The girls game ended with a score of 64 to 38, with Roberson meshing 33 points and Sharp scoring 28.

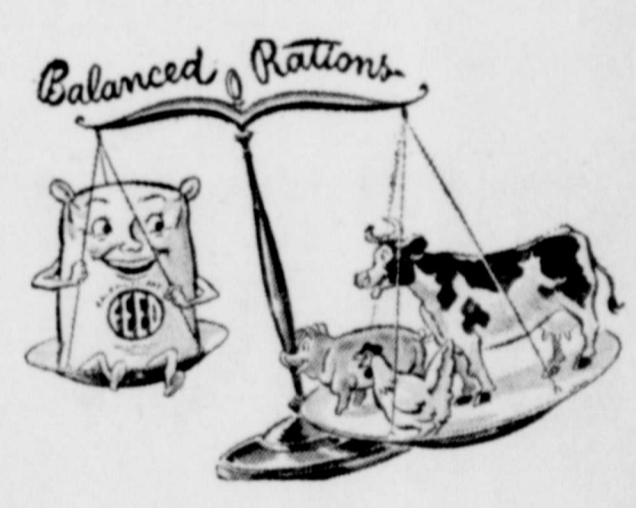
The second game for the boys was exciting with Carlton's Johnny Wilson sinking a basket just before the buzzer to defeat the Pottsville team 59 to 58.

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1,325 Poll Taxes Sold In County, Lowest in 10 Years

(From the Hamilton Herald-News)

A total of 1,325 poll taxes—the lowest figure in the last 10 years—was paid in Hamilton County as of the January 31 deadline, according to Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector.

The 1962 poll taxes (for voting during 1963) was over a 100 short of the next lowest total for any year during the 10-year period of 1952-1962, which was 1,447 poll taxes paid by countians during 1960 (for voting in 1961).

The highest figure for any year during the past 10 was in 1955 when a total of 2,612 poll taxes were paid (for voting in the presidential election year of 1956).

The 10-year breakdown: (In Texas Poll Taxes are issued during Oct., Nov. and Dec. of one year, and January of the following year. They are stamped with the year in which sales began, and used for voting during the following year.)

This year's paid poll taxes in Hamilton County represents approximately 15.6 percent of this county's total population of 8,458.

According to Social Security Administration figures, there is a total of 1,748 residents of Hamilton County who are 65 years of age or over. This represents approximately 20.6 percent of the county's total population.

Considering the fact that in counties with populations of less than 10,000, persons over 60 years of age do not have to have ex-

emption certificates to vote, and adding those countians between the ages of 60 to 65 to the group that are 65 or over, the figures show that the group from 60 years and older have near twice the voting potential as do those citizens between the ages of 21 and 59 who qualified to vote during 1963 by paying their poll taxes.

Game Warden Reports

Some of you may not realize how much money was brought into this district by the sale of furs. So I asked one of the buyers in this area to give me an account of furs he purchased from Dec. 1 through January 31, during the season. He bought:

10,179 Raccoons
3,763 Ringtails
1,249 Possums
921 Fox
228 Skunks
63 Minks

The 'coons averaged \$1.50, the ringtails \$1.25, so if we add just these two we will get \$20,000.00 worth of furs. Besides the amount of money this brought into the district, it also helped control some of these predators. This buyer also told me when he left this year that he planned to be back next season.

The crappie and black bass have been biting good at Meridian State Park during the pretty days last week. The crappie have been running from hand size to one pound, and the blacks have been running about a pound. The bass have been hitting spoons and picc perch about as good as anything.

We have a new park manager, Red Horton, and he invites all of you out to fish and enjoy the park facilities. The fishing is free now since they have taken off the fee formerly charged. However you still have to pay for a boat if you rent one. Be sure to bring your own minnows since he has discontinued the sale of them at the park.

I would like to remind you again that Feb. 15 is the last day to turn in doe or antlerless deer permits. If you have lost these please come and report it to me. Since we will run a check on them to see who has not turned theirs in. This is the only way we can determine how many antlerless deer were killed in the county the past season.

Please be extra careful while hunting and fishing, and let's keep down accidents. And always be good sportsmen and help preserve our wildlife.
