Completion of the project to erect a monument and medallion in commemoration to pioneer settlers in this area was assured this week after Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Taylor graciously offered the use of sufficient land on their ranch which to place the edifice.

The Taylors, on whose place Old Hico was located, also donated sufficient rock from the old mill at original townsite with which to build the monument. Other funds totaling \$133.75 have been raised, plus a portion of the charges by Leland Johnson, Leonard Weaver, Les Hamilton of the State Highway Department, and Fred Rainwater, Commissioner of Precinct 3, have pledged their cooperation, and the only thing that we can see lacking at present is about \$125 in additional funds.

The project won't be merely a monument of rock with attached medallion, but will be a place where visitors can pull off the road, look at the history, and visualize the life of yesterday.

The site is one of four recommended by the county organization for state-wide recognition. It will be included on future state maps and travel guides as a tourist attraction, and is a project worthy of everyone's consideration. A contribution, regardless of how small, would be welcomed.

350 Receive Type Two Polio Vaccine

Approximately 1350 local and out-of-town people took advantage of the type II polio vaccine program offered here the last two Sundays. Although the number was far below that of the first offering here, E. C. Dayton was pleased with the response. To be effective at least 70 percent of the population should receive the vaccine and the doctor estimated that around 75 percent took it here.

Reason for the decline was that area towns had already offered the vaccine.

Type III vaccine will be administered here at a date to be announced later.

Old Hico Foundation, organized in cooperation with State and County Historical societies to erect a monument in commemoration to the original townsite of Hico, received a grant this week which will enable leaders in the movement to continue plans on the project.

Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Taylor, on whose place the original townsite is located have donated the use of sufficient land near Honey Creek to erect the monument and medallion.

With the cooperation of the Highway Department and Precinct 3 Commissioner Fred Rainwater, work is expected to be started shortly on setting the fence back, grading and leveling off the tract. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor have also donated rock from the old mill with which to build the monument.

Miss Mettie Rodgers, member of the county historical society, said this week that \$133.75 had been pledged to the fund, which is approximately half of the needed amount. Several descendants of pioneer residents of Old Hico who now reside away from here have sent in contributions.

Approximately \$275.00 is needed to complete the project, and leaders are optimistic of receiving this amount shortly. As soon as sufficient funds are deposited to insure completion of the program, application will be made for the State Medallion.

Persons desiring to contribute to the fund may do so by depositing any amount—large or small—to Old Hico Foundation, First National Bank.

NEWS REVIEW SUBSCRIPTION RATES TO ADVANCE

The News Review is regretfully announcing an increase in subscription rates this week, to go into effect Monday, June 17.

The increase became necessary due to continued increases in publication costs and postage.

New rates will be as follows:

Hamilton, Erath and Bosque counties, \$2.55 per year.

Outside those three counties, \$3.06 per year.

Out of state, \$3.50 per year.

Last increase in subscription prices was seven years ago, and only two increases have been made in the last 23 years. While the management has made every effort to keep rates as low as possible, prices of paper, ink, and postage have continued upward until the increase was made necessary.

Advance notice of the increase is being given so that subscribers may take advantage of the old rates between now and June 17.

The original charter read as follows:

The Baptist Church of the town of Hico in the County of Hamilton and State of Texas by a vote of the majority of its members having consented to become a body corporate and having elected J. V. Rodgers, R. E. Langston and W. J. Keeling as directors is hereby constituted a Body Corporate under the name and style of Hico Baptist Church.

This Corporation is formed for the purpose of managing the secular affairs of said church in support of the worship of God, according to the teaching of the Bible, of procuring and holding such land as may be necessary for a church building or other edifice for the use of its members in their church capacity and of their pastor or Bishop and of erecting and

maintaining such edifice, and of performing any and all secular business connected with these objects.

This corporation shall continue and have succession for the term of 50 years.

Its board of directors shall be three in number and J. P. Rodgers, R. E. Langston and W. J. Keeling shall be its directors for the first year.

Its property consists of a lot or parcel of land in the town of Hico of the estimated value of \$75, of building material of the estimated value of \$150, and of money

The Hico Baptist Church was organized on Nov. 26, 1881, under a brush arbor at the present site on cool day when "the sunshine was more pleasant than the shade."

The Reverend Mr. J. P. Grammer, L. R. Scruggs and Deacon Miller, according to Dr. D. D. Tidwell, directed the 28 charter members in the formation of the church.

