



### Game Warden Cane Maker Finishes 100th Walking Stick For Elderly

The cane-maker, one E. E. Dawson, is now finishing his 100th cane, ninety of which have gone into the hands of folks who, due to age or a crippled condition, needed a

The cane business all started one day when Mr. Dawson saw on the streets of the town a crippled man, well-advanced in years hobbling along with a cane that he had improvised by cutting a limb from a tree and trimming it so that it might at least resemble a cane, but which, in truth, was a poor substitute. Dawson offered to make the man a cane, if he would accept it, and the man was happy to do just that. Then others in need of help in walking were seen, and the cane business got underway. The first ones were made of broom sticks and mop sticks, with such handles as could be fashioned out of materials in a junk pile.

Then the broom sticks and mop sticks were all used and he began to get rods for the

and now that source is no longer available as the yard no longer stocks them. So it appears that the cane business will cease when the hundred are all given away,

Not a penny has been accepted from a cane-user, and the maker would have most certainly refused any pay for them had it been offered. The cost was never great. The rods cost from ten to 25 cents each; the tips a dime each; then glue and paint were the other costs. The cost averaged about forty cents for each cane, and three to six days time to complete each. Several were in process of construction all the time. It takes time for glue to set and paint to dry and each cane usually had five or six coats of paint before it was ready for service.

Mr. Dawson has sent the canes to a great many places in Texas, and to California, Mississippi, Nebraska and New


