## Fire Prevention Week Observed at Local School

October 7-13 was observed as National Fire Prevention Week. During this time schools throughout the country joined in observing and observing all the aspects of safety and fire prevention. Hico schools were no exception. According to O. C. Cook, principal, who said, "All the teachers and students realize the importance and necessity the rules of safety and fire prevention have on their lives. They also realize that out of ten fires could have been prevented, but for someone's carelessness."

Last week, students in high school wrote themes and those in elementary school made posters on subjects relating to fire prevention. All of these posters were colorful and informative and good examples of the things students learned about fire prevention.

## Hico to Meridian Friday For District Opener

Hico's Tigers, owning a 3-2-1 season record, kicks off district action tonight, Friday, drawing the favorite, Meridian for the opener. Meridian has been made a heavy favorite to advance a step nearer the district crown which they were picked to win even before the season started. The game, to be played at Meridian, will be homecoming for the Jackets.

Meridian will carry an identical 3-2-1 record into the contest, having lost to Class A teams Joshua and Clifton, and won from Glen Rose, Whitney and Waco B. Their tie was with mighty Crawford last Friday, when the Jackets snapped Crawford's 26-game winning streak.

Coach John Baskin's charges will enter the contest in a crippled state for the seventh time this season. Halfback Alan Solsbery, who scored all four touchdowns in the Tigers' winning effort at Godley last week, went to the sidelines Tuesday afternoon, perhaps for the remainder of the season, with a dislocated shoulder. On the brighter side, Butch Knudson, who has missed the last two games with a knee injury, will be available for limited duty at his guard position. Scott Patterson,

alternating center, is still wearing a cast on his injured knee and will not suit up.

The loss of Solsbery will definitely weaken any chances the Tigers might have had of scoring an upset over the heavier Jackets.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. at Meridian.

## Tigers Overcome 14-Point Deficit to Down Godley 24-22

In a wild, pulse-stopping contest last Friday night, Hico's fighting Tigers spotted Godley Wildcats a 14-0 lead in the first few minutes of play and then came roaring back in the second quarter to stop the hosts 24-22 in as thrilling a high school football game that fans can ever expect to see.

Godley took advantage of two breaks—a fumbled kick attempt and another fumble recovery—in the first quarter to go ahead 14-0 and anyone but the stoutest would have fallen over dead. But not the Tigers.

They came back mad, and before the half ended, the locals had poured across three touchdowns of their own for an 18-14 lead at intermission.

Godley got another marker in the third quarter to go out front again, but the Tigers simply wouldn't quit, coming back with a fourth quarter tally of their own to win the contest.

Alan Solsbery, a slow-starter this season, really blossomed, running for three touchdowns and teaming up with Quarterback Charles Erick on a 65-yard pass and run play for the other marker. Solsbery's running mate at the other halfback slot, Jerry Casey, pitched in his own fine game but wasn't able to dent the end zone. Both played perhaps their best games of the year.

Defensively, the Tigers were "down" from their all-out effort the week before against Gorman, playing spasmodically throughout the game. Only in the second quarter did the defense really hold up, but a ball-control game by the offense didn't allow the hosts a chance to really test it in this period. Godley was allowed only five plays from scrimmage in the second period, one of which was a punt.

On Hico's first possession of the night, the Tigers were unable to

move, bringing up a punt situation. A hard rush by Godley and a low pass from center prevented the play from materializing and Godley took over at the Tiger 32. The Wildcats used six plays to score the first TD of the game, with a little speedster, Roland Massey going the last 18 yards. Massey was good for two conversion points and the Wildcat led 8-0 with only a few minutes gone.

On the second play following the kickoff, Hico fumbled the ball away at their own 55, and Godley

## County Judge Petitioned For Fairy-Hamilton School Merge

Petitions requesting an election to consolidate Fairy Rural High School with Hamilton Independent School District were presented to County Judge G. W. Hurley this week, and in a telephone conversation with the Judge Wednesday morning, the News Review was informed that the election order would be issued the first of next week.

Petitions from both Fairy and Hamilton school districts were presented the judge.

The latest development in the controversial Fairy district came about after a series of meetings involving trustees from Hamilton, Fairy and Hico, and members of the County School Board and County Superintendent.

The latest consolidation election will climax a stormy past three months in the Fairy district when first, a tax increase voted down, and second an issue to consolidate Fairy with Hico was defeated by two votes.

Following the August 24 election in which people at Fairy voted down consolidation with

Hico, members of the above named boards met in Hamilton in an attempt to work out a compromise whereby the Fairy district would be consolidated with Hamilton, with the stipulation that people residing in the Fairy district who wanted their property deannexed to another district would be able to do so.

