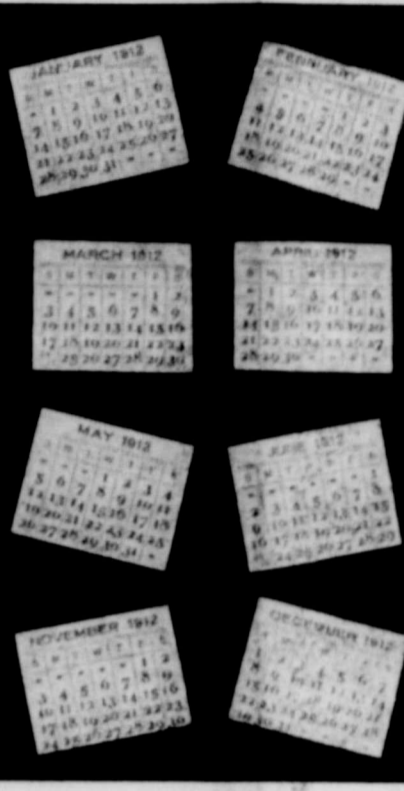
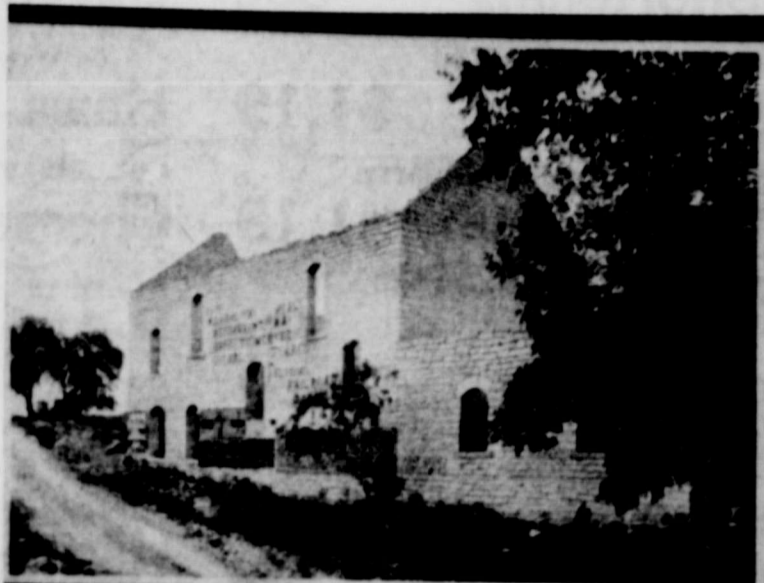

THE OLD MILL NEAR HICO

Success of the second phase of the Sabin Oral Sundays depends on the citizenship of Hico in this area. For to be effective, to carry out the program as was intended, 99 percent of the people here need to take the serum.

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## Second Round SOS May 26; More Than 600 Receives Type II Last Sunday

Sunday, May 26, Hico residents will be given a second chance to further the program to completely wipe out the dreaded disease—polio.

And if local and area residents feel any sense of responsibility toward their fellow citizens, they will take the painless, non-time consuming lump of sugar with the miracle vaccine which could prevent a major epidemic.

Six hundred people took the Type II Vaccine being offered during this program last Sunday, and Dr. B. C. Dayton in charge of the local program, administered another 60 doses at the school Tuesday. More than 3400 people took Type I vaccine when it was offered here last August.

Type II and Type III were to be offered in successive six-week periods, but an outbreak of polio in an area in Canada created such unfavorable publicity that the program was temporarily halted.

Since that time, the vaccine manufactured in the United States has been completely freed from any blame for the outbreak, and has been declared safe in every way.

In urging local people to take advantage of the opportunity of receiving the vaccine, Dr. B. C. Dayton said that to be effective in an area, the vaccine must be taken by nearly every citizen, regardless of age. He commented further that "If there was any doubt in my mind about the safety of the vaccine, I certainly would not jeopardize my own family, nor my career in endorsing the program. The program is endorsed by the Tri-County Medical Society, and by the American Medical Association."

The local physician further said that people who have previously received the Salk injection-type serum should also take the Sabin serum. Salk vaccine gives only an 85 percent immunity to the disease.

Hours that the program will be carried out this Sunday are the same as last—from 12 noon until 7 p.m. Hico School Cafeteria is the site and the vaccine is free. Only a token contribution may be given if people so desire, but even that is not necessary. Hico Civic Club is sponsoring the program in cooperation with Tri-County Medical Society.

The church has approximately 28 pastors since its founding. There were 28 charter members. The original building was erected at a cost of \$3,500.00.

Currently First Baptist has 515 members on roll; 372 of these are resident members. The historical committee is comprised of Mr. J. P. Rodgers Jr., Miss Mettie Rodgers, and Miss Thoma Rodgers.