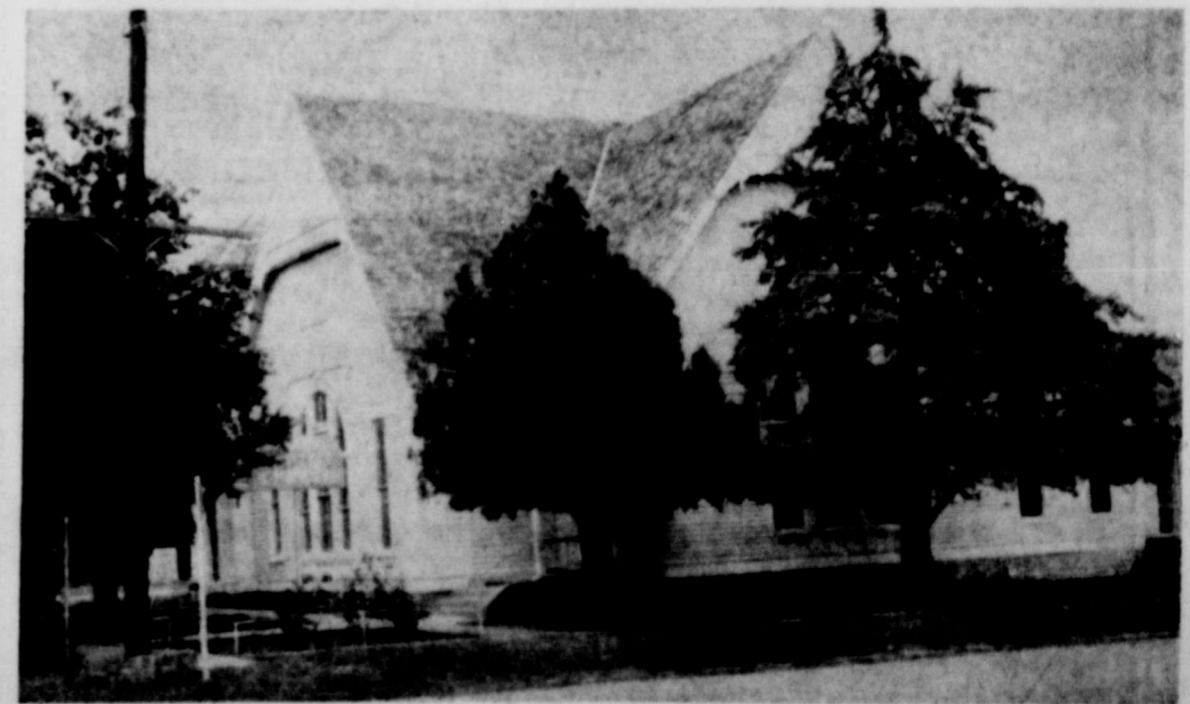
Most of these members were from Mt. Zion Baptist Church of Old Hico, which had been organized in 1861. The Baptist people shared with the Methodists on Sundays the use of the school building, one denomination using it in the morning and the other in the afternoon. A meeting house was begun in 1884; but before the windows were in place, a storm blew it down in June, 1885.

While I am not personally acquainted with you, I am acquainted with your paper. As a boy attending school in Hico, worked evenings, Saturdays and vacation periods with the then "Hico Review". In other words I was the "Devil" in the shop and before I left I could set five galleys of 10 point leaded type in a day. We purchased the patent sheets from the Western Newspaper Union in Dallas, folding them by hand. The part of the paper printed in Hico was on a Chandler & Price job press, as well as I remember it was a five column paper. The editor was Geo. Water Powers and a good man. The Hico News was printed on a Carlton "Wagon bed press" which you could hear as far as the City Park. Later the two papers merged and became the Hico News Review. Am sure some of the terms above would be new to you, as the period mentioned was between 1902 and 1906.

I enjoy the paper each week and every once in a while I see names of people I knew there and sometimes names of old school mates.

