A group of eighth grade girls started from Hico to Meridian Friday morning, but five miles on the other side of Iredell they decided to turn around and hike back to Hico. They covered 26 miles in all and each said they were throwing in the towel and letting heartier souls do the hiking from here on out.

McClinton Reports

Friday, March 9, was the final day for introducing bills. House members have, as of this date, introduced 970 bills, which they hope to get scheduled for public hearing. 760 bills have been read first time to committee by Speaker Byron Tunnell.

The House finally passed a bill that would increase the death and bodily injury liability a driver must assume under the Texas Safety Responsibility Law. Though the purchase of insurance is not compulsory under this law, it is surprising to note that about 65 percent of the state's drivers now have it.

Governor Connally presented his budget proposal to the Joint Session of the Senate and House of Representatives, Thursday, March 8. I am pleased that the Governor recommended appropriations for completion of the Screwworm Eradication Program, which is an urgent matter to all Texans. The Governor also recommended that 52 cents out of every dollar of the General Revenue Fund appropriation be budgeted for education.

IT'S THE LAW—

Division of Estates Explained By State Bar

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survive, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters and their descendants surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

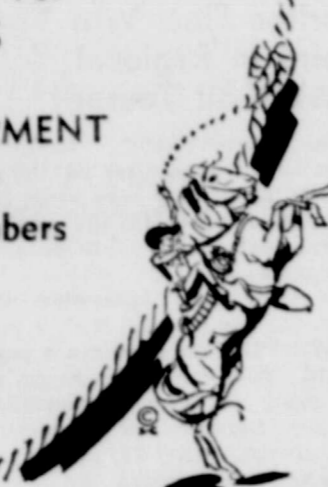

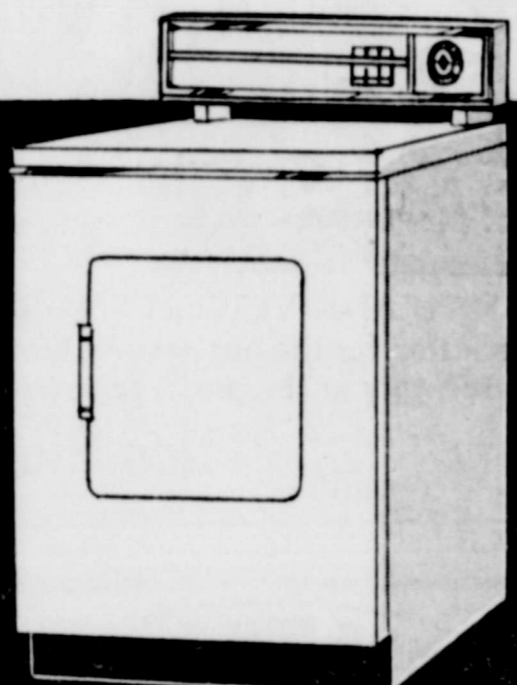

On the Home Range

This is the day of our second meeting of the Drapery Workshop, but I feel we would be missing a good opportunity if we passed this by and it ties in so beautifully with what we are learning. Are you a compulsive eater when it comes to peanuts? Few people can stop with just one or two. Don't let this worry you, for it's hard to find a more wholesome food. They are packed with a combination of protein, thiamine, phosphorus and niacin, and the fats necessary for a balanced diet.

Peanut production from the 1962 crop is estimated at 18 billion pounds, 68 million pounds above last year, and 274 million pounds above average. Of this total production, about one-third to one-half is used for peanut butter. Making peanut butter is a relatively simple process, however, why burden yourself with this chore when so many delicious brands are available at your grocers now?

Peanut butter variations include "chunky," in which bits of chopped peanuts are mixed with finely ground peanut butter; "homogenized" to which oil is added and the mixture processed to retard separation; "honey" to which honey is added to produce a different flavor; "yeasted" to which yeast is added to enrich its food value; and "fortified," to which vitamins are added to restore the vitamins lost in processing.

So, if you're looking for a good food to include in your everyday menus, because of its high nutritive value, taste appeal and attractive price, you'll find it hard to beat peanut butter. And what child is there that doesn't like peanut butter?

Vacationing? Vacation time is just around the corner, but plans for financing a trip should be underway now. You will be pleased to know that the American Automobile Association has lowered its estimate of how much it costs a couple for 300-miles a day of vacation travel by car. Earlier, the AAA had put the figure at \$40 a day, but it then received reports from many members saying you can get by for considerably less. So the new estimate, providing only for essentials, is \$29 a day. This allows \$10.50 for meals; \$9.50 for lodging; \$7 for gas and oil; \$2 tips and miscellaneous.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Legislators have received two proposals for spending the state's money during the two years starting September 1.