Friends in the community and former members will be officially welcomed at the 11 a.m. service. At this time members of long standing will receive special recognition.

The morning message will be brought by Dr. W. L. Hendricks, who is serving the church as interim pastor.

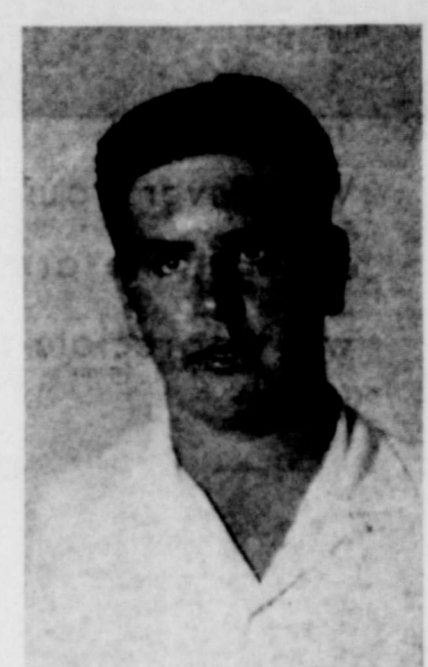

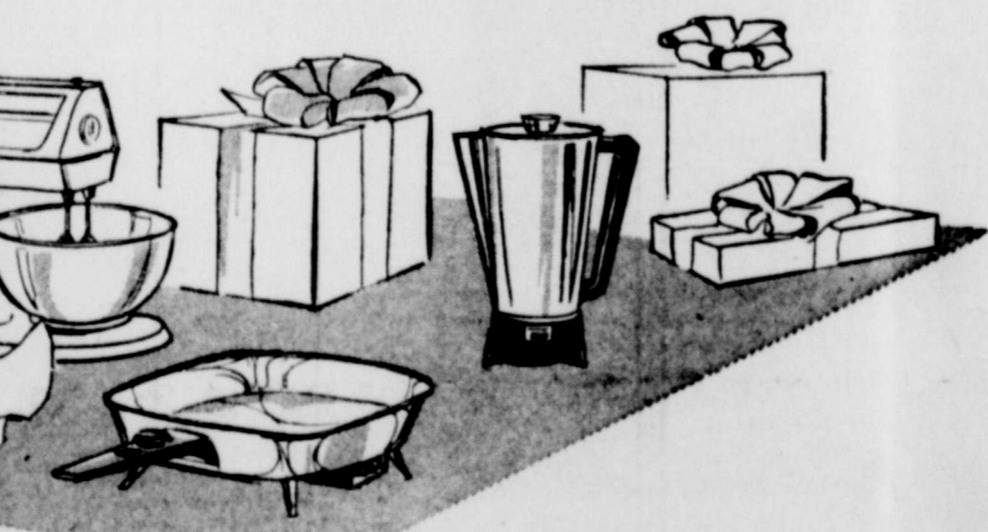
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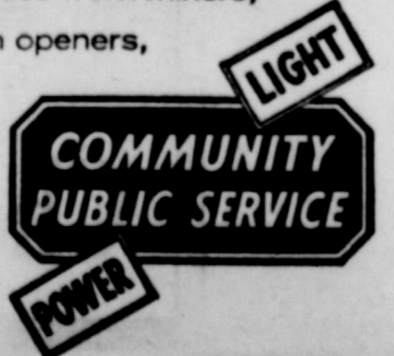

### On the Home Range

If you are a hiking enthusiast, or have children who are you know that walking sharpens the appetite. Yet no one wants to be burdened down with a large pack of food and equipment. For your next hike, plan to have pocket stew. The name—pocket stew—is self-explanatory. Simply assign each hiker to bring an item for the stew. Each individual can package the items to carry in a

pocket or two. Even the meat can be tucked into an insulated bag for easy and safe toting on the hike.

Of course, the hiker who gets the assignment to carry the stew kettle can scarcely pocket this. That can be the out-of-pocket contribution for the day.

When the hikers reach the designated spot they empty the food items from their pokes, and the

cooks get busy with the preparation of the stew. The remainder of the group can play games, bird watch or search for wildflowers.

Have you considered adding variety to your menus by including lamb dishes? This is a very nutritious meat and can be fixed in a number of ways. I have several new recipes from the American Lamb Council which offer a number of suggestions for its use. Call or come by for the recipes.

It's the time of year to bring out the fans. For their best efficiency, fan blades need to be cleaned. In this respect, kitchen exhaust fans take special care. Their chief purpose is to draw heat from cooking to the outside. During frying, broiling or roasting, the air around the range contains much grease—a great deal of this grease clings to the fan blades or to a mesh installed to collect this grease. Either way it is important to take the equipment apart and clean thoroughly. Be sure to save the directions for taking apart and putting together again. Your kitchen will be much cooler if you clean this exhaust fan regularly.

