Contract Let; Work Begun on Newest School Addition

Contract was let last Thursday for the newest addition to school facilities, when the local authorized work started on Agriculture Shop and shop area.

Work began last Friday on dismantling the old structure to make way for the new building. The \$206,000 building will contain classrooms, storage, and shop area.

Board let the contract after six months planning. The work was started when the State Education Committee, on their part, recommended that steps be taken to provide classrooms with adequate classrooms with adequate shop area in the agriculture department.

Bids were accepted on the part with Boyd McClure being on the labor contract. Simpson and Leslie Patterson submitted other labor bids. The masonry construction building will cost approximately \$19,000.

Hang up paint-soiled clothing so air can circulate around it. Never clean with highly flammable fluids such as gasoline or benzine. The vapors from these fluids form an explosive mixture with air that can be ignited by a tiny flame or spark—even static electricity or a pilot light.

When graduation exercises were concluded last Thursday evening at San Jacinto High School the most important business of the evening was still ahead for one teacher.

Mrs. Mary Stegatt drove to Meyerland and at 5023 Grape delivered a final diploma to smiling 19 year old DeValca White, propped up in a hospital bed with a much autographed cast on her leg.

It was a very special moment for DeValca and her mother. DeValca had planned it.

Polio Victim

Confined to a wheel chair since she was stricken by polio at the

age of three she'd dreamed of the night when she would be able to receive her diploma along with the rest of her classmates.

But then on prom night DeValca slipped while getting out of a car and fell—breaking a leg.

But sing no sad songs for DeValca. While the broken leg which meant that she couldn't participate in graduation exercises was a bitter blow, it wasn't one that DeValca couldn't handle.

She greets visitors and friends with that same sunny smile—her hoard of graduation presents proudly displayed in her bedroom.

She's waiting now for that leg to knit and excitedly looking forward to the prospect of a job as a telephone switchboard operator and receptionist.

She wants to work awhile but thinks she may someday like to go on to college with an eye toward eventually doing hospital social work.

During her high school years DeValca has been much more ac-

tive than many students with two sturdy legs.

She has been on the Student Council, in the Girls Booster Club and this year was elected from her home room to be in the spring court.

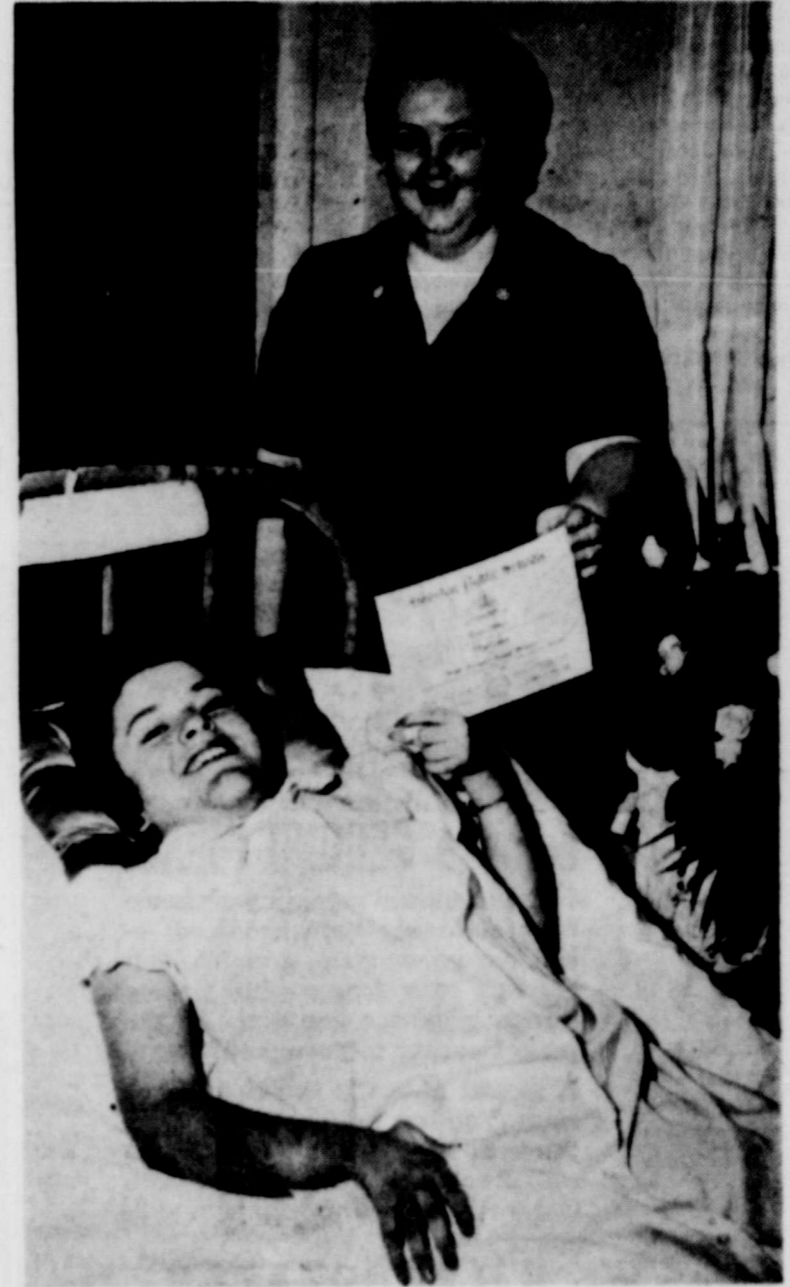
She has served as president of her home room and vice-president of the Cheer Club—a group of handicapped young people who don't dwell on their own problems but do what they can to help other less fortunate people. She has worked on the school newspaper and has been one of San Jacinto's representatives in the city-wide Junior Red Cross.

