Funeral Services Held For G. O. Ferguson, Pioneer Educator

Funeral services for George Oliver Ferguson, pioneer Texas college educator and former Associate Dean of Tarleton State College, were held Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 in Stephenville First Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. Morgan Garrettt of Cleburne. Mr. Ferguson was a brother-in-law of Mrs. H. H. Ramage of Hico.

Mr. Ferguson was found dead about 10 p.m. Monday on the porch of his ranch house near Chaik Mountain. He had gone to the ranch about 8 a.m. from his Stephenville home, and his wife and a neighbor became alarmed when he had not returned Monday night. They went to the ranch and found his body.

Peace Justice F. D. Hicks had not returned a verdict Tuesday but said Ferguson apparently died Monday afternoon of a heart attack.

Ferguson went to Tarleton in 1913 when it was John Tarleton College. He was a teacher of history and modern languages.

Mr. Ferguson remained associate dean until 1945 when he was on modified service as professor and head of the division of Arts and Sciences. He retired in 1950 after 27 years service.

Mr. Ferguson was married to Nona Laney in 1914 and they were the parents of two sons and a daughter, all of whom survive.

After the Civil War they came in a prairie schooner to Texas, settled in Erath County near Duffau, where she went to school and grew to young womanhood. Later she was a member of the first graduation class of Hico High School.