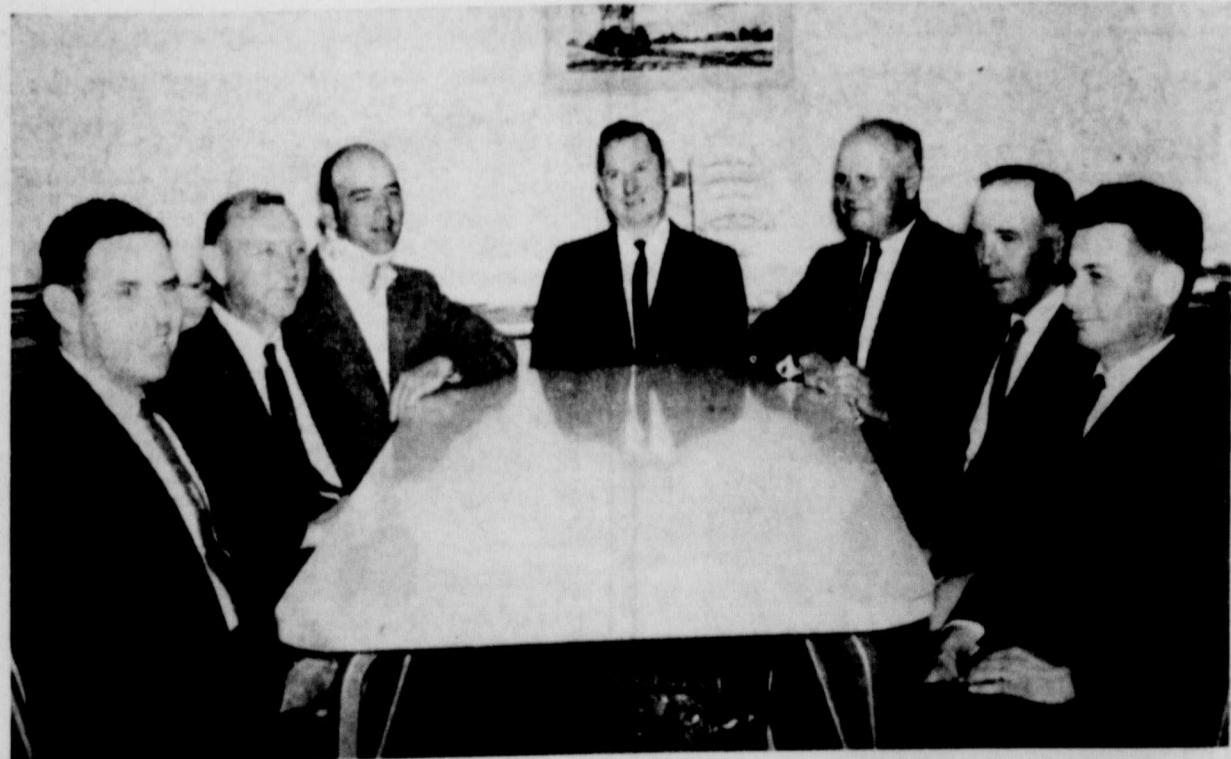

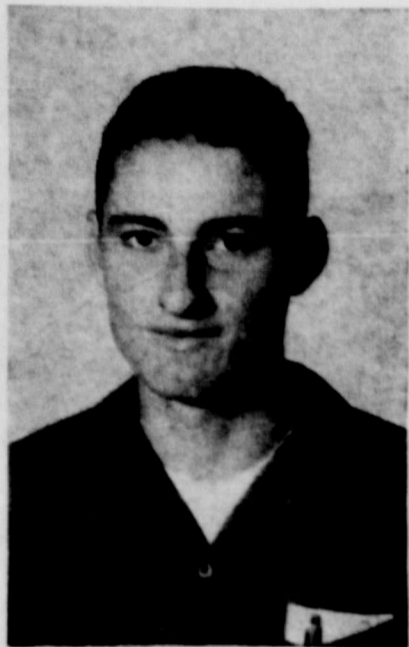

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By this time last May, there had been several confirmed cases of screwworms in the county. So far this year there have not been any.

Dr. C. B. Cathey, chairman of the screwworm program in the county says that stockmen should be more alert for cases from now on than in the past. He urges stockmen to make inspections of their herds several times a week and make a report of each case they find. Also to be sure and fill out the sheet that goes in with the worm sample when it is sent to the Mission laboratory.

It seems that in the state some people have sent in worm samples but they have forgotten to fill out the questionnaire. This gives the name and location to the stockman making the report.

With pasture conditions as they are, stockmen might want to consider making an attempt to balance livestock numbers with the available forage supply. Calves may be weaned earlier to help relieve grazing pasture and improve cow conditions. Fewer replacement cattle should be kept and culling is always in order. Non-breeders slow breeders, irregular breeders and cows which consistently produce lower grade, light weight calves should be marketed.
