FAIRY-HICO SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION PROPOSITION VOTED DOWN 78-76

Fairy School patrons voted last Saturday to maintain their schools another year by voting 78 to 76 against consolidation with the Hico District.

At Hico, 172 voters registered their approval for the consolidation, while six residents

voted against the merge. The election was called on August 2 after petitions had been presented to the late County Judge W. E. Tate asking for the vote.

Fairy Schools will open as previously scheduled—on Tuesday, September 3.

Band Practice Started Monday For Coming School Term

Three members were added to the band when rehearsals began Monday afternoon.

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School bells will ring out for Hico school students Tuesday morning, September 3, as the 1963-64 school year gets underway.

First day of school will find local youngsters following a routine class schedule. High school students were to register Thursday and Friday of this week, with elementary students registering Tuesday.

Buses will run on schedule the first day, and lunch will be served in the cafeteria. Classes will take up at 9 a.m.

A tour through the Hico plant this week revealed that all facilities were in tip-top condition, and ready for the opening.

Football practice was started 2 weeks ago, and band practice began Monday of this week. First football game is Saturday night, September 7 at the local stadium.

Superintendent of Schools O. C. Cook released the following information pertaining to school opening:

A child must be 6 years old on or before the first day of September to enroll. Children entering school for the first time must present a birth certificate upon registering. These certificates will be returned to the parents the same day.

The lunch room will begin serving meals Tuesday. Prices for lunches will be the same as last year, with grades one and two students charged 25c and all other grades 30c. Teachers will pay 35c. Visitors will pay 35c plus one cent tax. Lunches will include meat, two vegetables, salad, two one-half pints of milk, and dessert. Children may eat in the lunch room, bring their lunch, or go home to eat.

There will be a general faculty meeting at 8 a.m. Friday, August 30, which will last about one hour after which teachers may complete any last minute preparation before the opening day of school. Buses will make their initial runs on the regular routes Tuesday morning. There could be some changes and parents should ask about these, or be on the route early. One new 48-passenger bus has been purchased.

A general assembly will be held at 9 a.m. Tuesday, after which elementary students will go to their home rooms to enroll. High school students will follow the regular schedule the first day. School will dismiss at 2:45 p.m. Tuesday.

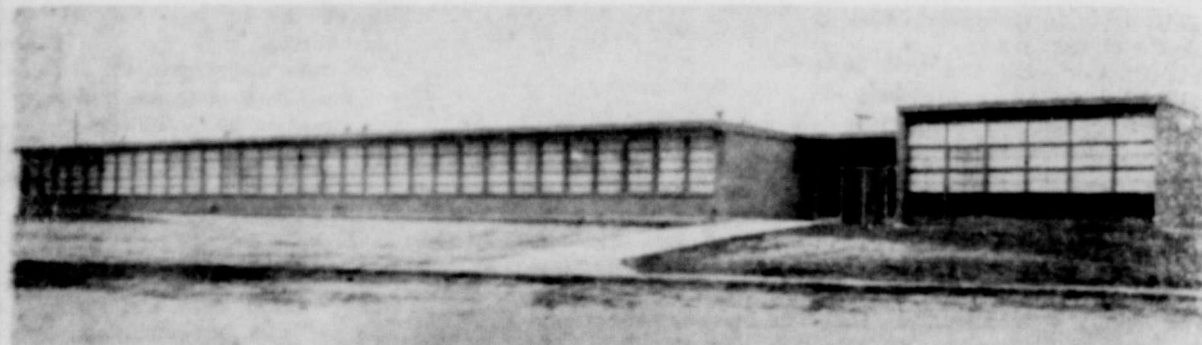

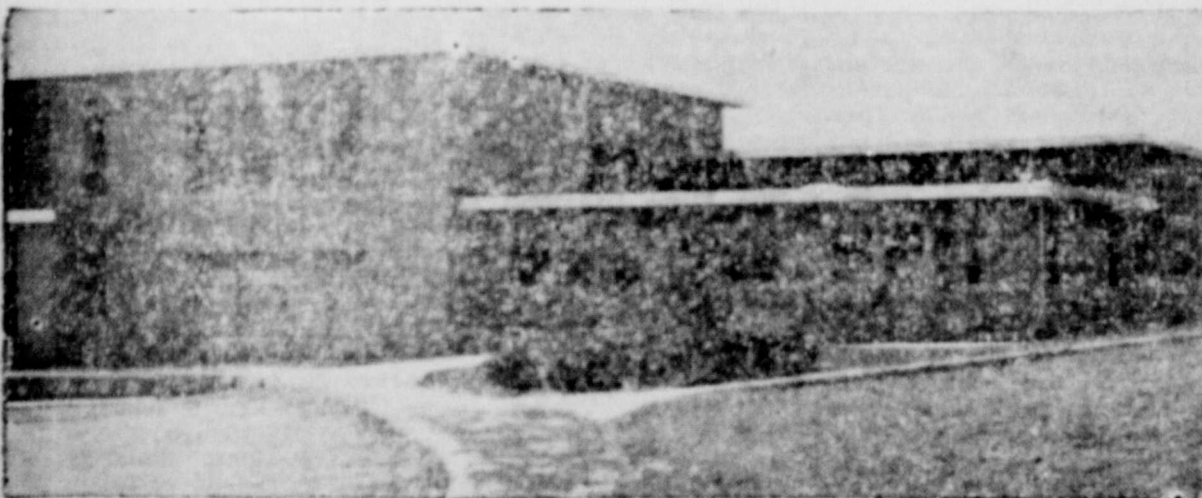

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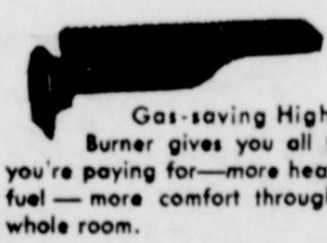
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Riding Club Round-up

ATTEND BLACK FAMILY REUNION AT ANDERSON

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Black attended the Black family reunion held August 24-25 in the "Black Roadside Park" near Anderson, Texas, Grimes County.

