Welcome to the Reunion!

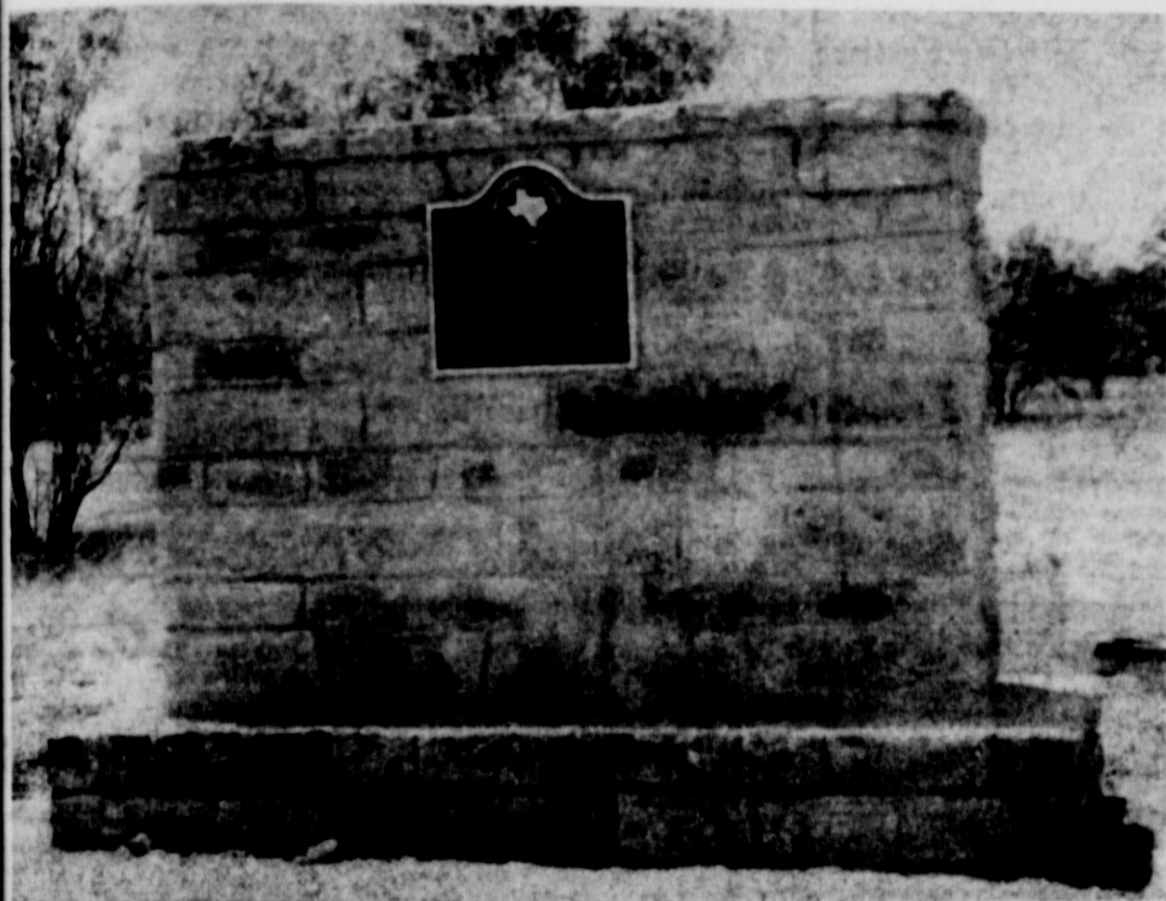

Fairy Schools to Open Tuesday, September 3rd

High School faculty members are: Boyd N. Lowry, science and high school principal; Herman Walton, mathematics; Mrs. O. H. Brummett, English; Martin Schrank, vocational agriculture; Janie Gleason, homemaking; Frank Hanes, social science and administration.

There will be no change in tax structure for 1963-64, as instructed by the Board of Education.

Wednesday Parade Signals Start of Four-Day Fvent

A street parade at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 31, will officially kickoff the 77th Annual Old Settlers Reunion for a four-day run ending Saturday night. Judge J. C. Barrow will open the celebration before parade time with his traditional welcome address.

Following the parade, an old-time Pony Express race will be staged, with perhaps at least four teams of horses and riders participating. Billy Doty is in charge of the race, and exact time of the start will be announced during the parade.

Parade Marshal Tommy Pierce has been busy the past few weeks lining up entries for the opening day feature, and prospects are good for the best parade in recent years. Many local businesses and clubs have committed floats and decorated cars for the parade.

