School Opening Set Sept. 4

This may be premature, but kids, good 'ole school will start Tuesday, September 4!

And if you think that is early, then consider the fact that Hico schools will open from 4 days to a week later than most in this area.

Registration will begin Friday, August 31 at 9 a.m. for the seniors-to-be, and juniors will register that afternoon, Saturday, beginning at 9 a.m. also, will be reserved for the sophomores and freshmen. All high school students are urged to register on those two days.

A general teachers meeting has been scheduled for 8 a.m. Monday morning, September 3.

Tuesday, Sept. 4, will be a regular classroom day, with classes beginning at 9 a.m. Lunch will be served in the cafeteria, and dismissal time has been set as 2:45.

Regular schedule will be carried out the remainder of the week.

Only one vacancy remains in the local system. To be hired as soon as possible is a commercial and foreign language teacher. The faculty was completed early in the summer, but the teacher hired for the latter two positions did not accept the job.

Two new faces are already in the fold for the coming term. Mrs. T. E. Pratt will teach High School English, and Mike Morton of Stephenville will be here part time as band instructor. Mrs. Pratt succeeds Mrs. Louise Angell, who has accepted a position on Guam, and Morton replaces Mr. McCutcheon.

The school plant is being readied for the approaching term, and the new agriculture building is expected to be completed by opening day. Modern in every respect, the new building is located on the site where the former building stood, and 32x96 feet. The building contains a classroom, teachers office, rest room with shower, and tool room, plus the spacious shop area.

3,149 People Receive Oral Polio Vaccine Past 2 Weeks

A number far exceeding expectations turned out for the second Sunday in a row this past week to take the Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine at the Hico School Cafeteria.

Dr. B. C. Dayton, who was in charge of the program locally, said that a total of 1218 doses of the vaccine was given this past Sunday. Included in the number were those who were given the vaccine at nursing homes and at the Hico Clinic during the week.

In all a total of 3149 doses of the vaccine has been administered under the local program.

The project was sponsored by Hico Civic Club in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society, and was given on a free-will donation basis. No one was refused the vaccine, and people from this entire area took advantage of the opportunity of taking the new polio preventative.

Vaccine given the past two Sundays was Type I, and Type II and Type III will be administered at a later date.

Breakdown on the age groups taking the vaccine locally show the following figures:

John Roby Penns, Jr., Hosts At Field Day to More Than 300

Mr. and Mrs. John Roby Penns, Jr. were hosts July 28 to more than 350 guests at a field day at Surprise Valley Ranch, 12 miles north of Hico Highway 220. The place is commonly referred to by residents as the old Guy-Ranch.

The Penns, residents of Fort Worth, purchased the main portion of the ranch in 1958. Major Long of Dallas, original tract consisted of 600 acres, and last year purchased another 1000 acres from Henry Smith which lies directly across Highway 220 to the west.

The Penn features Santa Gertrudis cattle, and only recently purchased the entire herd of the late Matthew Cartwright Jr. of Terrell, one of the foremost herds of Santa Gertrudis in the state.

Penn became interested in the breed in 1959, and with the addition of the Cartwright herd, he now has one of the largest operations in the state. The Cartwright herd was established in 1945 with foundation stock from Richard King of the King Ranch.

Herd bulls in the Penn operation came from Landreth Farms at Edinburg, A. A. Higson Sr. of Premont, L. A. Morgan of San Antonio, R. W. King of Houston, King Ranch at Kingsville, and the Cartwright herd.

The purebred herd of Penn's includes 200 breeding age females, and also includes herd bulls, replacement heifers, and bull yearlings.

Herdsmen for Surprise Valley is Gaylon Chandler, and Clyde Bordner is ranch manager. Bordner has been manager of the ranch since Penn bought the land.

The field day began at 11 a.m. and tours in an air-conditioned bus over portions of the ranch were conducted throughout the morning and part of the afternoon. Guests

explained in full how animals met requirements and were accepted as representatives of the Santa Gertrudis Breeders International.

Brahman-Shorthorn Mixed.

