A number of Hico Junior exhibitors showed livestock at the Texas State Fair in Dallas last week and won honors in beef and dairy divisions of the show. Ronnie Henderson, son of Mr. Melvin Henderson, showed the Reserve Junior Champion Swiss female in the Pan American Livestock Exposition. He also won his class and placed another heifer third with blue classification in the Junior Cattle Show. Edwin Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Black, showed the fourth

place Holstein Senior Heifer Calf, and Edmund Horton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Horton, had the fifth place heifer in the same class. This was an especially strong class numbering sixteen blue ribbon classification heifers. George Holladay of Hico is breeder of the heifers. In the steer show, James Crews exhibited the first place heavyweight Shorthorn steer. His calf weighed 1010 pounds, and was sold at auction Friday to Safeway Stores for thirty-five cents per pound.

## Tigers Stung By Meridian, to Play Valley Mills Here Friday

Hico Tigers, felled last week in their first district encounter, will play on the always-tough Valley Mills Eagles tonight, Friday at the Stadium in a game that begins at 7:30. The Eagles are fresh from a win over Cranfills Gap in their first district game, and will try to protect their record in a game with Hico. A large crowd is expected for the game. Meridian's Yellowjackets, every bit as good as they had been billing the Tigers into submitting to a 33-6 last Friday night, and now doing become everyone's favorite to cop the district title and another shot at Crawford in district play. Certainly at this time no team in the district appears to be strong enough to swat the Jackets, who rolled on unopposed toward the November 16th showdown at Valley Mills, Hico's opponent Friday night. Meridian set the stage early for the rout of the Tigers, when on their first possession a 90-yard run play netted a TD. The play was nullified, but fans got a glimpse of what was to come in the evening. The nullification didn't really matter because the Jackets took the ball and called the distance to the goal line for their first counter.

Mike Close, who was far from the Tigers all night, got the six points with a two-yard smash. On the first play in the second quarter, Close gathered in a Tiger punt and rambled 90 yards for his second touchdown of the night. Close had plenty of help on the punt return, as the Jackets put on one of the finest exhibitions of down-field blocking seen in a long time. The Jackets lit up the scoreboard for the third time in the first half when Close took a 3-yard pass for his third marker of the night. The TD was set up with an intercepted pass at the Tiger 39. Jimmy Smith, the Jackets' speedster, showed his heels to the Tigers on the second half kickoff, romping 84 yards for his first touchdown of the night. Again, an excellent display of down-field blocking paved the way for the score. Hico's only marker of the night came after the ensuing kickoff, when the Tigers pieced together a 55-yard march. Bill Rutledge got the last step, making the score 26-6. A recovered fumble on the Tiger 9 set up the final tally of the night, with Quarterback Don Hennessee getting the marker on a 13-yard keeper.

# 4 Hico Businesses Destroyed In Tuesday Afternoon Fire

The most damaging fire in several years gutted four Hico businesses late Tuesday afternoon and inflicted smoke and water damage to two adjoining businesses. Five fire units, three from Hico and one each from Hamilton and Stephenville, used a total of nine streams of water in combating the blaze which at one time threatened other buildings in the block. Completely destroyed was Hico Recreation Hall, Sols-

bery Shoe Shop, Lackey Barber Shop, and Hico Real Estate. The Koffee Kup Cafe and Western Auto Store were damaged by smoke and water.

Fire Marshal W. R. Hampton said Wednesday morning that cause of the blaze was still undetermined.

Hampered by heavy smoke, the firemen were more than two hours in extinguishing the blaze. The alarm was turned at 6:05 p.m., and at 8:15 the fire was under control, according to Hampton.

Two persons, Max Nachtigall of Hico and Hamilton Fireman E. L. Rost, were injured when cut by broken glass. Rost received facial cuts, and Nachtigall suffered severe hand and arm lacerations. Both were treated at Hico Hospital.

Hershel Sherrard, owner of the grocery store two doors down the street from the burned buildings first discovered the fire and turned in the alarm. Firemen responded quickly, but nature of the blaze was such that workers' efforts to quickly extinguish the blaze were futile. What fire that could be seen was isolated in the low ceiling of the building, and firemen were unable to direct a stream of water to the fire proper. The roofs of both buildings collapsed.

Estimates of damage to the buildings and contents might run as high as \$20,000 according to reliable sources, much less than was thought at first.

