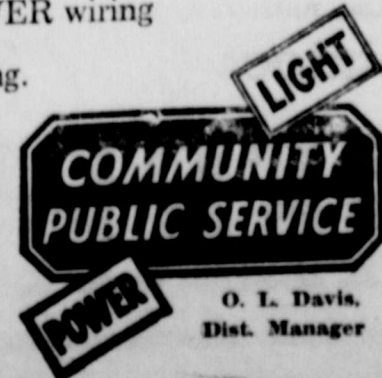

#### GOOD NUTRITION BEGINS AT HOME

Mothers who—without any fuss or comment—serve their families a good breakfast each morning are forming good food habits their children are not likely to forget. There is no need to tell your children to "eat a good breakfast." Instead, serve them one.

Make fruit or juices a regular part of their menu along with milk. Add breakfast favorites such as cereal, toast, bacon, EGGS, or other foods they like. Instant food products such as frozen juice concentrates, instant cereals and pancake mixes can be quickly prepared so that breakfast can be on the table in minutes.

After a while, a good breakfast will become a habit. And when your youngsters grow older and go out on their own, they're apt to keep right on eating a well-balanced breakfast.

#### FASHION ARITHMETIC

Good fashion is sometimes a matter of simple arithmetic. After you've put yourself together simply count up the basic parts that make up your costume. Remember that each piece of jewelry counts one a plain accessory counts one. But allow two points for a flowered dress or a bold plaid suit. Plain shoes get one point, elaborate shoes count for two. A simple rule of thumb is that

#### NEED A NEW MATTRESS?

If your present mattress is between 10 and 15 years old, it's probably time for a new one. Check for broken stitching, depressions and lumps, and sagging borders. Infants and children need the best bedding you can buy. A mattress should be 6 to 8 inches longer than the person who uses it. A growing interest has developed in longer and wider sleeping equipment. Supersize bedding and mattresses, 78 inches wide compared with the average 54 inches wide, can now be found in most stores and in many standard brands.

A must for the homemaker who wants to protect mattresses against soil is a cotton mattress pad.

Check to see that the mattress pad has been preshrunk, as they should be laundered periodically.

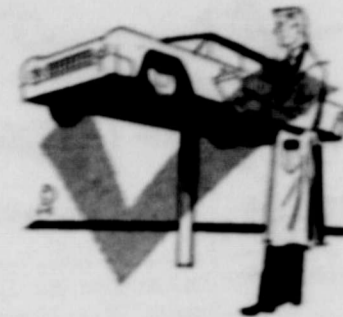

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Ernest McCoy, a cooperator with Hamilton-Coyell MCD in the Fairy community, has learned from experience that commercial fertilizer is a paying proposition.

Since bacteria that decompose the residue feeds on nitrogen, it is important to have adequate nitrogen in the soil for the bacteria to feed on as well as some left over for the next crop.

Nitrogen, phosphate, and potash must be in the soil in adequate amount to produce maximum yields; otherwise, the future crop is limited to the amount of the lowest element.

J. C. Prater, Hico barber, has a conservation program set up for his garden. Dead grass clippings are used as a residue to improve the soil and help hold the moisture by reducing evaporation.
