## Final Rites Held Wednesday For W. E. (Gene) Tate

Funeral services for Hamilton County Judge W. E. (Gene) Tate were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday at the First Methodist Church in Hamilton.

Rev. Wilson Canafax and Rev. Sidney Roberts officiated, and interment was in Hamilton Cemetery.

Mr. Tate died in a Temple hospital Monday. He was 63.

Born in Hamilton, Judge Tate had been a resident of Hamilton county most of his life. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Tate, pioneer settlers.

He graduated from Hamilton High School and attended Texas A.M. College and Marion Institute at Marion, Ohio. He continued his study of law at University of Texas and was admitted to the Texas bar in 1935. He was county attorney then, and was on the staff of Texas Attorney General William McCraw.

Judge Tate entered the U. S. Army during World War II and served with the late General George Patton in Africa. He later worked for the Internal Revenue Service at Houston.

He was county judge from 1947 through 1950, and again from 1955 until the time of his death.

Mr. Tate married Miss Mattie Oliver of Hamilton in 1950. He was a member of the Methodist Church, Lions Club, Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite, and Shrine.

Surviving are his wife; and one son, Mrs. George Shockley of Hamilton.

# Fairy-Hico School Consolidation Vote Set August 24th

Hamilton County Judge W. E. (Gene) Tate last week issued an order for an election to be held at Fairy and Hico for the purpose of consolidating Hico Independent School District and Fairy Rural High School District.

The judge issued the order after a petition from the Fairy district had requested such an election. Forty-one signatures were attached to the petition. The

minimum number—20 signatures—was attached to the Hico petition asking for an election to accept the Fairy School District should the people there vote to consolidate.

Judge Tate set the two elections for the same day, Saturday, August 24. Polling places will be at the Fairy School and at Hico City Hall. At the same time Judge Tate appointed A. A. Brown as election judge at Hico

and Ed Bulman as Fairy judge.

Should the people of both districts vote for the consolidation, another election would be necessary to equalize the tax rate, and for the assumption of bonded indebtedness. Hico's tax rate is \$1.10 per \$100 evaluation, and Fairy's rate is \$1.35 per \$100 evaluation.

The election order was dated Friday, August 2.

## Hico Schools Set to Open Tuesday, September 3rd

Hico Public Schools will open for the 1963-64 term Tuesday, September 3 at 9 a.m. The following information was compiled by Supt. O. C. Cook and gives important information needed by parents in making preparation for the opening of the new school year.

Pre-registration for High School students will begin Thursday and Friday, August 29 and 30. Students are urged to complete registration on these days.

All elementary students will enroll on Tuesday, Sept. 3.

A child must be 6 years old on or before the first day of September to enroll. Children entering school for the first time must present a birth certificate upon registering. These certificates will be returned to the parents the same day.

The lunch room will begin serving meals Tuesday, Sept. 3. Prices for lunches will be the same as last year. Grades one and two students will be charged 25c, and all other grades will be 30c. Teachers will pay 35c. Visitors will pay 35c plus one cent tax. Lunches will include meat, two vegetables, salad, two one-half pints of milk, and dessert. Children may eat in the lunch room, bring their lunch or go home to eat.

There will be a general faculty meeting at 8 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 30. This meeting will last for about one hour after which teachers may complete any last minute preparation before the opening day of school.

Buses will make their initial runs on the regular routes Tuesday, Sept. 3. There could be some time changes and parents should ask about these changes or be on the route early on this first run. One new 45-passenger bus has been purchased and will be ready for use when school begins.

A general assembly will be held at 9 a.m. Tuesday, after which the elementary students will go to their home rooms to enroll. High School students will follow the regular schedule the first day. School will dismiss at 2:45 p.m. on the first day.

A complete list of faculty members will be given at a later date.

## Game Warden Reports

Now that hunting season is only a few weeks off you hunters may be wanting to know some of the season and bag limits. But first I would like to remind you to please be extra careful with that gun. One careless move and you could wind up a statistic this hunting season.

At this time I have not received the information on the dove season but as soon as I do I will print it in this column. Please play it safe and find out before you go hunting. If you have not found out by the time you buy new hunting license ask at the place where you buy them. By this time the season and bag limit should be available at these places.

Quail season opens Dec. 1 and will run through Jan. 31, 1964, both days inclusive. The bag limit will be 12 a day or 36 in possession. Any shotgun used to shoot quail must be plugged to hold not more than 3 shells. And anyone hunting in his or her county of residence must have a valid hunt-

ing license if they are 17 and not over 65 years of age.

Deer season opens Nov. 16 and runs through Dec. 31, both days inclusive, in Bosque County. In Hamilton County it opens Nov. 16 and closes Dec. 8, both days inclusive. There is a 2-buck limit in both counties, except in areas designated by the Game and Fish Commission, you may kill does. I will outline this area sometime in October before the season opens. There will not be a doe season in Hamilton County.

