883 V.C. S.L.) You didn't vote on either. Is that why he has cut out the appropriation for the poor?
In this unsigned letter, Leaverton is blamed for the State and National deficits. He, alone, plunged the United States into bank-

ruptcy. The truth is that Leaverton was a conservative voter in all things but schools, and the Comptroller certifies Texas' deficit will be gone at the close of this biennial.
No full county program can be offered until we know what money we have. It took two auditors weeks to find where we stood on one item. I guarantee rigid economy, but I'll recommend more than to draw my salary.
The Treasurer's last Quarterly Report shows the County Judge spent from his General Fund last quarter \$11,266.99 and has three more quarters left and only \$13,760.60. General Fund taxes are all in. His budget shows the county owes \$45,275 in Warrants issued by him. Of these, \$28,825 were issued in 1969 on which nothing has been paid.
Many feel keenly on the County Hospital. They should. My opposition, knowing this, has deliberately put out a baseless falsehood that I will, if elected, take over the Hamilton Hospital for the county.
Not one person has even suggested such a take-over to me. I am not for a County Hospital and never have been, and I will actively oppose such if it arises during my administration.
I know you will condemn last-minute, unsigned falsehoods by your vote for H. A. Leaverton for County Judge.

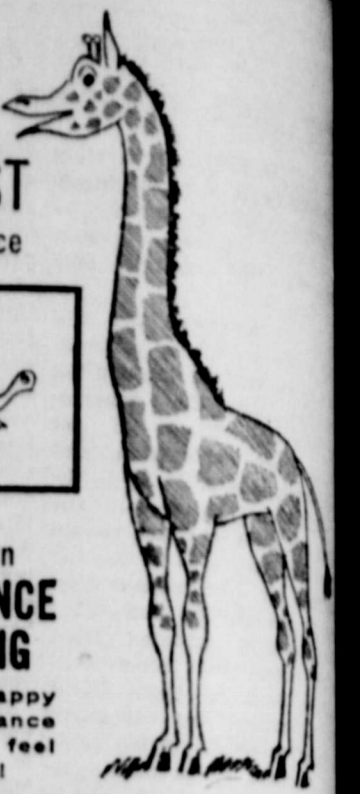

The Case Against Race Track Gambling

Texans on May 5 will vote their opinion "for" or "against" legalized gambling. The primary ballots of both parties will carry the question. We who are against legalized gambling urge every thoughtful man and woman to vote "against."

Not one valid argument can be advanced on gambling's behalf. The total experience of mankind argues eloquently against it.

Is gambling economically justified?

Virgil W. Peterson, director of the Chicago Crime Commission, testifies "Gambling drains the salaries, savings and investments of a community into a business enterprise that serves no human need. Those who benefit from gambling profits are almost without exception members of the underworld who invariably control the gambling business."

Gambling is the biggest single cause of such crimes as embezzlement and invariably brings in its wake a mounting stack of unpaid bills, skipped installment payments, repossessed automobiles and furniture, and lapsed insurance policies.

Since some people gamble anyway, shouldn't we make it legal in order to police it?

The Chairman of the United States Senate Investigating Committee says no. "No plan for legalized gambling that was presented to us seemed to carry any guarantee of success."

Isn't race track gambling a good source of tax revenue?

Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin says, "The idea that legalized gambling will be a revenue-raiser is an illusion. Every dollar raised from such sources means five dollars spent in higher police costs, higher court costs, higher penitentiary costs and higher relief costs."

But after all, isn't pari-mutuel gambling pretty harmless? So a guy loses two dollars.

This is the same, tired, fallacious combination of words mouthed by every gambling profiteer from Al Capone to Benny Binion.



The sad fact of gambling can be told in the words of Damon Runyon, "horse players die broke. A two-dollar bet is murder. Gambling . . . two dollars . . . ten dollars . . . a hundred to recoup . . . is a case of broken marriages, neglected children, poverty and sometimes suicide.

Ask a bank examiner. Ask a divorce court judge. Ask a probation officer. Ask your retail credit association. Ask the relief people. The easy money boys will give you the answer.

Small wonder that the three D's of gambling have been described as Debt, Degradation and Death.

You won't succumb to the fever, nor will we. Frankly we don't want our kids to be exposed to the characters as Hot Horse Herbie, Harry the Horse Bookie Bob and John the Boss.

We don't want our kids to grow up around a race track.

Do you?

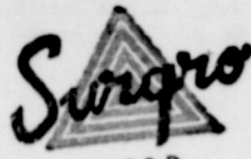

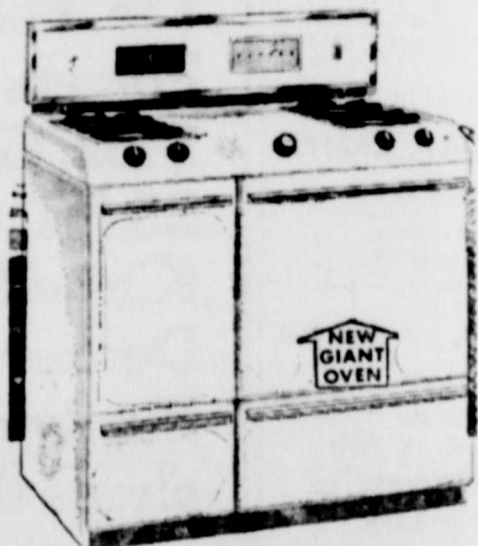