Kal Segrest, owner of the building housing the recreation center, said early Wednesday that he would start as soon as possible on re-building the structure. Mrs. J. O. Davis owns the building which was occupied by the barber shop, shoe store, and real estate office. Both buildings were partially insured, but none of the occupants were insured. Operator of the recreation center, D. O. Chew, had purchased the business only last month from J. L. Landes. Fred Jaggars, owner of Hico Real Estate, Marvin Solebery, and Jerry Lackey all said that they had no insurance.

The Tuesday fire was the first in the business section of Hico since 1955 when Buckhorn Cleaners was gutted. Other fires in the downtown section in the past 23 years was in 1940 when Petty Dry Goods store burned, the old McEver Hatchery fire in 1949, and the Western Auto Store fire in 1952.

## Type 3 Polio Vaccine to Be Given Here

Dr. E. C. Dayton, who has been in charge of both Sabin Polio Vaccine programs here in the past, said this week that Type III Oral Vaccine would be offered to Hico and area residents on Sunday, Nov. 10, and Sunday, Nov. 17.

The program is being sponsored by Hico Civic Club, in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Association.

The program is a joint effort between Hico, Stephenville and Dublin, as was the past two programs here.

The vaccine will be offered under the same plan as before, with no charge being made, but a free-will donation taken to defray the cost of the vaccine.

Place will be the school cafeteria, and time will be the same as before—from 12 noon until 7 p.m. both days.

