New Loan Twist

State Junior Bar Association has recommended a new approach to the Texas loan problem.

Proposal was made to the House Banking Committee by Charles Sowell, Houston attorney and chairman of the Junior Bar's legislative committee.

He recommended a that would regulate loans up to \$1,500 Total charges would be based on the outstanding balance, except on loans under \$100.

Basically, total charges could not exceed 3 per cent per month on the first \$200, 2 per cent per month on the next \$100, one and a half percent per month on the next \$200, and 1 per cent on the next \$1,000 on a loan contract. 

THE FARM PROGRAM The minority members of the House Agricultural Committee have issued a joint statement on their views on the President's recommendations concerning the farm program for

The statement expresses general approval, with certain definite limitations, of the overall farm message. It is noted that the President has formally dropped his plea for complete control of American agriculture. The group calls this, extent, sweet music to the ears of the American farmer." They go on to say, "Its general tone is in sharp contrast to the radical request he submitted in 1961 for Congress to delegate its Constitutional and legislative responsibilities to the Department of Agriculture***. Fortunately, in regard to dairy products and feed grains, it is also a substantial reversal from the President's request of last year for stringent controls over producers of these vital comnodities

In view of the rapidly rising costs of our farm programs, and the evident fact that they have failed to solve the prob-lems involved, it is refreshing to see some chance for real cooperation between the Executive and the Legislative branches in solving these problems.

A recent survey conducted by subscribers, showed the following results. A vast majority, 79.1% favored no price supports, no controls, a gradual return to a free supply-and-de-mand system—the free market economy. In response to a question concerning the quality job being done by Orvil Freeman as Secretary of Agri-culture, 86.2% voted that he was not doing a good job, while 6.5% voted for him. Of all the replies received, 60.9% were from farm owners, 5.9% from farm operators, and 5.9% from Obviously from these results, the average farmer today, at least in the South, is more than ready to stand on his own two feet and solve his own problems. The law of supply and demand is still the best yardstick by which to measure the production needs of any given commodity.

The present system of unrealistically high price supports, in an attempt to guarantee the farmer a price above the market value, got its present grip on American agriculture back in 1948. At that time, Congress decided to cling to this system, born of the depression, rather than allow the farmer to return to the traditional competition in the market place. The net result has been disasterous. Farm income, per capita, has averaged \$1,000 less per year than non-farm income. During the first nine-year period of the massive price support program, nearly two million of these were farms of less than 200 acres. Some farmers have come to find it more profitable to find ways to beat the farm rograms than to utilize their knowledge and know-how to produce crops more profitably.

It is hoped that the President will carry out the spirit of his message and make every possible effort to control the spending of the Department of Agriculture. In fiscal 1962, USDA spent nearly \$7.5 billion, more than the total of any other spending by the USDA in fiscal 1964 show a total of some \$8.5 billion, nearly 5 times the amount needed to operate the Department in 1954 and 49 times that needed in 1933.

The number of persons employed by the Department of Agriculture has increased by over 45,000 in ten years. At this rate, we may indeed see the day in the USDA exceeds the number of farmers in America.





Under average rainfall, soil condition and management, coastal bermuda grass will produce about five and a haif months of grazing during the year, On a comparative basis, small grain will produce approximately 3.3 months grazing, while sudan will produce about 2.1 months of grazing. Common bermuda grass, under the average conditions mentioned above, will produce about 3,7 months grazing per year. One month grazing is a cow grazing for one month during the year. King Ranch bluestem will produce about 2.8 months of grazing dur-

ing the year. Coastal bermuda grass sprigs should be planted on a well prepared seedbed. As long as the sprigs are dormant, they can be planted one and a half to 2 inches deep and completely covered. 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
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