Volunteer Worker

She has been a volunteer worker with the Harris County Easter Seal Society and has joined in on many of their outings including deep sea fishing trips, day camps and overnight camps. Her Mom, Mrs. W. J. White is a member of the board of the society.

DeValca has also been active in the Meyerland Teen Club and has served on its board. And this busy young lady also has time for church work. She is a member of the orthopedic Sunday School Class at South Main Baptist Church and even helps out with teaching responsibilities. She's also active in the YWA's mission study group for young girls.

Sgt. Eggen Releases Highway Figures For May Period

Stephenville, June 12—Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville Area released Comanche, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties' rural accident summary for the month of May.

The Highway Patrol in the Area investigated a total of 48 rural crashes during the month of May. As a result of these 48 rural traffic crashes one person was killed and 33 injured, and a combined property damage amounting to \$21,086.00.

For the first five months of 1962, the Stephenville Area traffic records show a total of 219 rural traffic crashes resulting in death to 6 people, injury to 103 and a combined property damage amounting to \$119,665.00.

For the same period in 1961, the area reported a total of 205 rural traffic crashes, resulting in death to 5 people, injury to 110, and a combined property damage amounting to \$116,626.00.

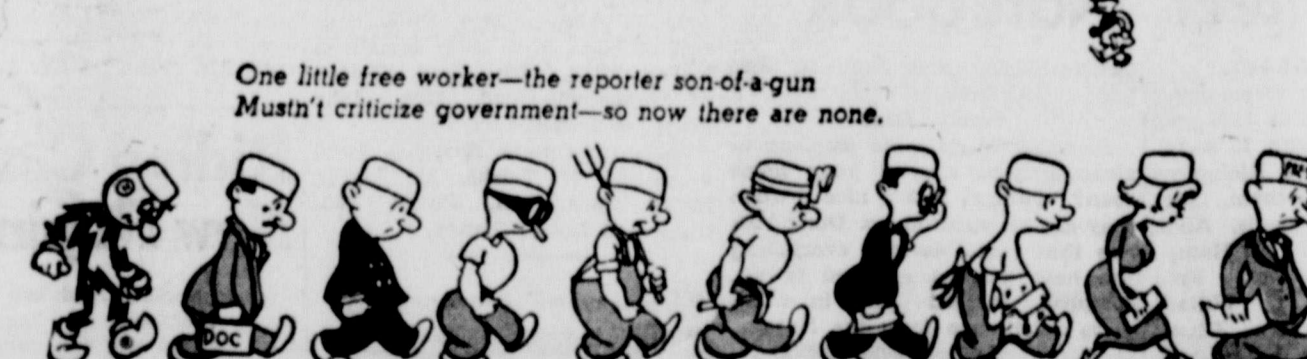

IT'S THE LAW—

10 Simple Rules to Follow In Case of Auto Accident

Vacation time is here. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.
2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid; (2) Stop bleeding; (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both; (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.
3. Protect the scene from further damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.
4. Call an officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.
5. Gather information, write it down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.
6. Be careful what you say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual.
7. See your doctor if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.
8. Consult your lawyer immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from the witnesses while their memories are fresh, and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interviews or statements to investigators or adjusters for the other side.
9. Inform your insurance company promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.