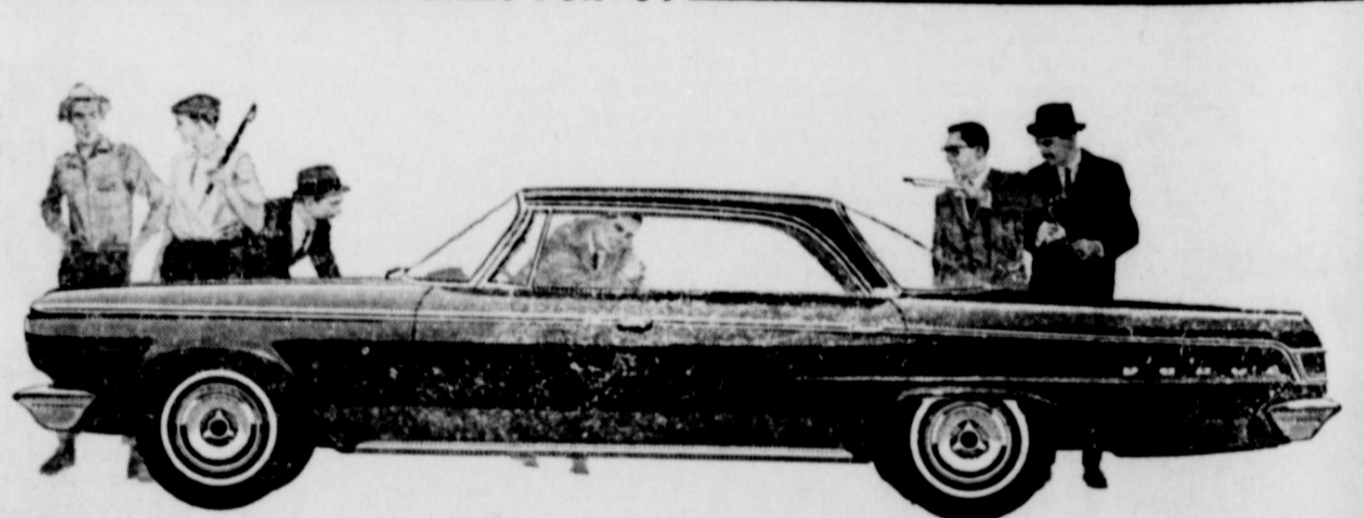

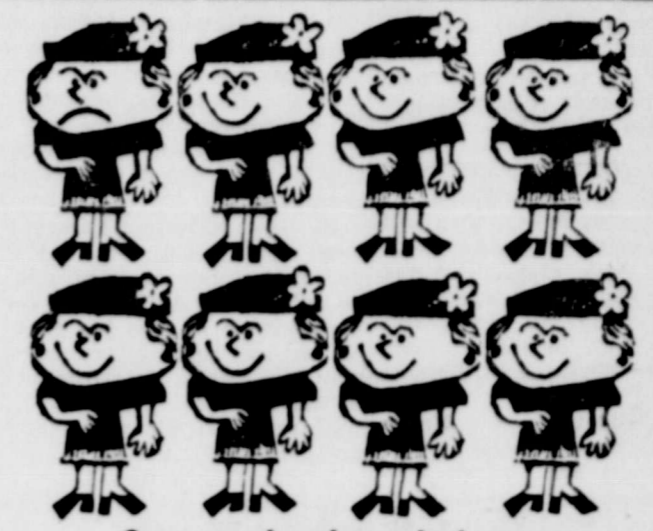

**ORDER OF ELECTION TO CONSOLIDATE DISTRICTS THE STATE OF TEXAS ) COUNTY OF HAMILTON )**

WHEREAS, on the 10th day of October A.D., 1963, a petition was presented to me for an election to be held in each of the following named school districts located in (a) Hamilton County, Texas, to-wit:

1. (b) Hamilton Independent School District No. 902, of said County, 2. (b) Fairy Rural High School District No. 706, of said County,

on the question of determining whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said districts desire to be consolidated with each other.

It appearing that each of said contiguous districts have been properly established and created and are legally and validly existing school districts;

THEREFORE, I in my capacity of County Judge of Hamilton County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 16th day of November, 1963, in Hamilton Independent School District; and Fairy Rural High School No. 706; to determine whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said Districts desire that they shall be consolidated as indicated above for school purposes.

I further order that said election shall be held at the following places in said districts and the following named person is hereby appointed presiding officer and he shall select two Judges and two Clerks to assist him in holding the same and he shall, within five days after said election has been held, make due return thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this County as required by law for holding a General Election:

1. In Hamilton Independent School District at Courthouse Building in Hamilton, Texas, within said district, with Leo F. Rendessy as presiding Judge;

2. In Fairy Rural High School Building at School Building in Fairy, Texas, within said district, with E. C. Parks as presiding Judge.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this County and who are resident voters in said Districts shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor the proposition to consolidate the said Districts for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words:

"FOR CONSOLIDATION"

And those opposed to the proposition to consolidate the said Districts for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST CONSOLIDATION"

Notice of said Election shall be given by posting three notices thereof in three public places within the boundaries of said District for twenty days prior to the date of said election.

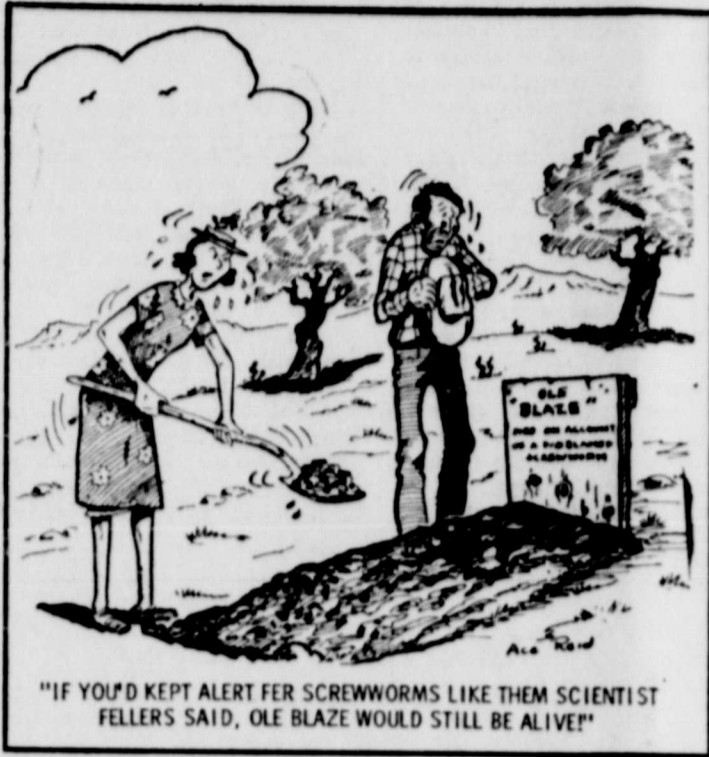
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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Hamilton County had its first case of screwworms this year on October 12. The larvae were identified at Mission October 15. The worms infested a cow owned by Joe McMinn, who lives between Hamilton and Shive.

A representative from the Texas Animal Health Commission sprayed McMinn's cattle last week. The farm was also plotted on the map so officials could saturate the area around the McMinn farm with sterile flies.

We are likely to have more screwworms in the county during the next month, I would like to remind all livestock producers, and especially those in the Shive community, to inspect their livestock twice a week, collect any worms found and notify the veterinarian or county agent. Spray your livestock with Co-Ral and Korlan every two or three weeks. Treat wounds and infestations and kill also larvae.

