Stephenville, Nov. 6.—Spl.—Tarleton State College Junior Nolan Pike ran jubilantly through the rec hall last week when he found out that his Brown Swiss heifer won the Grand Championship at the Texas State Fair in Dallas.
The cow, registered as "Rose Ridge Gentry's Ducky G" won the honors, and Nolan won a plaque and a \$50.00 bond.
More honors were won by Nolan at the same fair, since his other two entries in the Brown Swiss division also received awards. One of them won its class, and the other placed second.
Winning honors in stock shows is nothing new to Nolan, as "Rose Ridge Gerry's Ducky G" received awards in local shows earlier this year. In 1960 and 1961, other Brown Swiss heifers entered by Nolan won reserve grand champion honors at the Houston Fat Stock Show, and in 1960 he entered the reserve grand champion at the State Fair in Dallas.
Nolan now owns eight Brown Swiss heifers and is planning to build this number into a large herd in the future.

Texas A&M College supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the official breed improvement programs of the Holstein-Friesian Association. In announcing the new record, a spokesman for the national Holstein organization said that it compared to the average cow's annual output of 7,211 pounds of milk containing 270 pounds of butterfat.

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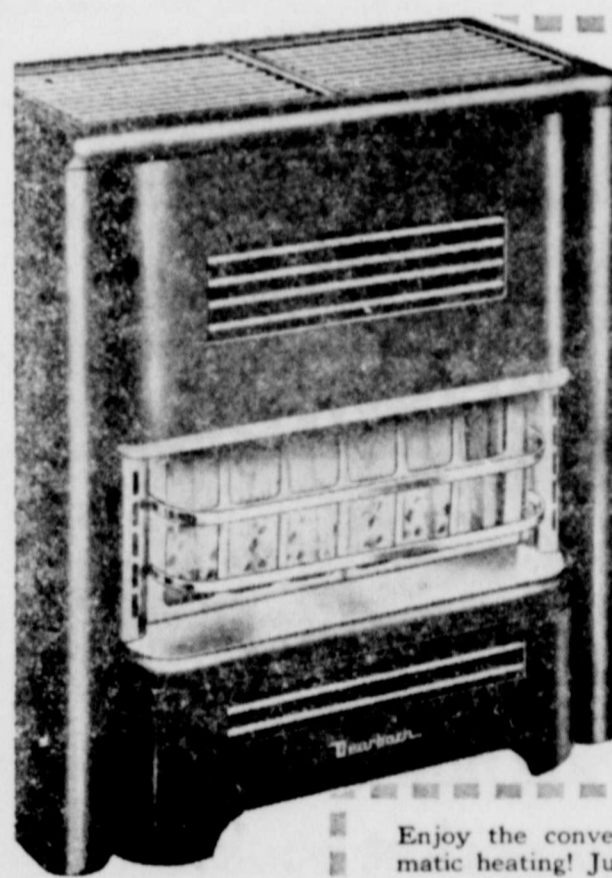

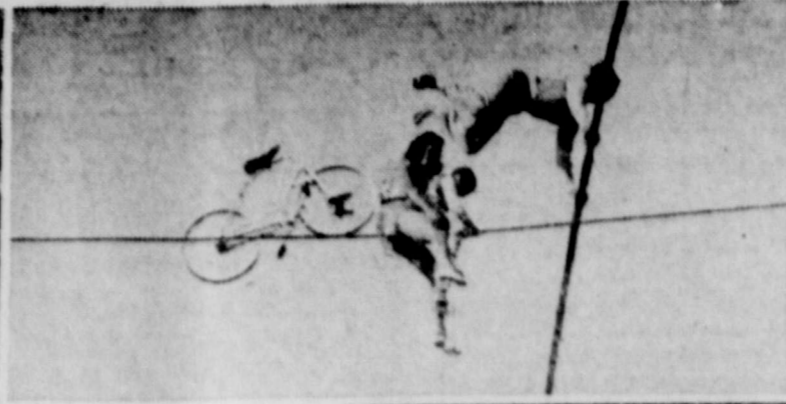
We received the first heavy frost of the season here early Sunday morning. However, it did not kill quiet a lot of vegetation.

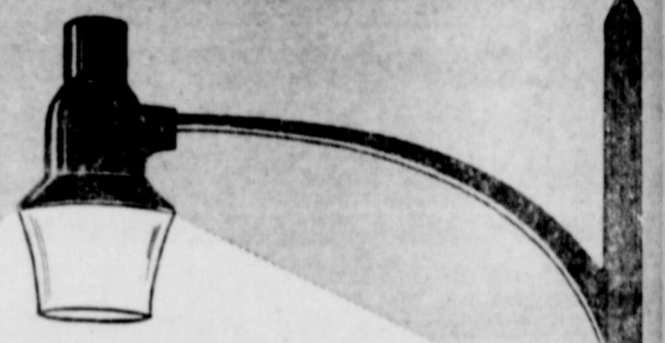

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

The cool weather last week and over the weekend should put a stop to the Army Worms or least slow them down. I sure hope this is the case but I might suggest that fields still be watched as there is a possibility that the worms could move in from pastures. Some pastures have been damaged but not as bad as in recent years. As long as pastures remain

green, I am of the opinion that many of the worms will stay there.