Marshall explained that basically, Santa Gertrudis cattle are three-eighths Brahman and five-eighths Shorthorn. The King Ranch was one of the leaders in establishing the fact this combination of blood was effective in providing hardiness and rustling ability of the Brahman blood and the beefiness and smoothness of the Shorthorn. The breed is essentially adapted to the hot weather of Texas.

Visitors at the field day were shown part of the herd, including some of the top breeders. They were also shown one of the herd bulls for which Penn paid \$6,000.00.

Most visitors were impressed with the pasturelands at Surprise Valley, with the lush Bluestems, Indian Grasses, and eight different varieties of Gramma grasses. The ranch has had a reputation for several years as being one of the better rangeland places in this area, gained through proper management. Well watered, the place has 11 lakes and several windmills which provide year-round water facilities.

Steer Operation.

Mr. Penn started out with a large-scale steer operation

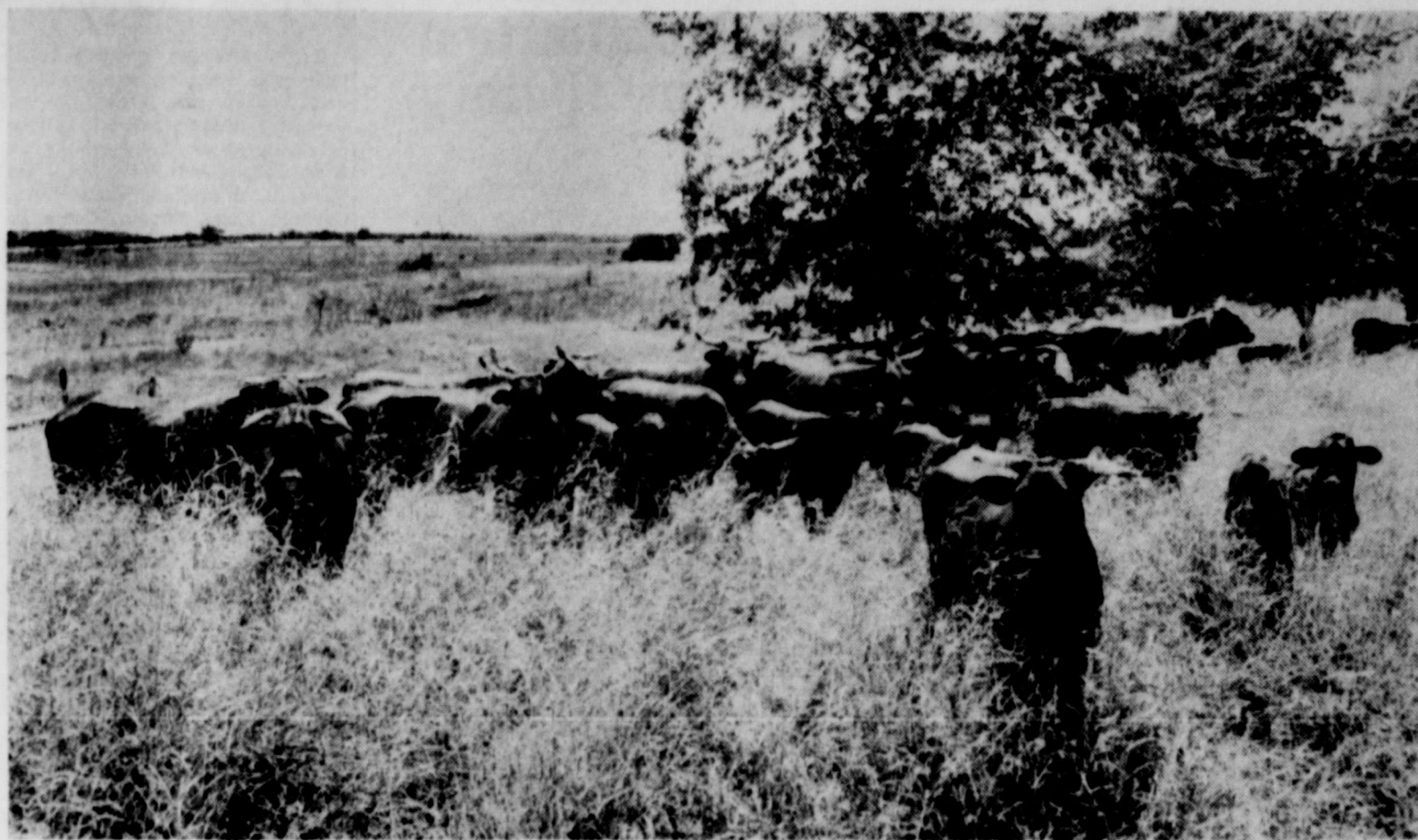

shortly after he bought the ranch, and later added the first of his Santa Gertrudis herd.

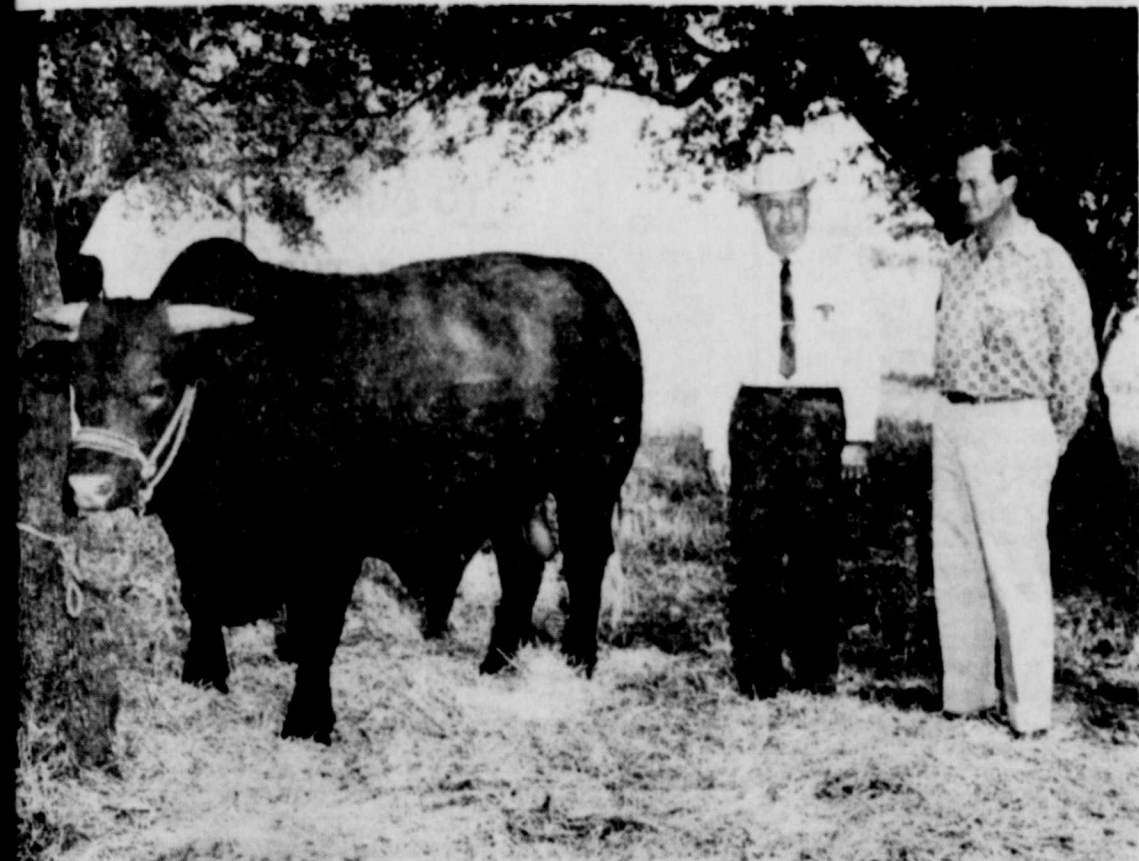
His first purebred animals were purchased from Landreth Farms at Edinburg. The Penns have steadily added to the herd by attending some

of the nation's major Santa Gertrudis production sales and selecting choice animals. The climax to his buying came only recently with the purchase of the Cartwright herd, including nearly 400 animals. Most of these have since been moved to Surprise Valley.