The August 27th meeting was called by Fairy school officials, who declared that they "had no plans or intentions to operate a school at Fairy for the year 1964-65." Other meetings followed with the end result being presentation of the petitions this week.

Both petitions asked for election to consolidate Fairy Rural High School District 706 with Hamilton Independent School District, under House Bill 87's Incentive Aid Program, referring to Article 2815-3 in Vernon's Civil Statutes of Texas.

A total of 38 signatures were attached to the petition from the Fairy district, and 29 names were signed to the Hamilton petition.

The Band Booster organization meets the second Thursday of each month.

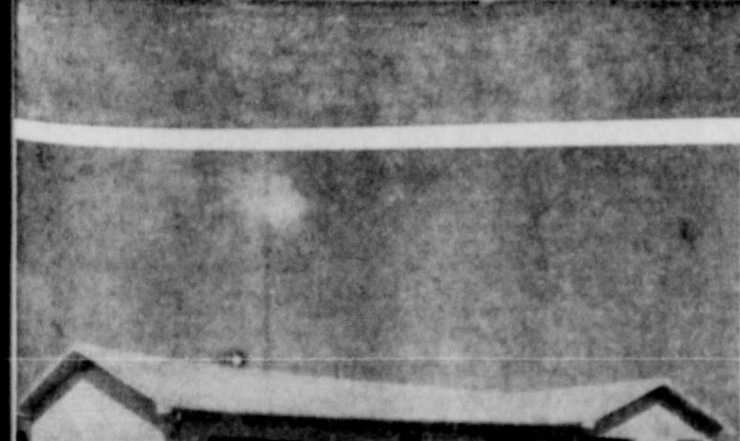
## Girl Scouts Elect New Officers at Recent Meeting

## Game Warden Reports

The dove season is moving along pretty slow to what it has in past years. By this I mean as to the number of birds in this area. At this time I do not know what to tell you what has happened to the doves we usually have in our area this time of the year.

We are running a statewide survey to try to determine what is happening to the doves, since they are on a decrease from year to year. Maybe we will know more about it next year at this time. I have noticed some large northern birds in the area the last week or so. This should improve the weight of your bag limit some if you are lucky enough to find them.

Doe or antlerless deer permits will be issued in Bosque County on November 4 and 5 at the county courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Your 1963 shooting preserve licenses will also be on sale at that time. I would like to remind all landowners that are going to lease out for the first time this year to be sure and buy this license before you accept any money for a lease on your property.

This license can only be obtained from me or the Parks & Wildlife Dept., Austin, at a cost of \$5.00 per tract of land. If you are unable to come in on those days mentioned you may come by or stop me at your convenience. I would like to remind land owners again as to the new regulation on issuing the doe or antlerless permits to the hunter. The hunter must have his part of the permit in his or her possession upon shooting a doe or antlerless deer.

In the past many of you have been letting them shoot the deer first and then come by your home and pick up the permit. Please do not give the hunter the complete permit, since there is a part of it you must turn back in. Your cooperation in this matter will certainly be appreciated since the return of these permits is very important in keeping records of the deer kill in the county.

For you folks in Hamilton County who wish to buy a shooting preserve license I will be at the county court house in Hamilton on Friday, November 8 for this purpose.

I would like to caution you about the deer or roads and highways this time of year. Please be extra careful since the weather has cooled off and the deer are beginning to move around more at night. I have had several deer hit by cars since the first northern last week. Although there have not been any serious injuries to people it certainly could be. If you should happen to hit one please call me as there is always a place that could use the meat.

If you have purchased a new deer rifle, now would be a good time to take it out and learn to handle it before the season gets here. Whether it be a new or old rifle or shotgun always show it respect, since the results of not doing so can sometimes be very tragic.