I would like to remind you doe hunters at this time that there has been a change in the way you handle the doe or antlerless permits this year. You must have this permit in your possession before you can lawfully kill a doe. So please check with your landowner before you go out and shoot a doe or antlerless deer. This may save you and the game warden some embarrassment if you are checked.

Squirrel season is still open the year around. Daily bag limit is 10 and possession limit is 20. As yet I have not received any information on the duck and goose season. But you should be able to obtain this information where you buy your new hunting license.

Turkey season opens Nov. 16 and runs through Dec. 8, both days inclusive in both Hamilton and Bosque counties. There is a one gobbler bag limit per season in both counties.

It shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take or kill any of the above mentioned game birds or animals between one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise, except migratory birds. This information will be printed in the same booklet that the season and bag limit is in.

If you have purchased a new gun for this season you still have time to take it out and learn to handle it before bird season.

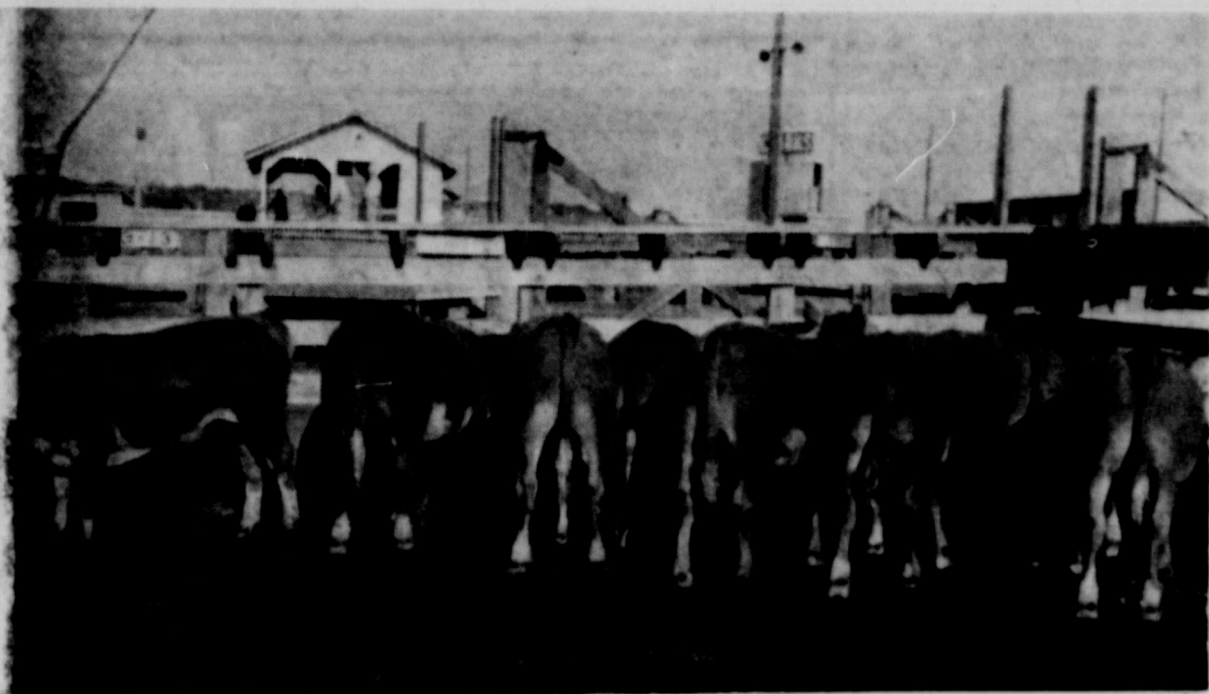

## Statement on Consolidation Released By Superintendent

(Ed Note: Following is a statement concerning the election on August 24 in Hico and Fairy for the purpose of consolidating the two schools beginning with the 1963-64 term. The statement was compiled by Superintendent of Schools O. C. Cook, and is meant to inform—not to advise.)

There will be an election held at the Hico City Hall in Hico and at the Fairy School building in Fairy on August 24, 1963, to determine by a majority vote in each district whether or not the Hico Independent School District and the Fairy Rural High School District will consolidate for school purposes.

The problems involved in a consolidation are not new to the people of these districts as both have been created in the past years by consolidation of other districts. Some nine districts formed what is now the Fairy district, and some eight districts formed what is now the Hico district. Since we know the problems of consolidation, it seems unnecessary for the loss of friendships on the part of the patrons. Each individual understands what he wants better than anyone else and should have the privilege of expressing his rights by going to the polls to let his wants be known.

