July 2nd Deadline For New Wheat Farm Applications

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" allotment for 1963 on a farm which does not now have an allotment should get in touch with the ASCS county office as soon as possible, according to Ed Bulman, chairman.

Such farmers have until July 2 to file applications for such an allotment. Because the usual program deadline of July 1 falls on Sunday this year the deadline was extended to the end of business on Monday, July 2.

Under the wheat allotment marketing program a new farm is one on which there is no wheat acreage, including acreage considered as wheat under the Conservation Reserve or the Great Plains program for any of the years 1960, 1961, or 1962.

The Chairman emphasized that formal application for a new farm application must be made in writing on a form provided for that purpose, and the applications must be filed at the ASCS office by the July 2 deadline.

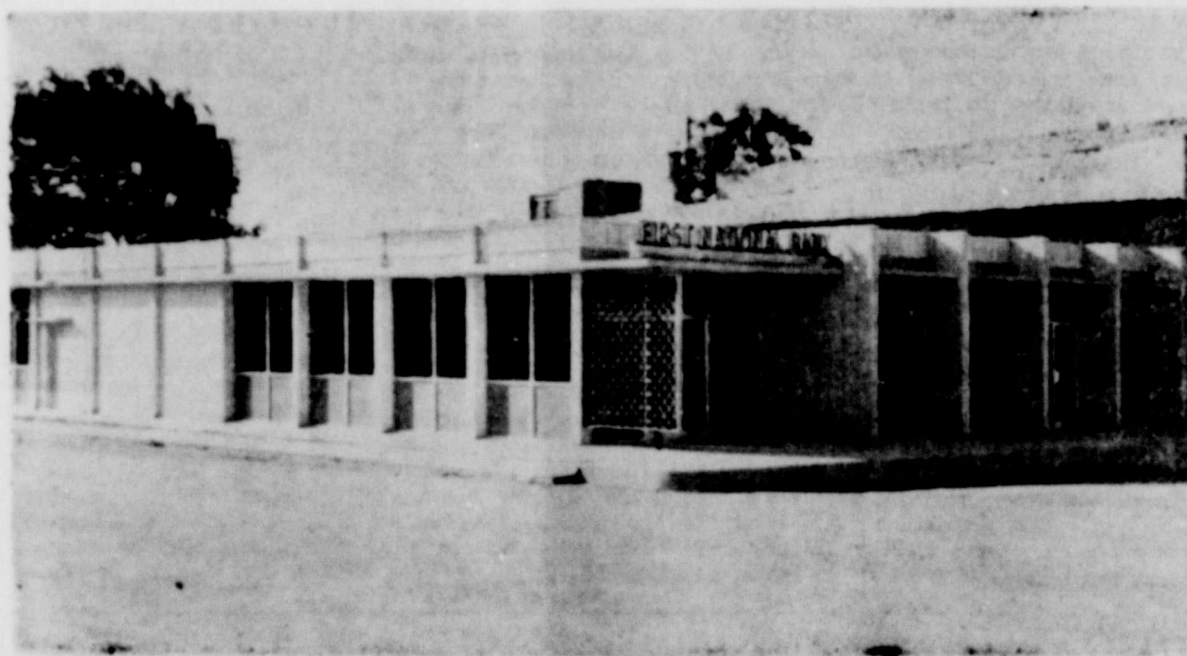

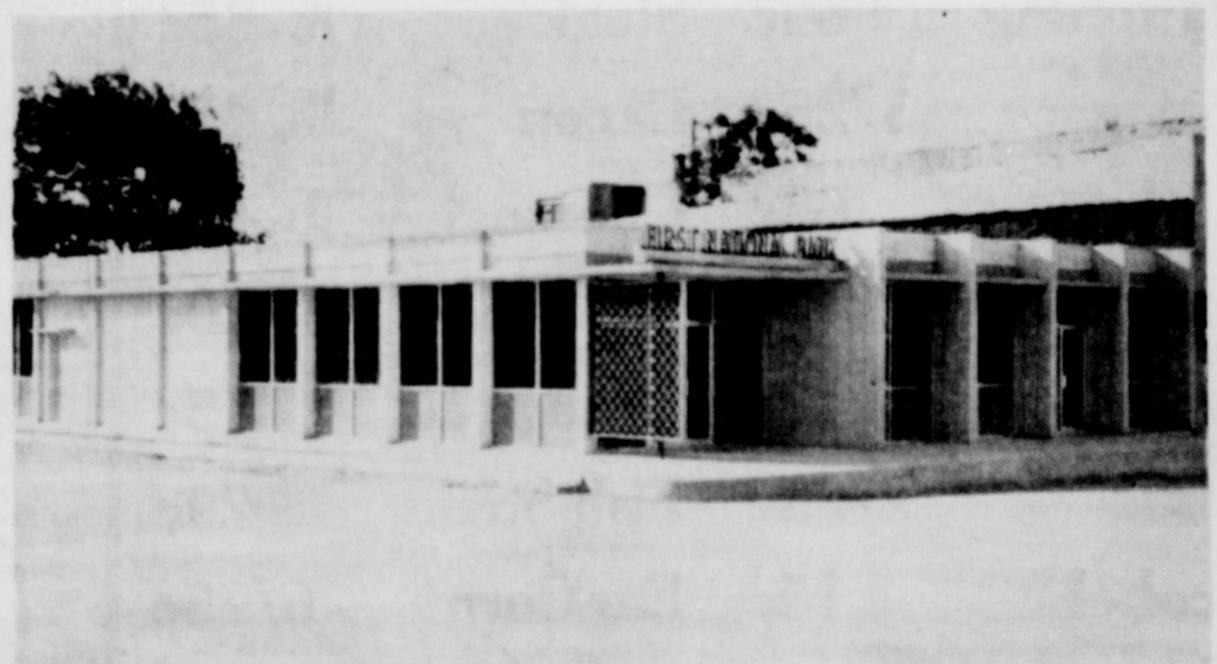

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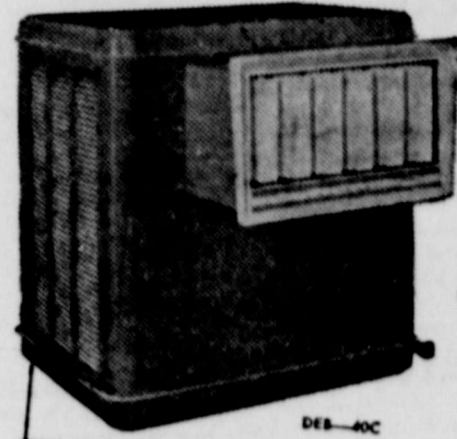
