Experience of Local Girl at Scout Roundup Related

(ED NOTE: The following story, written by Ruth Ann Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Martin of Clairette and student in Hico Schools, is an account of her recent trip to Button Bay, Vermont, where she attended the Senior Girl Scout Roundup.)

Years of work and pleasure for me have paid off and one of the dreams of my life has been fulfilled, I began planning and working about nine years ago when preparation was being made for the first big Senior Girl Scout Roundup. This is the third one that has been held. Girls were present from New Zealand's winter, and from Brazil's tropical heat. There were 150 teenage Girl Guides and 34 adult guides from a total of 21 nations of the free world this year at Button Bay State Park, Vermont from July 18-31.

There, on the shores of Lake Champlain, the Girl Guides joined with more than 10,000 Girl Scouts from every state and possession of the USA to form the largest encampment of girls ever held in the Western World. Girl Guides were there from Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Denmark, Great Britain (including Bermuda), Greece, India, Japan, Kenya, Mexico, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Nigeria, Peru, the Philippines, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland.

Eighteen months ago, I sent my application for Senior Girl Scout Roundup to the Heart of Texas Council. The first big encampment was held at Menard, Texas in August 1961. Five councils sent 150 girls to El Sugo Sucedo Camp. This encampment was "a little encampment" where we were graded on everything we did. Later we had another tryout at Lake Brownwood where the final eight girls were chosen by point system. These points were given by observers and we were questioned on Scouting and many other subjects. I received a letter in October, 1961 saying

Memory of Unusual Family Spurs Return of Feature Column

The most unusual family I can remember in my journey into the eighties of life was the Kirk family. It was in Hill County and we lived on a tenant farm on a pioneer estate, and some of our neighbors were also tenants there. The Kirk family was one of them.

What made it so unusual? I'll try to tell you. It is now a distant memory, and on a recent night while awake the memory returned for the first time in more than a half century. Then I determined to tell all of you about it—I mean the family.

The name was not really "Kirk" but that was a part of it: a three-syllable name. For sufficient reasons I am just using the "Kirk" part of it, a good Scotch name, that means "Church."

The male head of the family was Parson Kirk, a cornfield, one-horse preacher, who had engagements at school houses and some times in brush arbors, though he never served a church as pastor. He was a good meaning honorable man, though a bit queer in some ways, as you may soon guess.

There were a dozen children in 1889 when I knew them, ranging in age from small kids to older ones in their thirties. The first-born was a girl, and in 1889 she was an old maid about her mid-thirties. And she was one of the unusual things of the family. Her first name was Annie but her given names numbered 26, one for each letter of the alphabet, starting with Annie and ending in Zula. Annie could not always remember all of her names, so she went to the family Bible and copied them and kept the paper on which she had written the names in her possession.

One day I was in the Kirk home and she got the list and showed it to me, and she confessed she had some difficulty remembering all her names and so made the list. She was the only person I ever met with that number of names. The idea was that of her doting father.

The old mother was a bit more ragged looking than the Parson, though about the same age. She was an emotional creature, and on occasion manifested that characteristic in ample fashion. A brother of mine and I were visiting the home one Sunday afternoon with the boys of our age, and all the children, some ten of them, were there for the day with their wives and children and the house was filled with folks. While we and the lads with whom we were visiting were out in the front yard about mid-afternoon, a man slipped through the wire fence about the house and went inside. Our boy friends were so startled that they simply stood open-mouthed and watched the man enter the house and uttered no word.

When the man was inside such a storm of noise broke loose as you never heard. With our boy friends we crept up as close as we could get and looked in to see what was erupting. The old emotional mother had her arms about the neck of the man and was shouting and crying and beating him on the back and shoulders, and he along with the others were crying and making a great deal of fuss. Finally the boys explained to us that

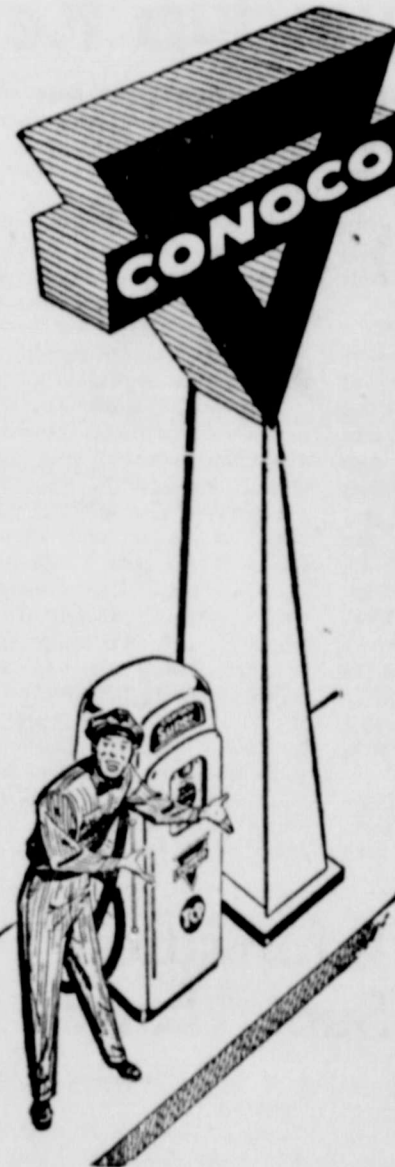

Proposal No. 14 appears to be stirring opposition from the Texas Municipal League which asserts that this amendment as presently written "could virtually destroy municipal government in Texas, except for certain of its police powers."