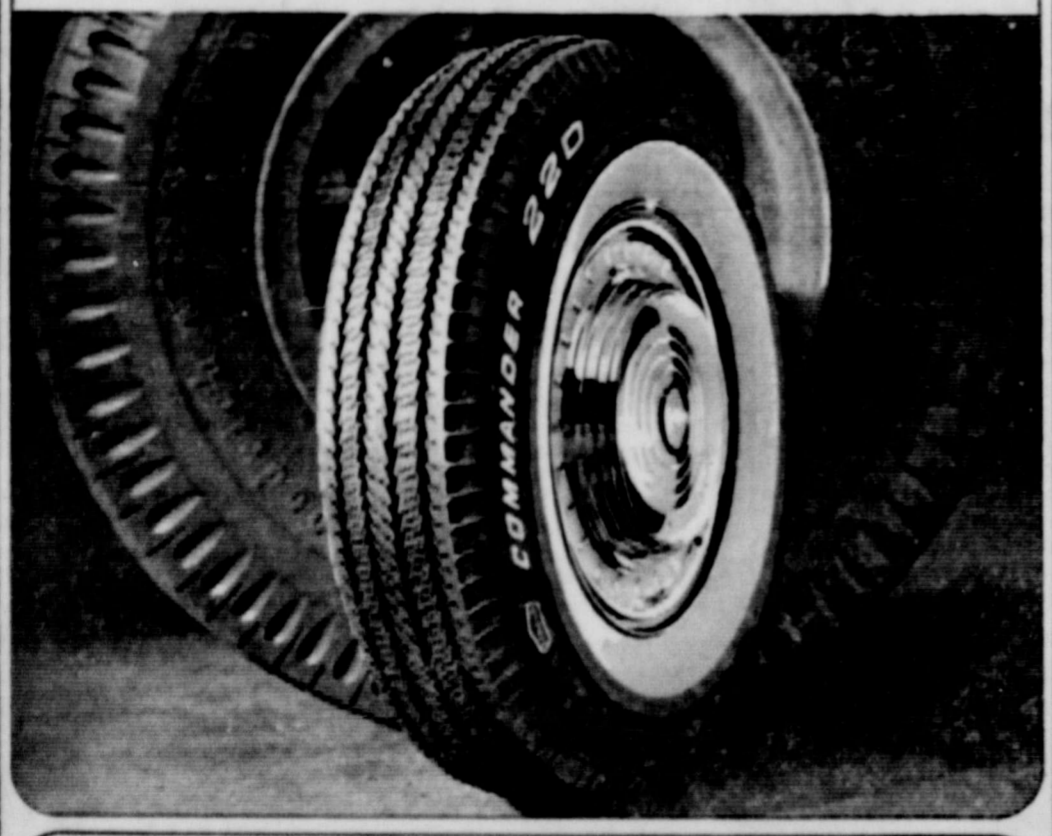

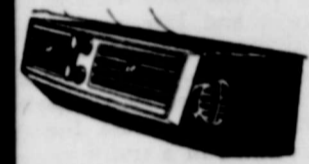

WASHINGTON

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—In 1962 the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives conducted hearings in connection with alleged abuses by corporations in deducting expenses for income tax purposes.

It was developed that some large businesses maintained summer resorts, yachts, and even deducted expenses for big game hunts in Africa for the pleasure of officers and members of boards of directors.

As a result, the Congress passed a law giving the Internal Revenue Service power to close these loopholes by regulations.

There was widespread complaint and publicity on the apparent abuses. Stockholders in some of the corporations named demanded that action be taken.

It is not possible to spell out every detail in legislation. The general intent of the Congress is usually expressed in a report accompanying each bill, but in most every law, verbiage is comparatively brief and usually followed with the words, "Under such procedures and regulations as may be promulgated," followed by the name of the Executive Department under whose jurisdiction the law is to be administered. In other words, the Executive Branch of Government does administer and execute laws passed by the Legislative Branch.

In the case of the tax bill of 1962, the Internal Revenue Service has adopted procedures which are more severe and have more far-reaching effects than many of us believe was intended by the Congress. As a result, business leaders now say they are unable to claim "good will" expenditures under accounting systems which make it practically impossible for them to comply. Hotels, restaurants, dispensers of food and entertainment, say that it is causing a real depression in these trades and putting people who render services of this nature out of business.

Mr. Steven B. Wilson, chairman of the board of the Fram Corporation, says, "Business in America is done on the basis of confidence between individuals. The larger the responsibilities, the more critical it is for executives to know and understand each other. Such personal knowledge is not

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Members of Gov. John Connally's "Committee of 25" to study education beyond the high school—have only one thing in common—they're all Texans.

Twenty-three, however, have something else in common—they are college graduates. Ten hold master's degrees and five have doctorates.

Eight have something else in common—they attended Connally's alma mater, the University of Texas.