The ranch is a member of Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, the Alamo Santa Gertrudis Association, and the Premier Santa Gertrudis Association, and consigns cattle to the Alamo and Premier sales each year.

Two of the animals purchas-

ed from the Cartwright herd, a bull and a heifer, had been screened and accepted for a national sale including only 40 animals during the Pan American Exposition at Dallas in October. Penn has withdrawn the bull to keep as one of his herd sires.

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A Special Report

Army National Guard's Mobilization Termed 'Most Successful' in History

WASHINGTON—Now that the period of the "Berlin Mobilization" is coming to an end—now that the active services have had time to increase their striking power and the immediate need for the reserve forces is over—many people are asking: "How effective were these National Guardsmen and Reservists, anyway? How long did it take them to become truly combat-ready?"

The answer from one high Pentagon source: "This was the most successful mobilization in the history of the United States." Thus states Major General Donald W. McGowan, Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

The swiftness with which the 150th became combat-ready last winter earned it a place in the Army's elite Strategic Army Corps (STRAC).

General McGowan is a man who ought to know. He has spent a lifetime in the National Guard and has been through three mobilizations himself. His accomplishments include leading an armored cavalry regiment through the Normandy invasion, commanding a Guard combat division, and guiding the entire 470,000-man Army and Air National Guard through the most crucial—and fruitful—years of its existence.

"To see how well the Guard did in this mobilization," General McGowan said recently, "you have only to look at the record of the two divisions that were called to active duty: the 32nd Infantry Division of Wisconsin and the 49th Armored Division of Texas."

Here are the facts that bear out General McGowan's claim. Back in 1955, both the 32nd and the 49th were among six National Guard divisions selected for a new high-priority status by Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, then Army Chief of Staff. General Taylor called this his "Six-by-Six" plan because he required these six divisions to be combat-ready within six months after they were mobilized. All but forgotten by the general public, the plan is significant now by the contrast that it offers to the events of the past ten months.

Instead of taking six months, the 32nd and 49th were declared completely combat-ready in four months—and this included the two weeks it took them to get to camp and two weeks to leave at Christmas time. If the world situation had required it, they could have made it in three months.

It was a grueling experience, not soon to be forgotten by the members of these units. At Fort Polk, Louisiana, the 49th Armored was challenged in the dust and mud with rugged combat exercises requiring its tanks and men to maneuver and fire exactly as they would on the battlefield. At Fort Lewis, Washington, the 32nd was challenged in the tall pines and in the mountains, day and night, against a tough, clever aggressor who turned a routine tactical exercise into an infantryman's nightmare.

But all this seemed worthwhile when, immediately after being declared combat-ready, both divisions were assigned to the Army's Strategic Army Corps (STRAC), the first National Guard units ever to be assigned to this elite fighting force.

So impressive was the Guard's performance, in fact, that General James Van Fleet reported: "The quality of these units is far above any previous mobilization that took place in World War II or Korea."

Are there any specific reasons for such a marked improvement in our citizen-soldiers?

"Yes," says Gen. McGowan, "and the primary one is the six months training program which provides active duty basic training for every non-prior service man we enlist. This has raised National Guard training to the unit level across the board.

"Then, too, we avoided our mistake of both world wars of reorganizing Guard units after they were called up. In 1959 we converted the entire Army Guard to the new Pentomic structure and when the Berlin crisis came upon us, we were able to provide the Army with the type of units it really needed. All they had to do was finish their training.

"And finally, this was the first mobilization in modern history in which we were able to preserve the integrity of our units. In Korea, you will remember, many of our key officers and NCOs were pulled out of their units to beef up overseas-bound active Army units. This helped the Army but it sure weakened our Guard units."

These are the facts of the Berlin Mobilization. But they do not tell the whole story. It remained for Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington to put the overall effect into words.

"This is the first time," he said, "that a President has been able to use the military power represented by our reserve program to achieve a foreign policy objective."