According to A. H. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, the 1962 Dairyman's Short Course will be held at A&M College November 29-30. Meekma states that this year's program will give dairymen up-to-date information on dairy cattle feeding, breeding and management, as well as the marketing of milk and milk products. It will feature such subjects as the importance of managed milking practice, practical reproductive management, quality forage production, marketing & advertising and what's new in the field of dairy research.

According to Ed Cooper, Extension Wildlife Specialist, the mis-handling of game after the kill often makes impossible a tasty

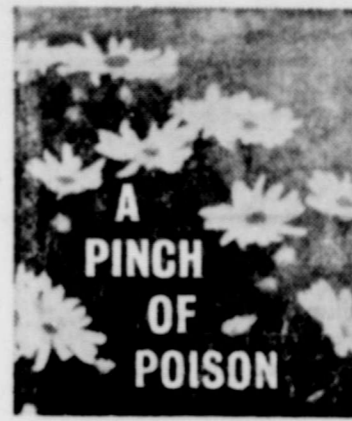
preparation job in the kitchen, and the putting of meat on the family table as you would like. Immediate and proper bleeding of the game animals is most important in improving meat flavor, points out Cooper.

The same is true for ducks and geese and most other game species. This practice will do much to remove the strong, gamey flavor which some people dislike. The specialist recommends field dressing immediately after the kill especially if the weather is relatively warm. The sooner the animal is dressed the better, for immediate dressing means fewer changes for meat spoilage or undesirable flavor or odor. Keep the game clean, avoid letting hair, feathers, dirt or other trash come into contact with the meat. Before the blood dries, wipe the body clean with either a dry or slightly moistened cloth rather than by washing with water.

If the weather is warm, game should be put into cold storage as soon as possible. It is held just above freezing for a few days, the meat will become more tender and have less of the undesirable gamey flavor.

A deer should be aged in cold storage much the same as the carcass of a beef animal. Omit the aging process and you might be sorry you killed your buck.

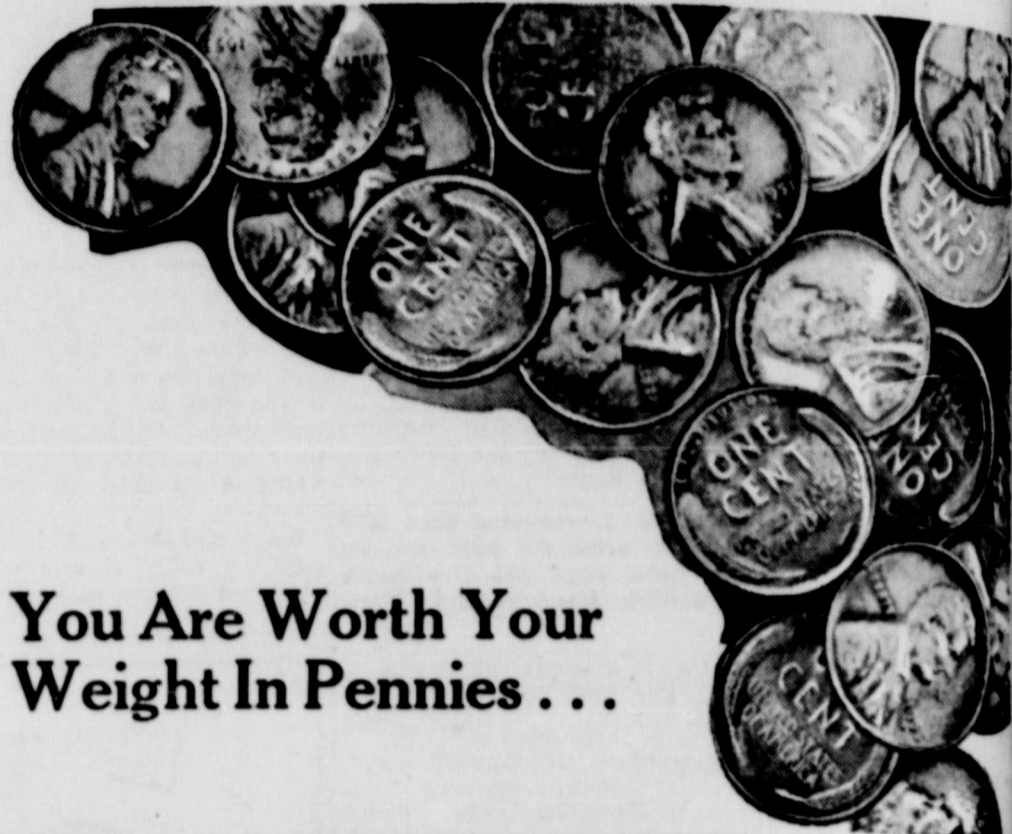