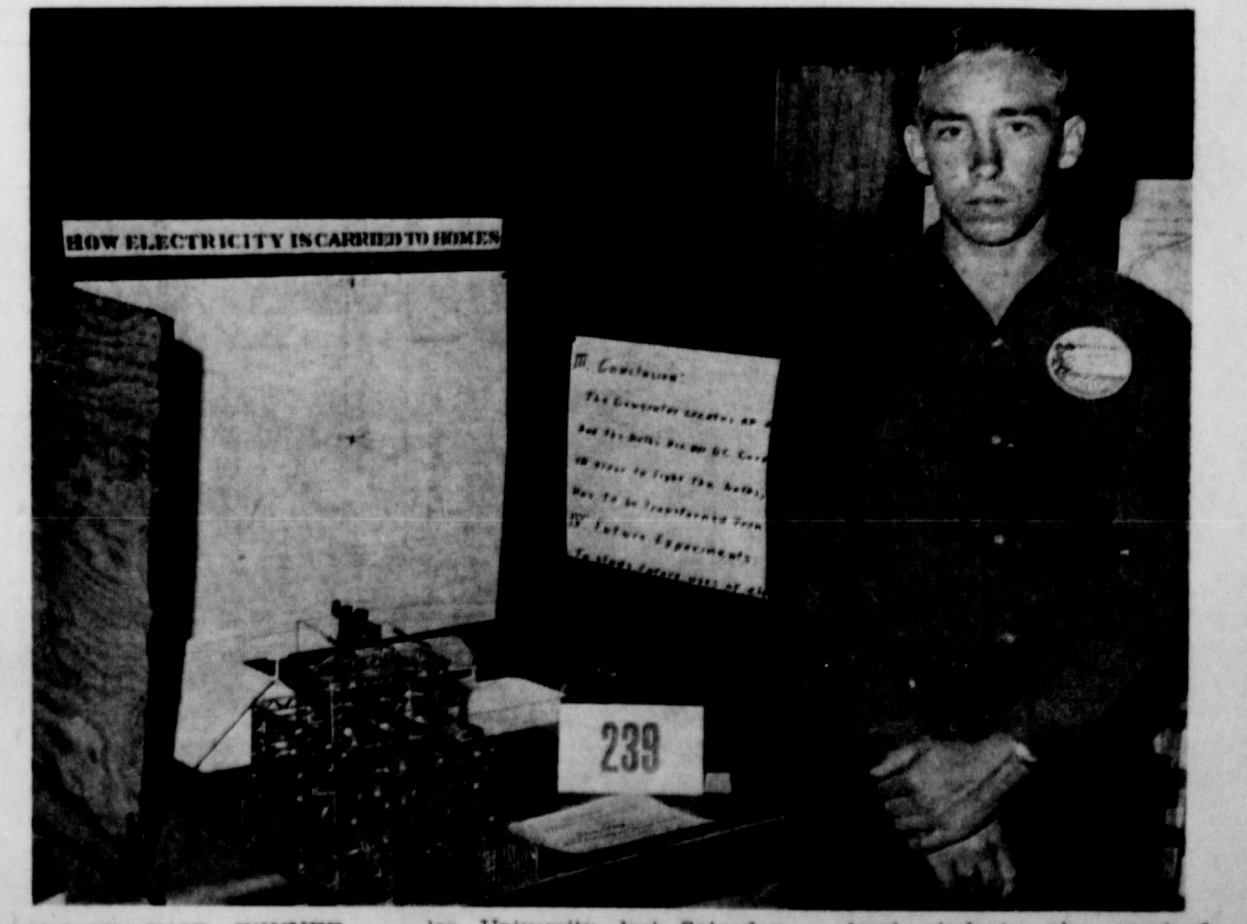
Fire Truck Fund Still \$1,000 Short

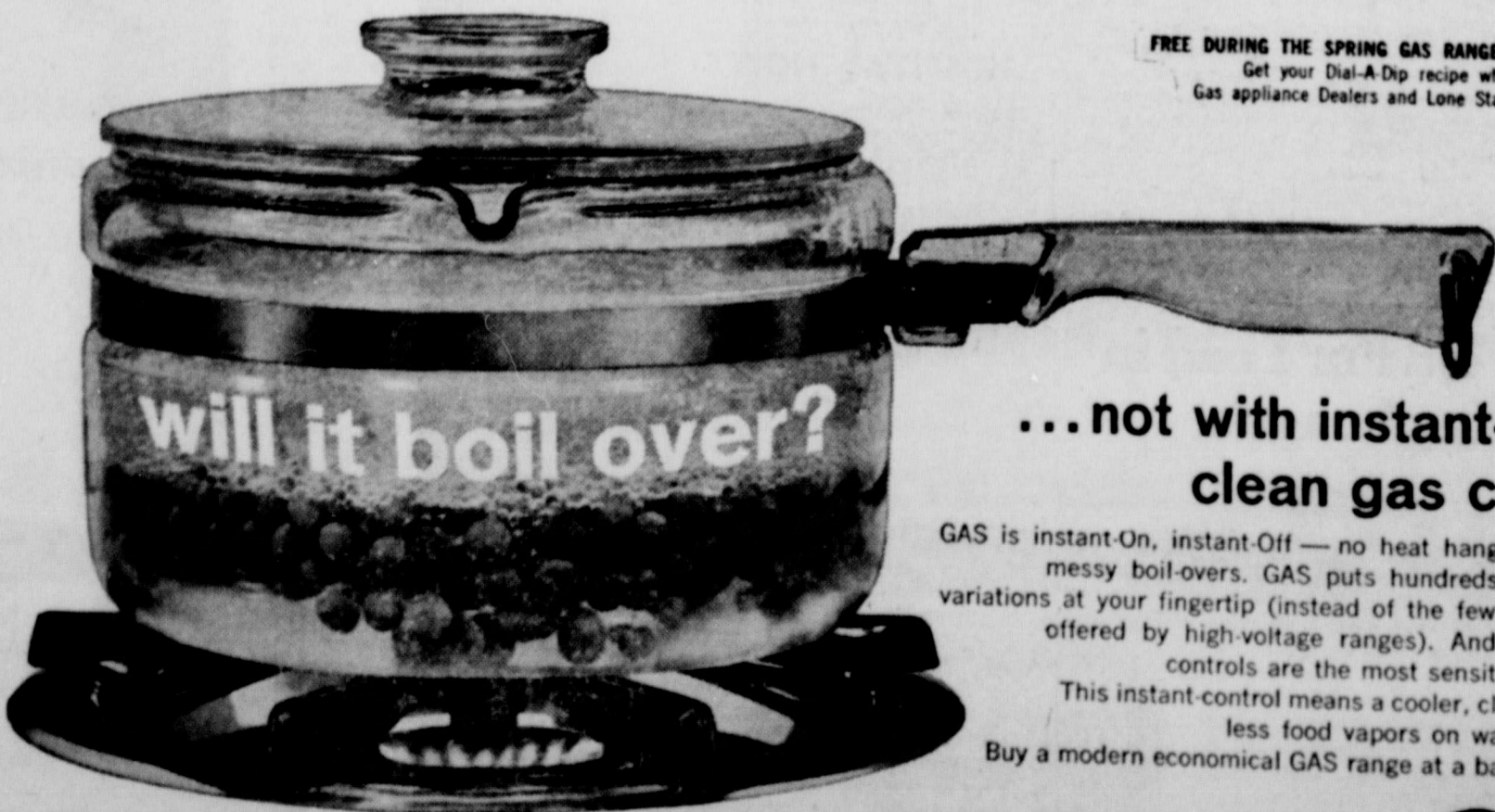

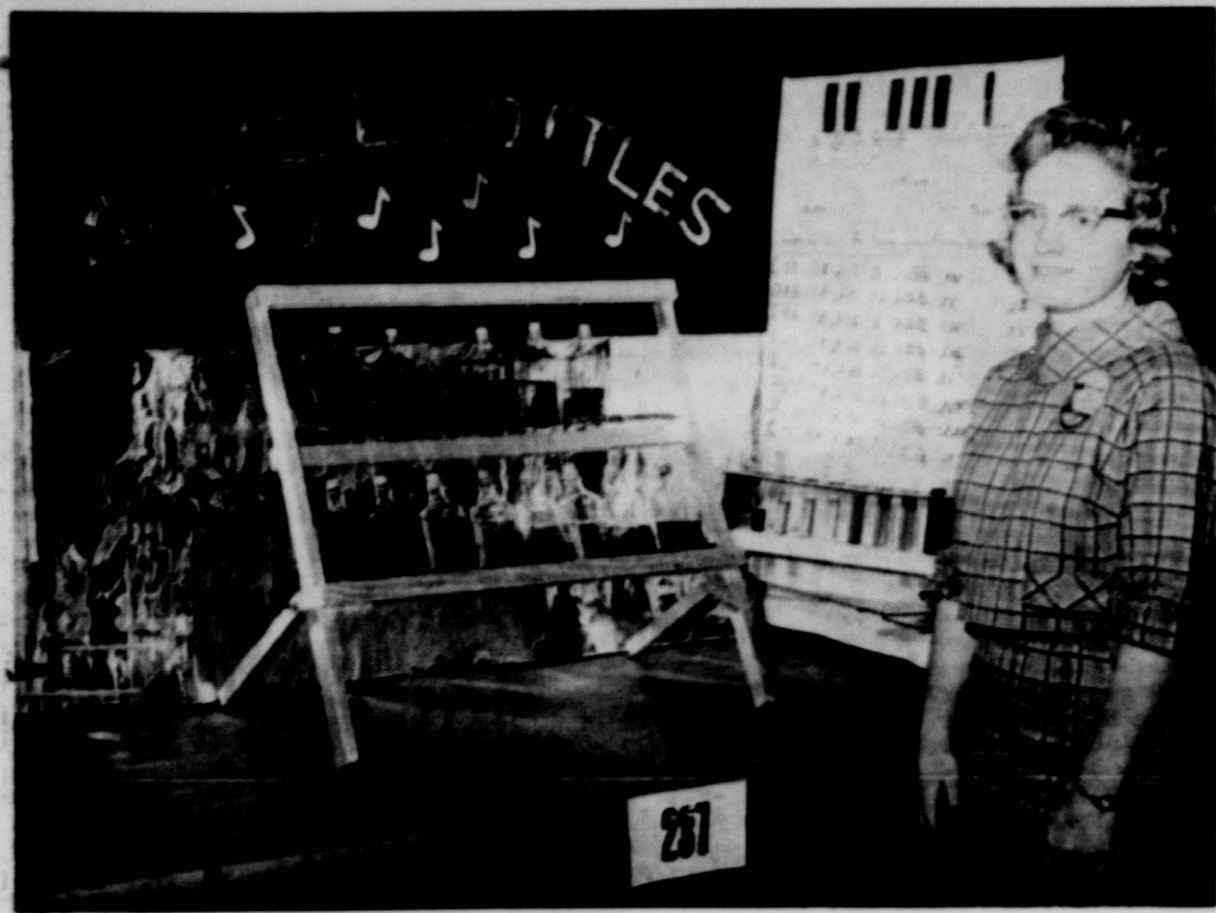

Local Students Cop Awards in Annual Baylor Science Fair

The winning projects from the chemistry class which had been exhibited during Public School Week, were taken to the Second Annual Science Fair at Baylor University in Waco last Saturday.

Harry Brown and Ruth Ann Martin had tied for first place at Hico with a ripple tank and some musical bottles. Eliene Gannaway had won second place with a study of the ocean, and Jerry Casey won third with a display of how electricity is taken to a home. These students continued work on their projects for the Science Fair.

On Friday morning, Mr. Chester Martin accompanied Harry and Ruth Ann, with the four projects, to Waco, and Eliene and Jerry went to Waco Saturday.

The following is an account of their experiences at the Fair.

We obtained our booth number and personal identification at the Fair office. We then set up our exhibits and had each inspected and a picture taken of each. Everything was going fine until Harry's ripple tank started leaking. We tried everything from chewing gum to glue, but finally the great scientific solution was found in my fingernail polish. It's a good thing we had gone prepared! Then no student was allowed on the fair floor after 5:30 for then the judges were examining the projects. At 8:30 each student was to go to his exhibit and be interviewed by the judges until 9:30. You'd be surprised at the different attitudes and appearance of some of the judges. We got back to Hico at 11:30 that night.