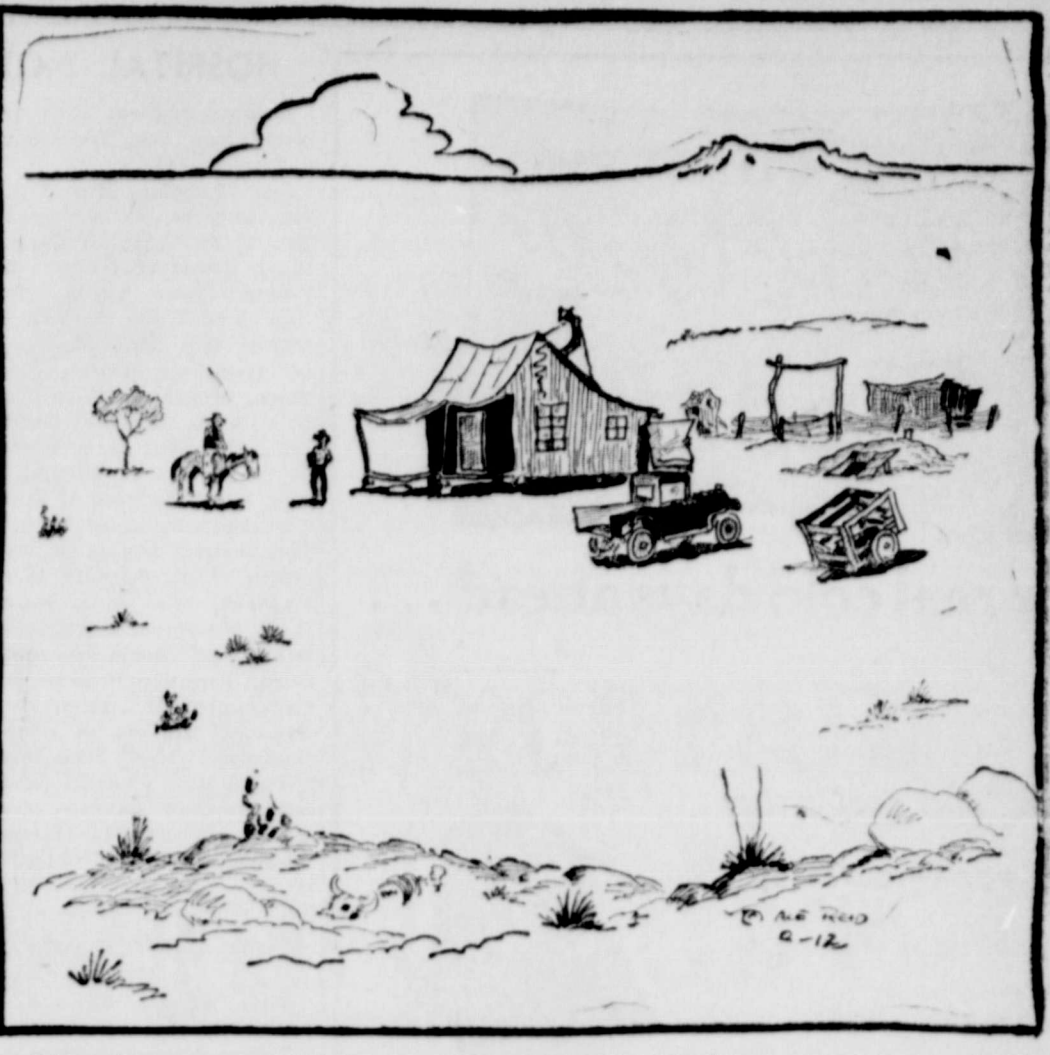

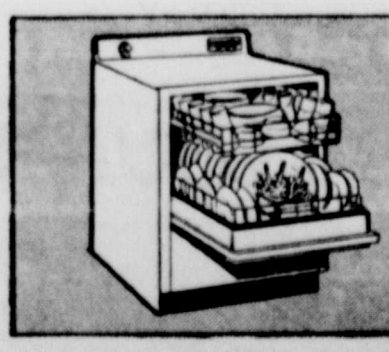