This was the 56th annual reunion held on the same property by descendants of John S. Black, one of the earlier Texas settlers. He donated the site for the park, which is a portion of his original Spanish Land Grant of 1830. There is a marker on the park site which reads "Erected by descendants of the Black Family in memory of John Sullivan Black, Upper Colonist of the Stephen F. Austin Colony—1830."

The history of the Blacks is very interesting. John S. Black and his boys operated an ox wagon freighter from the Trinity River to the Brazos River, where they met the steamboat that plied the Brazos. The Black Stage Coach Line of later years was actually an expansion of the original Black ox wagon route. John S. Black was a first cousin of General Sam Houston.

John Sullivan Black was the great-great-grandfather of E. A. Black, local dairyman.

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Separated by the Potomac River Maryland and Virginia furnish unexcelled beauty in their mountains, their trees and their rivers.

Looking down on the area from a plane, constant changes are evident when you see great slashes in the timber and bare hillsides from bulldozers preparing ground for a new shopping center.

No longer is it easy to get into the country; in fact, it is just about impossible. There is a supermarket around every turn.

Then, after you get through the shopping centers and look at the bare ground where beautiful trees once grew, now cleared for an apartment house, farther on you see great barren stretches, which are cleared for a new freeway. A big bulge in this 200 foot to 300 foot strip shows where the next intersection is to be with overpasses, underpasses and cloverleaves. A race is on between Detroit and the Federal Government and all the States, but Detroit is winning. It looks to be impossible to build enough roads, wide enough, long enough, high and low enough to keep up with over 7 million automobiles being produced this year.

This production in automobiles not only calls for more highways to get there, but it calls for more recreational grounds for use after arrival.

Tom Smith, the naturalist writer, commented the other day on how strange it was that the Government had to do a lot of things to improve on nature. At a recent meeting on conservation of natural resources, several speakers stressed the need for more open space, then went on and explained how it should be used. No one ever mentioned just leaving it alone. It seemed apparent that the Almighty had done a rather poor job of providing all these things, and that man has to come along and improve all of them.

These people talk about providing places of recreation which, of course, is to be done mainly with Federal funds as "improvements, development and facilities," and seemingly most of the planners have a different concept as to what these terms mean. The engineer says it means access roads, picnic tables, comfort stations, garbage cans and boat ramps.

The theoretician has it all figured out just how many campers should occupy so many square feet of camping space. Incidentally, none of them have given consideration to preserving the wild flowers which had to be scraped off to level the camp ground.

But all this comes under the heading of progress, and betterment for the individual. For reason of better pay and shorter hours, there is more time for recreation. Because there is more time for recreation, it requires more planners to furnish a place to recreate, more automobiles, and more roads to get us there. There is little separation between recreation and industry. A timber slash is an eyesore, but the cutting was to satisfy human demands for paper products and lumber. Industrial pollution would not exist in our streams if it were not for our human wants.

Probably most people who live in city apartments eleven and a half months out of the year may not recognize simplicity when

they see it. So, in order for them to enjoy it, it all has to be fixed for them. Like most of us, their comforts come out of stores, and these comfort furnishers have developed into mammoth business.

Just a thought—To live happily in the country, one must have the soul of a poet, the mind of a philosopher, the simple taste of a hermit—and a good station wagon.

Highlights and Sidelights

Gov. John Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School has its eye on tuition-free colleges and "super universities." Also being looked upon with favor are Texas junior colleges voactional schools. Committee is searching for a way to meet educational needs in the next decade. Task is made difficult by the need for 900,000 new junior and senior college graduates by 1971. The prediction, called "conservative" by committeemen Gifford Johnson, Dallas industrial leader, includes 456,000 four-year college

graduates and 440,000 graduates of two-year schools. Right now the total enrollment in 19 of the state's four-year colleges and 34 private senior colleges total 175,100. Junior college enrollment in 35 state junior colleges and 10 private schools is 37,200. If these students all were to graduate, they would produce about half the number of graduates needed in the next four years. But Johnson said the problem is—many won't graduate. There is a big drop-out problem in colleges and an even bigger drop-out in the grades below col-

lege level. Johnson stated that only 54 per cent of the students enrolled in the third grade in 1953 graduated from high school in 1963. What to do about the drop-out problem, which Governor Connally has called "one of the most critical problems of the decade?" Both Johnson and committeemen Tom Sealy of Midland, as well as other members of the committee which is composed of some of the state's most powerful citizens, recommend more and better counseling through all the high school years and college. "If students aren't encouraged to stay in high school and perform well there, they don't have a chance," Johnson said. **Poll Tax Campaign On** Governor Connally will kick off the League of Women Voter's

Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, issued a reminder that the new speed law specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slowly as to impede traffic. Minimum limits, as well as maximum limits are being posted on the highways throughout the state.
