

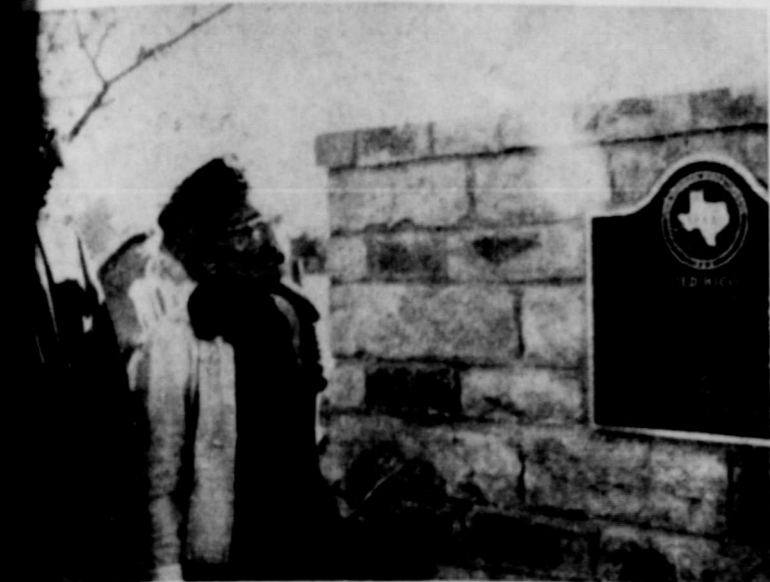

District Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton dedicated the memorial.

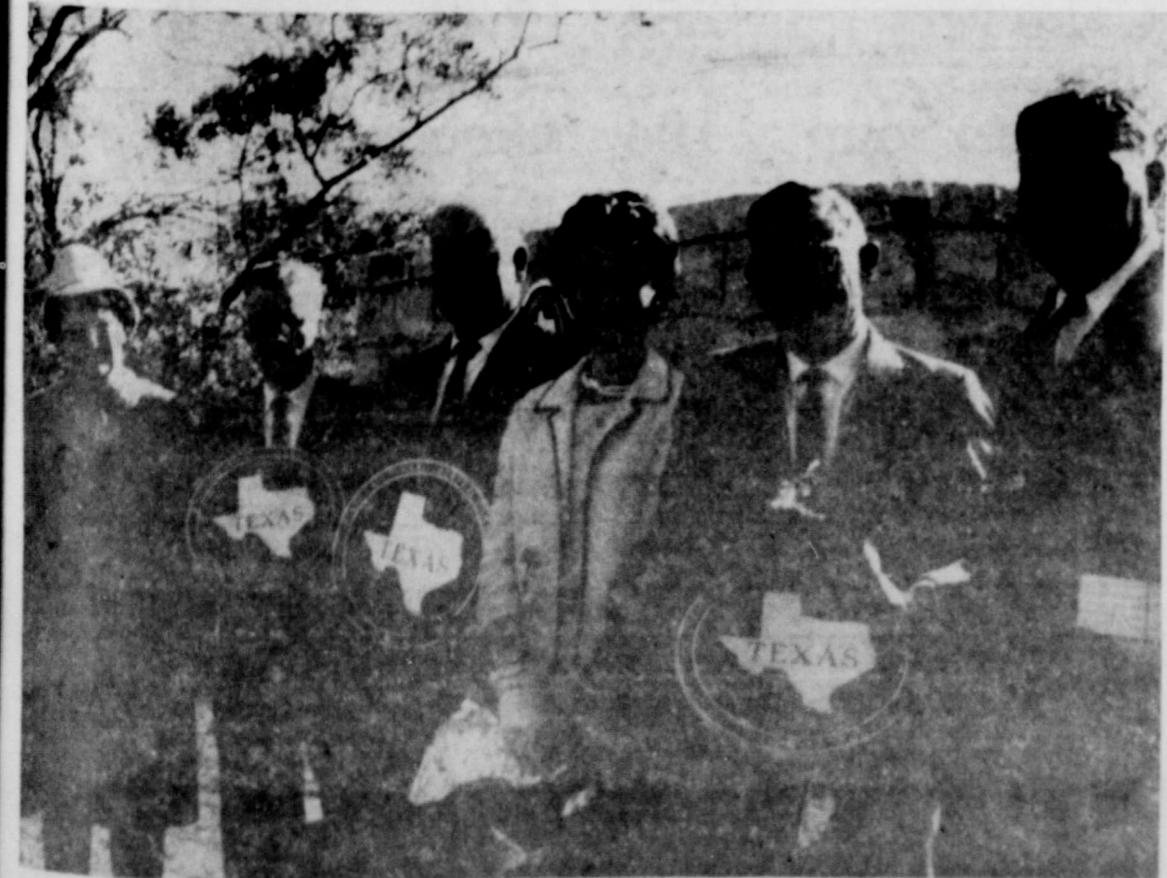

Tax Officers Will Visit Here in Oct.

Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector, said this week that traditional discounts would be allowed on 1963 taxes again this year. Tax statements will be in the mail before October 1 to county residents.

Discounts allowable for State and County taxes are 3 percent for payment in October, two percent in November, and 1 percent in December. Mrs. Williams has arranged for the tax office to remain open on Saturday morning, October 26 as a convenience to taxpayers desiring to take advantage of the three percent savings. The office is ordinarily closed on Saturdays.

Mrs. Williams also said that November 30 would be deadline for payment of first half taxes.

Poll tax payments will also be accepted by the tax office from those desiring to pay them.

First visit to Hico by the tax collector will be Thursday, Oct. 10 when the officer will be at City Hall from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. Mrs. Williams will be in Carlton on October 9, from 8 a.m. until noon at the drug store.

FOR HOMECOMING TILT

Hico to Gorman Saturday

Hico's Tigers, losers in their last two outings, jump out of the fat into the fire Saturday night, when they take on an always-tough Gorman Panther eleven at Gorman.

To make matters worse, it is Gorman's Homecoming and the Panthers will be all set to make one of their better showings of year before the exes. However, the last time the Tigers participated in an opponent's homecoming activities—at Perrin—the locals put a damper on festivities by taking a 22-0 win.

The Panthers, playing a tough schedule of Class AA and Class A opponents thus far, haven't

been very successful, owning a record of three losses and a tie. However, they usually jell around homecoming time, and the Tigers could be in for an interesting night.

In the modern series, the Tigers hold an edge in wins over the Panthers. In 1959 the locals downed Gorman 24-0, came back in 1960 to overpower the Panthers 55-8, dropped a 30- decision in 1961, and last year the locals pulled out a win 22-12.

Hico will go into the game in perhaps their worst shape of the season, with two top linemen crippled, and several other team members suffering colds. Butch

Knudson and Mike Flowers, senior lettermen, are the injured linemen. Knudson is suffering with an injured knee, and Flowers has a bruised shoulder. They are both doubtful for the game. The flu bug is expected to hinder the team members, but shouldn't keep them out of the lineup.

Others suffering knee injuries are James Randals and Scott Patterson, both centers.

A large following from Hico is expected for the 8 p.m. kickoff at Gorman. Fans are again reminded of the Saturday date rather than the traditional Friday time.

Glen Rose Prevails 14-6 In Renewal of Grid Series

Hico and Glen Rose, two Tiger elevens with more than their share of problems, squared off last Friday night in a tail-twisting contest. The end result was a shorter tail for the Hico Tigers, and a longer one for the Glen Rose felines, due mainly to a slick-operating quarterback in the form of Chuck Gibbs.

Gibbs scored both the visitors' touchdowns, the first on a one-yard sneak which sent Glen Rose out front 6-0, and the other in the fading minutes on a 43-yard romp which chilled any hopes the locals might have had of salvaging a victory.

Hico's tail was cropped somewhat in the second period when a 62-yard touchdown run by Jerry Casey was nullified due to an over-anxious mate who was caught moving before the proper time. The run was the longest of the night, and also of the season by the locals.

Only one other threat was offered by either team in the first half, with Glen Rose recovering a Tiger fumble at Hico's 23. The gift went for naught, however, with the locals digging in to stop the threat.

End Larry Shipman set the stage for the nullified TD run by Casey, intercepting a Glen Rose pass at the 34. One play got four yards to the 38, from where Casey set sail on the heart-breaker. The cancelled TD had to be the turning point of the contest, enabling the visitors to stay even at half-time.