Pierce announced parade prizes as follows:

- Best Decorated Float, \$60.00.
- Second Place Float, \$30.00.
- Best Decorated Car, \$20.00.
- Second Decorated Car, \$10.00.
- Best Bicycle or Motor Scooter, \$10.00.
- Best Comic, \$10.00.
- Best Horse & Rider, \$10.00.

Entertainment at City Park on opening night will feature the annual Miss Reunion Contest. Broken down into junior and senior divisions, the contest drew 24 entries—15 in the junior division and

nine in the senior category. Trophies, sponsored by Howard Drug and Hico News Review, will be awarded to the winner and two runnersup in each division. All contestants' pictures appear in the second section of this issue. Mrs. Bruce Slaughter is chairman of the contest, where entries will be judged on beauty, poise and personality.

Activities Thursday night will feature an amateur-talent contest. J. T. Butler of Cariton in charge.

Friday night will feature the Dublin Jaycee Playboys, a string band.

The Stroud Sisters of Dublin were scheduled for appearances at both Thursday and Friday night activities, but due to illness in the family, it is doubtful whether they will be able to attend.

Activities Saturday, concluding night of the Reunion, will be headlined by the Old Fiddlers Contest, with drawings for free merchandise also on the program.

James Cryer is manager for this year's production, and he expects another successful run.

On the midway, carnival attractions will be provided by Don Franklin Shows of San Antonio.

Old Hico Memorial Completed In Time For Reunion Visitors

Work was completed last week on the Old Hico Memorial, located on Honey Creek near the site of the original town of Hico.

The project, started last April, received the cooperation of many people, both in giving funds and with their work in other capacities. The monument was built by Leland Johnson and Lenard Weaver, and Fred Rainwater, County Commissioner, and Les Hamilton of the Highway Dept. contributed greatly with equipment and labor.

The program came into being after the Hamilton County Historical Society recommended the site as one of five in the county to receive recognition in the state-wide movement to erect markers at places of historical interest.

Miss Mettie Rodgers, a member of the county committee, presented the proposal to various clubs here, with thought of erecting the monument by means of public subscription of funds to offset the cost. Miss Rodgers said this week that funds were still being accepted with which to make final improvements at the site.

The monument is located about 100 yards north of Honey Creek bridge, on land donated by Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Taylor, now owners of the place where Old Hico once stood.

Old Hico was established in 1866 and in 1860 people of the settlement petitioned the government

for a post office. The request was granted, and J. R. Alford was named its first postmaster. People left it up to him as to what to name the settlement, and he decided to call it "Hico", after his home town in Kentucky.

From 1870 to 1880 more people came into the area. In the fall of 1880, the Texas Central Railroad came through the northern part of Hamilton County, and the railroad company bought land in the Bosque Valley to establish the present town of Hico.

Hico was incorporated July 3, 1883.

Plans are in the making to have a formal dedication service at the site sometime in the near future.

Holladay Holstein Classified 'Excellent' By Association

Little Lolly Gomar Smoker, a registered Holstein cow in the herd of G. E. Holladay, Hico, has been officially classified "Excellent"—the highest designation attainable in the type classification program of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

This highly select designation is applied only to animals scoring 90 or more of the 100 points representing theoretical perfection in body conformation.

Of nearly 65,000 Registered Holsteins officially classified for type last year, only 548 were rated "Excellent."

The Holladay Holstein moved into the Excellent bracket for the first time during a recent classification of the herd by John H. Stewart, Denver, Colo., an official inspector on the staff of the national Holstein organization.

She scored 90 points. Animals scored Excellent in previous programs are not included in this listing.

The classification program, in continuous operation since 1929, provides a universally-recognized method of comparing the conformation of living animals with that of the True-Type Holstein cow or bull. Participation is currently at an all-time high level.

Mrs. Dunagan was born October 4, 1882 and had lived in Hico for the past four years. She was formerly of Waco, and was preceded in death by her husband, Walter A. Dunagan. She was a member of the Methodist Church. Survivors include two daughters, Miss Alleen Dunagan of San Antonio, and Mrs. Lucille Doyle of Waco; three sisters, Mrs. W. E. Alexander of Hico, Mrs. Kate McFadden of Denison, and Mrs. Connie Redmond of Dallas; two brothers, George Jones of Austine and Oscar Jones of Austin; one granddaughter, Miss K. C. Biff, and two great-grandsons.

