CUTTING THE BUDGET Among the most popular top-ics for discussion today are the budget, the tax cut, and their possible effects on each other. On the face of it, every wage earner is, of course, in favor of any measure which will lighten the tax load he is carrying. A tax cut which is based on deficit financing, however, will not really benefit the individual tax payer. Such economics will only cause a further spiral in the cost of consumer items, as well as the cost of maintaining our government and servicing our national debt.

The President recently acknowledged that it was good for he country for those opposed to his plans to voice their opinions, but he added that they should be ready to offer some concrete suggestions as to how to accomplisn a tax cut without putting the government further in debt.

The response was almost immediate. The Council of State Chambers of Commerce advanced a detailed plan for effecting tax relief through the curtailment of much of the unnecessary spending. Their plan provides for reductions in spending of some \$9.8 billion. In-cluded are the following areas where economies can be effected: (1) foreign aid; (2) federal aid education; (3) urban mass transportation; (4) school grants and scholarships; (5) the national "service corps"; and several others. All but the pro-posed slash in foreign aid are in the category of peacetime domestic appropriations and have no connection with national de-Icns Senator Willis Robertson of Virginia, describing himself as a loyal Democrat responding to the Fresident's complaint that critics of his program do not offer specific suggestions, has also made suggestions along these lines. His proposals would cut about \$6 billion from the budget. In defense of a proposed cut of \$1.2 billion in planned spending for federal aid to edu cation, Robertson said such spending would "plunge the government ever more deeply into financing public school and college construction, teacher's salaries, etc.



Another proposal made by Robertson calls for chopping \$350 million from the area redevelopment program. The gov-ernment would use this money, he said, to insert itself "into still another area of local activity.

The spirit of offering specific advice on control of the budget has extended to testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee, now studying the President's tax proposals. Appearing before the commit-

tee are some of the best tax minds in the nation. The first such witness was Roswell Magill who was undersecretary of the Treasury in Franklin Roose-velt's cabinet. He strongly criticized the President's tax program on the grounds that it does not provide the investment incentive needed; the changes in tax rates defeat the proposed cuts; the budget is further imbalanced through lack of expenditure control.

Mr. Magill offered a constructive alternative program. (1) lower individual tax rates to 50% in the highest brackets and 16% in the lowest; (2) let corporate taxes drop to 47%; (3) consider tax reforms as a separate item; (4) lower federal spending and

balance the budget. These are specifics. The stand-ards of ethics of the American people should dictate that we can not morally go on spending money that we do not have. We should all give our Congressmen the benefit of our thoughts on this vital subject.


