Tigers Fall 12-8 Despite Final 4-Minute Flurry

The Tigers, seeking their third win of the season, fell short in the final minutes of play. In the last two minutes of play of the second half, the Tigers scored their second touchdown, and a 128 setback at the hands of the Blanket Tigers last Friday.

The locals, who couldn't cash in on the opportunities presented by the spotted Blanket a 12.0 and with but four minutes remaining in the game made their which almost resulted in victory. The finish was similar to the year's contest when the locals, led 8.0, pumped across two downs in the final five minutes to pull the game out 14.5.

Five times the Tigers worked into Blanket territory only to have the drive stopped. They led to the 18, 21 and 33 in the first stanza, and had the final yard of the night fizzle at the 29. Blanket struck on their second down for their first TD of the game, going 47 yards in three plays for the score. The payoff

came on a 42 yard pass and run play.

The score remained 6.0 until midway of the final stanza when Blanket took advantage of a Hico fumble and marched 35 yards for what proved to be the winning marker.

Following the Blanket score, Hico went to work and with sheer power blazed 74 yards for their only touchdown. Big gainer in the drive was a 22 yard pass to Larry Erick. Mike Lowe got the call for his first TD of the year. He also bulled in for the two conversion points, making the score 12.8, and giving the locals another chance to pull the game out.

With only two minutes remaining the Tigers simply overpowered the smaller Blanket team to block a punt and get possession at the 29 yard line. However one running play and three go for broke passes lost one yard, and Blanket ran out the clock for the victory.

In the statistic department Hico led Blanket in everything but passing. The locals had 157 yards on the ground compared to 112 for Blanket, rolled to 11 first downs to Blanket's six, and completed 3 of 25 pass attempts for 49 yards. Blanket connected on three of 16 passes for 82 yards.

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
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
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CARLTON

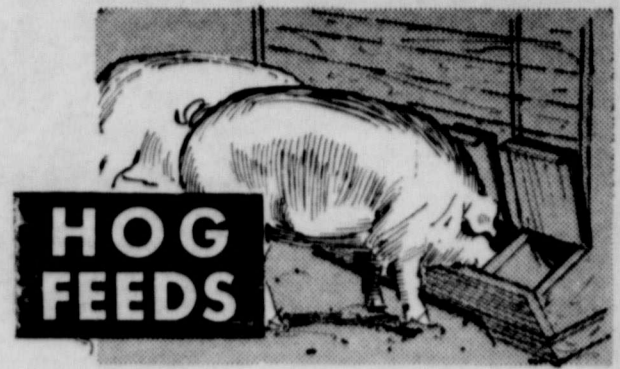

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Oak Most Common Tree Name

By E. E. DAWSON

What tree is most numerous in Texas? I wonder! I have never read or heard of a census of trees in the state, nor of anyone's guess as to the most numerous tree. But I am of the opinion that the names of the communities of the state may give us an answer to the query.

Have a look at these figures. Sixteen places have "Oak" as the first syllable of their names, and then there are Lone Oak, Red Oak, two Post Oaks, White Oak, and Blackjack, which is an oak. That makes 21 all told. Next comes "Cedar" with eight, plus Lone Cedar. And Lone Grove which may have been cedars that moved some soul to give the name to the community.

Then nine places are named "Pine," which ties with the nine named Cedar, and eight have Elm in their names, four with Ash, and Cypress two. But I looked in vain for Hackberry and not a one was found, and for Locust with the same result.

So let's say here is the order of Texas' most numerous trees: Oak, Cedar, Pine, Elm, Ash, Cypress, Cottonwood, China and just Wood.

Names of Texas' places reveal a lot of other interesting things too. Seven places have "Mount" in their names, and one has "Mountain"—and that is "Mountain Peak" over in Ellis County near Midlothian. Seven have "Hill" in their names, four have "River," 7 have "Big," ten have "Spring" as their first syllable and 16 have it as the latter part of their names. "Lake" shows up in thirteen names. And believe it or not, "Erath" is the name of a community in McLennan County. So

far no remonstrance from Stephenville.

But odd names are quite numerous as this list will show you: Jot 'Em Down; Cat Spring; Circle Back; Cut Hand; Dad's Corner; Dime Box; Dimple; Half Way; Deadwood; Razor; Sunrise; Sunset; Sunray; Telegraph; Telephone; City of Refuge; High Hill; The Grove; Thicket; Snipe; Cyclone; Dollarhide; Concrete; Clover Leaf; Cee Vee; Twin Sisters; and Seven Sisters. And that is just a sample.

But the most numerous of all the classifications are the places that have a female name. Look at the Alphabet long list: A 16; B 6; C 8; D 8; E 11; F 2; G 5; H 3; I 5; J 4; K 3; L 14; M 22; N 5; O 7; P 14; Q 1; R 7; S 17; T 4; U 1; V 9; W 4; Y 1; Z 0; So 177 places have feminine names. If all those places voted for one candidate he or she could be elected.

Now don't imagine that male names are not found in the list of names too. I did not count and catalogue the male names, but suspect they come near to equaling the female names. But I looked in vain for a place with either one of my given names, Edward Eugene. There just are not a single one. But my surname does appear! There is "Richmond" down in Fort Bend county.