School districts were created to educate children. But since the scholastic population has been on the decline in some areas, and more efficient schools have been demanded in recent years, it has been necessary to group more children together. By grouping more children in one system, more teachers can be employed and at the same time the services of specialized teachers to teach subjects needed in this modern age our youth has to face.

To employ more teachers, one of two things is necessary: Either more children or more money. A certain number of teachers are demanded by the Texas Education Agency to meet the minimum accreditation requirements for a high school.

The tax rate of Hico District is \$1.10 per \$100.00 evaluation and

there is no increase anticipated. The Fairy District tax rate is now \$1.25 on the \$100.00 evaluation. This would be lowered to \$1.10 over the entire consolidated district. The Hico children would get the benefit of at least two additional teachers. The Fairy children would get the benefit of 18 teachers instead of the ten they now have.

If this consolidation is voted, the trustees of the new district are morally and legally obligated to honor the existing teacher contracts of both schools.

Hico has one of the most modern school plants in the county. A new vocational agriculture shop was completed last year. The modern elementary school with lunch room, offices and health room was completed in 1953. The high school was completely modernized with new science laboratory, conference room, offices and new auditorium in 1960. A modern gymnasium, lighted football stadium with a seating capacity of 1000, a modern bus storage building with shop completed in 1959, and a modern homemaking cottage. This plant could accommodate at least 200 more students without additional cost.

All qualified voters are eligible to vote in this election. To be qualified, you must have paid a poll tax, or have an exemption, must have lived in the state for one year and in the county for six months, and must reside in one of the districts involved in the consolidation.

Get the facts and make your own decision in what you think would be to your best interest, and exercise your obligation by voting on Saturday, August 24.

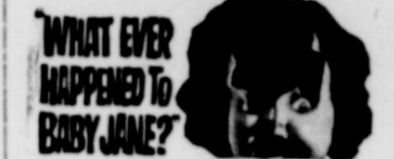

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1945.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy and persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are payable out of federal funds; and providing that the amount of state funds for such assistance shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; and providing the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (e), reading as follows:

"(e) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the State of Texas for such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision shall be used for the following purposes:

"(1) For the addition of subsection (e) to Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to establish all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

"(2) For the addition of subsection (c) to Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

"(3) The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1945, and have notice of said proposed amendment and the amount of state funds required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1945.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy and persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are payable out of federal funds; and providing that the amount of state funds for such assistance shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; and providing the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, for the payment of assistance to: (1) Neely aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(2) Neely individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feigning for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Neely Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(3) Neely blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Neely Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(4) Neely children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for such assistance as may be provided hereunder; provided that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make the recipients of aid hereunder eligible for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1945, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to (1) neely aged, (2) neely and totally disabled, (3) neely and persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) neely children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; providing that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to (1) neely aged, (2) neely and totally disabled, (3) neely and persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) neely children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; providing that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1945, and have notice of said proposed amendment and the amount of state funds required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Supporters of the proposed billion-dollar Trinity River development plan won the first round on the opening day of hearings when the Texas Water Commissioners turned down the railroad's motion to delay the Austin hearing.

Gov. John Connally's approval of the commission's proposed plan was expected. He had long since pledged his support.

Connally called the navigation project "a major step in one of the most important water conservation, flood control, and navigation projects in the history of Texas."

Texas Highway Department's 420-seat capacity auditorium overflowed during the two-day hearing as every community in the vast Trinity watershed was represented.

Spokesman for the railroads was Walter Caven, counselor for the Texas Railroad Association.

Plan of the U.S. Corps of Engineers calls for development of the entire watershed for navigation, flood-control, water conservation, water quality control, drainage, irrigation, hydroelectric power, fish, wildlife, and recreation.

Thirteen reservoirs are included in the long-range plan. Locks and other features to make the river navigable from the Gulf to Fort Worth would claim more than \$315,000,000. That's more than a million dollars a mile for the 300 mile project.

Barge-line navigation of the Trinity from the Gulf of Mexico to the Dallas-Fort Worth market was the target of railroad objections.

Railroads claimed that Army Engineers "greatly overestimated" traffic potential, future growth and benefits to be derived. Caven said the railroads would have to spend more than \$25,000,000 to relocate lines and bridges in the Fort Worth area. Then they would lose \$6,500,000 annually in freight business to the barge lines.

New Speed Limit Okayed Some 41,500 miles of state-maintained highways will be zoned for the new 70-mile per hour speed limit when the law becomes effective on August 23.

Texas Highway Commission approved the daytime maximum for passenger cars for more than two-thirds of the state's highway system. But the old 60-mile per hour maximum still applies to 18,840 miles. Engineering studies indicated that these roads couldn't handle faster traffic.