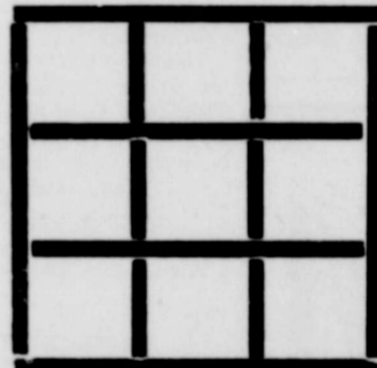

For the first time since 1872, Texas Republicans are presenting a strong threat to capture state-wide and legislative offices from the Democrats.

Following his nomination for the Governorship on the Democratic ticket, John Connally took immediate steps to meet the challenge with a united front.

Connally invited all Democratic nominees for state and legislative office to a barbecue to be held June 16 at his family ranch near Floresville. Purpose: to make some campaign medicine.

Saturday's outing will launch the campaign for the November 6 general election.

Jack Cox of Breckenridge, the Republican nominee for governor, is backed by a slate of 20 nominees for the 23 seats in Congress; 15 candidates for the 31 state senate seats, and 86 candidates for the 150 house seats.

Also there are candidates for county and precinct offices in many counties.

Lined up with Connally will be Waggoner Carr of Lubbock for attorney general, opposed by T. Everton Kennerly of Houston; Preston Smith of Lubbock for lieutenant governor, opposed by O. W. (Bill) Hayes of Temple; Jerry Sadler of Palestine for land commissioner, opposed by Albert Fay of Houston; John C. White of Wichita Falls for agriculture commissioner, opposed by Harry Hubbard of Marfa; Ben Ramsey of San Augustine for railroad commissioner, opposed by Bernoid M. Hanson of Midland; Jesse James of Austin for State Treasurer, opposed by Allen Lacy of Abilene; and Robert S. Calvert of Sweetwater for comptroller, opposed by Mrs. Hargrove Smith of Houston. Republicans are not contesting judicial seats.