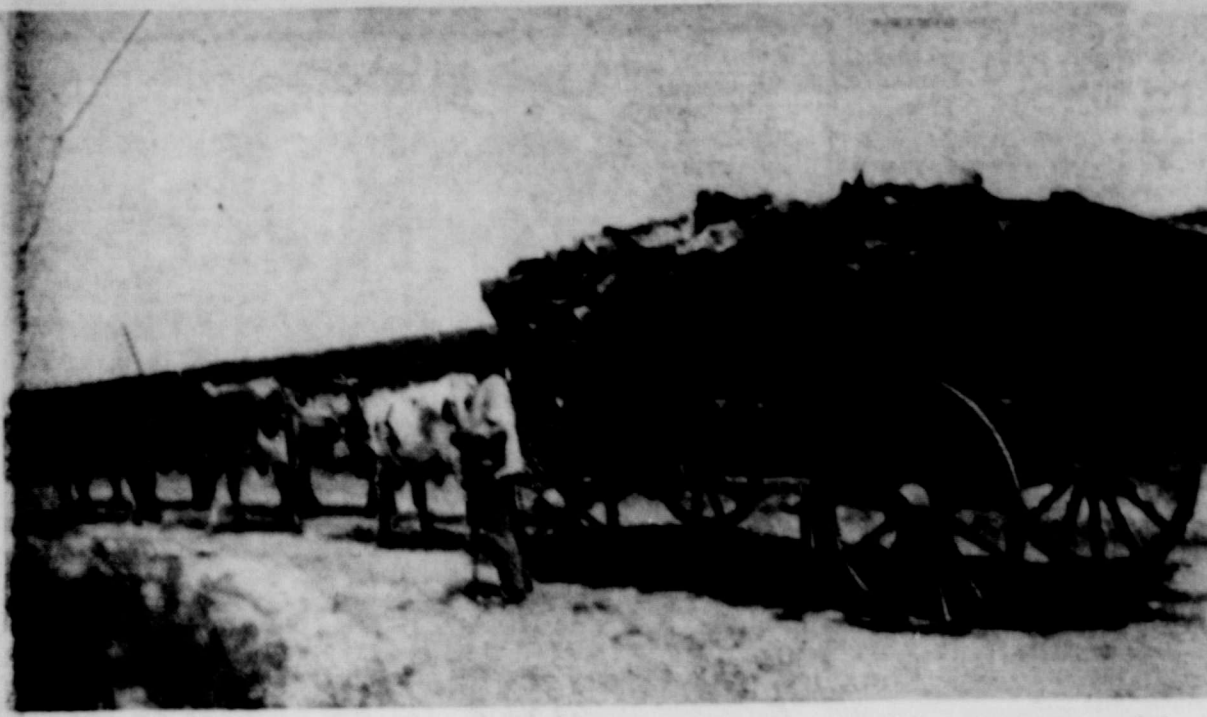

On the Home Range

Plans are almost complete for the 77th Old Settlers Reunion in Hico. Don't miss this event, and be sure to go by South Hico Home Demonstration Club's educational exhibit at the Park. The exhibit is called "Food Makes a Difference," pointing out the importance of weight control.

The Somervell County Ladies' Home Demonstration Clubs have invited the Hamilton County ladies to their camp at the YWCA camp at Glen Rose August 13 and 14. They say "Come Tuesday morning, Aug. 13 and be prepared to spend the night. You have lunch, dinner and breakfast the next morning all for \$2.50. Bring your sheets and pillow cases, towels and bathing suit. Also bring a stunt as part of the fun that night."

Cleanup crews of the Forest and Park Services have reported appalling conditions at picnic and campgrounds after summer week-

ends—garbage in the fireplaces and on the tables, papers and bottles everywhere.

As Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John A. Baker points out, "This careless littering is a shocking waste of public recreation funds. Savings that we can make in clean-up can and will be invested in more and better recreation facilities for the public."

Let's all work together on this litter business, whether you are in the park, street, or at home, let's "Don't Be a Litterbug—Keep America Beautiful."

Be sure to blanch vegetables before freezing, urge food specialists in the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. Blanching slows or stops the action of enzymes which otherwise would cause off-flavors, color changes, and toughness.

If your cakes crack open, it's probably because your oven is too hot.

To avoid that unappealing "massed" effect when cooking macaroni, noodles, spaghetti or rice, add one tablespoon vegetable oil per quart of boiling salted water. The oil also prevents the water from boiling over.