One came from Gov. John Connally, the other from the House Appropriations Committee.

Governor Connally's suggestions marked the first time a new governor had tried to work out a budget after taking office. In his message he dealt in detail with 19 of the major state departments. These are mainly the ones over which the Legislature has direct control.

Connally trimmed fat out of some agencies to provide new money for others. His stress came on higher education. Here he suggested \$14,000,000 worth of salary increases for faculty members and more research and library facilities, as a means of holding good professors and attracting new ones.

To finance his program, Connally suggested that the "temporary" corporation franchise surtax which has been extended twice before, be retained. It would provide about \$11,000,000 a year.

He also suggested that the 1961 sales tax law be revised to begin taxing clothing under \$10, farm implements and all sales of food by restaurants, and to raise the sales tax on cars and trucks from 1.5 to 2 percent.

Clothing tax proposal would bring in \$10,000,000 a year. Motor vehicle tax increase would provide \$2,500,000. Farm implements tax would run \$1,000,000.

Fire quickly developed from rural legislators over the proposed farm implements tax.

Both Connally and the House Appropriations Committee proposed expenditures totaling about \$3,100,000,000 during the coming two years.

Before Connally laid out his proposals to the Legislature, he invited Texas newspaper editors to

Austin to show them how the state's complicated fiscal structure works. His "illustrated lecture" revealed that the Legislature has actual control over only 15 percent of the \$3,100,000,000. Rest already is earmarked by constitutional and statutory provisions.

Will Farmers Foot Education Boost?

When Rep. Don Garrison of Houston spread before the House Revenue and Taxation committee his bill to boost the Available School Fund by \$3,000,000 a year, a spokesman for Texas farmers and ranchers registered a strong protest.

Garrison plans to get the additional \$3,000,000 by amending the state law that allows a 98 and one-half percent exemption refund from the State Motor Fuel Tax for gasoline not consumed on the highways. His bill would cut the refund to 73 and one-half percent. That 25 percent cut then would be credited to the school fund.

Charles H. Huff of the Texas Farm Bureau said almost half of the new school fund money—about \$1,500,000,000 a year—would be coming out of the pockets of farmers and ranchers.

They get motor fuel refunds of about \$5,700,000 a year—or 49.11 percent of the usual total refunded. Much of their refund comes from motor fuel taxes paid on farm machinery.

House Vacancy Election

As soon as government officials began recovering from the shock of the news of the sudden death of Rep. James L. Lattimore of Corpus Christi, they began studying the election code to see what must be done about filling the seat he left vacant in the House of Representatives.

Customarily, if a vacancy occurs in the legislature when it's not in session, the governor leaves the calling of a special election up to local officials.

But since the 58th Legislature will be in regular session until May 27, Gov. Connally is expected to move fast to provide Nueces County with a needed voice in legislation. A late April election date has been predicted.

Law states that the governor must call an election within 20 days. But it also provides that candidates must file 30 days before the election.

Last time a tragic death crippled the Legislature was on Mar. 23, 1937 when the late Charlie Heitman, representative from the Nacogdoches area, died.

Strong Support Screwworm Bill

Rep. Jack Crain of Nocona had 50 co-signers lined up when he introduced a bill to provide \$2,840,837 as the State's matching share of the \$12,000,000 federal-state-private screwworm eradication program.

Since it is backed by Governor Connally's strong recommendation the bill should be off to a good start.

But the House Appropriations Committee didn't include a provision for screwworm eradication in its 300-plus page appropriations bill.

Crain said Legislators would seek a separate appropriation to cover the proposed state contribution.

Blanket Hospital Bill

Last November, Texas voters decided to let the Legislature authorize the creation of hospital districts. Already many bills have been filed to create individual districts.

Now Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla proposes legislation to give every county the right to create a hospital district within its own boundaries.

License Plate Price Hike Asked

Sen. Criss Cole of Houston proposes to increase the annual motor vehicle registration fee by \$1 with the income going to our state parks.

If the Legislature approves Cole's license plate cost increase, the question will be submitted to voters at the general election of November, 1964.

have begun to hatch out. So those of you who have trees and shrubs you would like to protect might be watching them closely from now on.

As weather continues to warm up, these worms will be coming out in larger numbers. They are much easier to kill while they are young than when they get older and start moving about the place, from tree to tree.