Other than that, their backgrounds vary. Included are lawyers, bankers, contractors, telephone company executives, oil men, engineers, a district judge, a hospital administrator and educators.

Odessa Out. The expected bumper crop of college students in 1965 will have two more state colleges to choose from. Angelo State College in San Angelo and Pan American College in Edinburg join the state-supported system in the fall of 1965.

But Odessa Junior College still will be a junior college, despite strong efforts by Rep. George Cook of Odessa and Sen. Frank Owen III of El Paso.

State Studies Projected. When the 58th Legislative session ended lawmakers immediately began to study possible legislation for the 59th Legislature.

Interim committees of legislators will look into guidance training testing in public schools; boating safety; reservoir planning; Texas bays; care and discovery of tuberculosis cases; poverty and indigency in the state; State and Local Tax Policy; and a thorough survey of the oil and gas industry.

Judges' Pay. Another legislative study will concern the pay needs of judges. One of the most controversial subjects during the legislative session has been the proper pay for district judges.

State pays all district judges an annual salary of \$12,000. Many counties supplement this. Many more have asked their representatives to pass bills this session to authorize county supplements.

Lawmakers from districts where judges get only \$12,000 or a slight supplement have battled every bill that called for increased pay. Some increases would have run as high as \$20,000 a year. Rural members argue that judicial salaries like that cause too much competition.

Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville noted that creation of a new Court of Civil Appeals in Corpus Christi and the opening of three justice jobs at \$15,000 caused a flood of applications.

Gold in Them Hills? People who think a hidden fortune may lie somewhere north of

the Big Bend" may get a chance to test their theory under a new law. It allows prospector permits for 640 acres, at 25 cents at acre annual rental, for a maximum of five years.

Rep. Grainger McIlhenny of Wheeler, author of the bill, noted that present law limits a hard metal prospector to 40 acres.

Watersheds. Speed-up in planning watershed flood protection projects won approval from the Senate-House conference committee on appropriations.

It allocated \$100,000 a year to the State Soil Conservation Board to be used to plan small watershed programs.

U. S. Soil Conservation Service funds for planning are limited. In some watershed districts have raised money and hired the planning done, rather than wait for the U.S.

State program will help in the same fashion.

Salt Water. State agencies are moving deeper into the field of stopping salt field pollution of fresh water streams.

New Texas Water Pollution Control Board gives oilmen in Galveston County until December 1 to stop using open pits for salt water disposal.

Railroad Commission issued similar order for Menard and parts of Schleicher Counties, Agencies have concurrent powers in the field.

Beach Speeds. Voters said last November that it would be fine with them if the Legislature gave Gulf County commissioners courts authority to pass ordinances regulating speed and littering on public beaches like Padre Island.

Rep. James L. Lattimore of Corpus Christi passed such a speed bill through the House. Ironically he was killed in a traffic accident.

But Gov. Connally felt the law was too vague because of amendments placed in it by the House. So he vetoed it.

Rep. Charles Seagins, Corpus Christi Republican who repudiated Lattimore, tried to get the House to override the governor's veto. Although he got a majority vote of 75-62 it fell short of the two-thirds needed to override.