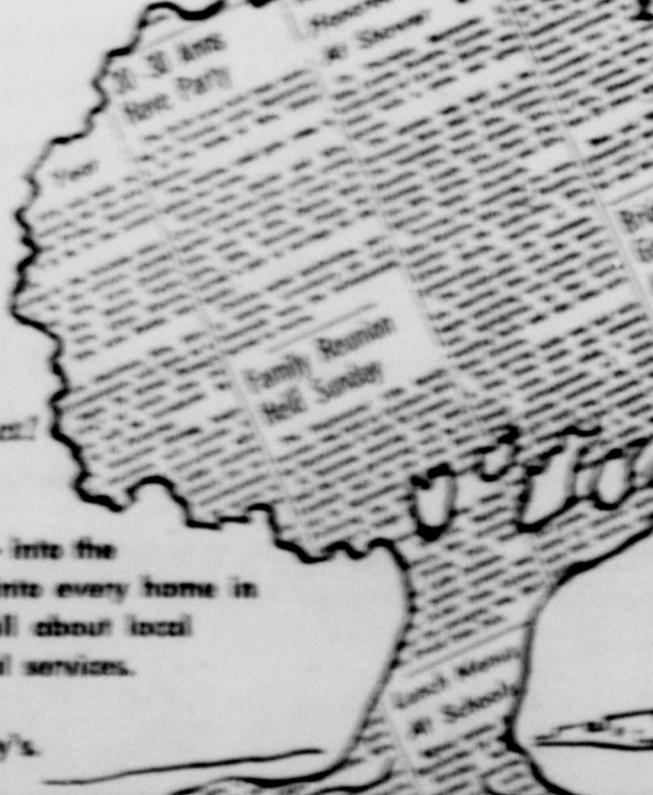

On the Home Range

Save on store specials. There will be differences in retail prices of meat, but feature various kinds of cuts. Consider beef pot roast, and round steak, short ribs ground beef. Pork loin and but roasts, shoulder chops, some brands of bacon and portions are low in price.

Apples are attractively priced for weekend, so take advantage of this value by putting an extra in your shopping basket. Quality is still the watchword at produce centers, but prices on some items are creeping up.

Plant, mustard greens, okra, beans, carrots, celery, sweet potatoes and onions are leaders. Broccoli, brussels sprouts and cauliflower are moderate to relatively high price. Pears are excellent eating out of hand, and grapes attractively priced. Bananas, lemons and limes are good choices.

These supplies generally are available. Since there's often a price spread between various brands, it pays to check labels to be sure of what you're buying.

There's an apple for virtually every taste and use. Some are tart, some become soft when cooked and others hold their shape. Get acquainted with the different varieties in order to know which are better for eating out of hand, for making into a pie, or for making apples that are firm and

free from bruises. Choose size according to their intended use. Small apples are good choices for school lunches or after school snacks, and medium size apples are good choices for general use. Larger apples may be desired for the fruit bowl.

Apples keep best under refrigeration. Go easy with the water when cooking apples. When making sauce, add only enough water to keep apples from sticking to the pan. Cook apples only until tender to retain the creamy white flavor.

Why not have baked apples this weekend. Wash and core apples and peel only about one inch from the top. Bake and serve with this "Jiffy Vanilla Sauce." Mix in a quart saucepan two-third cup sugar; one and a half tablespoon flour, and one-eighth teaspoon salt. Stir in gradually a mixture of two-third cup evaporated milk and one-half cup water.

Cook and stir until mixture boils. Then boil and stir 2 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in 1 tablespoon butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Serve warm or cold on baked apples (also good on bread pudding or cake).

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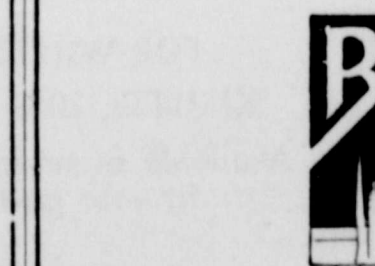

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THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

By VERN SANFORD Texas Press Association

Finance companies which hope to operate in the State under the new Texas Regulatory Loan Act must be licensed by November 21. The so-called "Loan-Shark" law, passed by the 58th Legislature, allows a much higher rate of interest for lenders. But it saddles them with stiff licensing requirements.

Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell predicted that 2,000 loan offices would come under the act. Already he has received more than 2,000 letters of intention to file application for a license. And letters still are flowing in at the rate of 30 or more a day.

One reason for the big response is that many automobile financing companies want to up their interest rates, too. Question of whether they are eligible to operate under the act has not been settled. But they are signing up just in case.

Nursing Home Investigation House General Investigating Committee will explore possible scandals in nursing home construction according to its chairman, Rep. Bob Fairchild of Center. Investigation was requested by Speaker Byron Tunnell after a series of stories on sub-standard nursing homes for old people appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

A separate check by the State Department of Public Safety has been ordered by Gov. John Connally. Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr also has promised support. Rainmaking Agency Proposed Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler thinks the State should have an official rainmaking agency. He says he has discussed the subject with the Governor and hopes to soon have a "concrete proposal to offer."