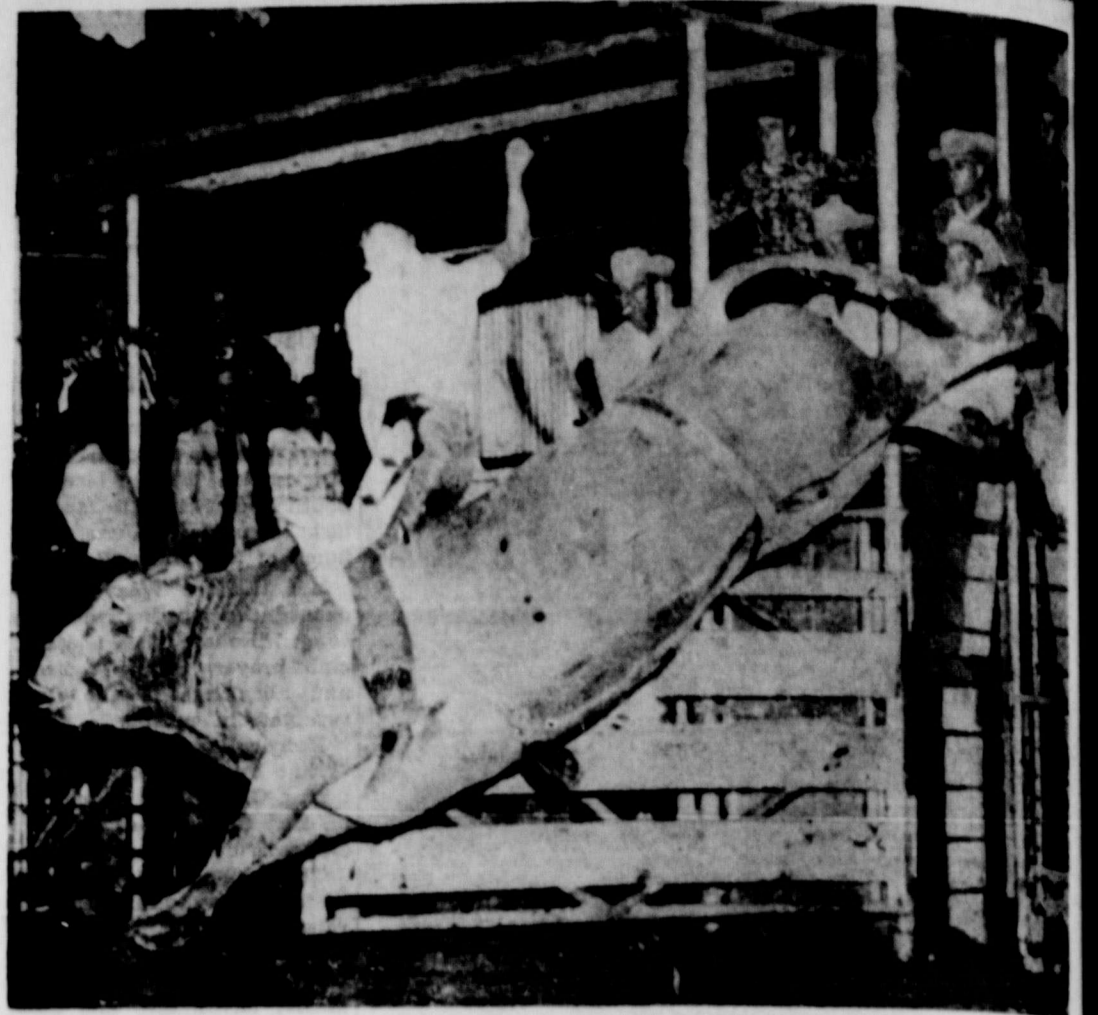
The Constitution Party also has fielded a slate of candidates for state office, all but one of them from Houston.

