



"TEXAS is the only slogan this state needs," Greer told the House Appropriations Committee. He added that more wording on car tags just means additional ex

"All law enforcement officers will tell you," Greer explained "that the readability of the rest of the plate is lessened if you crowd in slogans."

Death of Poll Tax?

If the rest of the Senate feels like the Senate committee on constitutional amendments, the poll tax may be on its way to extinc.

Committee gave a nine-to-two approval of Laredo Sen. Abraham Kazen's bill to submit to the peo ple a constitutional amendment that would kill the poll tax as of February 1, 1965.

The two "no" votes in committee came from Sen, George Park. house of Dallas and Sen. Galloway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler.