The Land Commissioner feels that his success with several cloud-seeding experiments warrants serious consideration of a rainmaking agency. Drought Posing Problems Texas with 53 reservoirs completed since 1950 and 12 more under construction, needs a stronger water development program says Gov. Connally. He proposes that the State harness surplus flood water for the protection of persons and property in areas which have too much water, then transport it to areas which have too little.

Final Veterans Land Suit The last (\$200,000) State penalty

suit growing out of Veterans Land Scandals is set for trial here Oct. 14.

Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, now living in Minnesota, may be brought into court again. The defendants, B. R. Sheffield of Brady and L. V. Ruffin of Shreveport, La. want Giles to pay a share of any judgment the State might win.

Press Quarters The Capitol press corps is in new temporary quarters, awaiting completion of remodeling and enlarging of the old press room just outside the Governor's office. Present location is downstairs on the main floor in the west wing of the Capitol building.

All correspondents will get a little more elbow room when the remodeling project is completed. Active competitors have been working side by side in cramped space. "We have the water resources to meet future demands. But only if they are properly developed, conserved and managed," the Governor stated.

According to the Texas Water Commission reservoirs in the state stand at 65 percent of capacity. That's nine percent less than last year at this time. As of the end of August (before Hurricane Cindy) streamflow was deficient for the entire state.

Opposes Poll Tax Repeal Rep. George Hinson of Mineola has come out swinging against repeal of the poll tax. Furthermore, he has volunteered to join any statewide organization that might develop to retain it. Hinson said his district—Wood, Upshur and Camp counties—is two to one against repeal. He charged that voter registration laws are not strong enough at this time to justify dumping the poll tax.

Republicans fearful that repeal might help the voter registration drive of the Democrats dodged the issue at their recent meeting and left the decision "up to the individual voter."

Repeal of the poll tax would mean that voters would be able to register at any time during the year. This would give the Democrats a much better chance of winning the election.

HAMILTON-CORYELL SCS News

By Tom P. Holeyfield

Success with grass planting is tied to two important things. The first is good planting material and the second is a good seed bed in which to plant. Preparation of the seed bed then becomes the first job to be done.

On rough brushy rangeland about the only soil disturbance possible is through the chaining or dozing of brush. Seed should be broadcast immediately following brush control. This means that if seeding is needed the brush should be controlled as near the best planting date as possible.

Cropland being converted to pasture and range is where seed bed preparation really becomes important. This land is always in poor condition due to having been cultivated intensively. These soils are low in organic content and are bad to run together and crust. Soil fertility is also a problem.

Deep breaking in September and October is the first step. Then the land can be smoothed and further conditioned by plowing with

a one-way or tandem disk and harrowed down. It should remain in this condition until just before time to plant.

In the case of sprigging bermuda, on heavy clay soil, the land should be bedded as the final step. Sandy land should be left flat. Then if winter weeds need to be controlled the beds can be plowed with a row cultivator. Moisture is conserved through this method. Planting with row sprigging machines will leave the land practically flat. Sprigging should be started in January and be finished by March 15.

Most seeding of grasses is done by drilling or broadcasting. The land should be prepared the same as for bermuda sprigging and left flat. Any weed growth can be eliminated by light disking. Seed should be drilled very shallow or broadcast on the surface. Compacting with a cultipacker or similar roller is necessary to press the seed into the seed bed.