It is almost unbelievable that the county has been completely free of screwworms for the last

ten months. The eradication program is very encouraging.

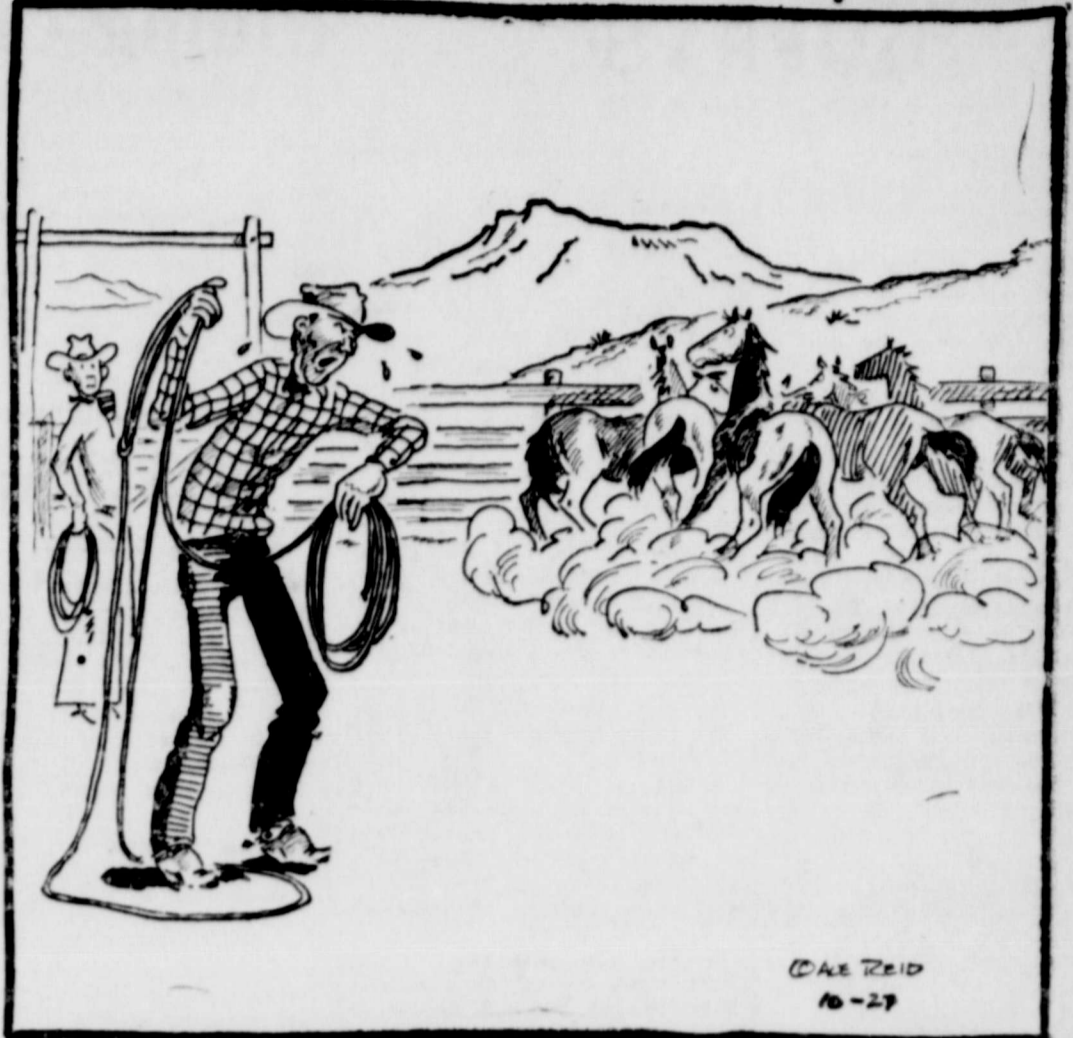
During the past few days, questions have arisen concerning the use of Co-Ral sprays for screwworm control. Some confusion has resulted from label information regarding the cut-off date for cattle grub control with Co-Ral. The material should not be used after October 1 as a 0.37 percent spray as recommended for grub control. However the 0.25 percent spray, as recommended for screwworm control, can be used at any time.