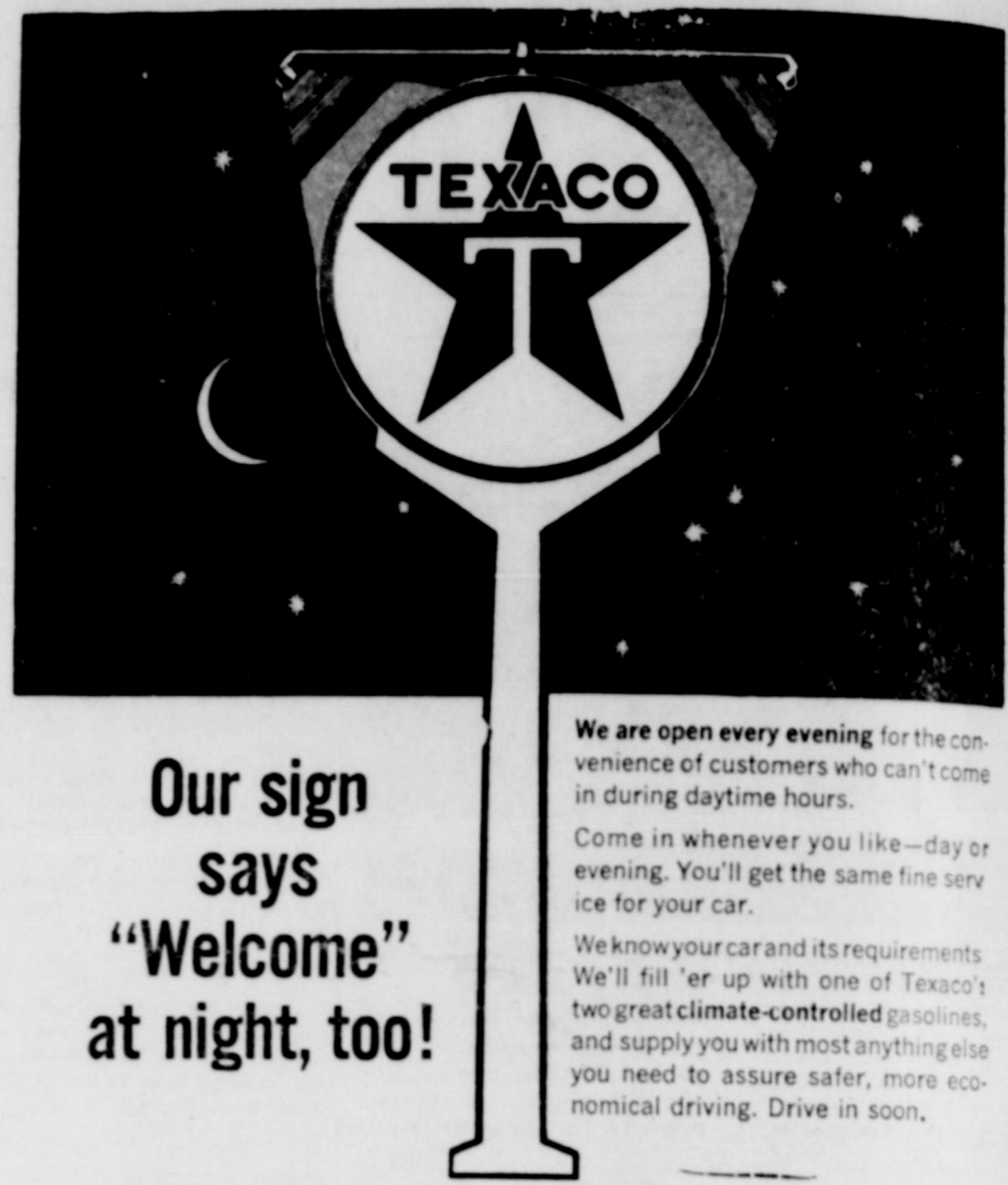

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Many farmers in Hamilton County will be putting fertilizer on land that will be used for fall small grain pastures and spring planted crops. If you plan to use fertilizer, a soil test would be a wise investment. Since most small grains will

be sown this month it is a little late for a soil test now. However October, November and December is a good time to get soil tested on land that will be used for crops or pasture next spring.

A soil test is the cheapest, most convenient and accurate way to determine fertility needs. It will determine the need for nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. The soil chemist will recommend the most profitable rate of fertilizer to use.

Field trials are valuable whether you have your soil tested or not. Unfertilized strips of four to six rows or 20 feet in width should be left across the field. Double the normal rate being used or de-

crease it by half the normal rate on several rows to see if a different rate would be more profitable. These strips will indicate whether the fertilizer pays. If check strips are used, be sure to select a strip that is representative of the field.

I have the soil testing cartons and information sheets for you to use and will be glad to show you how to make a good soil sample. If you would like to have a soil test made of your lawn, flower bed, or garden I also have infor-

mation for that purpose.

Next week is fire prevention week. This will be a good time for us to look around the farm and home and remove the fire hazards. Don't give fire a place to start.

Fire killed 11,800 Americans last year, over half of them in their own homes. Fire destroyed approximately \$1.5 billion worth of property in the same period. About 20 percent of all farm fires are caused by carelessness in using gasoline and kerosene.

It's always interesting to hear about the little tricks or habits busy persons have developed in order to take the hecticness out of their days. Sometimes just a simple thing like chaining a telephone book and pencil to a nearby wall makes a tremendous difference. I have noticed that the busier a woman is the more apt she is to work out many of these time and energy saving aids. She has to in order to survive and enjoy life.

Here are some of the ideas that will help you perhaps to preserve your own piece of mind:

Try paper cups and paper plates for children's snacks, sandwich lunches or suppers, and for outdoor eating. The cost is nominal.

Wrap all left over scraps, potato and tomato peelings, etc. in newspaper. You will want to separate the pages and fold back and put on handy shelf or drawer. (A good job for the small fry.) Work of course right on the newspaper, wrapping and putting in the garbage can wrapped. This will keep the garbage can clean. And of course you know that lining waste basket and garbage cans with paper bays makes disposing easier.

Have a special place for everything, neatly labeled to remind scatterers where things belong. You will be surprised at how the children will cooperate.