Proposal No. 4 on the ballot would permit the state to buy conservation storage in locally or federally owned reservoirs. Gov. Price Daniel has called a special meeting of his statewide water advisory committee for Sept. 10 for the express purpose of organizing support for the amendment.

When Jim Leonard, executive secretary of the Republican Party of Texas, asked Atty. Gen. Will Wilson to impound ballots in Duval, Zapata and Starr Counties, after the general election November, the Fall political campaign immediately got underway.

It was a quaint, but telling, legal order of impoundment which Wilson filed in the 98th District Court in Austin. It cited the vaults of Duval County's district and county clerks as "not as adequate, accessible and safe" as the vault of the Corpus Christi State Bank.

Same charges were levied against county vaults in Starr and Zapata counties.

Court order instructs election judges and officials in the three South Texas counties to turn in ballots, poll lists and all other election records over to a Texas Ranger. He then would deliver them to the Corpus Christi bank for safe keeping until the 98th District Judge, or his appointed representative, could examine them.

With this sort of preamble, it looks like the Fall campaign might be a little more exciting than the democrat-dominated ones in past years.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, and though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from the Justices of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the conditions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action, ruling or decision involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, that the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be proceeded in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas after the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effective except by subsequent legislation."

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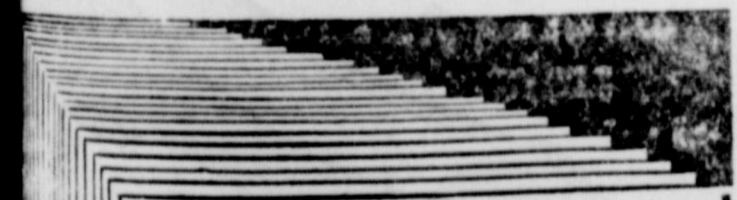

National Girl Scout Roundup ---

member of the patrol asked about the time zone she was in, and the lady asked her to repeat the question—she liked to hear the "southern droll." The rest of the day was spent on a sight-seeing trip with supper at the Royal York Hotel. The next morning we had breakfast at Windsor Statin in Montreal, then to Burlington, Vermont where we took buses for a 25 mile ride out to the Roundup site at Button Bay State Park.

We had the privilege of setting up camp without rain, for it had rained every day for a week before. We were with patrols (8 girls each) from New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, and Chicago, which made up our troop of 32 girls. Our troop leader was Carolyn "Sandy" Chaille from California. Each day we saluted to 200 flags as they were put up and taken down. On Sunday, July 22 I helped put up the Texas flag. The avenue of flags, totalling 109 one from every state and nation represented, was the most inspirational part of the Roundup. At 7 the day had begun, and there was always lots to do with three meals to prepare on charcoal fires, cleanup, swapping, swimming in Lake Champlain, picture taking, all kinds of demonstrations such as branding, cooking, dancing, building of birch bark canoes, etc. and always singing along with girls from everywhere.

Patrols first presented their demonstrations before a group of 650 girls. If the demonstration was good enough, they could present it on the Village Green where visitors, all Roundup girls and the public were invited. Our patrol had the privilege of demonstrating branding and rope twirling on the Village Green. We started our demonstration by laying a rope map of Texas on the ground and singing "Texas Our Texas." After we twirled and branded, we brought others in to teach them. We concluded our demonstration by singing the "Eyes of Texas."

We had three all-encampment events held at night which were very inspirational. On July 20 there was an arena campfire to "Honor the Past." Here an Olympic-type torch was lighted and burned throughout the arena events. There was a parade of international campers and flags, a reading of a challenge to youth from President Kennedy, greetings from World Chief Lady Baden-Powell, and a pageant of Americana in costume against a backdrop map of the United States.

On July 24 there two major birthday presents—presentation of the first albums of the commemorative stamp honoring the 50th anniversary of Girl Scouts of the USA, and the 50th anniversary campfire, awarding of 32 Reader's Digest college scholarships to one girl from each of the 12 Girl Scout Regions. Elizabeth Sterrett from Abernathy received the scholarship from the Cactus Region. Guest of honor was the distinguished folk singer, Mrs. Georg von Trapp family singers. There was a gigantic birthday cake with 50 candles, each with a special meaning. At a signal 1,054 sparklers (one for each patrol of 8 girls) twinkled throughout the entire arena as the girls sang the "Happy Birthday" song.

July 28 the farewell campfire "Serve the Future" was held. Before a world map backdrop, a rededication ceremony and pledge by representatives of the campers, including girls from other countries was made in answer to President Kennedy's challenge, "What can you do to serve your country?" Specific pledges of service were presented which resulted from four large youth forums and smaller camp discussion groups. The girls returned to their camps by torchlight.

Religious services of all faiths were held regularly on the encampment grounds and you were free to attend the service of your choice.

Our campsite contained 450 acres with three-fourths mile of water front. 250,000 gallons of water were used each day.

The Army set up more than 100 tons of tents which were used for the administration, section, and camp headquarters, food commissaries, first aid stations, post office, trading post and other necessary uses. They also set up a 100-bed hospital. There were 36 physicians and 56 civilian nurses to staff 7 dispensary.

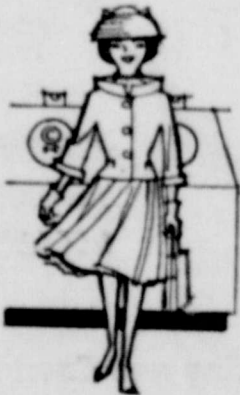
