Winners of the state contests will be given valuable awards such as scholarships and free trips to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

The occasion gave us an opportunity to meet and get acquainted with many of the leaders in agriculture and their families in this area.

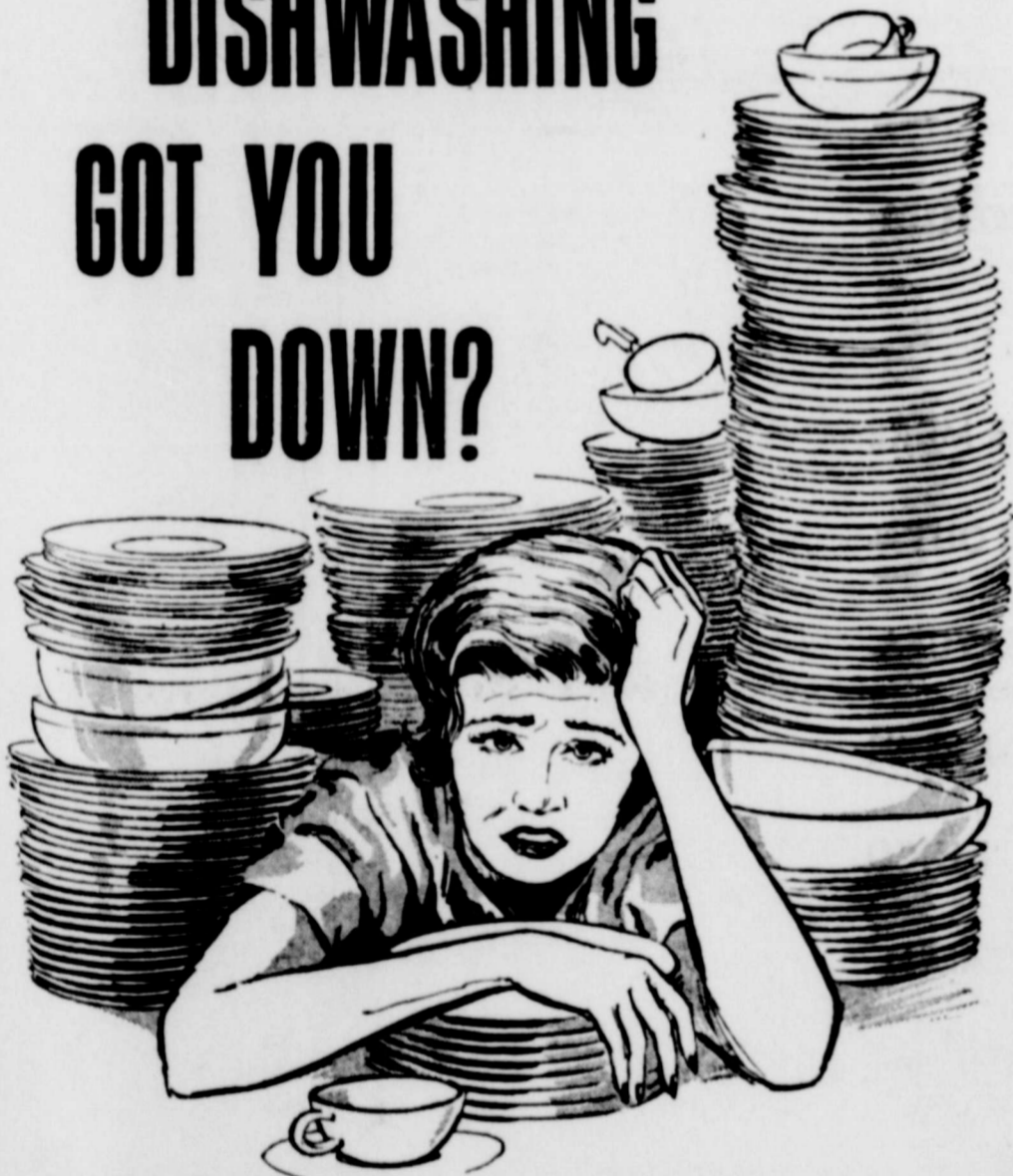
Many landowners and hunters are interested in the deer in Hamilton County, and would like to know more about deer herd management. Last week a new bulletin was made available by the Parks and Wildlife Department. Name of this bulletin is "Texas Deer Herd Management" by James G. Teer. Mr. Teer is an assistant professor of Wildlife Management at Texas A&M. In the 69 pages of this bulletin Mr. Teer discusses problems and principles of deer management in an interesting and easy to read manner.

The bulletin is available, free of charge on individual request, from the Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas.

The severe losses from winter killing of oats in 1962 and 1963 have reduced seed supplies of many recommended varieties. Varieties successfully grown in other states but not recommended in Texas have generally been unsatisfactory. You should be extremely cautious of seeding varieties not recommended in Texas.

The recommended and acceptable varieties are given in the leaflet L-578, "Recommended Practices for Producing Small Grains in Texas." These leaflets are available in my office.
