23-Year Navy Vet Logs Commendable Career

(ED NOTE: The following feature of interest to local people was written by the above named especially for the News Review. Chief Hefner is a local man, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Hefner Sr.)

When they celebrated the first annual Navy Day on Omeler W. W. Hefner, Jr.'s second birthday Oct. 27, 1922, it proved to be a prophetic omen.

October 12, Chief Yeoman Hefner, USN, Submarine Service, will have completed 23 years Naval Service.

Chief Hefner has had a variety of duty in a variety of locations—remarkable even in a service known for both. However, the influence of time and foreign service have not erased his Texas drawl and easy smile.

Chief Hefner's easy going nature is misleading. It gives no indication of a Navyman whose service has included four submarine war patrols in the Pacific work in intelligence offices, eight different ship assignments, Naval Attache service and more. That he has served well is attested to by a list of commendations and campaign ribbons.

Chief Hefner is presently assigned to the staff of the Commander, Submarine Squadron Five, home based aboard the submarine tender USS Nereus (AS-17) at San Diego, Calif. The squadron also includes a submarine rescue ship and 16 submarines. The submarines run the gamut from types like Chief Hefner spent his war patrols in the nuclear powered Scamp and Sculpin. The new subs represent a lot of improvement over the

ships in which Chief Hefner first went to sea.

His first ship was the USS Lexington (SV-2). It was the first carrier built from the keel up for the job. It was preceded only by the USS Langley, a converted collier.

His first submarine duty was on the "R" class submarines. It was a class of small submarines with 32 man crews, two engines with a direct drive, top speed of 10.12 knots and was tested for depths to 250 feet. There were no hydraulic systems and only four torpedo tubes—all forward.

Those subs earned the name "pig boats" for themselves and, though coming into disuse now, the name stuck through World War II.

By contrast, the USS Scamp and the USS Sculpin are powered by the most modern power plants known—atomic fueled and steam driven. Carrying 85 man crews, they are the Cadillacs of the fleet with hydraulic systems that make the torpedo man handling a thing of the past. Ingenious designing has made the most space usage and new materials have reduced the difficulty of cleanup work. Air conditioning and atmosphere control have been added, not only for the comfort of the crew but for their general health protection during long periods of submergence. Operating capabilities of the newest subs are classified but known to be greatly improved. Their movements have been described as "flying underwater."

While witnessing those progressions in the Navy's "hard-ware" Chief Hefner has witnessed a full score of exciting duty. He was a Yeoman Third Class

in the submarine R-7 going from New London, Conn., to Bermuda when the Japanese struck Pearl Harbor.

Later he spent four war patrols in two subs, the USS Pilotfish (SS 386) and USS Picuda. While aboard the Picuda, he was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation. The Picuda was a mem-

ber of one of the "silent services" most famous wolf packs, "Laughlin's Loopers." The Commanding Officer of BARE, another member of the pack, was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Hefner made Chief Yeoman in December, 1944 while aboard the Picuda. He remembers the sub

as his "outstanding war assignment."

Chief Hefner met his wife following the war while assigned to the Senior U. S. Naval Liaison Officer in Italy. The billet was in the four power Naval commission set up to dispose of Italy under the peace treaty of World War II. He married Michela Ricci January 17, 1948 and received a telegram of congratulations from the late Pope Pius XII.

Since Chief Hefner has taken part in the UN action in Korea and has continued to add commendations to his personnel record—not all of them from the Navy.

He earned the Army Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant when he was on the staff of General Mark Clark's intelligence unit in Tokyo, Japan from February 1953 to February 1955. Another time, he received a letter of commendation from the New York City Police Commissioner Stephen Kennedy. He was assigned to the Personnel Security Section, Third Naval District Headquarters and assisted the New York City Police in locating a suspect with some "long shot" slouching.

While commendations aren't new to Chief Hefner, his latest tribute indicates how he has put together a record that is beginning to assume the bulge of a Dallas telephone directory.