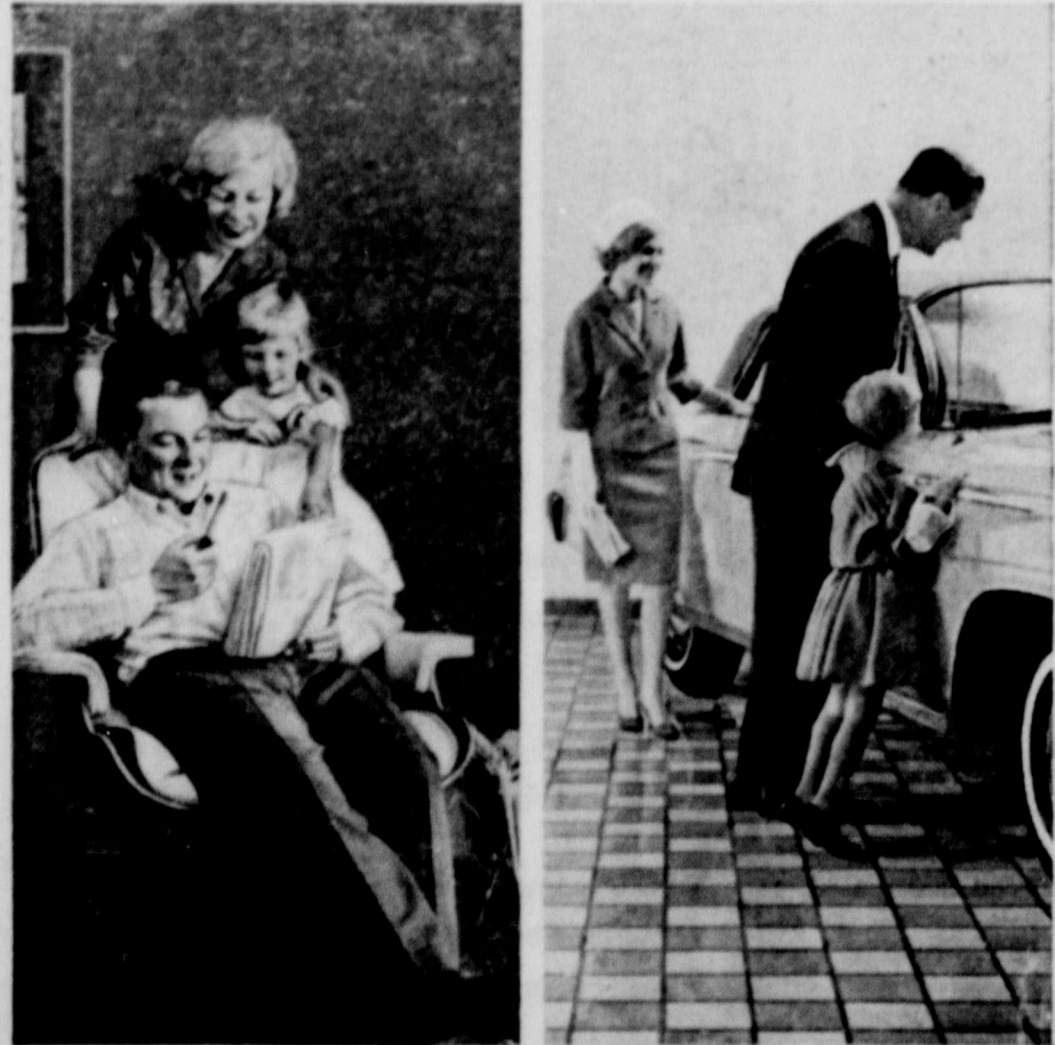

of the estimated value of \$211.
 Prior to the granting of a charter for the church as served by the Rev. Mr. L. R. Scruggs in 1882, by C. C. Smith in 1884, by M. L. Car-swallow in 1885, and by E. Ward in 1887. But the first official record of the Hico church organization appeared in the charter dated Dec. 3, 1885.
 According to a contract dated 1886, the church borrowed \$200 to augment the amount mentioned in the charter in order to make plans to erect the present building. The amount \$436.00 on hand then, to be used as a starter toward the building, the total cost of which was \$2,500.00 indicated that the members had great faith. Their action compares favorably to that of the present membership as it plans for a \$60,000 structure.
 There are no complete records of regular pastors from the date of the charter until 1888, when the church called the Rev. Mr. F. S. Payne, who served the church until 1891. Other pastors following him were:

Highway Week in Texas Designated By Governor

"Highway Week" in Texas was announced by a gubernatorial proclamation which urged Texans not to rest on their highway laurels—but to keep a wary eye on the road ahead.
 Highway Week is being observed in Texas and nationally during the dates of May 26-June 1.
 The proclamation urged "every citizen to view with concern the needs incurred by increasing population and traffic, to support a sustained improvement program, and to improve standards of driving safety."
 Governor John Connally signed the proclamation in the presence of the Texas Highway Commission and State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. Herbert C. Petry Jr. is Chairman of the Highway Commission while Hal Woodward and J. H. Kuitgen are members.
 The proclamation declared that "today's Texas highway system is

contributing immeasurably to the future growth potential of the economy of the state" and paid tribute to the Texas Highway Department. "The Highway Department is to be commended for its accomplishments in an effort to keep pace with the ever-increasing flood of traffic."
 But a note of concern was sounded keyed to expanding highway needs. "The very growth of the state's economy has posed future highway needs of a serious nature," the proclamation pointed out, "since the state's population has increased by 25 percent since 1950. The state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles, and the miles traveled by these vehicles now total well in excess of 40 billion a year."
