Many people who were concerned about the safety of Mrs. Louise Angell following the devastating typhoon Karen that hit Guam Island in the Pacific will be happy to learn that she escaped without any serious injuries.

Mrs. Angell, who taught in the local school system before accepting a position to teach on Guam, wrote the following card to Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Cook this past week:

"Dear Friends: I have survived Typhoon Karen with no actual damage of any kind. My car-out in the open-survived too, without any damage. This was quite miraculous for the damage to the island is terrific. I don't believe any of us have really waked up from shock.

"Our apartment building withstood the storm successfully. The other two suffered great damage; one woman was blown out of her upstairs apt. along with the walls and all of her furniture.

"The schools are nearly all damaged. Business houses and private homes are in many cases just a pile of lumber. worst typhoon that ever struck Guam. Those who were here during the Jap invasion say the Japanese caused less damage than Karen."




