\$71,080 Paid Monthly in Social Security Benefits

Old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits are becoming increasingly important as a community resource, according to Durrelle L. Allen, district manager of the Temple office of the Social Security Administration.

\$71,080.00 is paid monthly in social security benefits in Hamilton County. This is an increase of about 16 percent over last year's figures. While the benefits are intended primarily for the beneficiaries' economic security, they help business in the community generally. Most of the money is spent immediately for food, clothing and other necessities.

Deferred Grazing One of Most Attractive SCS Programs

By A. L. MILES
One of the most attractive cost sharing practices offered by the Agriculture Conservation Program is deferred grazing. No doubt the most essential thing required for profitable livestock production is plentiful supplies of forage. It is entirely feasible to purchase high protein concentrates for supplemental winter feeding, but not so with forage.

Hay requirements for wintering mature beef cattle range from 16 to 25 pounds per day, depending on the size of the animal fed. Whether you raise the hay or buy it on the open market the cost of the average will be about \$25 per ton. Based on these figures, feeding hay over a 120-day period will cost from \$25 to \$30 per animal unit. This would be in addition to the cost of concentrates of about \$8 to \$9 per animal unit. Simple addition indicates a total cost of \$33 to \$39 per animal unit, \$3,300 to \$3,900 to winter 100 head on over-grazed ranges. It is obvious this cost can be reduced to \$800 to \$900 if cost of forage can be eliminated.

This expensive hay cost can be largely eliminated, or least materially reduced by the simple practice of deferred grazing on a portion of your rangeland. There are several advantages to be gained by deferred grazing. Some of them are (1) reasonable assurance of good winter grazing, (2) increased vigor of range grasses and other desirable plants, (3) seed source for better stands of forage on your range, (4) definite increase in carrying capacity of ranges, (5) and you get paid for resting your pastures. Rates of pay for deferred grazing under the Agriculture Conservation Program vary with the length of time livestock are kept off ranges. Consult your ASC office in Hamilton or Gatesville for details. And remember—you are not losing the use of your grass when you defer grazing. The growth put on while livestock are off the range will still be there when winter comes. More than likely the need for grass will be greater in the winter than in spring and summer. The saving in the probable cost of hay for wintering livestock added to the ACP payments available makes deferred grazing doubly attractive. Soil Conservation Technicians recommend practice, and the Board of Supervisors urge farmers and ranchers to participate in this phase of conservation.

LOCAL SAILOR PARTICIPATES IN EXERCISE QUICK KICK

Camp LeJeune, N.C.—Raymond D. Britton, interior communications electrician third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Britton of Hico is serving aboard the guided missile heavy cruiser USS Boston, a unit taking part in Exercise Quick Kick, a joint training operation held May 7-10 at Camp LeJeune.

More than 40,000 men, 370 aircraft and 70 ships of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps took part in the exercise, scheduled by the U.S. Atlantic Command.

The exercise featured a full scale amphibious assault on Onslow Beach at Camp LeJeune, backed up by airborne troops and close air support from offshore. It was the year's major joint test of the Atlantic Command's conventional warfare capabilities.