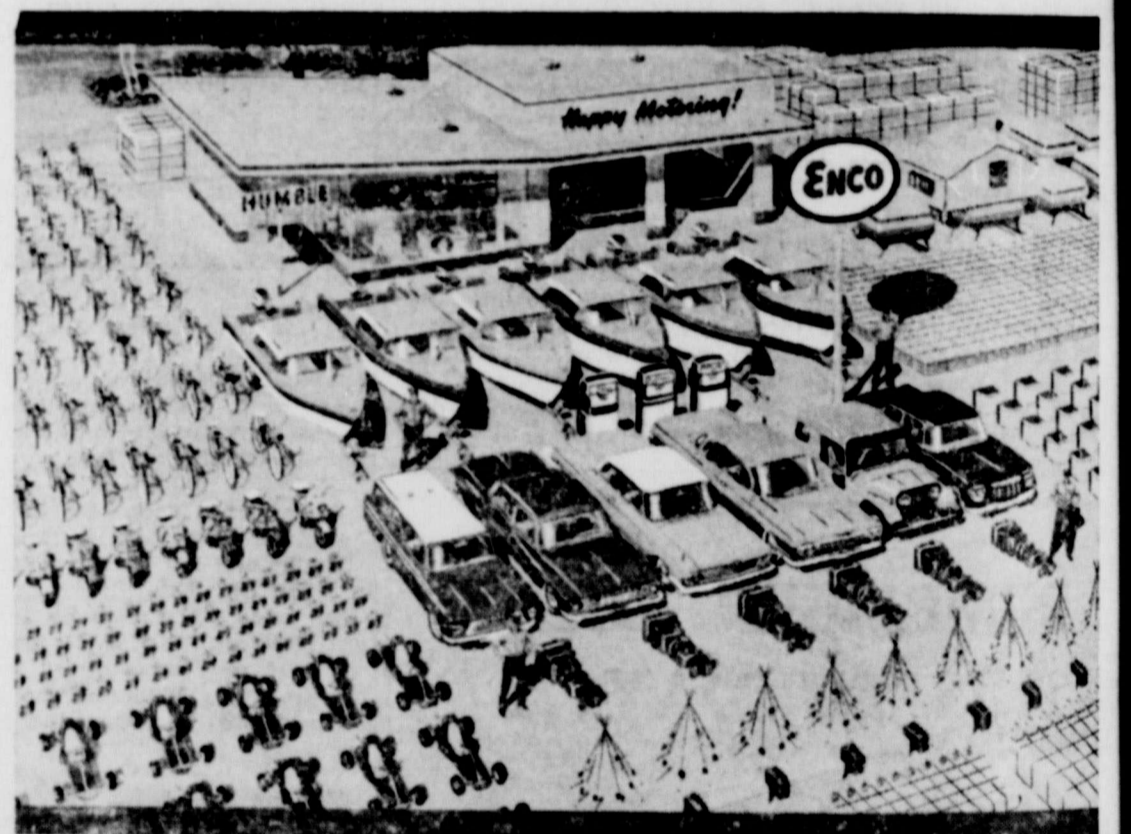

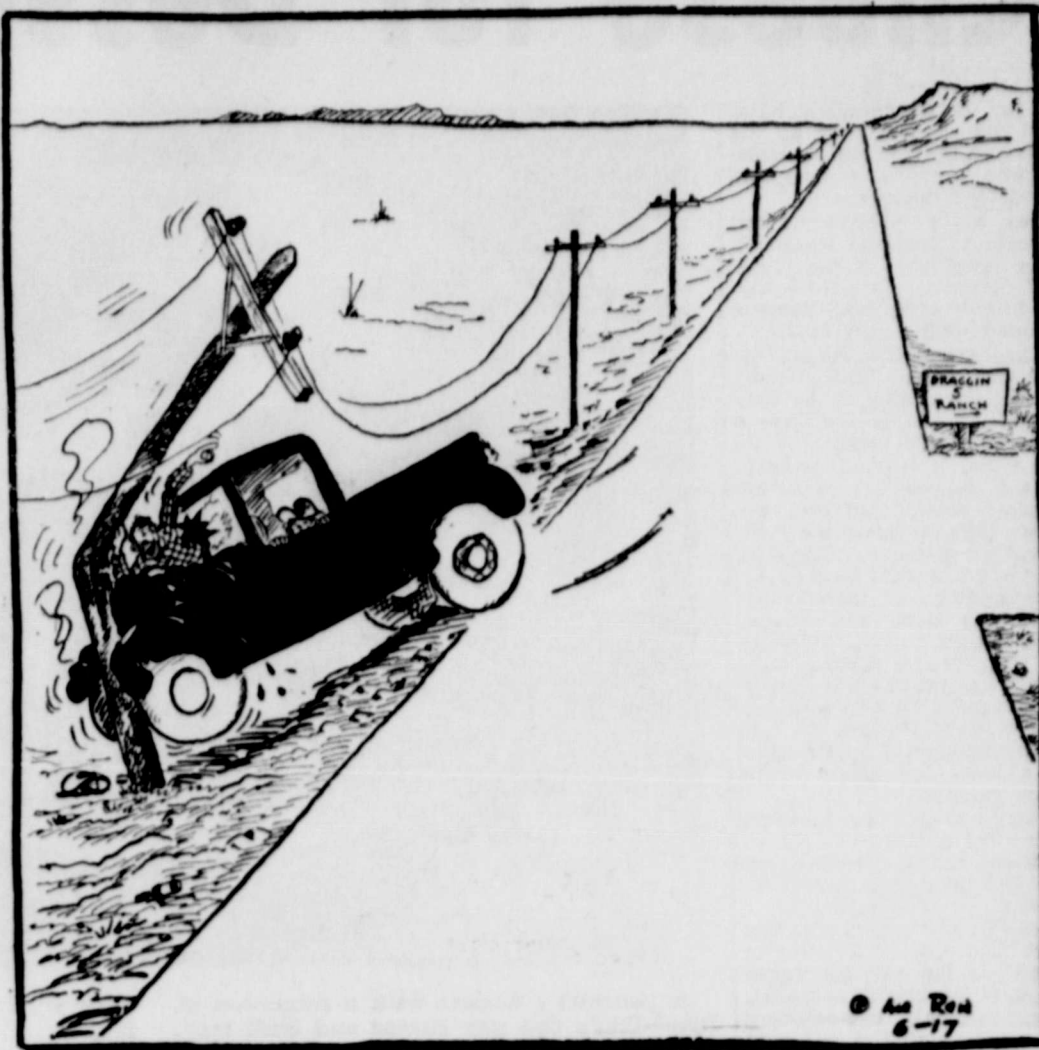

It has many advantages but good taste is first and foremost. By serving several choice varieties of cheese, each person can enjoy his favorite and become acquainted with a new type.