In the list of female names just one shows up under Q, and that is Quannah. Of course the city of that name gets its title from Chief Quannah Parker, famous Texas Indian Chief. But there is a woman named Quannah: Mrs. Quannah Medford of Alexander, whom I know quite well and have the highest esteem for as a very lovely, comely woman, greatly loved by a lot of people. Her noble husband, Jesse Medford, was born and reared in Hico.

How come all these communities to be given their names? No one can tell. But a good many of them were named for the daughters of railroad officials as new lines were built through the state

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Tuesday night, Oct. 2, is an important time for the land owners of Zone 4 of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. This is the time that a district supervisor will be elected.

The election will be held in the Fairy gym at 7:30 Tuesday night. A very interesting program has been arranged and lots of good ice cream will be served to all who attend.

Zone 4 is that part of the county north and east of a line along Highway 22 from the east side of the county to Hamilton, north on 281 to the river and west following the river to the county line. This is a pretty good size area and there should be many at the Tuesday night election. At present Carl King is supervisor in this zone.

To be eligible to vote in a soil conservation district supervisor's election a person must own agri-

culture land within the subdivision where the election is being held. He or she must live in a county, all or any part of which is in the soil conservation district. The voter must have attained the age of 21 years. No poll tax is required. Under the community property laws of Texas the wife of a landowner also owns land and is entitled to vote and hold office.

Soil Conservation District Supervisors serve a term of five years. The term of office begins the day after he is elected provided he qualifies. State law requires that a soil conservation district supervisor take an oath of office and execute a loyalty oath before he is officially a supervisor.

Now is a good time to do a little fertilizing of your lawn before winter sets in so the grass will go into the winter in a vigorous condition. Too, the grass will stay green this fall and will grow off earlier next spring.

By fertilizing now one will have less trouble with those winter and spring weeds. The fertilizer should be applied about a month before the first expected frost. Our average first frost is around November 15. About 20 pounds of 16-20-0 to each 1,000 square feet of lawn should give good results.

Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas. About 80 percent of wild and cultivated plants are susceptible in varying degrees to the disease. Small flowers, shrubs and trees die suddenly after the first wilting symptoms appear. Large trees and shrubs may die more slowly.

Bark of affected roots is decayed and brownish-wooly, buff or brownish, fungal strands are present on the surface of the roots. The whole root system decays, bark is rotted off the hard wood of the root, and roots spill out of the soil with comparatively little pulling effort.

So if you have been noticing some of your shrubs or plants around the place dying then this might be the cause. Cure? There isn't any other than to put out plants that are resistant.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Rules to prevent future crooked oil wells are being hammered out by the Texas Railroad Commission.

Chairman Bill Murray and Commissioner Ben Ramsey laid out a proposal for tougher rules.

Oil industry spokesmen split down the middle on the proposed rules. They say it is not possible to drill a vertical hole without greatly adding to the cost.

Commission took proposals of its own staff and of the industry under study after a long hearing. Ramsey said the Commission should not add to industry's drilling costs, because the public pays them all.

But it was clear that the Commission now will crack down to make sure wells do not stray under property lines.

Slant Oil Well Surveys

Major and independent oil producers have contributed a total of \$306,709 for surveys to find slanted wells in Texas fields, Attorney General Wilson disclosed.

All but \$40,000 has been used. Survey to date have revealed 138 deviated wells in the East Texas Field, 14 in Hawkins, one in Quitman and one in Friendswood.

The Railroad Commission plans to run inclination surveys on the remaining wells which are suspected—between 200 and 300 in the East Texas Field, Wilson said.

Education Committee

Texas State Committee on Public Education will meet in Austin on Sunday, September 20.

Two of the speakers will be Dr. Iby Carruth, superintendent of schools in Austin and president of the American Association of School Administrators, and Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

Legislative Study

A three member subcommittee of the Texas House Committee on Saving Taxes will make a study of the operations of the State Railroad Commission. Members are J. W. Buchanan of Dumas, chairman; Olen R. Petty of Levelland and George Preston of Paris. Preston is chairman of the full committee.

Purpose of the parent committee is to seek ways to effect a saving in the State tax dollar.

Polio Report

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner, reported that Texas has had 158 cases of paralytic polio this season. State's cases are almost half as many as in all the nation combined.

Total number of polio cases has risen to 206 to date. Without the mass immunization campaigns, he said, the Texas number undoubtedly would be much greater.

The Health Department recommended that oral vaccine types I and II be continued and accelerated; that type III be limited to preschool and school age children except in type III epidemic areas where it should be given to all age groups.

Highway Construction Safety
Traffic deaths on highway construction projects in Texas reached a five year low in 1961.

Credit for the good showing is given to a cooperative effort undertaken in 1958 by the Texas Highway Construction Traffic

Safety Committee.

This group consists of representatives from the Texas Highway Department, Department of Public Safety, Highway Heavy Branch of the Associated General Contractors of Texas and the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

Fatal crashes on highway construction projects last year totaled 58, compared with 71 in 1960.

School Integration

School boards cannot integrate without a court order or an election, rules Attorney General Wilson.

The opinion went to Dr. J. W. Edgar, State Commissioner of Education, on a question raised by the Yoakum School Board.



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