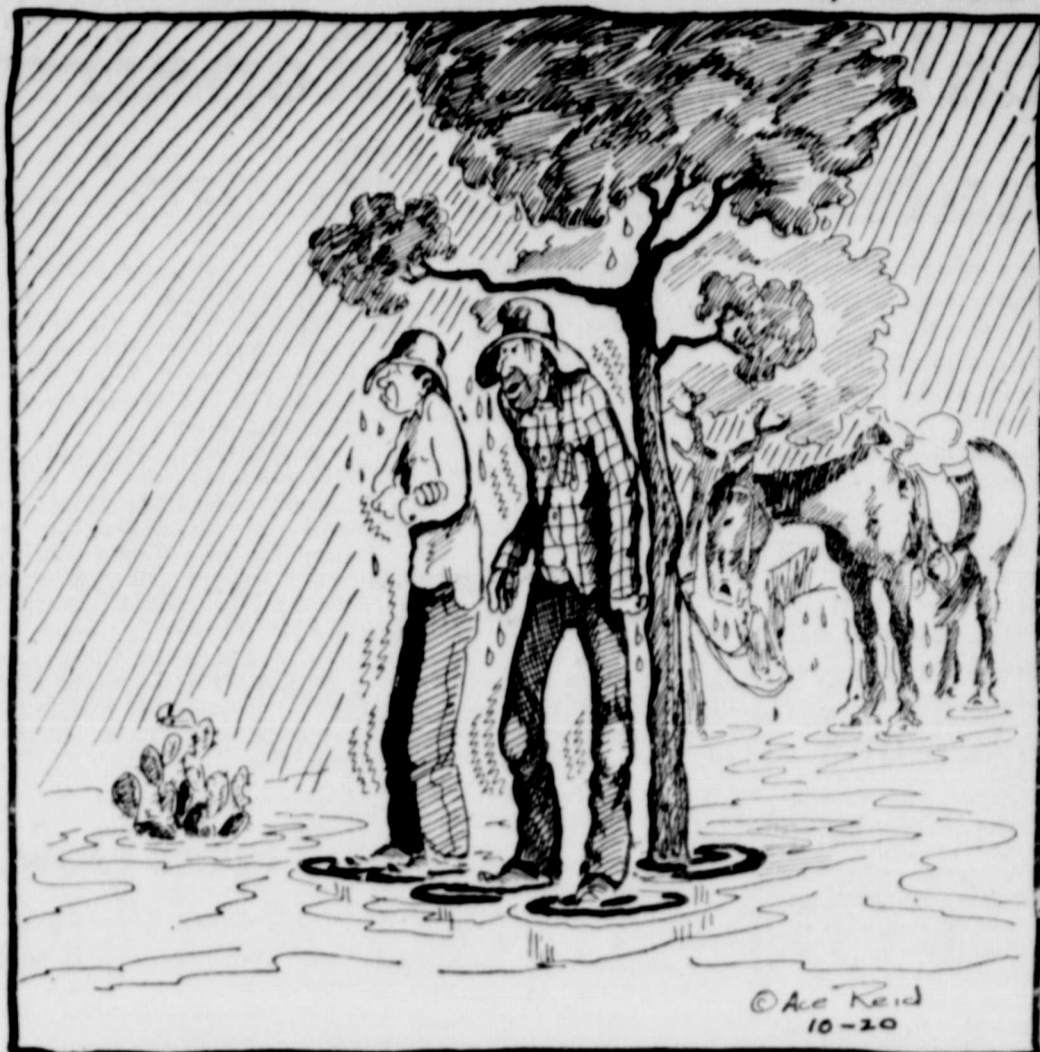
Seed or sod, planted in a well prepared seed bed and cared for as any other high producing crop, will be successful.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Hamilton County rancher Johnny Harris will be featured on the KWTX television farm show "Ten Acres" today at 12:15. Mr. Mitchell, who arranges programs for Johnny Watkins, was in the office October 8 looking for material for the program. We went out and spent about two hours with Johnny. During our visit Mr. Mitchell took pictures of pecan management work that Johnny has been doing. These pictures and others will be shown on the program. Johnny will appear on the program with Johnny Watkins to discuss the pictures.

Due to the increased competition in farming it is necessary for farmers to constantly look for better and more economical ways of doing things. On almost any farm one can find something designed and made by a farmer to serve a specific need. This might be a labor saving device, a piece of machinery made from beginning, or a piece of old equipment remodeled to do a better job. A good example of this is a two-row fertilizer distributor made by Alfred Seider of Aleman. Mr. Seider has been using fertilizer for several years, but has not been completely satisfied with the methods of application. He had no way of applying fertilizer in concentrated bands in the active root zone of row crop plants. By using his own imagination he took pieces of old equipment and built a fertilizer attachment to fit on the bedders. With this machinery he can put the fertilizer in con-

centrated bands about two inches below the area where seed will be planted.

We know through past experience that fertilizer will give best results if placed two inches below or to one side of the seed. With this equipment he accomplishes 3 jobs—first he plows up the stubble from this year's crop; second he re-beds the land; and third he places the fertilizer in the root zone of the plant.

## September Accident Report For Area Released by Sgt.

Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville Area, has released the accident summary for September for the month of September.

The Highway Patrol investigated a total of 36 rural traffic crashes during the month. As a result of these 36 accidents, one person was killed, 28 injured, and the combined property damage amounted to \$17,451.00.

For the first nine months of 1963 the Stephenville Area's rural traffic records show a total of 293 rural traffic crashes resulting in death to seven people, injury to 249, and a combined property damage of \$219,933.00.

For the same period of 1962, the Stephenville Area reported a total of 395 traffic crashes resulting in death to 19 people, injury to 220, and a combined property damage of \$328,400.00.
