BALANCE OF PAYMENTS One of the terms heard and read most frequently these days is "balance of payments." It oceurs in discussions of tax cuts, foreign aid, the Common Market, defense spending, and many other fiscal matters.

What, exactly, is meant by the term "balance of payments?" is the relationship between the total amount of money and goods exported from this country and the total amount of money and goods imported into this country. The outgo is made up of goods and services, foreign aid, military expenditures abroad (including the cost of keeping troops on foreign soil), tourist spending, etc. Receipts consist of payments from abroad for American goods, income from foreign investments, expenditures by foreign tourists in the United States, and repayment of loans by businesses or gov-

Except for the year 1957, we have had a deficit in our balance of payments in every year since 1951. Last year this deficit was \$2.2 billion. This means that we lost an additional \$2.2 billion of our gold reserve. This reserve has dwindled from \$24.6 billion in 1946 to \$15.9 billion today. Of this amount, we are required by law to hold in reserve some \$11.5 billion to back our cur-rency. If all the foreign banks demanded gold for the dollars they have accumulated through our imbalance of payments, the United States would not have enough gold to exchange for their dollars. This is a most serious problem because, if it con-tinues much longer, all of our reserve gold will be gone. If the ollar were no longer supported by gold the world would lose confidence in its value. In this event, faced with a decline in the real value of the dollar, producers of goods would increase their prices to offset the loss. The net result would be runaway inflation. This is the sure road to financial ruin. While it is not likely that the foreign banks would demand gold for their dollars, such a situation could occur if a decline in the real value of the dollar should cause

Contrary to popular belief, the imbalance of payments has not been brought about by an im-balance in the value of our exports. The United States exports much more in goods than it imports each year. Exports ex-ceeded imports by \$4.4 billion in 1962. To the contrary, the deficit in our balance of payments in recent years has been caused by heavy military spending abroad, foreign aid programs all over the world, overseas investments by American business, and short-term capital investments.

While it is obvious that some of the expenditures being made abroad must be maintained, it is equally obvious that we must, for the sake of our financial solcurtail much of the spending of the product of the free enterprise system to bolster every government that puts in an apearance anywhere in the world. At the same time we must take immediate steps to improve the business climate at home so that American businessmen will find it more profitable to invest their risk capital in the continued growth and expansion of Amer can industry rather than send

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

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
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