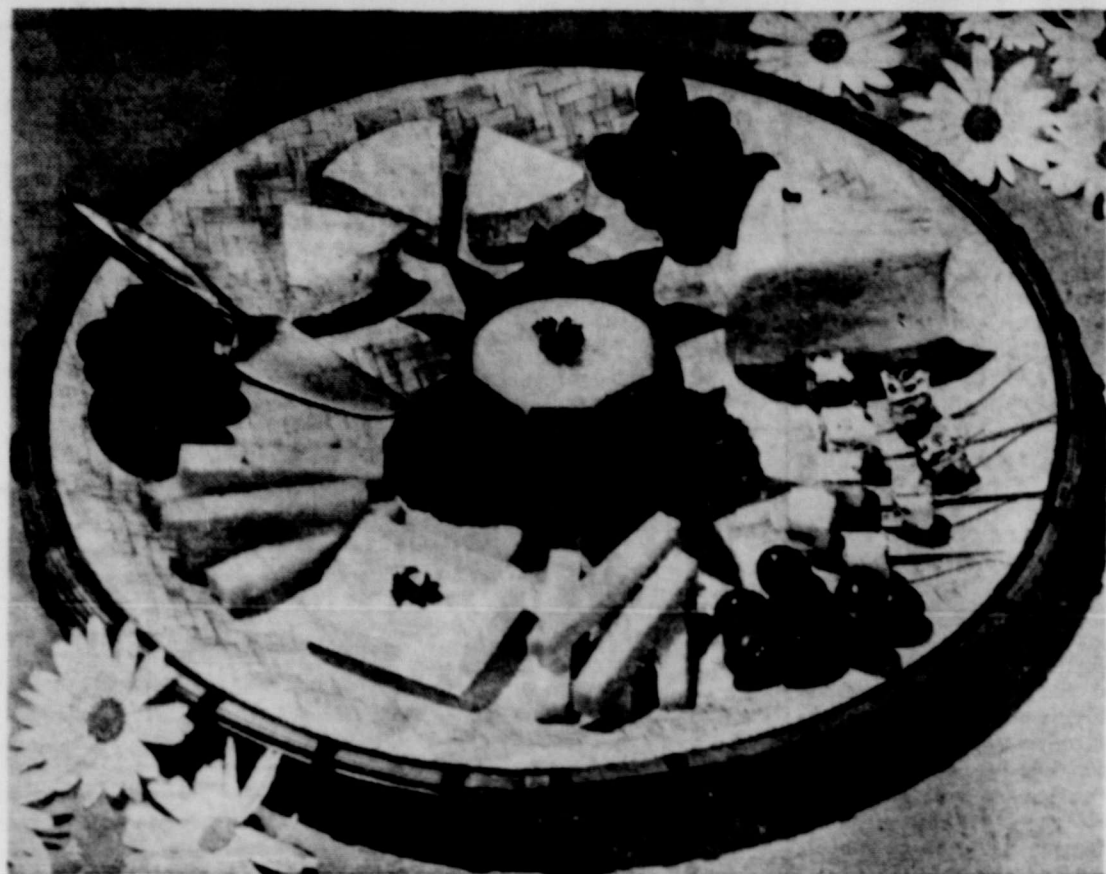
Fresh, juicy fruit is the perfect cheese companion. Chill it thoroughly before adding to the tray and quick as a wink you have a most refreshing dessert.

Such a tray is easy on the cook. Bring the cheeses out of the refrigerator about a half hour before serving. Standing at room temperature enhances their delicate flavor and makes them easier to spread. But, cut the cheeses into desired sizes and shapes while still cold, as cheese slices better than. Place cheeses on a serving tray and cover well with aluminum foil or other wrap until serving time. Then, add the cold fruits and garnishes. Bright green leaves of most any variety can be used for garnish.