The next mornin Eliene and

Jerry joined Harry and me on the trip back to Waco. When we first arrived we went to the track field where Jerry had to spend half the day. We were to stand by our exhibits every other hour to demonstrate to the public and press. After 4:30 we were free to view the campus, play pool, watch TV, or laugh at the antics of the Baylor mascots, the bears. At 7:00 everybody met in the Fair Building for the final results. Eliene and I were afraid the boys would not be there to get their awards, but our fears were dissolved when we saw Jerry's red shirt at the far end of the building. The presentation of awards began and it seemed that hundreds had been given out before the judges called out a Hico student's name.

Jerry was the first to get an award. Harry was sitting by him and said Jerry was stunned for the first few seconds, but then jumped up and went down to get his Baylor ROTC Award for applied physics. A few minutes later Jerry was called again for the Central Texas Chapter, Texas Society of Professional Engineers Award.

Later, to my astonishment, I heard my name called. I received second in my division for Physics. The next thing we knew Harry was walking down to the stand to get his third place award in Pure Physics.

Since there were 246 entries, most of which were from larger schools, we were surprised that we even got mentioned in the group who received awards.

The two projects which will enter national competition were "The

Electric Eel in War and Peace" by Stephen Tuttle from Temple, and "Comparative Evolution of the Toxicity of Conventional Anesthetics Agents" by Bobby Fauvelle of Corsicana.

We were so proud of our winnings that we decided to make a detour on our way home to tell Mrs. Brummett of success. Mrs. Brummett is our science teacher and deserves thanks for her support as we worked on our projects.

The program, "History and Origin of Hymns" was given by Mrs. Cyrus King. Mrs. Lucille Sikes and Mrs. Lem Weeks.

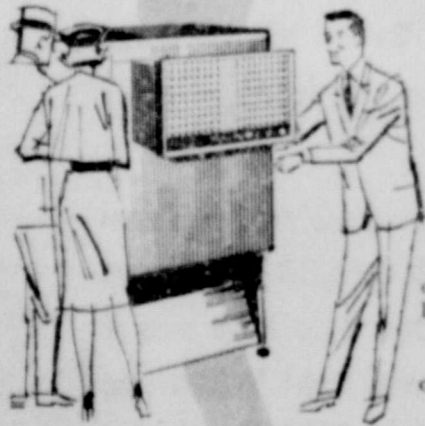

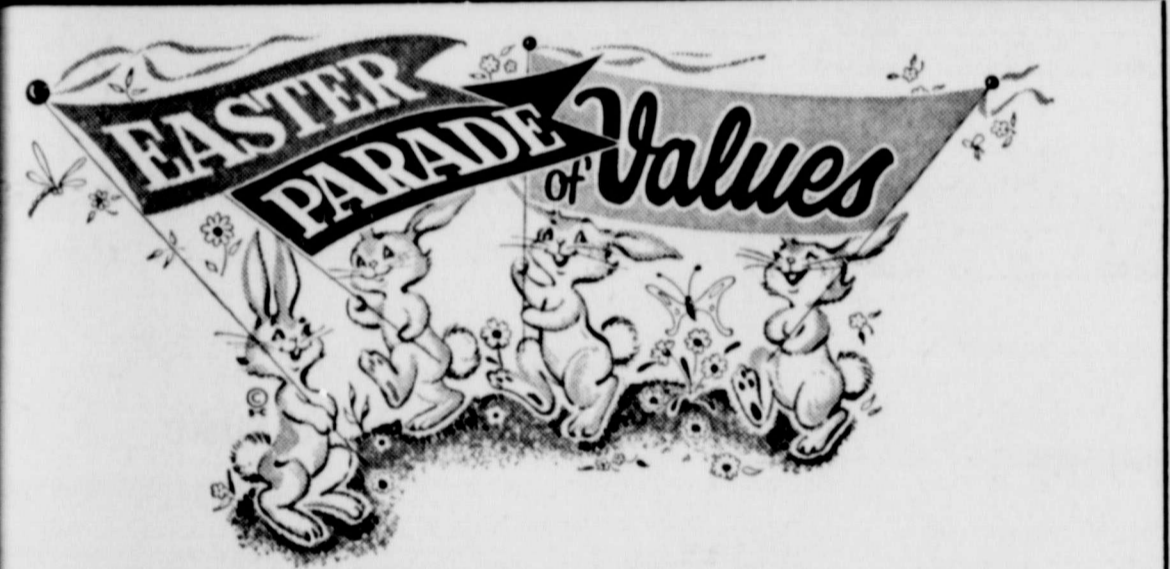