DDT, Toxaphene, Methoxychlor, Malathion or Chlordane are all good insecticides that can be used to give control of the worms.

Now is just about the time to begin applying insecticides for the control of peach and plum insects. When the buds are showing pink, the first application should be made for the control of peach twig borer—3 lbs. of 50 percent wettable DDT powder to 100 gallons of

water. When 75 percent of the petals have fallen make the second application for the control of stink and lygus bugs and also the twig borer—half pound of wettable dieldren plus 3 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT in 100 gallons water, or one and a quarter lbs. of 25 percent wettable parathion. Ten days after this application has been made, another one should be made and this is an important one, for the control of the plum curculio. This is the insect that causes much trouble in peaches and plums.

Use one of the materials just mentioned above. Repeat again in 14 to 21 days with the same material.

And spring can't be far behind. Mother nature has started her green-up and rough winter will soon be history. Why not, asks the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, set aside whatever time is needed for the spring cleanup job?

Farm people everywhere can make their farms and homes safer and more pleasant by cleaning up and disposing of the winter's

collection of trash and debris, points out the Council, and the time to do it is before the spring rush of farm work begins.

Spring Cleanup Week is a nationally promoted safety effort. Its purpose, according to the Council, is to encourage community action for the removal of hazards which endanger life, property and health. Farm families lose about 800 lives and \$163 million worth of property annually through fires. About 11,300 farm residents are killed in accidents and another 800,000 injured.

A general cleanup of homes and farms will remove many fire and accident hazards, emphasizes the safety group. More than 22 percent of all farm accidents occur in the home; 19.5 percent in the barns and other buildings; 19.2 percent in traffic and 18 percent in fields, and even though the farm population is declining, the rate of fatal accidents per 100,000 persons is increasing, points out the Council. They are strong in their belief that accidents can be prevented and that good housekeeping around the farmstead and in the home and the practicing of

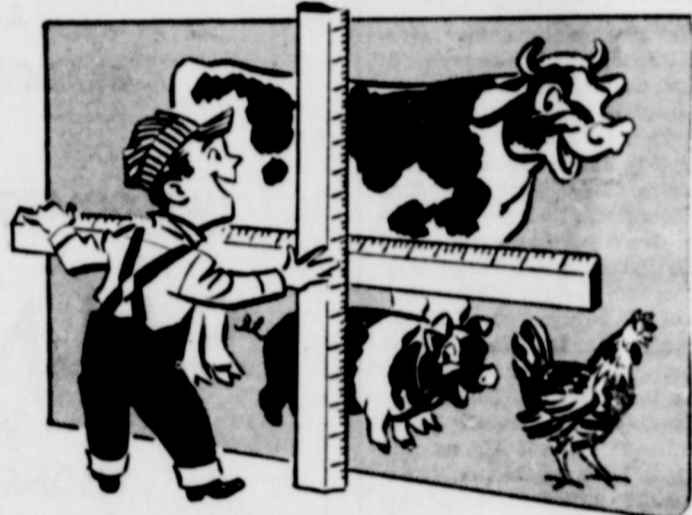

Game Warden Reports

By BOB RHODY

Joe Stevens has given me some information to pass on about the quail program we were in this year. If you recall, we weighed and collected some quail wings in an effort to further our study on Bobwhites. This five-year program includes Bosque, Hill and Johnson counties.

In these three counties we weighed a total of 733 birds and collected 722 wings. After determining the age of the birds we found that 69.7 percent of them were juveniles or birds that were hatched off last summer. And of these, 95.48 percent were hatched off before July 15 of last year. You may be wondering how we are able to determine the age. This is done by the primary feathers of the wings.

We also found that the 13 percent population increase we had last summer over the summer before did not show up during the season. We don't know at this time what happened to these. But we think in some areas there could have been a die-off due to a disease. Which at this point I would like to ask that each of you who raise birds, please don't turn loose any quail you might think has disease. This bird will not get well as you might think, but is sure to spread the disease in the native stock.

Since this was the first year of a five-year program I would like to thank both landowners and sportsmen for their fine cooperation. And would like to ask that you continue this support for the remainder of this program.

In checking my record I have found that some of the folks who were issued doe or antlerless deer permits have failed to turn them in. These were to have been turned in no later than March 15, so please check and see if you have forgotten to turn yours in. They must be returned to me.

These warm spring days are sure to bring on the fishing fever. So please be extra careful while fishing or boating, and prevent an accident if at all possible.