Serving couldn't be simpler. All you need are dessert plates, knives for spreading, and assorted crispy crackers as "go-with." Add some jelly if you please.

You don't have to be a gourmet to appreciate cheeses. Starting in the center is the colorful Edam cheese with its bright red coat. For an unusual, eye-catching touch, cut through the red coat from the center to the sides, as you would cut a pie. Pull back each pie-shaped piece for petal effect.

At the upper left of the tray are wedges of Camembert, long a popular dessert cheese. Camembert has a waxy, creamy texture, soft on the inside with whitish outer crust. This crust can be eaten too. Apples, tart plums, or pears are all delightful with Camembert.



A gourmet's dessert with a minimum of fuss—that's this gay cheese and fruit tray. It is cool to prepare, refreshing to eat. And with such a variety, everyone will find a favorite. For best flavor, bring cheeses from refrigerator one half hour before serving.

The large wedge is Port du Salut, which also is used chiefly for dessert. A soft, creamy cheese with a thin rind, it has an aroma similar to Limburger but is more mild in taste. To make nibbling a little easier, cut Blue cheese into cubes and insert a toothpick into each. This is one of the easiest of all cheeses to recognize, for its whiteness is pierced with decided blue-green

veins running through. Its sharp, salty flavor has long made it a favorite in salad dressings. But be different and serve blue cheese with chilled, fresh pears. American or Cheddar cheese is the number one choice of Americans. To make an interesting arrangement this cheese is sliced into long fingers. In any form, it is a square slice, tastes just

as good. Its flavor varies from mild to sharp, depending on the length of aging. The cream cheese has been garnished by making diagonal lines across the top with a fork, and decorating with a colorful sprig of parsley. Its creamy, delicately flavored goodness blends beautifully with any fruit. Spread orange sections or ripe strawberries with soft cream cheese.

Highlights and Sidelights

Speakership

One of the more important offices in state government is the speakership of the house. Unlike the Senate, however, the people have no voice in the selection. The speaker is elected by the 150 members of the House. Rep. Byron Tunnell of Tyler laid out the names of 95 Democratic nominees who have pledged to support him, and called on his opponents for the speakership to withdraw.

Rep. C. W. Pearce Jr. of Temple did. Another opponent, Rep. Ben Glasing of Kingsville, was defeated in the runoff primary, so he no longer is eligible. Rep. Aleno Jamison of Denton remained in the race. He had claimed 81 pledges.

In The Red Again

Heavy payments of state aid to the schools in May pulled the state's main checking account—the general revenue fund—into the red again.

When May started, the deficit was \$73,934,636. But heavy collections of corporation and insurance taxes wiped out the deficit, which has been present for nearly four years. This put the fund into the black by the middle of the month.

But when the school payments came due it pulled the fund \$9,391,468 into the red at the end of May. Early June expenditures made the deficit \$28,915,980. It will go back into the black when sales tax payments reach the treasury in July.

Crooked Holes

State investigators from the Railroad Commission report that of the first eight oil wells in the

East Texas Field tested seven were "deviated" beyond the three percent allowed by commission rules.

The work is slow, so it may be months, or even years, before the extent of the crooked hole drilling program in that giant field is known.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has filed one civil lawsuit, contending that a group of operators drilled four wells on a slant so the bottoms of the holes were on someone else's property, and that they plugged two more wells with cement before they could be tested.

Civil suits are being filed by oil companies against owners of nearby leases, contending that crooked holes have drained away oil which belonged to them. So far, eight such suits have been filed.

If court-type evidence is found by the commission's engineers and Texas Rangers, evidence will be turned over to U.S. Dist. Atty. Wayne Justice for possible prosecution under the federal law—usually called the Connally hot oil act—which makes it a federal offense to move oil in interstate commerce after it has been produced in violation of state laws or regulations of the Railroad Commission.

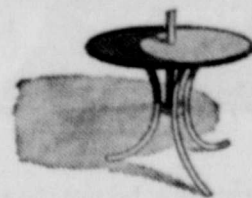