If you have noticed wax or gum oozing from the trunk of your peach trees they are probably infested with peach tree borers. There are two methods of controlling peach tree borers. One is the use of Dieldrin spray in early June and again in mid-August. The second method is a treatment of Paradichlorobenzene (P D B) crystals between October 20 and November 15. A combination of these methods would probably give best results.

If you use the PDB crystals here is the method of treatment. All weeds and grass should be removed from around the tree trunk for about a foot and the PDB crystals placed in a circular band round the tree about two inches from the trunk. A mound of dirt six inches high should then be packed against the tree without allowing the crystals to touch the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree cause injury. Leave the

## SCS News

Peoples have always been vulnerable to some form of attack by enemies of various kinds. The early American settlers lived in dread and fear of attack from the Indians. More recently people have lived in fear of a nuclear attack, intensified at times by reason of deterioration in international relations.

The early pioneers protected their communities against possible Indian attacks by building heavily fortified stockades. Our present population can and should protect themselves from possible nuclear attacks by constructing fall-out shelters. Hard work and expense? Yes, but no worse than that faced by the pioneers.

Agriculture is faced daily by enemies potentially more devastating than Indian raids and as destructive as a nuclear attack. Only the time element is different.

Farmers and ranchers are constantly faced with enemies in the form of fires, accidents, insects, drouths, and floods, to name a few.

Recently we observed Fire Prevention Week. This was done, of course, to emphasize the necessity for always being alert to the damage fires can inflict and the necessity for following a sound fire prevention program. Fires not only destroy buildings, forests, and range grasses in times of drouth, a large number of people lose their lives in fires every year.

Farmers and ranchers do not have professional assistance in putting out fires like people living town and cities. Therefore, the best bet is a sound fire prevention program. Water barrels and pails, and chemical fire extinguishers placed around farm buildings are fire prevention measures known in fire insurance circles as Good Housekeeping. Good Housekeeping consists of such things as preventing the accumulation of trash, feed bags, oily rags, or any other waste materials, particularly in the corners of buildings. Another effective practice is to keep grass and weeds cut back a safe distance from all buildings. All gasoline storage facilities should be located at least 100 feet from buildings. Gasoline should never be used for starting fires. This practice not only creates an undue fire hazard, but often is the cause of injury or loss of life. At best fires on farms are numerous and every one should adopt all known fire prevention and fire protection measures.

Another enemy farmers and ranchers face daily is accidents. Daily newspapers frequently carry reports of serious and often fatal farm accidents. Most are preventable. Careful handling of farm machinery and livestock will reduce accidents to a minimum.

Every farmer and rancher should familiarize himself with safe procedures and follow them rigidly. No doubt your County Agent could be helpful on safety.

Still another enemy is insects. Grasshoppers and caterpillars destroy growing crops and range grasses, and sometimes small grains. Green bugs and red spiders also destroy small grains. Boll weevil, boll worm, leaf worms and flea hoppers play havoc with cotton. Plant lice, or aphids, damage many crops. Screwworms forever plague livestock people. Damage runs into staggering figures. Your County Agent has information on control of most insects and can help you reduce the damage through control measures.

Drouths and floods have always come. Both are destructive. Of course, drouths are of much longer duration than floods. A great deal has been done to reduce the severity of damage inflicted by drouths and floods, but much more remains to be done.

Drouth damage to ranges can be held to a minimum by always keeping a satisfactory cover of grass on the land. Drouths inflict far more damage on over-grazed ranges. As dry as it is, ranges with a good cover have some green grass near the ground where it is shaded. Overgrazed ranges with grass no more than one to two inches high do not show the semblance of life, except broomweeds. Soil Conservation Service people can give you valuable information on handling your ranges and will be glad to do so.

Drouth damage to growing crops can be materially reduced. It is a matter of having cropland in condition to absorb rain that does fall. Conditioning can be achieved through a conservation cropping system. This is another phase

Another formidable enemy is floods. Small retention dams will hold the water where it falls and feed it into streams automatically as streams can carry it and thus reduce the flooding of low lands. Small watershed projects can be developed anywhere needed if the people in the watersheds are interested. The Soil Conservation Service handles the USDA phase of small watershed. Any community interested should contact the Board of Supervisors or some member of the SCS personnel at Hamilton or Gatesville. It is hard to understand why people do not exhibit more interest in watersheds, one of the most valuable phases of Soil and Water Conservation.

All the enemies of agriculture discussed can either be controlled or eliminated. It will take work, of course, but not any more than was required by the early settlers who successfully protected themselves and developed this good country for our profit and pleasure.