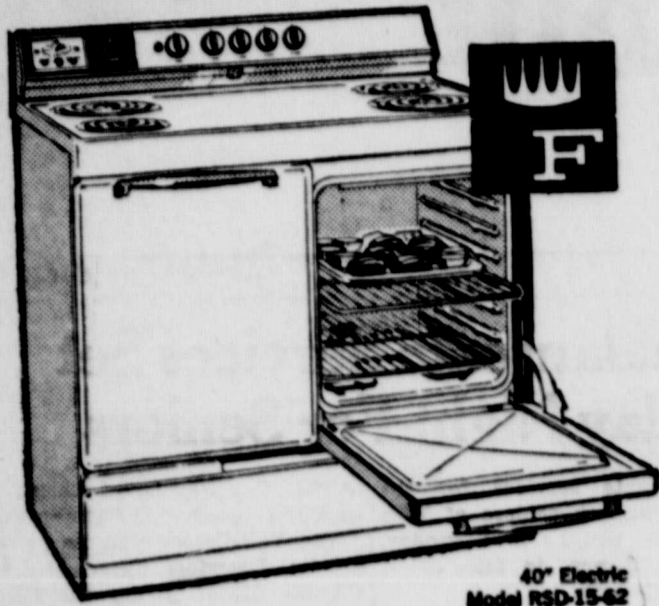
It reads in part: "Your clerical ability combined with your untiring efforts were of tremendous assistance to me and to the staff as a whole. The manner in which you managed the squadron office and conducted yourself left nothing to be desired."

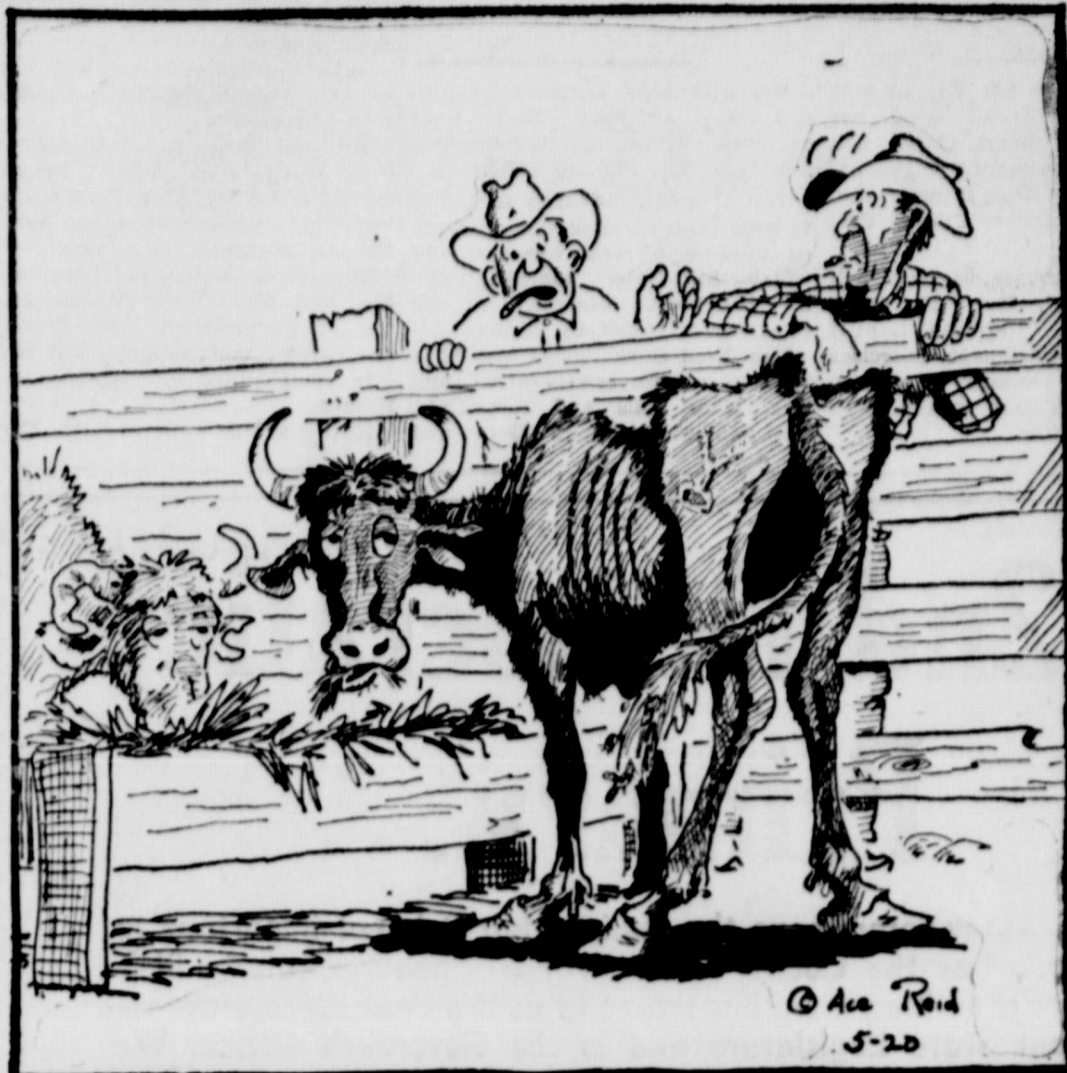