A large percentage of the Farm-to-Market Road system will come under the 70-mph maximum. Lower limits will apply where conditions warrant.

District engineers are expected to release news of re-zoning on a local basis.

Heart of Texas A roadside park some 20 miles north of Erady on US 377 is the geographical center of Texas.

It will be so designated when the Highway Commission erects a brilliant aluminum "Heart of Texas" marker.

Other \$600 aluminum markers are scheduled for Pilot Knob in Travis County, location of the state's only exposed submarine volcano; the Llano Estacado in Garza County; and Old Tascosa in Oldham County. The latter is famed for its Boot Hill Cemetery.

Commission figures each marker will earn more than 10 times its original cost in added tourist revenues.

Hot Weather Toll Four consecutive weeks of over 100 degree weather plus drying winds took a toll of crops and pastures over the state, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Early harvesting was used to beat the heat in many places. Reporting Service predicts that general rains in all areas still could revive pastures.

Folio Fades to Four Cases Plionmyelitis, the dread disease that kept parents stiff with fear for many summers, has declined to the point that the State Health Department has received only four reports of cases so far this year. Total caseload for the state last year was only 114. Credit for the decline of the crippler is given to Salk and Sabin vaccines.

But health officials continued to warn Texans not to be complacent. People of all ages are urged to follow up with booster shots.

Industry Gains Lt. Gov. Preston Smith is a staunch defender of local-versus-state programs for bringing in industry.

He told Kiwanis: "Texas does not have to rush headlong into any unwise scheme to bring industry to the state. And as long as we can do this locally, there will be less bureaucracy."

Smith said the privately-supported Texas Industrial Commission had done a "commendable job."

Last year Texas was third in the nation in attracting new industries.

The Commission provides support, advice and materials to local industrial development groups.

Short Snorts State Treasurer Jesse James reports that July Revenue from cigarette, liquor and wine stamps was almost \$1,000,000 above June's \$8,600,000 total.

Gov. Connally appointed Dr. Joaquin Gonzalez Cigarroa Jr. of Laredo to the Commission on Higher Education, to succeed Jack Woodward of San Angelo.

As It Looks From Here

The Foreign Affairs Committee has just approved a measure authorizing a little more than \$4 billion in foreign aid. In some form or other, it covers just about the four corners of the earth.

As has been the case throughout the history of foreign aid it is based primarily on ideology. Actually, we are the only people anywhere in the world who are so deeply concerned with Communism. The vast majority of nations, including those of the free world, do not share our pre-occupation with Communism, but rather devote their attention first to the cold economies of national life.

There has been a cliché for the last 15 years or so which refers to the "struggle for the hearts and minds of men" as a main selling point for foreign aid. Minds and hearts are important, but the stomach comes before either.

In the case of the split between Russia and Communist China, we are interpreting it to mean a disagreement in ideology. It is doubtful that it has much, if anything, to do with it. By the same token, Khrushchev's new attitude of sweet reason towards the West should not be interpreted as any change of feelings, but rather as a matter of political and economic reality.

In the first place, Khrushchev must have come to the conclusion that the Chinese Reds are not only willing to risk war, but want to promote it.

The only winner in such a war, in which the industry of both America and Russia would be destroyed, would be Communist China. Her inferiority in industry would be relatively eliminated with nothing to stop her from expanding into Soviet territory and into Southeast Asia.

Khrushchev has now decided to accept the proposal made by the United States and Great Britain some months ago in Geneva. He is not doing so out of any change of heart, but rather out of economic necessity.

Following the signing of a nuclear test ban treaty, we can watch for overtures from Russia to ourselves and Western Europe for increased trade. Since the warm wind from Moscow will touch Western Europe first, those who care less about ideology than

they do enhancing their own economic benefits are likely to increase trade, even in strategic material. They are already doing a far greater business with the Soviets than our own Country, but the lessening of tensions will undoubtedly cause an increase in the present level. As the thaw progresses, look for requests from Russia for loans and grants.

The very nature of the situation strongly suggests the likelihood that Khrushchev hopes to get what he wants on the economic front by making a big show in agreeing to the Test Ban Treaty. Some of our own leaders and a great many Americans seemingly want to make a life raft out of a single straw cast out by the Kremlin. When things are dark, a very faint glow makes a lot of light, but it should not be taking as a guiding beacon.

The aims of International Communism have always been the same and cannot be changed by the small gestures of its representatives. The giving of a little seems a lot when nothing at all is expected. If Mr. Khrushchev has now decided it is better to be agreeable until the economy of Russia can be improved, it is hardly justification for a great jubilation.

While all this is taking place, we continue to pour out our resources in every corner of the earth. The threat of nations that they will look to the Soviet Union for assistance unless it comes from America will continue. The time for a real challenge to this situation is long past due.
